HIS MAJESTY in Council was this day pleased to appoint The Lord President of the Council; The Right Honourable Thomas McKinnon Wood, M.P., Secretary for Scotland (Vice-President); The Right Honourable Viscount Haldane, K.T., Lord High Chancellor; The First Lord of the Treasury; The Right Honourable the Earl of Elgin and Kincardine, K.G., G.C.S.I., G.C.I.E.;

His Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the eighteenth day of December, in the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the thirty-third and thirty-fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-nine, and of the Acts therein mentioned, that is to say, the Act of the third and fourth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and thirteen, the Act of the fourth and fifth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-nine, and the Act of the thirty-first and thirty-second years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and fourteen, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the church and cure (hereinafter called ‘the said benefice’) of Roecliffe, in the county of York and in the diocese of Ripon.

“Whereas the advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Roecliffe is vested for an estate in fee simple in possession free from incumbrances in Andrew Sherlock Lawson, of Aldborough Manor, Boroughbridge, in the county of York, Esquire.

“And whereas the said Andrew Sherlock Lawson is desirous that the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Roecliffe, now vested in him as aforesaid, should be transferred to and vested in the Right Reverend Thomas Wortley, now Bishop of Ripon, and his successors in the same Bishoprick.

“And whereas the said Thomas Wortley, Bishop of Ripon, is willing to accept such transfer, and in token of such his willingness and also in token that the same transfer has that consent of the Bishop of the diocese which by the Acts in the hereinbefore mentioned Act recited or by some or one of them is made necessary, he, the said Thomas Wortley, Bishop of Ripon, has executed this Scheme as hereinafter mentioned.

“And whereas the transfer of the patronage of the said benefice of Roecliffe which is hereinbefore mentioned and hereinafter recommended and proposed will render the same benefice more eligible for augmentation out of funds under our control, and this circumstance will, in our opinion, tend to make better provision for the cure of souls in the parish or district in or in respect of which the right of patronage or advowson so recommended and proposed to be transferred as aforesaid arises or exists, that is to say, in the new parish of Roecliffe.

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Andrew Sherlock Lawson (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), and with the consent of the said Thomas Wortley, Bishop of Ripon (in testimony whereof he has signed this Scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order,

the whole advowson or perpetual right of patronage of and presentation to the said benefice of Roecliffe now vested in him the said Andrew Sherlock Lawson as aforesaid shall be transferred to the said Thomas Wortley, Bishop of Ripon, and his successors in the same Bishoprick, and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the said Thomas Wortley, Bishop of Ripon, and his successors in the same Bishoprick for ever.

“And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of his said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Ripon.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, have, in pursuance of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four; of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four; and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Scheme or Representation, bearing date the fifteenth day of January, in the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, acting under the provisions of the Act of the seventh and eighth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter ninety-four, of the Act of the thirteenth and fourteenth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, and of the Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme or Representation for altering the boundaries of the new parish of Great Marsden, in the county of Lancaster and in the diocese of Manchester.

“Whereas, by the authority of an Order of

Her said late Majesty in Council, bearing date the eighth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, and published in the London Gazette on the third day of the following month, a separate district for spiritual purposes was constituted out of the parochial chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Colne, in the parish of Whalley, in the said county of Lancaster, and at that time in the diocese of Chester, but now in the said diocese of Manchester, and such district was named 'the District of Great Marsden.'

"And whereas the said District of Great Marsden has become a new parish of the character contemplated by the Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her said late Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, by the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her said late Majesty, chapter one hundred and four, and by the above-mentioned Act of the thirty-second and thirty-third years of Her said late Majesty, chapter ninety-four.

"And whereas it has been represented to us, and it appears to us to be expedient that the boundaries of the said new parish of Great Marsden should be altered in the manner which is hereinafter mentioned.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Edmund Arbuthnott, Bishop of Manchester (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme or Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent, recommend, and propose that from and after the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council, ratifying this Scheme or Representation, and without any assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the boundaries of the said new parish of Great Marsden shall be altered so that all that portion of the said new parish of Great Marsden, which is described in the schedule hereunder written, and is delineated and set forth upon the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink, shall be dissevered from such new parish and shall be restored to, and shall in future form part of the said parochial chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Colne.

"And we further represent, recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from representing, recommending or proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the hereinbefore mentioned Acts, or of any of them or of any other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme or Representation has reference.

