No. 3.—SOUTH WARD.

I do hereby determine that South Ward shall comprise so much of the borough of Evesham as lies within the following boundary:—

Commencing at the boundary of the borough in the centre of the River Avon, opposite to the south-west corner of the enclosure of meadow land, adjoining to the said River Avon, and numbered 64 on the Ordnance Survey Map of the scale of 25·344 inches to the statute mile, 1904, second edition, and thence proceeding in an easterly direction, following the southern boundaries of the West and North Wards successively as hereinbefore described, to the centre of the River Avon, at the point opposite to the public road lying immediately to the south of Avon Mill House, and from such last-named point proceeding along the centre of the said River Avon, in a south-westerly direction, to the centre of the roadway passing over Evesham Bridge (otherwise Bengeworth Bridge) over the River Avon, and thence proceeding in an imaginary straight line in an easterly direction to the centre of the public street called Port Street at its point of conjunction with the street called Waterside, and thence proceeding in a south-easterly direction along the centre of Port Street to the point of conjunction of the last-named street with Elm Road and Broadway Road, and thence proceeding along the centre of the said Broadway Road to the boundary of the borough at the place called Longdon Hill, and from the last-named point following the boundary of the borough in a south-westerly, westerly, and generally northerly direction successively to the point of commencement aforesaid.

No. 4.—EAST WARD.

I do hereby determine that East Ward shall comprise so much of the borough of Evesham as lies within the following boundary:—

Commencing at a point in the centre of Evesham Bridge (otherwise Bengeworth Bridge) over the River Avon, and thence proceeding in an easterly direction following the northern boundary of South Ward hereinbefore described to the boundary of the borough, and from such last-named point following the boundary of the borough in a north-easterly and north-westerly direction successively to its point of conjunction with the centre of the River Avon, and thence proceeding along the centre of the said river in a south-westerly direction, following successively the eastern boundaries of North Ward and South Ward hereinbefore described to the point of commencement aforesaid.

And I do hereby assign and apportion three councillors to each and every of the said Wards as follows, that is to say:

To North Ward.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by the Burial Act, 1900, it is enacted that, in case it appear to His Majesty in Council, upon the representation of the Local Government Board, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that no new burial ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require: Provided always that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please His Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered: Provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of
