WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the twelfth day of March, in the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, in the words and figures following that is to say

ing, that is to say:
"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for
England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth
and seventh years of Her late Majesty Queen

Victoria, chapter thirty-seven, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property in the parish of Croydon, in the county of Surrey, now vested in us.

"Whereas under and by virtue of the several indentures, particulars whereof are set forth in the Schedule hereunder written, the tithes or tithe rentcharges, lands, tenements, and hereditaments situate in the parish of Croydon aforesaid, and particularly described in the same indentures and Schedule became with their appurtenances, and are now vested in us.
"And whereas none of the said tithes, lands,

tenements, and hereditaments are subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant, but are now in our possession, but some portions thereof, on account of their character or situation, are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

"And whereas with a view to the advan-tageous appropriation of the same or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, it is expedient that the said tithes, lands, tenements, and hereditaments, or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit, should be sold or disposed of, and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such tithes, lands, tenements, and hereditaments, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable:

"Now therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell or dispose of and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said tithes, lands, tenements, and hereditaments so vested in us as aforesaid, under and by virtue of the said several indentures or any of them with their appurtenances and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein or in any part or parts thereof unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same and his or their heirs, executors, adminis-trators, or assigns or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall, upon due calculation and inquiry, appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale from time to time, as occasion may arise, in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rentcharges, tenements, or hereditaments, or of some estate or interest therein convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock or other public securities in England.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and

after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Canterbury.

#### PRESENT.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, by section 20 of the Finance Act, 1911, it is enacted that His Majesty may, by Order in Council, provide that any powers and duties of the Commissioners of Inland Revenue, whether statutory or otherwise, with reference to any stamps used to denote duties of postage, or any stamps used to denote other duties, being either adhesive stamps or stamps which are usually sold or distributed at a post office, or with reference to any postal orders, licences, or forms usually so sold or distributed shall be exercised and performed by the Postmaster-General, either to the exclusion of the Commissioners of Inland Revenue or concurrently with those Commissioners, and that any such Order shall have effect as if enacted in the said Act, and that such provisions may be made by the Order as appear necessary or expedient to give full effect to the exercise and performance of the powers and duties to which the said Order relates in manner provided by the said Order.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, in exercise of the powers vested in Him by the said recited enactment, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby

ordered as follows:

1. This Order may be cited as "The Inland Revenue and Post Office (Powers and Duties) Order, 1914," and shall come into operation

on the first day of April, 1914.

2. As from the date on which this Order comes into operation all or any of the hereinbefore recited powers and duties of the Commissioners of Inland Revenue, except powers and duties with reference to impressed (as distinct from adhesive) stamps denoting any duty or fee other than a duty of postage, and to the following matters, namely, the allowance for or re-purchase of any stamps which

are appropriated exclusively to payment of any duty or fee other than a duty of postage, and proceedings to enforce the law with regard to the amount of duty payable in respect of any document which should bear a stamp in payment of any duty other than a duty of postage shall be exercised and performed by the Postmaster-General concurrently with the Commissioners of Inland Revenue and the Statutes, Orders, and Regulations under which the same or any of them have heretofore been exercised and performed by the Commissioners of Inland Revenue, shall be and are hereby so modified as may be necessary or expedient to adapt them to this Order, and to give full effect to the exercise and performance by the Postmaster-General of the said powers and duties of the Commissioners of Inland Revenue except as aforesaid.

And whereas it is expedient that Article 3 of the said first-mentioned Order should be

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and by virtue of the authority conferred upon Him by the Copyright Act, 1911, is pleased to order, and

it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. Article 3 of the said Order shall be varied by omitting therefrom the words "and the first day of July, 1914, for the first day of July, 1913," and the Article shall take effect as if those words had not been inserted therein.

2. This Order shall come into operation on

the 1st day of April, 1914.

And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary orders accordingly.

### PRESENT

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council from time to time, by Order in Council, to define the limits of a Dockyard Port for the purposes of that Act, and to make regulations in relation to any Dockyard Port for all or any of the purposes in the said Act particularly mentioned, and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary, with a view to the proper protection of His Majesty's vessels, dockyards, or property, or to the requirements of His property, or to the majesty's Naval Service:

And whereas by the same Act it is also enacted that in relation to any Dockyard Port, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council from time to time, by Order in Council, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and Board of Trade, to make rules concerning the Lights or Signals to be carried or used, and the steps for avoiding collisions to be taken by His Majesty's vessels, and other vessels navigating the waters of the Port, and of the approaches thereto:

And whereas in pursuance of the said Act, certain Regulations and Rules were made by Order in Council, dated the sixteenth day of February, 1903, with reference to the Dock-

yard Port of Portland:

And whereas it appears expedient to repeal the said Order in Council and Regulations and Rules and to substitute therefor this Order and the Regulations and Rules contained in the First and Second Schedules hereto respectively:

And whereas the provisions of section one of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been

complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in Him vested, and so far as regards the Rules contained in the Second Schedule hereto, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:-

### PRELIMINARY.

1. This Order shall take effect from one calendar month from the date hereof.

2. On this Order taking effect the said Order of 16th February, 1903, shall cease to operate, and in lieu of the Regulations and Rules

thereby made the Regulations and Rules set forth in the First and Second Schedules to this Order are hereby made and shall have effect in relation to the Dockyard Port of Portland.

