TENDERS FOR LOANS ON TREASURY BILLS.

FACTORY AND WORKSHOP ACT, 1901.

In pursuance of Section 118 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, the Right Honourable Reginald McKenna, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has been pleased to appoint Henry Thomas Ringrose to be an Inspector of Factories and Workshops.
