The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Bishopricks Act, 1878, and the Bishopricks of Sheffield, Chelmsford, and for the County of Suffolk Act, 1913, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twelfth day of March, in the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Bishopricks Act, 1878, and the Bishopricks of Sheffield, Chelmsford and for the County of Suffolk Act, 1913, have prepared and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme with respect to the bishoprick of Chelmsford and for the re-arrangement of the boundaries of the diocese of Chelmsford and of the contiguous dioceses of Ely, Saint Albans and Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich and of the patronage of the bishops of the said dioceses.

"Whereas by the seventh section of the said Bishopricks Act, 1878, it is enacted that whenever the certificate therein referred to shall have been given to Your Majesty by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, with respect to the endowment fund of any new bishoprick mentioned in the schedule to the said Act, we shall lay before Your Majesty in Council a scheme for all or any of the matters in relation to such new bishoprick which in

the same section are mentioned.

"And whereas by the first section of the said Bishopricks of Sheffield, Chelmsford and for the County of Suffolk Act, 1913, it is enacted that, subject to the modifications set forth in the First Schedule to the same Act, the said Bishopricks Act, 1878, including the repealed portions thereof, shall have effect for the purpose of the foundation of the new bishopricks of Sheffield, Chelmsford and Saint Edmundsbury and Ioswich as if the Second Schedule to the said Bishopricks of Sheffield, Chelmsford and for the County of Suffolk Act, 1913, were substituted for the Schedule to the said Bishopricks Act, 1878, and as if the last-mentioned Act had become law on the date on which the said Bishopricks of Sheffield, Chelmsford and for the County of Suffolk Act, 1913, was passed

was passed.

"And whereas the bishoprick of Chelmsford is one of the bishopricks mentioned in the said Second Schedule to the said Bishopricks of Sheffield, Chelmsford and for the County of Suffolk Act, 1913, and the said certificate was given by us with respect to the endowment fund of the said bishoprick of Chelmsford on the

eighteenth day of December, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, and thereupon by an Order of Your Majesty in Council of the twenty-first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, made in pursuance of the said Acts, and reciting that such certificate had been so given as aforesaid, which Order was published in the London Gazette on the twenty-third day of the same month January, and came into operation on the day of the date of such publication (1) the bishoprick of Chelmsford was founded (2) the diocese of the said bishoprick was declared to consist (subject to the provisions contained in the First Schedule to the Bishopricks of Sheffield, Chelmsford and for the County of Suffolk Act, 1913, as to re-arrangement of boundaries) of the county of Essex and that part of the county of Kent which lies north of the River Thames, (3) the parish church of Chelmsford, in the county of Essex (subject to the rights of the patron and Incumbent thereof), was declared to be the cathedral church of the said bishoprick, and (4) the Bishop of Chelmsford was constituted a body corporate and was invested with all such rights, privileges and jurisdictions as are possessed by any other bishop in England, and was subjected to the metropolitan

jurisdiction of the Archbishop of Canterbury.

"And whereas among the modifications of the said Bishopricks Act, 1878, contained in the said First Schedule to the said Bishopricks of Sheffield, Chelmsford and for the County of Suffolk Act, 1913, it is particularly provided in relation to the said bishoprick of Chelmsford that the scheme made under section seven of the said Bishopricks Act, 1878, in relation to that bishoprick may provide for the transfer of the whole or any part of the county of Bedford from the diocese of Ely to the residue of the diocese of Saint Albans remaining after the founding of the said bishoprick of Chelmsford, and as incidental thereto may provide for the re-arrangement of the patronage of the Bishops of Ely and Saint Albans, and make other neces-

sary provisions therein described.
"And whereas the Right Reverend Frederic Henry, Bishop of Ely, the Right Reverend Bertram, Bishop of Norwich, the Right Reverend Edgar, Bishop of Saint Albans, the Right Reverend Henry Bernard, Bishop of Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich, and the Right Reverend John Edwin, Bishop of Chelmoford do for far as their respective con-Chelmsford, do (so far as their respective consents are necessary) consent to this scheme and the several recommendations hereinafter contained, in testimony whereof they have respectively hereto set their hands and episcopal seals:

