WHEREAS in pursuance of the Bishops Resignation Act, 1869, a representation has been made to His Majesty by the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, by Divine providence Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, Primate of all England and Metropolitan, at the instance of the Right Reverend George Forrest, by Divine permission Lord Bishop of Bristol, and, as such, a Bishop of a Diocese within and of the province of Canterbury, that the said Bishop is desirous of resigning his Bishopric, by reason that he is incapacitated by age from the due performance of his duties as Bishop.

And whereas His Majesty is satisfied of such incapacity and that the said Bishop has canonically resigned.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, that the said bishopric of Bristol is vacant, and His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct, and it is hereby directed, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Bristol.

WHEREAS by section 16 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, as amended by the Pluralities Act, 1850, it is, amongst other things, enacted, "that whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the province, with respect to his own diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of any diocese, or by the bishops of any two dioceses, that two or more benefices, or that one or more benefice or benefices, and one or more spiritual sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, in his or their diocese or dioceses, being either in the same parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed one thousand five hundred persons, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one benefice, the said Archbishop of the province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such inquiry it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the patron or patrons of the said benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto, such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patron or patrons, the said Archbishop shall, six weeks before certifying such inquiry and consent to His Majesty as herein-after directed, cause, with respect to his own diocese, a statement in writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid representation, to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such benefices, sinecure rectories, or vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop against such union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the inquiry and consent aforesaid to His Majesty in Council; and thereupon it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such benefices, sinecure rectory or rectories, vicarage or vicarages, into one benefice, with cure of souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only; and it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to give directions for regulating the course and succession in which the patrons, if there be more than one patron, shall present or nominate to such united benefice, from time to time, as the same shall become vacant."

And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Act, hath duly prepared and laid before His Majesty in Council a certificate in writing bearing date the 20th day of June, 1913, in the words and figures following:—

"We, Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of All England and Metropolitan, do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council—

"That the Right Reverend George Wyndham, Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells, as Bishop of the Diocese within which are situate the Rectory of Holford and the Rectory of Dodington, both in the county of Somerset, having represented unto us that the said benefices being contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population does not exceed fifteen hundred persons, might with advantage to the interests of religion be united into one benefice we inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such inquiry it appeared to us that such union might be usefully made and would not be of inconvenient extent, and that the Provost of the College Royal of the Blessed Mary of Eton, near unto Windsor, in the county of Bucks, and the same College being the patrons or persons entitled to present to the Rectory of Holford if the same were now vacant, and the Right Honourable Alexander Baron St. Audries being the patron or person entitled to present to the Rectory of Dodington if the same were now vacant, have consented to the proposed union.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such inquiry and consents to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid Representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed to the principal outer door of the Parish Church of each of the said benefices with Notice to any person or persons interested that he, she or they might within such six weeks show cause in writing under his, her or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop, and no such cause has been shown.

"The Representation of the said Lord Bishop of Bath and Wells, our inquiry into the circumstances of the case, the statement of circumstances in reply thereto, the consents in writing of the said patrons and the copies of the Representation and Notices before mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the inquiry and consents aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do make and issue an Order for uniting the said benefices into one benefice for cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only, and we further recommend that the patronage of the said united benefice shall be vested in the said Provost of the College Royal of the Blessed Mary of Eton, near unto Windsor, in the county of Bucks, and the same College, and the said Right Honourable Alexander Baron St. Audries alternately, and that the first right of presentation after the said benefices shall come to be holden by the same Incumbent shall belong to and be exercised by the patron or patrons for the time being of the said Rectory of Holford.

pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the Rectory of Holford, situate in the county of Somerset and Diocese of Bath and Wells, and the Rectory of Dodington, situate in the same county and diocese, shall be united into one benefice with cure of souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

And His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is further pleased to direct that the course and succession in which the respective patrons for the time being shall present or nominate to the said benefices, after the same shall be united into one benefice and come to be holden by the same Incumbent, from time to time as the same shall become vacant shall be as follows, that is to say:—The right of presentation shall be exercised by the Provost of the College Royal of the Blessed Mary of Eton, near unto Windsor, in the county of Bucks, and the same College, and the Right Honourable Alexander Baron St. Audries and his successors in title alternately, and the first turn, or right of presentation, shall belong to and be exercised by the patron, or patrons, for the time being of the said Rectory of Holford.

