Privy Council Office, Whitehall, 30th June, 1914.

The following Scheme for the adjustment of the property, rights, liabilities, &c., of the Urban District Council of Stourbridge, in the county of Worcester, and for other purposes, as settled by a Committee of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, is published in accordance with the provisions of "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1882":—

Whereas by the Municipal Corporation Acts, 1882 and 1885, it is enacted that where a Petition for a Charter of Incorporation is referred to the Committee of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and it is proposed by the Charter to extend the Municipal Corporation Acts to the Municipal Borough to be created by the Charter, the said Committee of the Council may settle a Scheme for the purposes in the said Acts named, and containing such provisions as are in the said Acts particularized.

And whereas in the month of December, 1911, certain inhabitant householders of the urban district of Stourbridge, in the county of Worcester, petitioned His Majesty the King praying for the grant of a Charter of Incorporation.

And whereas the said petition for a

Charter was referred to the Committee of Council, and it was proposed by the Charter to create the urban district of Stourbridge, hereinafter described, a municipal borough, and to extend to such borough and to the inhabitants thereof all the powers; privileges, and provisions of the Municipal Corporation Acts.

And whereas in the year 1791 an Act was passed entitled "An Act for lighting, cleansing and watching the streets, lanes and other public passages and places within the township of Stourbridge, in the parish of Oldswinford, in the county of Worcester, and for removing and preventing obstructions, nuisances and annoyances therein."

And whereas under and by virtue of a further Act, passed in the year 1825, and entitled "An Act for better lighting, cleansing, watching, paving and otherwise improving the township of Stourbridge, in the parish of Oldswinford, in the county of Worcester; for regulating the market, and building a market place within and for the said township; and for removing and preventing nuisances and annoyances therein" (hereinafter called the said Act of 1825), the said Act of 1791 was repealed and Commissioners were appointed for carrying the said Act of 1825 into execution, and were invested with powers to build a market place and other buildings, and to

impose tolls and to levy rates, and to borrow money upon the credit of the said market place, tolls and rates, and for other purposes.

And whereas in pursuance of the powers contained in the said Act of 1825 a market place and other buildings were duly erected, and market tolls were imposed and monies were borrowed for the purpose of defraying the cost of the said market place and other buildings.

And whereas under and by virtue of "The Stourbridge Improvement Act, 1866" (hereinafter called the said Act of 1866) the said Act of 1825 was repealed to the extent and with the exceptions specified in the said Act of 1866, and the said Commissioners were reconstituted and incorporated under name of the Stourbridge Improvement Commissioners, and provision was made for the adoption of the said Act of 1866 by any one of the townships of Lye, Amblecote and Wollaston, and for the extension of the limits of that Act so as to comprise the respective township adopting the same, but in case of such adoption as aforesaid it was provided that no part of the debt of the existing Commissioners appointed by the said Act of 1825 or of the interest thereon should be charged upon or paid out of the improvement rate to be from time to time levied in respect of rateable property in any township so adopting the said Act of 1866 as aforesaid.

And whereas under and by virtue of "The Stourbridge Improvement Commissioners Act, 1891" (hereinafter called the said Act of 1891) the said Act of 1866 was repealed to the extent in the said Act of 1891 mentioned (including in such repeal the provision as to payment of the debt of the existing Commissioners hereinbefore referred to), and it was provided, inter alia, that, notwithstanding anything in the said Act of 1866, that Act should not at any time after the passing of the said Act of 1891 be adopted by any of the townships empowered by the said Act of 1866 to adopt the same without the approval of the Stourbridge Improvement Commissioners, and that if at the time of the adoption of the said Act of 1866 by any township the debt incurred in respect of the building of the old Town Hall, Corn Exchange, and Market Hall should be outstanding, such debt should not be a charge upon any such township adopting the said Act or the rates or revenues thereof

And whereas under and by virtue of the Local Government Act, 1894, as from the 22nd day of November, 1894, the Improvement Act District of Stourbridge became an urban district (hereinafter called "the District"), and the said Stourbridge Improvement Commissioners became the urban district council of Stourbridge (hereinafter called "the District Council").