"The territory to be dissevered from the new parish of Great Marsden, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Manchester, and to be restored to the parochial chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Colne, in the same county and diocese, being:—

"All that portion of the said new parish of Great Marsden, which is bounded upon all sides as follows, that is to say, upon part of the south by the new parish of Trawden, in the said county and diocese, upon the east, upon the north-east, and upon the north by the said parochial chapelry of Saint Bartholomew, Colne, upon the west by the consolidated

chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Colne, in the said county and diocese, and upon the remaining part of the south by an imaginary line, commencing at the point on the south-western side of Knott's Lane to the south-west of the Spring Gardens Mill Water Reservoirs, where the boundary which divides the said consolidated chapelry of the Holy Trinity, Colne, from the said new parish of Great Marsden, meets the boundary of the Municipal Borough of Colne, and extending thence first south-eastward, then north-eastward, then again south-eastward, and then again north-eastward, along the boundary of the said Municipal Borough of Colne (thereby following in part the south-western side of Knott's Lane, in part the south-eastern side of Lenches Road, in part the south-western side of the road leading from Reed Row to Kiln Hill, in part the middle of the stream flowing past the north-western side of the house and premises known as Kiln Hill, into Church Clough Brook, and in part the middle of such brook), for a distance of sixty-three chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said new parish of Great Marsden from the said new parish of Trawden."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme or Representation have been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the cures affected by the arrangements which are contemplated by such Scheme or Representation, and such Patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent thereto.

And whereas the said Scheme or Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme or Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Manchester.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty, by virtue of the authority conferred on Him by the Copyright Act, 1911, and having regard to the provisions of the Berlin Copyright Convention, was pleased to make an Order in Council, dated the 24th day of June, 1912 (hereinafter called the Principal Order), extending the protection of the said Act to certain classes of works to which protection is guaranteed by the said Convention.

And whereas it is provided in Article (2) proviso (i) of the Principal Order that Sections 1 (2) (d) and 19 of the Copyright Act, 1911, and such other part or parts thereof as

confer upon the owner of the copyright in a literary, dramatic or musical work the exclusive right of making any record, perforated roll, cinematograph film, or other contrivance by means of which the work may be mechanically performed, and such other part or parts thereof as confer copyright in any record or perforated roll shall not apply in the case of any work of which the country of origin is Italy:

And whereas His Majesty has received an assurance from the Italian Government to the effect that the widest protection is granted in Italy to works of British origin, to the authors of which is reserved the exclusive right of every form of reproduction, execution, or representation by any means whatever (including the cinematograph, as well as mechanical musical instruments):

And whereas, in view of this assurance, it is expedient to revoke the provision above referred to in Article (2) proviso (i) of the Principal Order:

Now therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority conferred upon him by the Copyright Act, 1911, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

(1) The provisions of Article (2) proviso (i) of the Principal Order are hereby revoked so far as they relate to works of which the country of origin is Italy.

(2) In the application of the provisions of Article (3) of the Principal Order to works of which the country of origin is Italy, the commencement of this Order shall be substituted for the commencement of the Act and for the commencement of the Principal Order.

(3) In the application to works of which the country of origin is Italy of sections 1 (2) (d) and 19 of the Copyright Act, 1911, the commencement of this Order shall be substituted for the commencement of the Act, and for the passing of the Act, in sections 19 (7) and 19 (8), wherever those expressions occur, and the 1st day of July, 1914, for the 1st day of July, 1913.

(4) Where any person has, before the date of this Order, taken any action whereby he has incurred any expenditure or liability in connection with the reproduction or performance of any work at a time when such reproduction or performance would, but for the making of this Order, have been lawful, nothing in this Order shall diminish or prejudice any rights or interest arising from, or in connection with, such action which are subsisting or valuable at the said date unless the person who, by virtue of this Order, becomes entitled to restrain such reproduction or performance agrees to pay such compensation as, failing agreement, may be determined in accordance with the provisions of the Copyright Act, 1911.

(5) This Order shall come into operation on the first day of April, 1914, which date is in this Order referred to as the commencement of the Order.

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary orders accordingly.

And whereas it appears expedient to amend and add to such Rules as hereinafter provided:

And whereas the provisions of section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in Him vested, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

(1) This Order shall come into force on the 1st March, 1914.

(2) Clauses 17 and 20 of the Second Schedule to the said Order in Council, dated the 16th December, 1912, are hereby repealed.