3. In this Order, and in the Schedules hereto, unless the context shall otherwise

require :-

The term "vessel" shall mean and include ship, boat, lighter and craft of every kind however propelled;
The term "steam vessel" shall include

any vessel propelled by machinery;
The term "Master" shall mean the person having command or charge of the vessel for the time being

The term "King's Harbour Master" shall mean the person for the time being appointed to be King's Harbour Master of the Dockyard Port of Portland under the Dock-

yard Ports Regulation Act, 1865; The term "Dockyard Port" shall mean the Dockyard Port of Portland as defined in

paragraph 4 hereof;

The term "Harbour" shall mean Portland Harbour as defined in paragraph 4 hereof.

### DESCRIPTION OF LIMITS.

### Dockyard Port of Portland.

4. For the purposes of the said Act and of this Order, the limits of the Dockyard Port of Portland shall be as follows:

On the north a line drawn east (true) from the Nothe Point, Weymouth.

On the east a line drawn south (true) from a position 3,400 yards east (true) from Nothe Point.

On the south a line drawn east (true) from the north point of Church Cove.

On the west the line of high-water mark of spring tides from the Nothe Point to the north point of Church Cove, except at the entrance to the East Fleet, where the western boundary of the Port shall be the western side of Portland Bridge.

### Limits of Portland Harbour.

Portland Harbour shall comprise that portion of the Dockyard Port aforesaid which is enclosed by the Breakwaters.

### DELINEATION OF LIMITS.

5. The limits mentioned herein are delineated on the Chart annexed to this Order.

### PENALTIES.

6. Any infringement of the Regulations contained in the First Schedule hereto shall render the person infringing liable to the penalty prescribed in Clause 25 of the said Schedule.

### FIRST SCHEDULE.

### REGULATIONS.

#### GENERAL.

1. Moorings for His Majesty's vessels, mark buoys, and other aids of navigation, and such other buoys as may be required for any purpose in connection with Naval or Military operations, may be placed by the King's Harbour Master in such positions as he may from time to time consider the requirements of His Majesty's Service demand.

- 2. No person shall lay moorings for private vessels, hulks, rafts, pontoons, bathing stages, houseboats, timber or any floating structures in the Dockyard Port without the permission, in writing, of the King's Harbour Master, and all such moorings shall be in such positions as the King's Harbour Master shall deem fit, and shall be forthwith removed on the requisition of the King's Harbour Master to that effect.
- 3. If at any time the anchor of any merchant or other private vessel hooks any government moorings, or any electric cables, or moorings of buoys, the Master or other person having the charge or command of such vessels shall not proceed to unhook the same, but shall forthwith give notice thereof to the King's Harbour Master, in order that aid may be given for clearing such moorings or cables without doing damage to the same.

4. No merchant or other private vessel shall make fast to, or lie at, any of the buoys marking the channels or shoals in the Dockyard

Port.

5. No merchant or other private vessel shall, without license in writing from the King's Harbour Master, be moored or fastened to any of the Forts, or to any government moorings, buoys, piles, or vessels in the Dockyard Port, nor shall such vessel anchor in the fairway channel so as to obstruct the entrances or passages into the Harbour or any of them.

6. All vessels subject to or being in quarantine shall anchor in such place as the King's

Harbour Master may direct.

7. No fishing from boats shall be carried on within one hundred feet of His Majesty's Naval. Depôt and Establishment, or of any government storehouses, tanks, arsenals, powder magazines, wharves, or other govern-

ment buildings or property.

- 8. No trawling or fishing by nets shall take place within one hundred feet of His Majesty's Naval Depôt and Establishment, or of any government storehouses, tanks, arsenals, powder magazines, wharves, or other government buildings or property, in the channels between the breakwaters in the Man of War Anchorage or in the area set apart for the torpedo range or in any part of the Dockyard Port where it would obstruct vessels passing in or out of the channels between the breakwaters.
- 9. No ballast, stones, sand, earth, clay, refuse, ashes, rubbish, dust, filth of any description, or refuse from any quarry, mine or pit, or any other matters solid or liquid whatsoever, shall be unladen, cast, or allowed to fall into the waters of the Dockyard Port, except in such places as may be appointed by the King's Harbour Master, or upon the banks or any portion of the shore of the said Dockyard Port where the same may be liable to be washed into the waters of the said Dockyard Port by rain, tide or otherwise; or into or upon the shores of any rivers or streams discharging into the said Dockyard Port where the same may be liable to be washed into the said rivers or streams by rain, flood or otherwise.