"Now therefore, we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose as follows, namely:

"1. The boundaries of the diocese of Chelmsford and of the contiguous dioceses of Ely, Saint Albans, and Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich shall be re-arranged as follows:

"(i) the whole of the parish of Sturmer (in the archdeacoury of Colchester), of which part is situate in the county of Suffolk, and the whole of the parishes of Hadstock and Helion Bumpstead (also in the archdeaconry of Colchester), of which parts are situate in the county of Cambridge, and the whole of the parishes of Heydon, Little Chishall and Great Chishall (also in the archdeaconry of Colchester), which are situate in the administrative county of Cambridge, shall, so far as the same are not already included in the diocese of Chelmsford, be severed from the diocese of Saint Albans, and be included in and form part of the diocese of Chelmsford.

"(ii) the part of the parish of Bartlow (in the archdeaconry of Ely), which is situate in the county of Essex, shall be severed from the diocese of Chelmsford, and shall be included in and form part of the diocese of Ely.

(iii) the parts of the parishes of Bures, All Saints Sudbury with Ballingdon cum Brundon, and Haverhill (all in the archdeaconry of Sudbury), which are situate in the county of Essex, shall be severed from the diocese of Chelmsford, and shall be included in and form part of the diocese of

Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich.
"(iv) the rural deaneries of Ampthill, Bedford, Biggleswade, Dunstable, Eaton, Felmersham, Fleete, Haynes, Luton, Riseley and Shefford (together constituting the archdeaconry of Bedford), with the exception of the parish of Tilbrook, in the county of Huntingdon, but with the addition of the parish of Swineshead, in the county of Bedford, shall be severed from the diocese of Ely, and shall be included in and form part of the diocese of Saint Albans.

"2. The Bishop of Chelmsford for the time being shall, subject to the provisions hereinafter contained, have all such courts and officers and all such jurisdiction as were immediately before the said date of the publication in the London Gazette of the said Order of Your Majesty in Council of the twenty-first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, or are at present possessed by the Bishop of Saint Albans within the area of the diocese

of Chelmsford as hereinbefore defined.
"3. All parishes, ecclesiastical districts, and other cures and places, churches and chapels, and all the clergy and others Your Majesty's subjects within the territories which by virtue of the said Order of Your Majesty in Council of the twenty-first day of January, one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, or of any Order of Your Majesty in Council confirming this scheme, have been or shall be severed from any diocese, and do now constitute the diocese of Chelmsford, or shall be included therein or in any of the said dioceses of Ely. Saint Albans, and Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich shall be exempted and released from all episcopal jurisdiction, authority and control of the bishop of the diocese in which the same were situate immediately before such severance, and shall be under and subject to the episcopal jurisdiction, authority and control of the Bishop of Chelmsford or other the bishop of the diocese to which such territories have been or shall be transferred by virtue of such Orders in Council as aforesaid and of the successors of such bishop

"4. Until a dean and chapter of and for the cathedral church of the bishoprick of Chelmsford shall have been created, the Bishop of Chelmsford may, as to any and every matter with respect to which the confirmation or other agency of a dean and chapter is by law required for rendering effectual the action of a bishop, take action in such matter without such confirmation or agency, and his action so taken shall not for want of such confirmation or

agency be ineffectual or invalid.
"5. During any and every vacancy in the See of Chelmsford, whether such vacancy shall happen before or after the creation of a dean and chapter of and for the cathedral church of the bishoprick of Chelmsford, the Archbishop of Canterbury for the time being shall have the custody and be guardian of the spiritualities of the See of Chelmsford.