And whereas none of the said townships of Lye, Amblecote and Wollaston has adopted the said Act of 1866.

And whereas by an Order of the County Council of Worcester, dated the 15th day of September, 1894, duly confirmed (with such modifications as are in the confirming Order mentioned) by the County of Worcester (Stourbridge) Confirmation Order, 1894, of the Local Government Board, dated the 19th day of November, 1894, it was ordered that on and after the appointed day, as defined by

section 84 of the Local Government Act, 1894, the township of Wollaston should be included in and form part of the district, and it was provided, inter alia, that the "old debt," as defined by section 4 of the said Act of 1891, and the outstanding balance of the amount borrowed for the payment of the costs of obtaining that Act, with all interest due or to become due thereon, should be paid exclusively out of rates to be levied for the discharge thereof exclusively within the area of the then existing parish of Stourbridge, and no part thereof should be paid out of rates to be levied in the said township of Wollaston.

And whereas by an Order of the County Council of Worcester, dated the 22nd day of October, 1894, duly confirmed (with such modifications as are in the confirming Order mentioned) by the County of Worcester (Stourbridge) Confirmation Order, 1895, of the Local Government Board, dated the 25th day of March, 1895, it was ordered that as, on and from the 1st day of April, 1895, the township of Upper Swinford should be included in and form part of the district, and it was provided, inter alia, that the old debt of £16,070, as defined by section 4 of the said Act of 1891 (being the debt incurred in respect of the building of the old Town Hall, Corn Exchange and Market Hall), and the debt of £1,764, the cost of obtaining the said Act of 1891 debts of the urban district, with all interest due or to become due thereon, should be paid exclusively out of rates to be levied for the discharge thereof exclusively within the area of the then existing urban district, and that no part thereof should be paid out of rates to be levied in the said township of Upper Swinford.

And whereas by the County of Worcester, Stourbridge Urban District Order, 1909, the number of members of the District Council to be elected for the district (which had been prescribed by the said Act of 1866 and varied by the said Act of 1891, and the said Orders of September and October, 1894) were reduced from 27 to 21.

And whereas by the Stourbridge Main Drainage Order, 1881, of the Local Government Board, duly confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (Brentford Union, &c.) Act, 1881, and amended by the Stourbridge Drainage Order, 1896, duly confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 8) Act, 1896, and a further Order of the Local Government Board, dated the 24th day of June, 1898, the district and the urban district of Amblecote were formed into a united district, called the Stourbridge Main Drainage District, governed by a Joint Board called the Stourbridge Main Drainage Board, and having a common fund to be contributed by the said districts in manner provided by section 283 of the Public Health Act, 1875.

And whereas by the Stourbridge and Halesowen Hospital (County of Worcester) Order, 1896, amended by the Stourbridge and Halesowen Hospital (County of Worcester) Order, 1897, the Lye and Wollescote urban district, the district and the Halesowen rural district were formed into a united hospital district for the provision, maintenance and management of an isolation hospital or hospitals under the Isolation Hospitals Act, 1893,

and with a common fund contributed by the above-named Local Authorities in such sums as are in the said Orders provided.

And whereas under and by virtue of the Stourbridge and District Water Board Act, 1909, the Stourbridge and District Water Board was constituted for the purpose of acquiring the undertaking of the Stourbridge Waterworks Company Limited, and for other purposes, and with power to raise money by precept and rate within the district.

And whereas in the year 1874 a Burial Board was duly constituted for the townships of Stourbridge and Upper Swinford, which Board duly purchased and laid out a burial ground for the said townships.

And whereas in exercise of the powers conferred by the Local Government Act, 1894, the Council, on the 27th day of May, 1895, resolved that the powers, duties, property, debts and liabilities of the Stourbridge and Upper Swinford Burial Board be, and that they were thereby, transferred forthwith to the Council, and that the said Board should forthwith cease to exist, and the Council should be the successors of the said Board, and the same were transferred, and the said Board ceased to exist, and the Council became their successors accordingly.

And whereas tables of fees, duly allowed and approved in accordance with the provisions of the Burial Acts, are now in force within the district.

