WILD BIRD (ENGLAND).

The Wild Birds Protection (Administrative County of the Isle of Ely) Order, 1914.

Dated 6th June, 1914.

In pursuance of the powers conferred on me by the Wild Birds Protection Acts, 1880 to 1908, and upon application by the Council of

the Administrative County of the Isle of Ely, I hereby make the following Order:—

Title.

I. This Order may be cited as "The Wild Birds Protection (Administrative County of the Isle of Ely) Order, 1914."

BIRDS.

Close Time varied.

II. The time during which the killing or taking of Wild Birds is prohibited by the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, shall be varied throughout the Administrative County of the Isle of Ely, so as to be between the 14th day of March and the 1st day of September in any year.

Certain Birds protected during the whole of the Year.

III. During that period of the year to which the protection afforded by the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, as varied by Clause II. of this Order, does not extend, the killing or taking of the following species of Wild Birds is prohibited throughout the Administrative County of the Isle of Ely:—

Bullfinch, Goldfinch, Kingfisher, Owl (all species), Woodpecker (all species).

Repeal of former Order.

IV. The Order of the 21st June, 1909, is hereby repealed.

BIRMINGHAM INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL FOR BOYS, SHUSTOKE.

The Secretary of State for the Home Department being satisfied that there is now accommodation at the Birmingham Industrial School for Boys at Shustoke for one hundred and sixty-six boys, has sanctioned the reception in the school of not more than six boys recalled to the school by the revocation of their licences under section 67 and 68 of the Children Act, in addition to the number of 160 fixed for ordinary inmates.

The number of inmates at any one time in the said school, whether sent thereto in pursuance of the provisions of the Children Act, 1908 (8 Edw. 7, cap. 67), or of the Elementary Education Act, 1876 (39 and 40 Vict., cap 79), or otherwise, shall not exceed one hundred and sixty-six.