the See of Chelmsford.
"6. The archidiaconal supervision of all the parishes, ecclesiastical districts, and other cures and places comprised within the diocese of Chelmsford and the archdeaconry of Col chester or the archdeaconry of Essex, shall remain vested in and be with and in and be exercised by the archdeacons of those archdeaconries respectively, and the said archdeacons shall be officers of the diocese of Chelmsford, and shall not be subject to the episcopal jurisdiction of the Bishop of Saint Albans, but shall be exclusively subject to the episcopal jurisdiction of the Bishop of Chelmsford, and the archidiaconal dignities of the said archdeacons shall be transferred from the cathedral church of Saint Albans to the cathedral church of the bishoprick of Chelmsford, and all the endowments belonging to the said archdeaconries respectively shall continue to belong to the same notwithstanding the transfer of the said archdeaconries from the diocese of Saint Albans to the diocese of Chelmsford.

"7. The archidiaconal supervision of the rural deaneries and parishes hereinbefore recommended to be severed from the diocese of Ely, and to be included in the diocese of Saint Albans (the parish of Tilbrook, in the county of Huntingdon being excepted) shall, with the further exception of the parish of Holwell, in the rural deanery of Shefford, remain or be vested in and be with and in and be exercised by the archdeacon of the archdeaconry of Bedford, and the parish of Swineshead shall be severed from the rural deanery of Kimbolton and archdeaconry of Huntingdon, and shall be included in the rural deanery of Riseley, and the archdeaconry of Bedford, and the said parish of Holwell shall be severed from the rural deanery of Shefford, and shall be included in and form part of the rural deanery of Hitchin, in the archdeaconry of Saint Albans, and the said archdeacon of the archdeaconry of Bedford shall be an officer of the diocese of Saint Albans, and shall not be subject to the episcopal jurisdiction of the Bishop of Ely, but shall be exclusively subject to the episcopal jurisdiction of the Bishop of Saint Albans, and the archidiaconal dignity of the said archdeacon shall be transferred from the cathedral church of Ely to the cathedral church of Saint Albans, and all the endowments belonging to the said archdeaconry shall continue to belong to the same notwithstanding the transfer of the said archdeaconry from the diocese of Ely to the diocese of Saint Albans.

"8. The parish of Tilbrook shall be severed from the rural deanery of Riseley and archdeaconry of Bedford, and shall be included in the rural deanery of Kimbolton and archdeaconry of Huntingdon, and shall be subject to the archidiaconal supervision of the archdeacon of Huntingdon.

"9. The patronage of every ecclesiastical dignity or benefice, being within the diocese of Chelmsford, of which dignity or benefice the patronage or any estate or interest therein is now vested in or belongs to the Bishop of Saint Albans in right of his See, shall without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council confirming the same be forthwith, to the extent of the estate or

interest therein now vested in or belonging to the Bishop of Saint Albans as aforesaid, transferred from the said Bishop of Saint Albans to and shall become and be vested in and shall belong to the Bishop of Chelmsford and his successors.

"10. The patronage of every ecclesiastical dignity or benefice being within that portion of the diocese of Ely which is hereinbefore recommended to be transferred to the diocese of Saint Albans, of which dignity or benefice the patronage or any estate or interest therein is now vested in or belongs to the Bishop of Ely in right of his See, shall without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council confirming the same be forthwith to the extent of the estate or interest therein now vested in or belonging to the Bishop of Ely as aforesaid transferred from the said Bishop of Ely to and shall become and be vested in and shall belong to the Bishop of