WHEREAS by section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances tithings, hamlets, chapelries, and other places or districts may be separated from the parishes or mother churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and places altogether extra-parochial may, in some instances, with advantage be annexed to parishes or districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop, that any such tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district within the diocese of such Archbishop, or the diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any parish or mother church, and either be constituted a separate benefice by itself or be united to any other parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining tithing, hamlet, chapelry, place or district, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate parish or benefice, or that any extra-parochial place may with advantage be annexed to any parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a Scheme in writing (the Scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent charges, and other ecclesi-

astical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the patron or patrons of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such Scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such Scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such Scheme or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas by section 8 of the Church Building Act, 1839, it is, amongst other things, further enacted, "That when by any Order of His Majesty in Council, as aforesaid, a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes is constituted, the same shall, on registration thereof, and with the consent in writing of the Incumbent or Incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be thereby affected, become a perpetual curacy and benefice, and the minister thereof duly nominated and licensed thereto, and his successors shall be a body politic and corporate, with perpetual succession, and may receive and take to himself and his successors all such lands, tenements, tithes, rent charges, and hereditaments as shall be granted unto him or them, and such perpetual curate shall thenceforth have, within the limits of the district parish formed under the Church Building Acts for the church of such perpetual curacy, sole and exclusive cure of souls, and shall not in anywise be subject to the control or interference of the Incumbent or Incumbents of the benefice or benefices to be affected by such Order, if he or they shall have consented to such Order as aforesaid."

And whereas the Right Reverend Joshua Pritchard, Lord Bishop of Llandaff, hath made a Representation in writing dated the 30th day of June, 1913, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I, Joshua Pritchard, by Divine permission Bishop of Llandaff, do in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 106, hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

"That there is in my diocese of Llandaff, partly in the county of Glamorgan and partly in the county of Monmouth, the rectory and parish of Bedwas, with the chapelry of Rudry annexed, the limits and boundaries of which are well known and defined.

"That the chapelry of Rudry (which is wholly situate in the county of Glamorgan) contains an ancient consecrated church or chapel dedicated to Saint James, distant from the parish church of Bedwas three and a half miles or thereabouts. That the church at Bedwas has accommodation for 200 people, and that at Rudry for 70 people.

"That according to the Census of one thousand nine hundred and eleven the population of the parish of Bedwas, exclusive of that of the chapelry of Rudry, is 2,015, and that of the said chapelry is 619.

"That there is a house of residence belonging to the said benefice of Bedwas with Rudry.

"That the net annual value of the said benefice of Bedwas with Rudry is five hundred

and eighty-three pounds or thereabouts, arising from tithe rent charge, glebe, fees, amounts payable by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England and by the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty, and from other sources, of which amount seventy-one pounds or thereabouts arises from tithe rent charge within the chapelry of Rudry.

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of the said Act of Parliament and of the Act of the second and third years of the same reign, chapter 49, the said chapelry of Rudry may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Bedwas and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice to be called 'the Perpetual Curacy of Rudry.'

"I, by virtue of my Bishopric, am the patron of the said benefice of Bedwas with Rudry, and the Reverend George Thomas is the present Incumbent thereof.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the first-mentioned Act of Parliament I, the said Lord Bishop, have drawn up a Scheme in writing appended to this Representation describing the mode in which it appears to me the separation may best be effected, and how the changes consequent thereon in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, dues, rates and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested. And I do hereby submit the same to your Grace, together with the Consents thereto in writing of myself as such patron as aforesaid and of the said Incumbent of the said benefice to the intent that if your Grace shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with such Scheme, you may certify the same and such Consents as aforesaid to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate the chapelry of Rudry from the rectory and parish church of Bedwas and to constitute the same a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a benefice by the name and style of 'the Perpetual Curacy of Rudry,' of which the said church or chapel in the said chapelry shall be the parish church.

"The said separate parish and benefice shall henceforth be subject to the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said parish of Bedwas, and the Incumbent of the said separate parish and benefice shall have sole and exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the same.

"That the whole of the tithe rent charge belonging to or arising out of the chapelry of Rudry, and the glebe lands belonging to the same and all other endowments, profits, ecclesiastical dues, offerings, or emoluments whatsoever situate or arising within or in respect of the said chapelry shall henceforth belong to and be attached to the separate parish and perpetual curacy of Rudry for ever, and be held, received, and enjoyed by the Incumbent thereof for the time being.

"That there shall be charged upon the income of the benefice of Bedwas an annual sum or charge amounting to sixty pounds in favour of the benefice or perpetual curacy of Rudry, to be received and enjoyed by the Incumbent

for the time being of the said benefice of Rudry for ever, such annual sum or charge to be due and payable by the Incumbent for the time being of the benefice of Bedwas on the first day of January and the first day of July in every year, and that the Incumbent for the time being of the benefice or perpetual curacy of Rudry shall, for recovering the sum or charge so proposed to be made annually payable to him as such Incumbent, have as against the Incumbent for the time being of the said benefice of Bedwas all such remedies and powers as may by the law then in force be had for the recovery of a debt.