10. The removal of sand, shingle or any other material whatsoever from any foreshore adjoining Admiralty property within the limits of the Dockyard Port, and anywhere between Sandsfoot Castle and the Ferry Bridge is prohibited.

11. No firearm nor air-gun shall be discharged from any vessel or from the shore within the limits of the Dockyard Port excepting always such discharge of firearms as may be necessary

by His Majesty's Naval and Military Forces and the Metropolitan Police employed within the limits of the said Port, for drill or practice, and for the protection of His Majesty's Vessels and the Naval and Military Magazines and Establishments.

12. No ship's gun on board any merchant or other private vessel shall be kept loaded, nor shall any such gun be discharged except as a

signal of distress.

13. No vessel shall anchor on the line of any electric cable laid down in the Dockyard Port, when such line is indicated by whitewashed posts, or other discernible marks erected on shore, and a warning has been conveyed to mariners by notice issued by the Admiralty and published in the London Gazette.

- 14. Whenever it may be necessary for mining or gunnery operations or experiments, dredging operations, or other Naval or Military purposes to reserve any further area than that mentioned in Clause 18 for such operations or purposes, the area will be marked by buoys coloured green and white, or by posts coloured red; and after twenty-one days' warning notice has been issued by the Admiralty, and published in the London Gazette, no vessel shall anchor within or pass through the area so marked, unless compelled to do so by stress of weather, or to avoid accident; nor when such area is uncovered, or nearly uncovered, at low water, shall any person pass through it, or remain in it, unless by permission of, and under such arrangements as may be from time to time made by, the Officer in charge of such operations.
- 15. Persons may at any time be prohibited by order of the King's Harbour Master from landing on the breakwaters.

#### ANCHORAGE.

### General.

- 16. All merchant or other private vessels shall be subject to the direction of the King's Harbour Master.
- 17. All the anchorage within the breakwaters to the eastward of the line drawn in a north (true) direction through two triangular white marks erected on the hill side east of the houses at Castleton, Portland, shall be reserved for the exclusive use of His Majesty's Ships, and no merchant or other private vessel shall anchor therein except with the permission of the King's Harbour Master.
- 18. The area within the breakwaters lying westward of the above-mentioned line drawn through the white marks, and northward of a line drawn S. 80° E. (true) from the end of the Torpedo Pier at the north side of the entrance to the Fleet is reserved for a Torpedo Range, and no vessel shall anchor therein, except with the permission of the King's Harbour Master. This Torpedo Range is further extended right across the Harbour to the south shore. The line of the range is drawn S. 2° W. (true) from the Torpedo Pier at Bincleaves to a beacon situated 580 feet westward of Portland Castle.
- 19. Merchant or other private vessels may, subject to the directions of the King's Harbour Master, anchor westward of the above-mentioned line drawn through the white marks, and southward of the above-mentioned line drawn S. 80° E. (true) from the end of the Torpedo Pier.

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### Castleton Wharves.

20. All vessels using the Crown Wharves at Castleton, Portland (hereinafter called the Wharves), shall be subject to the direction of the King's Harbour Master.

21. Anchors shall not be let go in the fairway

to the Wharves.

22. Masters of vessels bound for the Wharves (should the state of tide not permit of their getting there) shall take up a berth at anchor in such a position as will allow a clear passage for vessels going to or leaving the Wharves, and before attempting to come alongside to discharge shall ascertain from the King's Harbour Master that there is sufficient water to enable

them to get into their berths.

In the case of a sailing vessel arriving at the same time as a steam vessel, the steam vessel is to be berthed before the sailing vessel; and should a sailing vessel be already in occupation of a berth alongside Wharf No. 5 she is in the first place to shift so as to permit the steam vessel to get in and work her foremost hold either in loading or discharging, and if the sailing vessel has no prospect of completing discharge within six hours she is to further shift and permit the steam vessel to get right along-side taking up a berth outside the steam vessel, or if necessary go to anchor. Should a steam vessel be unloading at Wharf No. 5 and another steam vessel arrive to load at Wharf No. 4 the unloading steam vessel is to move to such an extent as may be necessary by either hauling her stern off or by moving outside the loading steam vessel so as to allow the loading steam vessel to lay alongside Wharf No. 4.

23. Every sea-going sailing vessel using or intending to use the Wharves shall be kept at all times so ballasted as to be in a condition to

be safely removed.