Saint Albans and his successors. "11. The portion of the endowment or income of the bishoprick of Ely which is mentioned in Part II of the Second Schedule to the said Bishopricks of Sheffield, Chelmsford and for the County of Suffolk Act, 1913 (that is to say, such portion of the endowment or income of the bishoprick of Ely as will produce or amount to the sum of seven hundred and fifty pounds per annum, together with a moiety of the proceeds of sale of the espiscopal residence attached to the said bishoprick of Ely, situate in the parish of Saint James, Piccadilly, in the county of London now in the hands of us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners), shall without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council confirming the same, be transferred from the Bishop and bishoprick of Ely to and shall become and be and form part of the endowment fund of the bishoprick of Chelmsford, and the said annual sum of seven hundred and fifty pounds and the income derived from the said moiety of the proceeds of sale of the said episcopal residence, such moiety of the said proceeds of sale being now represented by the sum of twenty thousand and forty-three pounds four shillings and one penny India three pounds and ten shillings per centum stock standing in the name of us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, shall become part of the annual income of the Bishon of Chelmsford for the time being, such transfer taking effect as to the said sum of twenty thousand and forty-three pounds four shillings and one penny India three pounds and ten shillings per centum stock as on the said twenty-third day of January, one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, and as to the said annual sum of seven hundred and fifty pounds as on the day upon which any Order of Your Majesty in Council confirming this scheme shall take effect, but the first fruits and tenths, or the annual sum payable in lieu of such first fruits and tenths, in respect of the said annual sum of seven hundred and fifty pounds shall be payable by the Bishop of Chelmsford for the time being to the exoneration of the Bishop and bishoprick of Ely.

"12. The portion of the endowment or income of the bishoprick of Norwich, which is mentioned in Part II of the Second Schedule to the said Bishopricks of Sheffield, Chelmsford and for the County of Suffolk Act, 1913 (that is to say, such portion of the endowment

or income of the bishoprick of Norwich as will produce or amount to one hundred and fifty pounds per annum), shall without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme, and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council confirming the same, be transferred as on the said twenty-third day of January, one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, from the Bishop and bishoprick of Norwich to and shall become and for ever thereafter be and form part of the endowment fund of the bishoprick of Chelmsford so as to become part of the annual income of the Bishop of Chelmsford for the time being, but the first fruits and tenths, or the annual sum payable in lieu of such first fruits and tenths respect of the said annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds shall be payable by the Bishop of Chelmsford for the time being to the exoneration of the Bishop and bishoprick of Norwich.

"13. The portion of the endowment or income of the bishoprick of Saint Albans which is mentioned in Part II of the Second Schedule to the said Bishopricks of Sheffield, Chelmsford and for the County of Suffolk Act, 1913 (that is to say, such portion of the endowment or income of the bishoprick of Saint Albans as will produce or amount to three hundred and fifty pounds per annum), the said portion of the endowment or income of the bishoprick of Saint Albans to consist of (a) the annual sum of two hundred and fifty pounds, part of the annual sum of five hundred pounds, which by an Order of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria in Council, made on the eleventh day of July, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-seven, and published in the London Gazette of the thirteenth day of the same month, was transferred from the endowment of the Bishop of Rochester to the Saint Albans Bishoprick Endowment Fund, and (b) the sum of two thousand five hundred pounds Great Western Railway four pounds per centum debenture stock, now forming part of the said Saint Albans Bishoprick Endowment Fund, shall without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than this scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council confirming the same be transferred as on the said twentythird day of January, one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, from the Bishop and bishoprick of Saint Albans to and shall become and for ever thereafter be and form part of the endowment fund of the bishoprick of Chelmsford, and the said annual sum of two hundred and fifty pounds, and the income derived from the said sum of two thousand five hundred pounds Great Western Railway four pounds per centum debenture stock, and any re-investment thereof shall become part of the annual income of the Bishop of Chelmsford for the time being