"That baptisms, churchings, marriages and burials shall as heretofore be performed in the church of the benefice so to be constituted, and that the fees for all such offices performed within the limits of the said benefice and all ecclesiastical dues, offerings and other emoluments arising from or in respect of the said benefice and usually payable to the Incumbent of a benefice shall belong to the Incumbent for the time being of the said intended benefice or perpetual curacy of Rudry.

"That two churchwardens shall be appointed in the usual way for the said separate parish of Rudry.

"That the inhabitants of the said separate parish of Rudry shall not be entitled to any accommodation in the said church of Bedwas (except nevertheless any person or persons possessing a legal right by Faculty or otherwise, and who may not be willing to relinquish the same), nor shall the inhabitants of the said parish of Bedwas be entitled to any accommodation in the said church or chapel of Rudry, and the inhabitants of the said separate parish of Rudry shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the church of Bedwas, but shall be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of the said separate parish of Rudry, and shall be liable, subject to the provisions of the Compulsory Rates Abolition Act, 1868, to the repairs of the same.

"That the patronage or right of nomination of or to the said proposed separate benefice of Rudry shall belong to and be vested in the Lord Bishop of Llandaff and his successors for ever."

"CONSENTS.

"We, Joshua Pritchard, Lord Bishop of Llandaff, by virtue of our Bishopric being the patron or person entitled to present to the benefice of Bedwas with Rudry (in case the same were now vacant), and the Reverend George Thomas, the Incumbent of the same benefice, do hereby signify to your Grace our respective Consents to the Scheme above proposed and set forth, and to every matter and thing therein contained.

"In testimony whereof we have hereunto set our hands this thirtieth day of June, one thousand nine hundred and thirteen.

And whereas the said Scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration.

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said Scheme, hath certified the same and the Consents aforesaid to His Majesty in Council by his report dated the

9th day of July, 1913, which said report is in the words and figures following:—

“We, the undersigned, Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council:—

“That the Right Reverend Joshua Pritchard, by Divine permission Bishop of Llandaff, has represented unto us, amongst other things—

“That there is partly in the county of Glamorgan and partly in the county of Monmouth the rectory and parish of Bedwas with the chapelry of Rudry annexed, the limits and boundaries of which are well known and defined.

“That the said chapelry of Rudry (which is wholly situate in the county of Glamorgan) contains an ancient consecrated church or chapel dedicated to St. James, distant from the parish church of Bedwas three and a half miles or thereabouts.

“That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that the said chapelry of Rudry may, under the provisions of the Act of Parliament of 1 and 2 Victoria, chapter 106, and of the Act of the second and third years of the same reign, chapter 49, be advantageously separated from the said parish of Bedwas and be constituted a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes and a perpetual curacy and benefice to be called ‘the Perpetual Curacy of Rudry.’

“That pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said first-mentioned Act of Parliament the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a Scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him the alterations above proposed may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithe rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested, which Scheme, together with the Consents thereto in writing of the said Lord Bishop, by virtue of his bishopric, being the patron or person entitled to present to the said benefice of Bedwas with Rudry (in case the same were now vacant), and of the Reverend George Thomas, the Incumbent of the same benefice, has been transmitted to us for our consideration.

“The Representation and Scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the Consents above referred to are hereunto annexed.

“And we, the said Archbishop, being, on full consideration and inquiry, satisfied with the said Scheme, do hereby, pursuant to the Pluralities Act, 1838, certify the same and such Consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council, to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may, in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make and issue an Order for carrying the said Scheme into effect.

“And we recommend that the whole of the tithe rent charge belonging to or arising out of the chapelry of Rudry and the glebe lands belonging to the same and all other endowments, profits, ecclesiastical dues, offerings or emoluments whatsoever situate or arising within or in respect of the said chapelry shall henceforth belong to and be attached to the separate parish and perpetual curacy of Rudry for ever, and be held, received, and enjoyed by the Incumbent thereof for the time being, and that there shall be charged upon the in-

come of the said benefice of Bedwas an annual sum or charge amounting to sixty pounds in favour of the benefice or perpetual curacy of Rudry, to be received and enjoyed by the Incumbent for the time being of the said benefice or perpetual curacy for ever, such annual sum to be due, payable, and recoverable in manner prescribed in the said Scheme.

or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such consent as aforesaid, by his report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such Scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Archibald, Lord Bishop of Exeter, hath, pursuant to the enactment aforesaid, made a Representation in writing, dated the 24th day of July, 1913, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"We, Archibald, by Divine permission Lord Bishop of Exeter, in pursuance of the twenty-sixth section of the Pluralities Act, 1838, do hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

"1. That there is in the county of Devon and our diocese of Exeter the parish of Lydford (consisting of the whole of the ancient parish of Lydford except those parts out of which by an Order of His Majesty in Council, dated the 11th day of October, 1912, the new parish of Princetown has been formed, together with certain parts of the parish of Brentor Peter Tavy and Bridestowe, which by Order of His Majesty in Council, dated the 13th day of June, 1913, have been annexed to the said parish of Lydford), which contains a population of about three hundred and ninety-two by the Census of nineteen hundred and eleven, with accommodation in the parish church for one hundred and fifty persons. The net annual value of the benefice is two hundred and ten pounds and there is a house of residence.