And whereas the following Acts have been adopted by the district council, and are now in force within the district (that is to say):—

- (1.) The Baths and Washhouses Acts, 1846-1899; adopted on the 29th day of January, 1900.
- (2.) The Infectious Disease (Notification) Act, 1889; adopted on the 25th day of June, 1894; as to Ophthalmia Neonatorum on the 30th day of January, 1911, and as to Acute Poliomyelitis and Cerebro-Spinal Fever on the 25th day of March, 1912.
- (3.) The Infectious Disease (Prevention) Act, 1890; adopted on the 25th day of June,
- (4.) The Housing of the Working Classes Act, 1890, Part 3; adopted on the 30th day of December, 1901.
- (5.) The Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1890; adopted as to Parts 1, 2, 3 and 5 thereof on the 6th day of April, 1891, and as to Part 4 thereof on the 30th day of August, 1909.
- (6.) The Public Libraries Act, 1892, and the Public Libraries (Amendment) Act, 1893; adopted on the 20th day of August, 1902.
- (7.) The Private Street Works Act, 1892; adopted on the 31st day of October,

And whereas by the Commissioner's award, dated the 14th day of April, 1881, and made pursuant to a Provisional Order (confirmed by the Regulation (Clent) Provisional Order Act, 1880) for the regulation under the provisions of the Inclosure Acts, 1845 to 1878, of Clent Hill Common, in the parish of Clent, the general management of the said common was vested in twelve Commissioners, of whom

one should be the chairman for the time being of the urban sanitary authority of Stourbridge (now the district council), and it was provided that an annual sum not exceeding ten pounds should be contributed by such urban sanitary authority towards defraying the expenses of the said Commissioners.

And whereas by the Stourbridge Electric Lighting Order, 1899 (confirmed by the Electric Lighting Orders Confirmation (No. 11) Act, 1899), the district council were granted certain powers as to electric lighting.

And whereas by the Stourbridge Electric Lighting Order, 1909 (confirmed by the Electric Lighting Provisional Orders (No. 1) Act, 1909), the district council were granted certain powers with regard to electric lighting only exercisable in the event of the transfer of the Council's undertaking to the Midland Electric Corporation for Power Distribution Limited, and provision was made for such transfer as aforesaid with the consent of and upon terms approved by the Board of Trade, and it was provided that upon such transfer as aforesaid the Stourbridge Electric Lighting Order, 1899, should be repealed.

And whereas the said transfer was duly effected by deed dated the 16th day of February, 1910, and approved by the Board of Trade on the 25th day of February, 1910, and the said deed includes provisions empowering the district council to require the said company to re-transfer the said undertaking at the expiration of the periods, at the price and upon the conditions therein specified.

And whereas the Local Government Board, under and by virtue of section 33 of the Local Government Act, 1894, have made the following Orders affecting the district (that is to say):—

On the 20th day of March, 1895, an Order transferring to the district council the power of appointing overseers for each of the parishes wholly comprised within their district.

On the 5th day of February, 1896, an Order conferring on the district council the powers, duties and liabilities of a parish council under section 14 of the Local Government Act, 1894, with reference to any charity held wholly or partly for the benefit of the inhabitants of any parish comprised within the district.

On the 6th day of February, 1896, an Order transferring to the district council the power of appointing, and revoking the appointment of, any assistant overseer for each parish wholly comprised within the district.

On the 21st day of October, 1898, an Order conferring on the district council the powers, duties and liabilities of a parish council in regard to the hiring, either by agreement or compulsorily, of land for allotments under section 10 of the Local Government Act, 1894.

On the 17th day of September, 1908, an Order conferring on the district council the powers of a parish council under section 13, sub-section 2, of the Local Government Act, 1894 (as to repair and maintenance of public footpaths), and under section 17, sub-section 8, of that Act (as to custody of public books, &c.),

with such right of access and such transfer to the district council of the powers of the vestry under section 6 of the Vestries Act, 1818, as are in the said Order specified.