"14. The registrar, apparitor-general, sealer, or record keeper of the diocese or bishoprick to which any church, parish, benefice or place has been transferred by the formation of the diocese of Chelmsford, or shall be transferred by this scheme and any Order of Your Majesty in Council confirming the same, and the registrar and any other officer of the archdeaconry in which any such church, parish, benefice or place is included shall respectively on the first day of January and the first day of July in every year, so long as any present registrar, apparitor-general, sealer or record keeper of a diocese or bishoprick or registrar

or other officer of an archdeaconry (as the case may be), from which any such church, parish, benefice or place has been so transferred, who was appointed to his office before the fifteenth day of August, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, shall continue to hold such office, pay to such last-mentioned registrar, apparitorgeneral, sealer or record keeper of a diocese or bishoprick or registrar or other officer of an archdeaconry one-half of the net fees received by such accounting officer during the six months preceding the said first day of January, or first day of July, as the case may be, for work done by such accounting officer in the exercise of his office (or by any other officer who may by usage or otherwise perform the duties of such office) in or in relation to any church, parish, benefice or place so transferred, such fees to be calculated upon the scale of fees which shall be established for or shall be in force within the diocese or archdeaconry (as the case may be) of such accounting officer, and in computing such net fees there shall be deducted from the gross fees so received as aforesaid the out-of-pocket expenses incurred in relation to the matters in respect of which the fees have been received.

"15. Every officer (other than the chancellor of the diocese and the Bishop's secretary and those referred to in the last preceding clause of this scheme), who by virtue of an appointment bearing date prior to the fifteenth day of August, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, now holds any office of emolument under the Bishop of any diocese or the dean and chapter of the cathedral church of any diocese or otherwise in and for any diocese affected by the formation of the diocese of Chelmsford or by any Order of Your Majesty in Council confirming this scheme or in and for any part of any such diocese, and who derived or might have derived any portion of the emoluments of his office from sources arising within parishes or places which by the formation of the diocese of Chelmsford or by virtue of any Order of Your Majesty in Council confirming this scheme, have been or shall be transferred from one diocese to another shall for the term for which he was so appointed to his office as aforesaid or until his resignation or other avoidance thereof continue within such transferred parishes or places to perform such duties in the same manner (that is to say, either in person or by deputy as may be authorized by the terms of such his appointment), and to receive accordingly such emoluments (upon the scale which may be established or be in force in relation to such his office in such transferred parishes or places) as an officer of or within the diocese to which such parishes or places have been so transferred as he has hitherto performed, and received as an officer of or within the diocese wherein such parishes or places were formerly situate, and (if an officer of the Bishop or diocese) shall as regards such transferred parishes or places during his tenure of such his office be an officer of the Bishop or diocese to which such parishes or places are transferred.

"16. Twenty-four honorary canonries shall be founded in the said cathedral church of the bishoprick of Chelmsford, and it shall be lawful for the Bishop of Chelmsford to appoint to such honorary canonries spiritual persons to whom the provisions of the twenty-third section of the Act of the third and fourth years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter one hundred and thirteen, in relation to the holders of

honorary canonries founded thereunder shall be applicable save that so long as there shall be no dean and chapter of the said cathedral church it shall be lawful for the Bishop of Ghelmsford of his own sole authority, and without the consent of any dean and chapter, to make regulations respecting the honorary canons so appointed, provided always that any honorary canons in the cathedral church of Saint Albans who upon the foundation of the bishoprick of Chelmsford were holding benefices in that part of the diocese of Saint Albans which has now become the diocese of Chelmsford, and who, by writing under their respective hands, duly registered or recorded as the Bishop of Chelmsford shall direct, shall consent to such transfer, shall (notwithstanding anything in the last-mentioned Act and section contained) be transferred to and become honorary canons in the said cathedral church of the bishoprick of Chelmsford, and shall thereupon, that is to say, as to each of them upon his appointment as such honorary canon in the cathedral church of the bishoprick of Chelmsford, cease, ipso facto, to be an honorary canon in the cathedral church of Saint Albans: Provided also that in the first year after the passing of any Order of Your Majesty in Council confirming this Scheme eight spiritual persons and no more (exclusive of any honorary canons who may be transferred from the cathedral church of Saint Albans as aforesaid) may be appointed to honorary canonries in the said cathedral church of the bishoprick of Chelmsford.