"2. That there is also in the said county of Devon and diocese of Exeter the parish of Mary Tavy, which contains a population, according to the Census of nineteen hundred and eleven, of six hundred and nineteen; with accommodation in the parish church for one hundred and twenty persons.

"3. That the Incumbents and patrons of the above-named benefices are as follows:—The rector of the said parish of Lydford is the Reverend George Smith Thorpe, and the patron thereof is His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, in right of His Duchy of Cornwall. The rector of the said parish of Mary Tavy is the Reverend Irvine Kempt Anderson, and the patronage thereof is vested in a body of trustees.

"4. That the lands delineated on the plan hereto annexed surrounded with a blue line constitute a portion of the present parish of Lydford, the lands surrounded with a red line on the said plan form part of the parish of Mary Tavy, and are hereinafter called 'the Mary Tavy lands.'

"5. That the Mary Tavy lands contain six houses inhabited by about twenty-three persons, the house on the Mary Tavy lands nearest to the parish church of Mary Tavy is distant therefrom about four miles by the nearest road, and distant from the parish church of Lydford about one and a quarter miles by the nearest road.

"6. That the parishioners inhabiting the Mary Tavy lands have for the most part for many years attended Lydford Parish Church for all the purposes of the church's ministrations.

"7. That the tithe rent charge payable in respect of the Mary Tavy lands is four shillings per annum.

"8. That it appears to us, and we hereby represent to your Grace, that under the provisions of the said Pluralities Act, 1838, the Mary Tavy lands may be advantageously separated from the parish of Mary Tavy and annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said parish of Lydford, to which they are contiguous.

"9. That pursuant to the direction contained in the twenty-sixth section of the said Act we have prepared the following Scheme in writing annexed to this Representation describing the mode in which it appears to us that the alteration above proposed may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithe rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested, and we do hereby submit the same to your Grace, together with the Consents in writing of the patrons of the said benefices and of the said respective Incumbents of the said benefices of Lydford and Mary Tavy, to the intent that if your Grace shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with such Scheme, you may certify the same and such Consent as aforesaid to His Majesty in Council."

"That the inhabitants of the said Mary Tavy lands shall be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of Lydford, but shall cease to be entitled to any right or accommodation in the parish church of Mary Tavy, except nevertheless any person or persons (if any) possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting in the said parish church of Mary Tavy, and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"That the inhabitants of the said Mary Tavy lands shall be discharged from all liability for the maintenance of the church of the said parish of Mary Tavy and shall be liable to contribute with the inhabitants of the said present parish of Lydford to the maintenance of the said parish church of Lydford.

"CONSENTS.

"We, Edward Prince of Wales, Duke of Cornwall, patron of the rectory of Lydford, and I, the Reverend George Smith Thorpe, Clerk, rector of the said rectory, and we, Walter Plimpton, Henry William Hill, and Guilbert Edward Wyndham Malet, patrons of the said rectory of Mary Tavy, and I, Irvine Kempt Anderson, Clerk, rector of the said rectory of Mary Tavy, do hereby respectively signify to your Grace our consent to the scheme above proposed for separating the Mary Tavy lands from the parish of Mary Tavy, and annexing them for all ecclesiastical purposes to the parish of Lydford, and to every matter and thing therein contained.

rectory, Walter Plimpton, Henry William Hill, and Guilbert Edward Wyndham Malet, patrons of the said rectory of Mary Tavy, and Irvine Kempt Anderson, rector of the said rectory, has been transmitted to us for our consideration.

"The Representation and Scheme of the said Lord Bishop and the Consents above referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we, the said Archbishop, being, on full consideration and inquiry, satisfied with the said Scheme, do hereby, pursuant to the said Pluralities Act, 1838, certify the same and such Consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council, to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make and issue an Order for carrying the said Scheme into effect.

"I Huyshe, by Divine permission, Bishop of Worcester, do, in pursuance of the 26th section of an Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, cap. 106, hereby represent to Your Grace as follows:—

"1. There is in the county of Warwick and my Diocese of Worcester the Vicarage of Wootton Wawen, the parish whereof comprises (amongst other places) the chapelry and township of Henley-in-Arden, the limits and boundaries whereof are well known and defined.