And whereas by the Stourbridge Order, 1898, made by the Local Government Board in pursuance of their powers under section 176 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 12) Act, 1898, the district council were empowered to put in force the compulsory clauses of the Lands Clauses Acts with reference to the lands described in the Schedule to such Order.

And whereas by an Order of the Local Government Board made the 16th day of February, 1910, such parts as are therein specified of the Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1907, were put in force in the district.

And whereas by The Stourbridge (Notification of Births) Order, 1910, made by the Local Government Board in pursuance of their powers under section 2 sub-section 4 (b) of the Notification of Births Act, 1907, it was declared that that Act should take effect in relation to the district as if it had been adopted by the County Council of the administrative county of Worcester instead of the district

And whereas by an Order of the Local Government Board made the 23rd day of December, 1910, an Order of the district council declaring certain trades to be offensive trades was, with the exception therein specified, confirmed.

And whereas the following Acts of Parliament and Orders refer and apply in whole or in part to the district or some part thereof: -

And whereas under the provisions of the Public Health Act, 1875, other general Acts and certain local Acts, the district council or their predecessors have made or continued byelaws in respect of :-

Hackney carriages; allowed and confirmed by the Justices assembled in Court of Quarter Sessions for the county of Worcester on the 14th day of October, 1861.

Markets and fairs; confirmed on the 14th day of August, 1867, by one of Her Majesty's principal Secretaries of State.

Cleansing of earth closets and cesspools; common lodging houses; houses let in lodgings; a market; a mortuary; new streets and buildings; slaughter houses; bloodboilers; blood-driers; bone-boilers; fatmelters or fat extractors; fellmongers; gluemakers; gut scrapers; leather-dressers; sizemakers; soap - boilers; tallow - melters; tanners; tripe-boilers; allowed by the Local Government Board on the 15th day of September, 1890.

Flushing of water closets; allowed by the Local Government Board on the 30th day of September, 1895.

Nuisances; allowed by the Local Government Board on the 20th day of October, 1911.

Tents, vans, sheds and similar structures, allowed by the Local Government Board on the 23rd day of December, 1912.

Pleasure grounds; allowed by the Local Government Board on the 16th day of January, 1913.

And whereas the district council on the 26th day of April, 1897, made regulations under the Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops Order of 1885.

And whereas under the provisions of the Stourbridge and District Water Board Act, 1909, the Stourbridge and District Water Board have made bye-laws to prevent the waste, undue consumption, misuse, or contamination of the water of the said Board, which said bye-laws were allowed by the Local Government Board on the 18th day of May, 1911.

whereas the County Council Worcestershire have made certain bye-laws for the good rule and government of the Administrative County of Worcester and the same are now in force in the district.

And whereas it is intended that the Council of the borough of Stourbridge when constituted shall, subject to the approval of the Board of Education, enter into an agreement with the County Council of the county of Worcester for relinquishing in favour of the said County Council their powers and duties under Part 3 of the Education Act, 1902.

And whereas it is intended that arrangements shall be made for the consolidation of the police force of the borough of Stourbridge when constituted by charter with the police force of the county of Worcester.

And whereas the district council is a local authority within the meaning of the Municipal Corporation Acts, 1882 and 1885.

And whereas this Scheme was before being settled by the Committee of Council referred for consideration to His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, to the Local Government Board, to the Board of Trade and to the Board of Education.

And whereas it is expedient that a Scheme should be made and settled containing the provisions hereinafter set forth.

Now therefore, pursuant to the Municipal Corporation Acts, 1882 and 1885, and every other power enabling them in that behalf, the Committee of Council have settled a Scheme containing the provisions herein, and do hereby direct, order and declare as follows:—