"17. All terriers, tithe apportionments, maps, plans and other documents relating exclusively to any parish or parishes, ecclesiastical districts, or other cures or places situate within the diocese of Chelmsford as hereinbefore defined, or otherwise relating exclusively to the said diocese or relating exclusively to any part or parts of any diocese hereinbefore recommended to be included in any other diocese shall, subject to the provisions hereinbefore contained, be transferred from the custody of the registrar or other officer of the diocese or of the Bishop of the diocese within which the said parish or parishes, eccleciastical districts, or other cures or places were situate immediately before the foundation of the said diocese of Chelmsford as aforesaid or (as the case may be) are now situate and shall become and be in the custody of such registrar or other officer or officers of the diocese or of the Bishop of the diocese of Chelmsford or other the diocese in which such places are herein-before recommended to be included as the Bishop of such diocese shall appoint in that And as to all documents which may remain in their present custody, although relating to or affecting the bishoprick of Chelmsford or any parish, ecclesiastical district, cure or place now situate in the diocese of Chelmsford as hereinbefore defined, or by this Scheme, and any Order of Your Majesty in Council confirming the same transferred from one diocese to another diocese, the registrar or other officer of the diocese of Chelmsford or other the diocese to which such parish, ecclesiastical district, cure or place shall be so transferred as aforesaid shall be at liberty at all convenient times to inspect such documents and take copies therefrom as freely as the registrar or other officer in whose custody such documents may so remain."

And whereas the said Scheme has been

approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law on and after the thirteenth day of April of the present year, one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, and that this Order shall be forthwith published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrars of the said dioceses of Ely, Saint Albans, Chelmsford, and Saint Edmundsbury and Ipswich.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (Session two), chapter twenty-six, duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the twelfth day of March, in the year one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the sixth and seventh years of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven, and of the Act of the fifth year of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (Session two), chapter twenty-six, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following scheme for authorizing certain works of improvement at Farnham Castle, the episcopal house of residence belonging to the see of Winchester

of Winchester.

"Whereas the Right Reverend Edward Stuart, now Bishop of Winchester, is desirous that certain works should be carried out for the improvement of the laundry at Farnham Castle, the episcopal house of residence of the see of Winchester, and has submitted to us the particulars of such works, and we have approved the same.

"And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous, and it appears to us to be expedient, that towards the cost of the said works a sum of one hundred pounds (being a sum which, together with the two sums of five hundred pounds and nine hundred pounds recently authorized to be borrowed upon the same security under the authority of the statutes hereinbefore mentioned, does not exceed two years' income of the see) should be provided by the borrowing of the same sum by way of mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands, tenements and hereditaments, endowments, or emoluments, which now belong or may hereafter belong to the Bishop of Winchester.

"Now therefore, with the consent of the said Edward Stuart, Bishop of Winchester (testified by his having affixed his signature

benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes, and the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a Scheme in writing (the Scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe rentcharges, lands, tithes, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such Scheme, or to such modification thereof, as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such Scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such Scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend John

And whereas the Right Reverend John Lord Bishop of Hereford hath made a Representation in writing, dated the 9th day of August, 1913, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archhishop of Centerbury, as follows:

bishop of Canterbury, as follows:—
"I, the Right Reverend John Lord Bishop of Hereford, do hereby represent to Your Grace that there is in the county of Salop and my diocese of Hereford the vicarage of Caynham, the parish whereof comprises, amongst other places, part of the township of Bennetts End.

"That the other part of the said township of Bennetts End was, by Order in Council of the eighth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and forty, assigned to the consolidated District of St. Paul, Knowbury, which was formed from the parishes of Bitterley and Caynham, both in the county of Salop and our diocese of Hereford.

"That the part of the said township still remaining within the said parish of Caynham is situate at a distance of two and a quarter miles from the parish church of Caynham and only one quarter to three quarters of a mile from the district church of St. Paul, Knowbury, and the inhabitants of such portion of the said township of Bennetts End are in the habit of attending divine service at the church of St. Paul, Knowbury.

