To The King's Most Excellent Majesty.

The Humble Address of The Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the City of Bristol.

May it please Your Majesty.

We, Your Majesty's dutiful subjects, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the City of Bristol, crave leave to offer a most hearty and loyal welcome to our ancient City on the occasion of Your Majesty's visit to the Show of the Royal Agricultural Society of England, which after a lapse of 35 years is again being held in our City.

The ever-widening scope of the aims and objects of the Society is strikingly emphasised in the present Show by the introduction, at the instance of the Bristol Committee, of a section which illustrates the products of Your Majesty's Overseas Dominions, and the comparison which, for the first time in the history of the Society, can now be made between the products of the Home Country and the Colonies