"2. The said chapelry and township contains a consecrated church or chapel long since erected and dedicated to St. John the Baptist, distant from the parish church of Wootton Wawen two miles or thereabouts. The seats in the said church or chapel are free and unappropriated, and the inhabitants of the said chapelry and township are accustomed to resort to the said church or chapel for Divine Service and other rites of the Church of England, including marriages.

"3. The population of the said parish, exclusive of the said chapelry and township is, according to the Census of one thousand nine hundred and eleven, five hundred and thirty-four, and the population of the said chapelry and township, according to the same Census, is one thousand and sixty-two.

"4. The net annual value of the said benefice (exclusive of the said chapelry and township) arising from tithe rentcharge glebe fees and Easter dues is two hundred pounds or thereabouts, and the net annual value of the said chapelry and township arising from glebe fees Easter dues and other sources, is two hundred and fifteen pounds or thereabouts.

"5. It appears to me that the said chapelry and township may, under the provisions of the said Act 1 and 2 Vic., cap 106, and of the Act of the second and third years of the same reign, cap. 49, be advantageously separated from the said parish of Wootton Wawen and be constituted a separate parish for Ecclesiastical purposes, and a perpetual curacy and benefice, to be called 'The Perpetual Curacy of Henley-in-Arden.'

"6. The Provost and Scholars of the King's College of Our Lady and St. Nicholas in Cambridge are the patrons of the said benefice of Wootton Wawen, and the Reverend Francis Thomas Bramston is the present Incumbent of the said benefice.

"7. Pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the first mentioned Act of Parliament I the said Bishop have drawn up a Scheme in writing, appended to this Representation, describing the said chapelry and township so-as aforesaid proposed to be formed into a separate benefice and the mode in which it appears to me the alterations may be best effected, and how the changes consequent thereon in respect of Ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, dues, rates and payments and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested, and I do hereby submit the same to your Grace, together with the consents in writing of the said patron and Incumbent, and in case you shall on full consideration and inquiry be satisfied therewith I request that your Grace will be pleased to certify the same and such consents to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed that the chapelry and township of Henley-in-Arden, the boundaries of which are defined and well known, and which said chapelry and township is coloured pink and indicated by the letter 'A' on the annexed plan, be separated from the Ecclesiastical parish of Wootton Wawen, in the county of Warwick and Diocese of Worcester, and that the same be constituted a separate parish for Ecclesiastical purposes and a benefice by the name of 'The Perpetual Curacy of Henley-in-Arden,' of which the said church or chapel of St. John the Baptist, Henley-in-Arden, shall be the parish church.

"The said separate parish and benefice of Henley-in-Arden shall henceforth be subject to the same Ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said

parish of Wootton Wawen and the Incumbent of the said separate parish and benefice shall have sole and exclusive cure of souls within the limits of the same.

"The fees for marriages, churchings and all other ecclesiastical dues arising from the said parish shall belong to the Incumbent of the same.

"The right of nominating a Minister or Incumbent to the church of such perpetual curacy and benefice shall be for ever vested in and be exercised by the High Bailiff for the time being of the township of Henley-in-Arden aforesaid.

"The glebe lands, situate in the parishes of Ullenhall and Beaudesert, in the said county of Warwick, and acquired for the endowment of the said chapelry and township by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne for the augmentation of the maintenance of the poor clergy, part of such glebe lands being numbered 175, 179, and 180 on the Ordnance Map (2nd Edition, 1905) for the said parish of Ullenhall, and the remainder being numbered 139, 140, and 151 on the Ordnance Map (same Edition) for the said parish of Beaudesert, and having a total acreage of twenty-one acres three roods and thirty-six perches or thereabouts, shall be assigned to and vested in the Incumbent of the said separate parish of Henley-in-Arden.

"All endowments and other emoluments at present belonging to or enjoyed by the Incumbent of the said chapel shall henceforth be vested in and belong to the Incumbent of the said separate parish of Henley-in-Arden.

"The inhabitants of the said separate parish shall not be entitled to any accommodation in the parish church of Wootton Wawen (except nevertheless any person or persons possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting within the said church, and who may not be willing to relinquish the same) and shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the same, but shall be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of the said separate parish, and shall be liable, subject to the provisions of the Compulsory Church Rates Abolition Act, 1868, to the repairs of the said church.

"The inhabitants of the said separate parish shall retain such rights of burial as they now possess in the graveyard attached to the parish church of Wootton Wawen until such time as a graveyard or burial ground shall be provided for the said separate parish, after which they shall not be entitled to any right of burial in the said graveyard of Wootton Wawen (except nevertheless any person or persons possessing a legal right of burial therein by faculty).