24. No merchant or other private vessel shall make use of the west side of the Wharves including the pleasure steamer landing and the Admiralty landing, or make fast any ropes or chains thereto, or moor thereto, except with the consent of the lessees of such wharf in the case of the pleasure steamer landing or of the King's Harbour Master in the case of the Admiralty landing, and then only for the purpose of embarking or disembarking passengers and their luggage.

### PENALTIES.

25. The Master of every merchant or other private vessel to which this Order relates shall observe and cause to be observed the said Regulations in this Schedule so far as any relate to his vessel, and if any Master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the said Regulations or fails to observe or to cause the same to be observed, he shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding the sum of ten pounds.

### SECOND SCHEDULE.

### RULES.

### GENERAL.

Observance of "Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea."

1. All sea-going vessels, when within the limits of the Dockyard Port of Portland, shall

carry such lights as are prescribed by the "Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea" made from time to time under the Merchant Shipping Act; and all vessels of every description shall also observe the steering and sailing rules set forth in such Regulations, except in so far as they are affected by the Regulations hereinafter contained.

### Stern Anchor Light.

2. Every vessel of 150 feet or upwards in length whilst at a swinging berth shall carry such lights as are prescribed by Article 11 of the "Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea."

### Lights for Small Steam Craft.

3. Steam launches and other small craft propelled by steam or other mechanical power, of a length over all of, or exceeding 35 feet, shall, between sunset and sunrise when within the limits of the Dockyard Port of Portland, carry the lights prescribed for sea-going steamships in the above-mentioned Regulations; or shall when under way, in lieu of the coloured side lights, carry a single lantern amidships, with a green glass on the one side and a red glass on the other side; such lantern to be not less than 2 feet above the hull, and so constructed and placed that the green light shall show from right ahead to two points abaft the starboard beam, and the red light from right ahead to two points abaft the port beam, without being obscured by objects in the vessel. The bright light is to be in the middle line of the craft, and not less than two feet above the coloured light or lights and may, when there is no foremast, be carried on a pole, or otherwise at the forepart of the vessel; and at a height above the hull not less than the breadth of the vessel. These lights are to be of such a character that on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, the coloured lights shall be visible at least one mile and the bright light at least two miles.

4. Steam launches and all other boats propelled by steam or other mechanical power, of a length over all of less than 35 feet, when under way between sunset and sunrise within the limits of the Dockyard Port of Portland, shall not be obliged to carry the white light, but shall carry the coloured side lights prescribed in the "Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea," or in lieu thereof the single lantern amidships with parti-coloured glass, as

set forth in the previous clause.

### Dredgers.

5. A Dredger when at work or in position for working shall carry the following Lights and Signals, viz.:—

### Lights between Sunset and Sunrise: --

- (a) Forward.—In the forward part of the dredger at a height of not less than 20 and not exceeding 40 feet above the hull, a white light in a lantern so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile.
- (b) Amidships.—Three such white lights placed in a triangular form at least 8 feet apart, at right angles to the keel and with the apex uppermost, the base of the triangle to be at least 10 feet higher than the forward light and to be also higher than, and clear of the framework, funnels, or other erections upon the dredger. If so moored or

working as to make it necessary to prohibit the passage of vessels on one or both sides, a red light or lights in a lautern so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least one mile, is, or are, to be substituted for the lower light or lights of the triangle on the side or sides on which passage is prohibited.

(c) Aft.—One such white light at or near the stern of the dredger and at such a height that it shall not be less than 15 feet lower than the forward light.

Signals between Sunrise and Sunset: -

Amidships.—Three black balls of not less than 2 feet in diameter placed in a triangular form at least 8 feet apart, at right angles to the keel with the apex uppermost, the base of the triangle to be higher than, and clear of, the framework, funnels or any other erection upon the dredger. If so moored or working as to make it necessary to prohibit passage on one or both sides, a red flag or flags, at least 5 feet in the hoist, is, or are, to be substituted for the lower ball or balls of the triangle on the side or sides on which passage is prohibited.

Signal in Fog:-

In fog, mist, falling snow, or heavy rain storms a dredger at work or in position for working shall at intervals of not more than one minute sound a gong rapidly for about five seconds.

### Lights for Small Boats.

- 6. Small fishing boats and all other boats of every description at anchor in any part of the Dockyard Port at night, shall exhibit a white light, visible all round at a distance of at least one mile.
- 7. Small fishing boats, and all other boats, sailing or rowing, in any part of the Dockyard Port at night, shall have ready at hand a white light, and shall exhibit the same on approaching or being approached by any vessel or boat under way.

Vessels entering the Harbour to have Priority.

8. When any vessel or vessels are about to enter from seaward any of the channels between the breakwaters, no vessel proceeding outward by the same channel shall enter the said channel until the before-mentioned vessel or vessels shall have passed in.