"That in the year 1911 the population of the ecclesiastical parish of Caynham amounted to 405, and the population of the parish of Knowbury to 1,026.

"That the annual value of the said vicarage of Caynham is two hundred and eighty pounds net, arising from tithe, rentcharge and glebe rents (including the estimated value of the vicarage and land belonging), and the annual value of the perpetual curacy of St. Paul, Knowbury, is two hundred pounds gross,

arising from payments from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, and from Queen Anne's Bounty, glebe rent, and surplice fees.

"That it appears to me that having regard to the close proximity to the Church of St. Paul, Knowbury, of that portion of the said township of Bennetts End still remaining in the parish of Caynham, that such portion may, under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament of the 1st and 2nd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 106, and the 2nd and 3rd years of Her said Majesty, chapter 49, be advantageously separated from the said parish of Caynham, and be annexed to the parish of Knowbury, to which it is contiguous.

"That, pursuant to the direction contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said first mentioned Act of Parliament, I, the said Lord Bishop, have drawn up a Scheme in writing appended to this Representation, describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alteration above proposed may be best effected and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithe, rentcharges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested, and I do submit the same to Your Grace, together with the consents in writing of Charles Francis Kynaston Mainwaring, the patron of the said vicarage of Caynham; the Reverend Somers Percy Heriz-Smith, the Incumbent of the same benefice; the Prime Minister, the patron on behalf of the Crown of the said benefice of St. Paul, Knowbury; and the Reverend George Russell Gipps, the Incumbent of the same benefice, to the intent that Your Grace may, if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with the said Scheme, certify the same and such consent to His Majesty in Council.

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

"It is proposed to transfer to the parish of Knowbury such portion (hereinafter called the portion transferred) of the parish of Caynham as lies on the north-easternly side of a line commencing at Knowbury Hall Farm and proceeding in a southernly or south-easternly direction along the western boundaries of three fields, numbered respectively 577, 576, and 570 on the tithe map of the parish of Caynham to the road leading from Caynham to Knowbury, and thence to the northernmost point of Burford parish (and being Whitton, the second division of that parish), and near to Whiteway Head and thence following the boundary of the parish of Burford, second division aforesaid, in a southernly direction to the south or southeastern boundary of a field numbered 423 on the tithe map of the parish of Caynham, the eastern side of which is crossed by a brook called the Colly Brook, and thence following in a north-easternly direction the western fence of the said field and across a lane or cartway leading from The Hollins on the south to Cumberley on the north, and thence following in a northernly direction the eastern fence of the Craft Cottage to a point where same meets the boundary of Hope Bagot parish, and thence following the western side of such last mentioned boundary to the point where it crosses the lane leading to Bennetts End aforesaid (all which portion intended to be transferred is coloured pink on the plan attached

"That the yearly sum of fifteen pounds shall be paid by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of January and the first day of July out of the annual value of the said vicarage of Caynham to the Incumbent of the benefice of Knowbury.

"That baptisms, churchings, marriages and burials arising out of the portion transferred shall henceforth be performed at the parish church of Knowbury, and that the fees, if any, for all such offices and all Ecclesiastical dues, offerings and other emoluments arising within the limits of the portion transferred, and usually payable to the Incumbent of a benefice shall belong to the Incumbent of the said district church of Knowbury.

"That the Incumbent of the said parish of Knowbury shall have exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the portion transferred.

"That the inhabitants of the portion transferred shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the parish church of Caynham, but shall become liable, in common with the inhabitants of the said parish of Knowbury, to the repairs of the district church of Knowbury.