(3) The following additional rules shall have effect in relation to the Dockyard Port of Portsmouth, and shall be read and construed as though inserted in the Second Schedule to the said Order in Council, dated the 16th December, 1912, in the positions indicated by the numbers prefixed thereto:—

RULES.

17. When one of His Majesty's vessels or other vessel in charge of His Majesty's Officers intends to pass in or out of the Harbour she shall hoist O flag (International Code—Alphabetical) by day, or a red light by night at the foremast head, and all other of His Majesty's vessels present in the Port shall hoist the Pilot Jack by day, or show position lights (two white lights vertical, 8 feet apart, hoisted at the Peak, or if no gaff, hoisted abreast of the main-top in the middle line of the ship or on the ensign staff) by night, as a general warning. The Pilot Jack shall be hoisted by day, or position lights by night at the Semaphore

Tower in the Dockyard and position lights shall also be shown at the Horse Fort by night, for the same purpose, and all other vessels under way in the harbour shall keep out of the way of the said vessel flying the O flag by day, or showing the red light by night, at the foremast head; provided always that the said vessel shall be navigated with due care and at a moderate speed.

20. When it is specially necessary to keep the harbour channel clear owing to a very large vessel or royal yacht entering or leaving harbour, a red oblong flag, with a white diagonal bar from the outer upper corner will be hoisted by day, or three green lights vertical by night, at the Semaphore Tower, Fort Blockhouse and Horse Fort, and while this flag is flying, or these green lights are being shown, no vessel is to enter the harbour channel from either end.

Lights and Signals for Dredgers.

21. A dredger when at work or in position for working shall carry the following Lights and Signals, viz.:—

Lights between Sunset and Sunrise:—

(a) *Forward*.—In the forward part of the dredger, at a height of not less than 20 and not exceeding 40 feet above the hull, a white light in a lantern, so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile.

(b) *Amidships*.—Three such white lights placed in a triangular form at least 8 feet apart, at right angles to the keel and with the apex uppermost, the base of the triangle to be at least 10 feet higher than the forward light and to be also higher than and clear of the framework, funnels or other erections upon the dredger. If so moored or working as to make it necessary to prohibit the passage of vessels on one or both sides, a red light or lights in a lantern so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile, is, or are, to be substituted for the lower light or lights of the triangle on the side or sides on which passage is prohibited.

(c) *Aft*.—One such white light at or near the stern of the dredger and at such a height that it shall not be less than 15 feet lower than the forward light.

Signals between Sunrise and Sunset:—

Amidships.—Three black balls of not less than 2 feet in diameter placed in a triangular form at least 8 feet apart, at right angles to the keel, with the apex uppermost, the base of the triangle to be higher than, and clear of, the framework, funnels, or any other erection upon the dredger. If so moored or working so as to make it necessary to prohibit passage on one or both sides, a red flag or flags at least 5 feet in the hoist is, or are, to be substituted for the lower ball or balls of the triangle on the side or sides on which passage is prohibited.

Signal in Fog:—

In fog, mist, falling snow or heavy rain storms a dredger at work or in a position for working, shall at intervals of not more than one minute sound a gong rapidly for about 5 seconds.

RULES.

7a. A dredger when at work or in position for working shall carry the following Lights and Signals, viz.:—

Lights between Sunset and Sunrise:—

(a) *Forward*.—In the forward part of the dredger, at a height of not less than 20 and not exceeding 40 feet above the hull, a white light in a lantern, so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile.

(b) *Amidships*.—Three such white lights placed in a triangular form at least 8 feet

apart, at right angles to the keel and with the apex uppermost, the base of the triangle to be at least 10 feet higher than the forward light and to be also higher than and clear of the framework, funnels or other erections upon the dredger. If so moored or working as to make it necessary to prohibit the passage of vessels on one or both sides, a red light or lights in a lantern so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile, is, or are, to be substituted for the lower light or lights of the triangle on the side or sides on which passage is prohibited.

(c) *Aft*.—One such white light at or near the stern of the dredger and at such a height that it shall not be less than 15 feet lower than the forward light.