Vessels to keep clear of His Majesty's Vessels entering or leaving the Harbour.

9. When one of His Majesty's vessels or other vessel in charge of His Majesty's Officers intends to pass in or out of the Harbour, she shall hoist O flag (International Code—Alphabetical) by day, or a red light by night at the foremast head, and all other of His Majesty's vessels present in the Port shall hoist the Pilot Jack by day or show position lights (two white lights vertical, 8 feet apart, hoisted at the peak, or if no gaff, hoisted abreast the maintop in the middle line of the ship or on the ensign staff) by night, as a general warning: and all other vessels under way within the limits of the Dockyard Port shall keep out of the way of the said vessel flying the O flag, or showing the red light at the foremast head; provided always that the said vessel shall be navigated with due care and at a moderate speed.

Regulations for Vessels crossing the Torpedo Range.

10. Whenever practice with locomotive torpedoes takes place a red flag will be hoisted at the firing point and on the 2,000 yards Range Target to warn vessels that practice is taking place within the areas referred to in Clause 18 of the First Schedule. Vessels having occasion to cross the range are to be guided by the positions of the red flag on the 2,000 yards Range Target. If hoisted right up this flag indicates that a torpedo is about to be fired, and vessels are not to cross the range; if seen to be low on the flagstaff it shows that the range is clear and can be crossed at any position south of the 2,000 yards Range Target.

Regulations as to marking Wrecks.

11. Should a vessel sink or become a wreck in any part of the Dockyard Port of Portland, so that an obstruction in a navigable fairway is caused, which in the opinion of the King's Harbour Master it is necessary to mark, such wreck will be indicated by the following marks or lights exhibited from the wreck itself or from a wreck-marking craft:—

By Day.—Three balls on a yard 20 feet above the sea, two placed vertically at one end and one at the other, the single ball being on the side nearest the wreck.

By Night.—Three white fixed lights similarly arranged, but not the ordinary riding

light.

If the obstruction is not considered by the King's Harbour Master of sufficient importance to be marked both by day and night, a green buoy only will be used with the word "Wreck" on it in white letters.

### PENALTIES.

Note.—The Master of every merchant or other private vessel to which the rules in this Schedule relate must observe and cause to be observed the provisions of these Rules as far as they relate to his vessel, and any such Master, by his wilful default infringing or causing any infringement of any of the provisions of these rules, is guilty of a misdemeanour.

that no new burial ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require: Provided always that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please His Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered: Provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and the Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas by the Burial Act, 1855, it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to His Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the 11th day of January, 1900, it was ordered that burials should be discontinued in (amongst other places) the Parish Church of Llanfihangel, in the county of Montgomery, and also in so much of the churchyard as is not situated (a) within fifteen yards of the west, south, and east boundaries thereof; or (b) to the north side of the church, with certain exceptions in the said Order in Council specified:

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the churchwardens of the said parish of Llanfihangel ten days' previous notice of their intention in that behalf, have made a representation that, for reasons of public health, so much of the said Order in Council of the 11th day of January, 1900, as relates to burials in the parish church and the church-yard of Llanfihangel aforesaid, should be varied so as to provide that burials should be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the said churchyard. Provided that in the said churchyard the burial may be allowed of the bodies of Ann Griffith and D. C. Davies, for whom grave spaces have been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the

# ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 28TH MARCH 1914.)

LIVERPOOL AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1914 (No. 7).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

### PART I.

### Application of Order.

1. This Order applies to the Scheduled District described in the First Schedule hereto, and hereinafter referred to as "the Scheduled District."

### Division of Scheduled District into Three Zones.

2.—(1.) The Scheduled District shall for the purposes of this Order be divided into the three Zones described in the Second Schedule to this Order (hereinafter referred to respectively as Zone I, Zone II, and Zone III), to which the provisions hereinafter set forth shall apply.

(2.) If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly without a Zone, the whole shall be deemed to be within the Zone, and where the farm extends to two Zones, the whole shall be deemed to be in the

inner Zone.

### PART II.

### PROVISIONS AS TO ZONE I.

Prohibition of Movement of Animals out of Zone I; Movement into or within such Zone.

- 3.—(1.) No animal shall be moved out of Zone I.
- (2.) No animal shall be landed in, or moved into, or moved along, over, or across a highway or thoroughfare within, Zone I except in

accordance with the following provisions of this Order.

(3.) No animal shall be allowed by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon a highway or thoroughtare in Zone I.

### Movement of Animals into Zone 1 for Immediate Slaughter.

- 4.—(1.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved without a licence by railway or by vessel from premises in Zone III, or from premises in Great Britain not situate within any District which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Board relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease, to a railway station or lauding-place situate within Zone I; and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station or landing-place to any slaughterhouse situate within Zone I, or to any market or sale in Zone I, which is authorised by the Local Authority under this Order, if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the railway station or landing-place is situate.
- (2.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, also be moved from any premises situate within Zone II or within Zone III to any slaughterhouse situate within Zone I, if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the first mentioned premises are situate.