" CONSENTS.

"We, the Provost and Scholars of the King's College of Our Lady and St. Nicholas, in Cambridge, being the patrons or body corporate entitled to present to the benefice of Wootton Wawen in case the same were now vacant, and the Reverend Francis Thomas Bramston, the Incumbent of the same benefice, do hereby respectively signify to your Grace our respective consents to the scheme above proposed, and set forth, and to every matter and thing therein contained.

"2. The net annual value of the said benefice (exclusive of the said chapelry and township) arising from tithe rentcharge, glebe, fees and Easter dues is two hundred pounds or thereabouts.

"3. There is in the county and diocese aforesaid the vicarage of Ullenhall, the parish whereof contains, according to the Census of one thousand nine hundred and eleven, a population of four hundred and eighty.

"4. The net annual value of the said benefice arising from tithe dividends from the Ecclesiastical Commissioners and other sources is one hundred and sixty-five pounds or thereabouts.

"5. There is in the county and diocese aforesaid the rectory of Beaudesert (adjacent to the said parishes of Wootton Wawen and Ullenhall), the parish whereof contains, according to the Census of one thousand nine hundred and eleven, a population of one hundred and eighty-seven.

"6. The net annual value of the said benefice arising from tithe, ground rents and other sources is three hundred and sixteen pounds or thereabouts.

"7. It appears to me that a certain detached portion of the said parish of Wootton Wawen, situate near Buckley Green, and entirely surrounded by the said parish of Beaudesert, and also a certain district of the said parish of Wootton Wawen, situate in the north of the parish adjoining the said parish of Beaudesert, and lying at a distance from the parish church of Wootton Wawen, may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Wootton

Wawen, and united to the said parish of Beaudesert.

"8. It also appears to me that a certain district of the said parish of Ullenhall, being bounded on all sides except the western side thereof by the said parish of Beaudesert, may also, under the provisions of the said Acts, be advantageously separated from the said parish of Ullenhall and united to the said parish of Beaudesert.

"9. The Provost and Scholars of the King's College of our Lady and St. Nicholas in Cambridge are the patrons of the said benefice of Wootton Wawen, Hugh Goodwin Newton, of Barrells, near Henley-in-Arden aforesaid, Esquire, is the patron of the said benefice of Ullenhall, and the Right Honourable Richard Burdon Viscount Haldane of Cloan Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, on behalf of His Most Gracious Majesty the King, is the patron of the said benefice of Beaudesert.

"10. The Reverend Francis Thomas Bramston is the present Incumbent of the said benefice of Wootton Wawen, the Reverend William Frederick Pelton is the present Incumbent of the said benefice of Ullenhall, and the Reverend James Smith Turner is the present Incumbent of the said benefice of Beaudesert.

Pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth section of the first-mentioned Act of Parliament, I, the said Bishop, have drawn up a Scheme in writing appended to this Representation describing the said respective districts of the said parishes of Wootton Wawen and Ullenhall, so as aforesaid proposed to be annexed to the said parish of Beaudesert, and the mode in which it appears to me the alterations may be best effected, and how the changes consequent thereon in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, dues, rates and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested. And I do hereby submit the same to your Grace, together with the consents in writing of the said Patrons and Incumbents, and in case you shall on full consideration and inquiry be satisfied therewith, I request that your Grace will be pleased to certify the same and such consents to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop, and the Consents referred to in the said Representation, are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate a district, being a detached portion of the said parish of Wootton Wawen, from that parish, and unite the same for ecclesiastical purposes to the adjoining ecclesiastical parish of Beaudesert aforesaid.

"Such district shall consist of all that detached portion of the said parish of Wootton Wawen which lies in that part of the said parish of Beaudesert known as Buckley Green, and is wholly surrounded by such last-mentioned parish, and such district is coloured green, and indicated by the letter 'A' on the said plan.

"It is further proposed to separate another district from the said parish of Wootton Wawen, and unite such district for ecclesiastical purposes to the adjoining parish of Beaudesert aforesaid.

"Such district shall consist of all that portion of the said parish of Wootton Wawen (other than the said chapelry and township) which lies to the north of the High Road leading from Preston Bagot to Henley-in-Arden, and which is bounded on the south by the said High Road on the west or north-west by the parish of Beaudesert, in the said county and diocese, and on the east by the parish of Preston Bagot, in the said county and diocese, and is coloured green, and indicated by the letter 'B' on the said plan.

"It is further proposed to separate a district from the ecclesiastical parish of Ullenhall, in the county and diocese aforesaid, and unite such district for ecclesiastical purposes to the adjoining ecclesiastical parish of Beaudesert aforesaid.