"I, Charles Francis Kynaston Mainwaring, of Oteley Park, in the county of Salop, Esquire, the patron or the person entitled to present to the vicarage of Caynham, in the county of Salop and diocese of Hereford, in case the same were now vacant, and I, the Reverend Somers Percy Heriz-Smith, clerk, vicar of the said vicarage, do hereby respectively signify to Your Grace our consent to the scheme above proposed for separating the portion transferred from the parish of Caynham, and annexing same to the parish of Knowbury.

REGULATIONS respecting Open Competitive Examinations for the Situation of Male Learner in the Department of the Postmaster-General in Edinburgh and certain other towns.

These Regulations are liable to alteration from time to time.

1. The limits of age for this situation are 14 and 16. If an examination begins in one of the first 4 months of any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of January in that year. If an examination begins in one of the second 4 months of any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of May in that year. If an examination begins in one of the last 4 months of any year, Candidates must be of the prescribed age on the 1st day of September in that year.

- 2. Candidates will be required to satisfy the Civil Service Commissioners—
 - (a) That they are duly qualified in respect of health and character.
 - (b) That they are natural-born or naturalised British subjects.
- At each examination the number of Candidates to be selected will be such as the Postmaster-General may from time to time fix.
- 4. The examination will be in the following subjects, viz.:—

1. English Composition (including writing

and spelling).

2. Arithmetic (first four rules, Simple and Compound, including English and Metrical Weights and Measures, Reduction, Vulgar Fractions and Decimals, excluding Recurring Decimals).

3. Geography.

Candidates who fail to obtain such an aggregate number of marks as may indicate in the judgment of the Civil Service Commissioners a competent amount of general proficiency will not be regarded as qualified.

- 5. No Candidate will be admitted to examination who does not, at such time as may be fixed by the Civil Service Commissioners, produce an undertaking, signed by his parent or guardian, that he will, if successful, reside within a suitable distance from the Post Office, either with his parents or guardians, or with relations or friends approved by such parents or guardians.
- 6. Candidates must be at least 5 feet in height, and no officer will be retained in the service who does not attain the height of 5 ft. 4 in. before completing his 19th year.
- 7. (i) Persons actually serving in the Army or Navy are ineligible to compete. (ii) Persons holding situations in the Civil Service, Probationary Engineer Cadets in the Navy, and apprentices in His Majesty's Dockyards, must obtain the permission of the authorities of their Department to attend the examination before the commencement of the competition.
- 8. LIVERPOOL AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1914 (No. 8).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Modification of Order.

1. The Liverpool and District (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1914 (No. 7), hereinafter referred to as the principal Order, is modified in manner hereinafter appearing.

Movement into and within Zone I for any necessary or expedient purpose.

2. Notwithstanding the provisions of the principal Order an animal may be moved to any premises in Zone I from any premises in that Zone or from outside that Zone if an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the premises from which the animal is moved are situate considers such movement to be necessary or expedient and authorises the movement by a Movement Licence.

Markets in Zone I.

3. Markets or sales authorised under the principal Order to be held in Zone I shall be open to animals moved from Zone II if intended for immediate slaughter and moved with a licence under the preceding Article authorising such movement.

Free Movement into and within Zone II; Restrictions on Movement out of such Zone.

- 4.—(1) The provisions of Part III of the principal Order (*Provisions as to Zone II*) shall cease to operate.
- (2) No animal shall be moved out of Zone II except to premises in Zone I and under and in accordance with a licence granted under the principal Order or this Order.

Regulation of Markets, etc., in Zone II.

5. The provisions of Article 11 of the principal Order shall take effect as if Zone II were therein substituted for Zone III.

Withdrawal of Restrictions from Zone III.

6. The provisions of the principal Order which relate or refer to Zone III shall cease to apply to that Zone and that Zone shall cease to form part of the Scheduled District.

Commencement.

7. This Order shall come into operation on the seventh day of April, nineteen hundred and fourteen.

8. This Order may be cited as the LIVERPOOL AND DISTRICT (FOOT-AND-MOUTH-DISEASE) ORDER OF 1914 (No. 8), and shall be read with the Order referred to in Article 1.