# Movement of Animals within Zone 1 for Immediate Slaughter.

5. An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved from premises in Zone I to any slaughterhouse in that Zone if accompanied by a Movement Licence authorising such movement, granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the first mentioned premises are situate.

### Holding of Markets and Sales of Animals for Immediate Slaughter in Zone I.

- 6.—(1.) No market, fair, sale or exhibition of animals shall be held in Zone I, except a market or sale held in accordance with the following provisions:—
  - (i) The market or sale shall be restricted to animals intended for immediate slaughter which have been brought from premises in Zone III or from premises situate outside the Scheduled District under and in accordance with the provisions of this Order, and the market or sale must be authorised by the Local Authority under this Article.
  - (ii) The Local Authority shall cause a Veterinary Inspector to attend at every market or sale authorised under this Article and examine the animals exposed thereat.
- (2.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved from any market or sale authorised under this Article if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the market or sale is situate to a slaughterhouse in Zone I.

PART III.

PROVISIONS AS TO ZONE II.

Movement out of Zone II.

7. No animal shall be moved out of Zone II except to a slaughterhouse in Zone I, and then only in accordance with Article 4 (2) of this Order.

Movement into Zone II for Immediate Slaughter only; Movement within Zone II for any necessary or expedient purpose.

- 8.—(1.) No animal shall be landed in, or moved into, or moved along, over, or across a highway or thoroughfare within, Zone II except in accordance with the provisions of this Order.
- (2.) No animal shall be allowed by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon a highway or thoroughfare in Zone II.
- (3.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by railway or by vessel without a Licence from premises in Zone III, or from premises in Great Britain not situate within any District which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Board relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease, to a railway station or landing place situate within Zone II; and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station or landing place to any slaughter-house situate within Zone II if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the railway station or landing place is situate.
- (4.) An animal may, subject as hereinafter provided, be moved by road from any premises in Zone III, or from any premises not situate within any District which is for the time being a Scheduled District for the purposes of an Order of the Board relating to Foot-and-Mouth Disease, to any slaughterhouse in Zone II if accompanied, while being moved by road in Zone II, by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the slaughterhouse is situate.
- (5.) Where an Inspector of the Local Authority considers it necessary or expedient that an animal in his District should be permitted to be moved for any purpose from premises in Zone II to any other premises in that Zone, he may authorise such movement by a Movement Licence.
- (6.) A Movement Licence under this Article shall not be granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority unless he is satisfied that the proposed movement will not involve movement on a road in Zone I.

# Prohibition of Markets, &c., of Animals in Zone II.

9. No market, fair, sale, or exhibition of animals shall be held in Zone II.

### PART IV.

### PROVISIONS AS TO ZONE III.

Prohibition of Movement out of Zone III except into Zone I or Zone II for Slaughter.

10. No animal shall be moved out of Zone III except for the purpose of movement to a slaughterhouse or authorised market or sale in Zone I, or to a slaughterhouse in Zone II, and then only in accordance with Parts II and III of this Order respectively.

Regulation of Markets, &c., in Zone III.

- 11.—(1.) No market, fair, sale or exhibition of animals shall be held in Zone III, except in accordance with the following provisions:—
  - (i) A market or sale may be held on any premises in Zone III if the Local Authority are satisfied that the market or sale will be restricted to animals intended for immediate slaughter and the market or sale is authorised by the Local Authority under this Order.
  - (ii) The Local Authority shall cause a Veterinary Inspector to attend at every market or sale authorised under this Order and examine the animals exposed thereat.
- (2.) An animal exposed at a market or sale authorised under this Article shall not be moved therefrom unless before such movement it is marked, by and at the expense of the owner, in the manner described in Article 12 of this Order.

### PART V.

#### GENERAL.

Provisions as to Movement Licences.

12.—(1.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence granted under this Order is movement to a slaughterhouse from premises other than a railway station or landing place, an animal shall not be moved with the Licence unless before the movement is commenced it is marked by and at the expense of the owner in manner following:—

Cattle.—By the clipping of a broad arrow, about six inches long, on the left hind-quarter of each of the cattle and by the clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

clipping of the hair off the end of the tail.

Sheep.—By'the clipping of a broad arrow

on the forehead of each of the sheep;
and also by the painting or stamping of the
letter M, about six inches long, on both
sides of each of the sheep with the following
composition, namely: Rosin, five parts; oil
of turpentine, two parts; and blue or red
ochre, one part; melted and used warm; or
with some other adhesive composition of a
blue or red colour.