"Such district shall consist of all that part of the said parish of Ullenhall which lies to the east of an imaginary line starting from a point in the south-eastern boundary of the said parish at the south-western corner of the field numbered 212 on the Ordnance Map (Second Edition, 1905) for the said parish, and which runs in a northerly direction along the western boundary of the said field, and of the field numbered 203 on the said map, and continues thence in a north-easterly direction along the north-western boundaries of the fields numbered 204, 205, 190, 169 and 155 on the said map until it reaches the northern boundary of the said parish, and such district is coloured purple, and indicated by the letter 'C' on the said plan.

"The inhabitants of the said respective districts shall not, after this Scheme takes effect, be entitled to any accommodation in the respective churches of the parishes from which such districts have been separated (except, nevertheless, any person or persons possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting within the said churches respectively, and who may not be willing to relinquish the same), and shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the churches of the parishes from which such districts shall respectively have been separated, but shall be entitled to accommodation in the parish church of Beaudesert, and shall be liable subject to the provisions of the Church Rates Abolition Act, 1868, to the repairs of the said church.

"The inhabitants of the said respective districts shall not be entitled to any right of burial in the respective graveyards or burial places of the parishes from which such districts have been separated (except, nevertheless, any person or persons possessing a legal right of burial therein by faculty).

"The Incumbent of the parish church of Beaudesert shall henceforth have the exclusive cure of souls within the said districts.

"The fees for marriages and churchings and all other ecclesiastical dues arising from the said districts, and due to the Incumbent thereof, shall henceforth belong to the Incumbent of the benefice of Beaudesert aforesaid.

"No alteration shall be made in the patronage or endowments of any of the aforesaid benefices.

entitled to present to the benefice of Wootton Wawen, in case the same were now vacant, and the Reverend Francis Thomas Bramston, the Incumbent of the same benefice, Hugh Goodwin Newton, of Barrells, near Henley-in-Arden, in the county of Warwick, Esquire, being the patron or person entitled to present to the benefice of Ullenhall, in case the same were now vacant, and the Reverend William Frederick Pelton, the Incumbent of the same benefice, the Right Honourable Richard Burdon Viscount Haldane of Cloan, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, on behalf of His Most Gracious Majesty the King, being the patron or person entitled to present to the benefice of Beaudesert, in case the same were now vacant, and the Reverend James Smith Turner, the Incumbent of the same benefice, do hereby respectively signify to your Grace our respective Consents to the Scheme above proposed and set forth, and to every matter and thing therein contained.

hereinafter-mentioned Scheme of the said Lord Bishop, appended hereto and delineated on the plan annexed to such Scheme, and thereon coloured green, and indicated by the letter 'A,' and also a certain district of the said parish of Wootton Wawen, also described in the said Scheme, and delineated on the said plan, and thereon coloured green, and indicated by the letter 'B,' may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Wootton Wawen and united to the said parish of Beaudesert.

"That it also appears to the said Lord Bishop that a certain district of the said parish of Ullenhall, described in the said Scheme, and delineated on the said plan, and thereon coloured purple, and indicated by the letter 'C,' may be advantageously separated from the said parish of Ullenhall and united to the said parish of Beaudesert.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the said Pluralities Act the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a Scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him that the proposed alterations may best be effected, and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithe rentcharges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews may be made with justice to all parties interested, which scheme, together with the consents thereto in writing of the Provost and Scholars of the King's College of Our Lady and St. Nicholas in Cambridge, the patrons or body corporate entitled to present to the benefice of Wootton Wawen, in case the same were now vacant, the Reverend Francis Thomas Bramston, the Incumbent of the same benefice, Hugh Goodwin Newton, Esquire, the patron or person entitled to present to the benefice of Ullenhall, in case the same were now vacant, the Reverend William Frederick Pelton, the Incumbent of the same benefice, the Right Honourable Richard Burdon Viscount Haldane of Cloan, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain on behalf of His Most Gracious Majesty the King, the patron or person entitled to present to the benefice of Beaudesert, in case the same were now vacant, and the Reverend James Smith Turner, the Incumbent of the same benefice, have been transmitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration.

"The Representation and Scheme of the said Lord Bishop, and the consents above referred to, are hereunto annexed.

"And we, the said Archbishop, being, on full consideration and inquiry, satisfied with the said Scheme, do hereby pursuant to the said Pluralities Act, certify the same and such Consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may, in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make and issue an Order for carrying the said Scheme into effect.