Signals between Sunrise and Sunset:—

Amidships.—Three black balls of not less than 2 feet in diameter placed in a triangular form at least 8 feet apart, at right angles to the keel, with the apex uppermost, the base of the triangle to be higher than and clear of the framework, funnels or any other erection upon the dredger. If so moored or working so as to make it necessary to prohibit passage on one or both sides, a red flag or flags at least 5 feet in the hoist is, or are, to be substituted for the lower ball or balls of the triangle on the side or sides on which passage is prohibited.

Signal in Fog:—

In fog, mist, falling snow or heavy rain storms a dredger at work or in a position for working, shall at intervals of not more than one minute sound a gong rapidly for about 5 seconds.

8. When one of His Majesty's vessels or other vessel in charge of His Majesty's Officers intends to pass between Hamoaze and the Sound she shall hoist O flag (International Code—Alphabetical) by day, or a red light by night, at the foremast head, and all other of His Majesty's vessels present in the Port shall hoist the Pilot Jack by day, or show position lights (two white lights vertical, 8 feet apart hoisted at the Peak, or if no gaff, hoisted abreast of the main top in the middle line of the ship or on the ensign staff) by night, as a general warning. The Pilot Jack shall also be hoisted by day, or position lights by night, on the flag staff at Mount Wise for the same purpose and all other vessels under way in Hamoaze or in the narrow waters of the Sound shall keep out of the way of the said vessel flying the O flag, or showing the red light at the foremast head; provided always that the said vessel shall be navigated with due care and at a moderate speed.

NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE.

The National Health Insurance (Preliminary Expenses) Order, 1914, dated January 19, 1914, made by the Insurance Commissioners under section 78 of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (1 & 2 Geo. 5, c. 55).

Whereas by section 78 of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (in this Order called "the Act") it is amongst other things provided that if any difficulty arises with respect to bringing into operation Part I of the Act, the Insurance Commissioners may, with the consent of the Treasury, by Order, do any thing which appears to them necessary or expedient for bringing that part of the Act into operation, and any such Order may modify the provisions of the Act so far as may appear necessary or expedient for carrying the order into effect:

And whereas it is provided by the Act that the funds for defraying the expenses of administration of benefits shall be derived in certain proportions in the Act more particularly set forth from contributions from employed contributors and their employers and from moneys provided by Parliament:

And whereas by sub-section (2) of section 35 of the Act which relates to the accounts to be kept by Approved Societies and branches it is provided that Regulations made under that section shall provide for a separate account being kept showing the amount expended on administration and for limiting the amount which may be carried to that account out of the contributions under Part I of the Act:

And whereas it is necessary, in order to bring Part I of the Act into operation, that Approved Societies and branches should be established and for that purpose that expenses should be incurred in getting up and obtaining approval for those Societies and in forming branches thereof, and doubts have arisen as to whether

it will be open to an Approved Society or branch when established to defray any expenses incurred by or on behalf of the Society or branch before approval has been obtained, or, in the case of a branch before the establishment thereof, and a difficulty has thereby arisen within the meaning of section 78 aforesaid:

Now, therefore, the Insurance Commissioners, in pursuance of section 78 of the Act and every other power enabling them in that behalf, with the consent of the Treasury, hereby order as follows:—

1. Any expenses reasonably incurred by an Approved Society for the purpose of becoming approved under the Act, or in repaying to any person expenses reasonably incurred by him in getting up or obtaining approval for the Society, and any expenses reasonably incurred by a branch of an Approved Society (being a branch which administers benefits under the Act) for the purpose of forming the branch or in repaying to any person the expenses of forming the branch may, if the Society or branch thinks fit, be treated as though they were expenses incurred by the Society or branch in the administration of the benefits conferred by the Act.

2.—(1) This Order may be cited as the National Health Insurance (Preliminary Expenses) Order, 1914.

(2) The Interpretation Act, 1889, applies to the interpretation of this Order as it applies to the interpretation of an Act of Parliament.

(3) The National Health Insurance (Preliminary Expenses) Order, 1912, is hereby revoked.

Regulation under Section 8.

BOROUGH OF CAMBRIDGE.

To Wit.

WHEREAS, by section 2 of the Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1865, it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of two members of the Council, by an Order in writing, to prohibit the importation or introduction into this Isle, of Cattle, Horses, Sheep or other animals for such period or periods as may be deemed necessary for the purpose of preventing the introduction of any infectious or contagious disease among cattle, horses, sheep or other animals in this Isle:

And whereas the infectious disease commonly called "Foot and Mouth Disease" prevails amongst animals in certain places in Ireland.