Swine.—By the painting or stamping of the letter M, about six inches long, on both sides of each of the swine with the composition above mentioned.

(2.) Where the movement authorised by a Movement Licence is movement as often as occasion may require, either between different parts of the same farm, or between different farms, the Licence shall be marked with the words "Occupation Licence," and shall be in

- force until it is revoked by an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board by a Notice served on the occupier of the farm on which the animals then are.
- (3.) Every Licence shall specify the name and address of the person to whom the Licence is granted, the number and description of the animals authorised to be moved, and the name or description of the several premises to and from which the animals are authorised to be moved.
- (4.) Where animals are moved with a Licence under this Order, unless the Licence is an Occupation Licence, the Licence shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up to an officer of the Local Authority or be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the animals at the time of completing the movement.
- (5.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order, except where it is otherwise expressly authorised by this Order, shall be in force for four days, inclusive of the day of issue.
- (6.) A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the animal to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the animal, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughterhouse from or to which the animal is to be moved, or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee of a Local Authority.
- (7.) A copy of a Licence which authorises movement to premises in a District other than the District for which the person granting the Licence acts as Inspector shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination is situate.

### General Provisions as to Movement.

13. Animals while being moved under this Order shall, so far as is practicable, be kept separate from all animals which are not being so moved, and shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay to the place of destination specified in the Licence, and where the place of destination is a slaughterhouse they shall be there detained until they are slaughtered.

Exception of certain Animals from Provisions as to Movement, etc.

- 14.—(1.) Nothing in this Order shall be construed as authorising—
  - (i) movement of an animal which is affected with foot-and-mouth disease, or which has during the preceding twenty-eight days been in any way exposed to the infection of such disease; or

(ii) movement into or out of a foot-andmouth disease infected place; or

- (iii) movement of an animal the movement of which is prohibited by notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board.
- (2.) Nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to animals landed at a Landing Place for Irish animals as at a Foreign Animals Wharf.

Movement of Animals through Scheduled District by Railway or Vessel; Movement through Zones by Railway.

15.—(1.) For the purposes of this Order an animal shall not be deemed to be moved into or out of the Scheduled District or moved into or out of a Zone where it is moved through such District or Zone by railway from a place outside such District or Zone to another place outside such District or Zone without unnecessary delay and without the animal being untrucked within such District or Zone except for the purposes of feeding or watering the animal within the railway station premises where such untrucking takes place.

(2.) Nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals through a Zone or the Scheduled District by-vessel from a place outside such Zone or District to another

place outside such Zone or District.

### Saving for Orders and Regulations.

16. Movement of animals under this Order is subject to any other Order of the Board, and also subject to any Regulation made by a Local Authority under any Order of the Board for prohibiting or regulating the movement of animals.

# Power to Restrict the Movement of Persons in Certain Cases.

- Authority acting under their direction may serve a Notice on the occupier of any field, shed, or other place in the Scheduled District, prohibiting the entry of any person into any such field, shed or other place, and thereupon, notwithstanding the existence of any footpath or right of way, no person shall enter the field, shed, or other place to which the Notice relates while any cattle, sheep, goats or swine are therein, otherwise than in accordance with the following regulations, that is to say:—
  - (i.) The owner of the field, shed, or other place, or of the animals therein, or the agent or servants of such owner, may enter such field, shed, or other place so far as may be necessary for the feeding or tending of the animals.
  - (ii.) Any other person may enter such field, shed, or other place with a licence of an Inspector of the Local Authority, or of the Board.
- (2.) Copies of such Notice shall be affixed or exhibited by the Inspector in such manner as he shall think desirable for ensuring notification of the restrictions thereby imposed.

(3.) A copy of every such Notice shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, 4, Whitehall Place, London, S.W.

### Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

18.—(1.) Any person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read, and a copy of or

extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or other officer.

### Offences.

19.—(1.) If an animal is landed in contravention of this Order, the owner and the charterer and the master of the vessel from which it is landed, and the owner of the animal and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing or permitting the landing, and the person landing the same, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been landed in contravention as aforesaid, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against

the Act of 1894.

(3.) If any person enters any field, shed, or other place in contravention of this Order, or of a Notice served thereunder, such person shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(4.) If a person in charge of an animal being moved, where under this Order a Movement Licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(5.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any animal as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

### Interpretation.

### 20. In this Order-

"The Act of 1894" means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

"The Board" means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries.

- "Animals" means cattle, sheep, goats and swine.
- "Slaughterhouse" means any premises where animals are habitually slaughtered, and includes a bacon factory.

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1894,

### Revocation.

21. The Liverpool and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1914 and the Liverpool and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Orders of 1914 (Nos. 3, 4, and 6) are hereby revoked.