Thence along the said road to the point where it crosses the Midland Railway (Barnt Green, Evesham and Ashchurch Branch) at Evesham, thence along the said railway to Tewkesbury. Thence along the River Severn past Ashleworth and by Maisemore to the bridge where the Gloucester-Mitcheldean road crosses the river about a mile north-west of the city of Gloucester.

On the south and west from the said point along the Roman Road north of Churcham to

Huntley, thence by the road south of Huntley Hill by Little London to Longhope and Mitcheldean, thence by Drybrook and Ruardean to the River Wye and the boundary between Gloucestershire and Herefordshire, and thence continuing along the southern and western boundary of the said county of Hereford to a point near Bucknell where it meets the London and North-Western Railway (Knighton Line). Thence northward along the said railway to Craven Arms and thence along the railway through March Farm Junction and Harton Road Station towards Much Wenlock to the point at Presthope, and which area, surrounded on all sides by a red line, is delineated on a map signed by one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, copies of which are deposited in the War Office and the Privy Council Office.

WHEREAS by the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1906, it was amongst other things enacted that, where an arrangement has been made with any foreign State with respect to the surrender to such State of any fugitive criminals, His Majesty may, by Order in Council, direct that the said Acts shall apply in the case of such foreign State; and that His Majesty may, by the same or any subsequent Order, limit the operation of the Order, and restrict the same to fugitive criminals who are in or suspected of being in the part of His Majesty's dominions specified in the Order, and render the operation thereof subject to such conditions, exceptions, and qualifications as may be deemed expedient:

And whereas a Treaty was concluded on the fourteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two, between Her late Majesty Queen Victoria and His late Majesty the German Emperor for the mutual extradition of fugitive criminals, in the case of which Treaty the Extradition Act, 1870, was applied by Order in Council of the twenty-fifth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two:

And whereas a further Treaty was concluded on the fifth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-four, between Her late Majesty Queen Victoria and His Majesty the German Emperor for the mutual extradition of fugitive offenders, in the case of which Treaty the Extradition Acts, 1870 and 1873, were applied by Order in Council of the second day of February, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-five:

And whereas a Convention was concluded between His Majesty and other Powers and States enumerated therein, one of whom was His Majesty the German Emperor, on the fourth day of May, one thousand nine hundred

and ten, for the suppression of the white slave traffic, which contains Articles in the terms following:—

“ARTICLE 1.”

“Doit être puni quiconque, pour satisfaire les passions d'autrui, a, embauché, entraîné, ou détourné, même avec son consentement, une femme ou fille mineure, en vue de la débauche, alors même que les divers actes qui sont les éléments constitutifs de l'infraction auraient été accomplis dans des pays différents.

“ARTICLE 2.

“Doit être aussi puni quiconque, pour satisfaire les passions d'autrui, a, par fraude ou à l'aide de violences, menaces, abus d'autorité, ou tout autre moyen de contrainte, embauché, entraîné, ou détourné une femme ou fille majeure, en vue de la débauche, alors même que les divers actes qui sont les éléments constitutifs de l'infraction auraient été accomplis dans des pays différents.

* * * *

“ARTICLE 5.

“Les infractions prévues par les articles 1 et 2 seront, à partir du jour de l'entrée en vigueur de la présente Convention, réputées être inscrites de plein droit au nombre des infractions donnant lieu à extradition d'après les Conventions déjà existantes entre les Parties contractantes.

“Dans les cas où la stipulation qui précède ne pourrait recevoir effet sans modifier la législation existante, les Parties contractantes s'engagent à prendre ou à proposer à leurs législatures respectives les mesures nécessaires.

* * * *

“ARTICLE 11.

“Si un État contractant désire la mise en vigueur de la présente Convention dans une ou plusieurs de ses colonies, possessions ou circonscriptions consulaires judiciaires, il notifiera son intention à cet effet par un acte qui sera déposé dans les archives du Gouvernement de la République française. Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in virtue of

the authority committed to Him by the Extradition Acts, 1870 to 1906, doth order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Acts shall apply in the case of Germany under and in accordance with the said Treaties as supplemented by the said Convention above set forth.

This Order shall come into operation in the United Kingdom from and after the 25th day of May, 1914. In the above-mentioned British Possessions in respect of which His Majesty's Government have acceded to the Convention in accordance with Article 11 thereof, or in other British Possessions in respect of which His Majesty's Government may in future accede thereto, it shall in each case come into operation on a date six months after the respective date of such accession, or from and after the said 25th day of May, 1914, whichever shall be the later date.

Provided always that the operation of the said Acts shall be and remain suspended within the Dominion of Canada so long as an Act of the Parliament of Canada, being Part I. of chapter 155 of the Revised Statutes of Canada, 1906, and entitled “An Act respecting the Extradition of Fugitive Criminals,” shall continue in force there, and no longer.