### Commencement.

22. This Order shall come into operation on the thirty-first day of March, nineteen hundred and fourteen.

### Short Title.

CRAMLINGTON URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Government Board by an Order dated the 19th day of March, 1914, have declared and directed that on and after the 30th day of April, 1914, Part II, Part III and Part IV of the Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1907, shall be in force in the Urban District of Cramlington subject as to the sections of the said Act specified in the first column of the Schedule to the said Order the said sections respectively shall, unless and until the Board shall otherwise order, have effect as if the words and figures set forth in the second column of the said Schedule opposite to the reference to that section in the first column of that Schedule were added to and formed part of the section.

Section Twenty-five.

"The power of making or enforcing bye-laws under section one hundred and fifty-seven of the Public Health Act, 1875, as extended by section twenty-three of the Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1890, with respect to the paving of yards and open spaces in connection with dwelling - houses, other than yards and open spaces common to two or more dwelling - houses, shall cease to be exerciseable."

"Nothing in this section shall apply to any wall or other structure in so far as the same is used either for the support of any street or public footpath, or for the protection of any street or public foot-path from damage or obstruction, by reason of the surface of the street or footpath being above or below the level of the surface of the adjoining land unless the wall or other structure was built after the street or footpath became a highway repairable by the inhabitants at large by or at the expense of a person other than the highway authority responsible for the repair of the street or footpath."

Part III. Section Thirtyfive.

"This section, so far as it relates to the deposit of material, shall have effect subject to the first proviso to section ninety-one of the Public Health Act,

"Bye-laws made in pursuance of section sixteer of the Local Government Act, 1888, for the prevention and suppression of nuisances shall not, in relation to any subjectmatter of this section, be of any force or effect within the district."

Section Thirtyeight.

"Nothing in this section shall prejudicially affect any power or right exerciseable by or attaching to an owner or occupier of premises by virtue of section twenty-two of the Public Health Act, 1875, or of section eighteen of the Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1890."

Part IV. Section Fiftynine.

"(6) Nothing in this section shall apply to a public or circulating

library which is not within the district."

(Substitution of New Railway for Railway No. 5A described in pending Bill; Application of Provisions of pending Bill as to the Taking of Lands and Easements and Appropriation of Subsoil of Streets and Roads and as to Other Matters; Entry upon and formation of communications with Waterloo and City Railway of London and South-Western Railway Company and Agreements with that Company; Tolls Rates and Charges; Application of Capital; Incorporation and Amendment of Acts.)

OTICE is hereby given, that application is intended to be made by Petition for Additional Provision for leave to amend the Bill (hereinafter referred to as "the Bill") now pending in Parliament under the short title of "Metropolitan and Great Northern Railway Companies" and promoted by the Metropolitan Railway Company and the Great Northern Railway Company (hereinafter together referred to as "the two Companies") so as to effect all or some of the following (among other) objects, namely:

the following (among other) objects, namely:
To substitute for the Railway No. 5a described in the Bill (hereinafter referred to as "Railway 5a") the following railway (hereinafter referred to as "the substituted railway"), namely:—

A railway No. 5a (2 furlongs 9.3 chains in length) situated wholly in the parish of the city of London, commencing by a junction with the railway authorized by the Metropolitan Railway Act, 1913, at a point beneath the Northern end of Princes-street 27 yards or thereabouts measured in a southerly direction from the intersection of the centre lines of Moorgate-street and Lothbury (such point being the termination of the said authorized railway) and terminating at a point beneath Queen Victoria-street 60 yards or thereabouts measured in a westerly direction along the centre line of that street from the intersection of the centre line of Knightrider-street with the centre line of Queen Victoria-street aforesaid.

To authorize agreements with any local authority respecting the construction, maintenance and otherwise of the substituted railway and works or in connection therewith, and to confirm and give effect to any agreement which may have been made or may be made prior to the passing of the Bill in respect of the matters aforesaid.

To empower the two Companies or either of them or the Joint Committee, upon such terms and conditions as may be specified in the Additional Provision, for the purposes of and in connection with the construction, working, maintenance, and user of the substituted railway and the stations, shafts, lifts, escalators, stairways, subways, passages. communications, openings, conveniences and works in connection therewith, to enter upon and use the lands, stations, platforms and works of the London and South-Western Railway Company (hereinafter referred to as "the South-Western Company"), and to alter any such stations, platforms and other works of the South-Western Company and to make and maintain openings in the same and in any

walls, floors, passages or other works, and to construct and provide any protective works, and to make provision for securing to the public and to officers and servants of the two Companies respectively or the Joint Committee and of the South-Western Company or any of them free and uninterrupted access and communication to and between the substituted railway and the respective stations and premises of the two Companies or either of them or the Joint Committee and the South Western Company.