- 1. This Scheme may be cited for all purposes as "The Borough of Stourbridge Scheme, 1914."
- 2. The Mayor, Aldermen and Burgesses of the borough of Stourbridge are in this Scheme referred to as "the Corporation."
- 3. This Scheme, when confirmed, shall come into operation on the day of the first meeting of the Council of the municipal borough created by the said charter, and this Scheme shall be construed and applied as if it had been dated and confirmed by Parliament or Order in Council, on the day before the day of the said first meeting, and everything thereunder shall be done and had accordingly. This date is hereinafter referred to as "the commencement of this Scheme." So far as may be necessary this Scheme shall operate retrospectively.
- 4. From and after the commencement of this Scheme the municipal borough created by the said charter shall be placed within the jurisdiction of the Corporation acting by the Council of the borough as the sanitary authority of the said borough.
- 5. The district council, its powers, duties, rights, obligations and privileges shall continue, and be deemed to have continued, to exist until the commencement of this Scheme unaffected in any manner whatsoever by the grant of the said charter or of the creation of the said borough. From and after the commencement of this Scheme the District Council shall be and the same is hereby abolished, and the powers, rights, duties, obligations and privileges thereof shall cease and determine.
- 6. The tables of fees duly allowed and approved in accordance with the provisions of the Burial Acts shall continue in force in

regard to the respective burial grounds until the same are repealed, varied, revised or altered by the Council of the borough with such approval as is required by law.

- 7. All the jurisdiction, powers, duties and property vested in or possessed by the district council or by any person or body in trust for them or any of their members as such (and not otherwise dealt with or transferred by or under any part of this Scheme) shall vest in the Corporation and shall be exercised, held and applied for the municipal and public purposes of the said borough.
- 8. All duties and liabilities which immediately before the commencement of this Scheme attached to and were enforceable against the district council or the property thereof shall attach to and be enforceable against the Corporation.
- 9. Any investigation, legal proceedings, or remedy in respect of any debt, liability, penalty or forfeiture due to or incurred by or on behalf of the district council, before the commencement of this Scheme may be continued, prosecuted or enforced by or against the Corporation.
- 10. The term "property" in this Scheme means and includes all property, real and personal, and all things in action, and all rights of common and commonable rights and rights to toll, and all franchises, privileges and rights which have any pecuniary value, and all charters, records, deeds, books, and documents, and all rights and all claims to relief, and all rights to avoid contracts or otherwise, and includes any estate or interest, legal or equitable, in or in respect of any property so defined.
- 11. The district fund and general district rate of the borough of Stourbridge shall for all purposes whatsoever (subject to the provisions of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, with respect to the borough fund and borough rate and watch rate respectively) take the place of and be substituted for the district fund and general district rate respectively of the district council, and all sums of money respectively payable to, from or out of, and all liabilities charged upon or attaching to the district fund or general district rate of the said urban district shall (subject as aforesaid) be paid to, from or out of, and shall be charged upon the said district fund and general district rate of the said borough respectively. All the rights, interests, powers, property, liabilities or obligations vested in or attached to the district council under the Public Health Acts; the said Act of 1825; "The Stourbridge Improvement Act, 1866"; "The Stourbridge Improvement Commissioners Act, 1891"; "The Local Government Act, 1894"; "The Stourbridge and District Water Board Act, 1909"; "The Baths and Wash-houses Acts, 1846-1899"; "The Infectious Disease (Notification) Act, 1889"; "The Infectious Disease (Prevention) Act, 1890"; "The Housing of the Working Classes Act, 1890"; "The Public Health Acts Amend-

Powers Orders of 1881 (being "The Stour Powers) Act, 1897"; The Local Government Board Orders of 1881 (being "The Stour-bridge Main Drainage Order, 1881"); the 19th day of November, 1894; the 20th day of March, 1895; the 25th day of March, 1895; 1896 (being "the Stourbridge Main Drainage Order, 1896''); the 5th day of February, 1896; the 6th day of February, 1896; 1898 (being "The Stourbridge Order, 1898"); the 24th day of June, 1898; the 21st day of October, 1898; the 17th day of September, 1908; 1910 (being "The Stourbridge (Notification of Births) Order, 1910 ''); the 16th day of February, 1910, and the 23rd day of December, 1910; the Stourbridge and Halesowen Hospital (County of Worcester) Orders, 1896 and 1897; the Stourbridge Electric Lighting Order, 1899; the Stourbridge Electric Lighting Order, 1909; the Commissioner's Award dated the 14th day of April, 1881, with regard to the Regulation of Clent Hill Common; the Dudley and District Light Railways Order, 1898; the Kinver Light Railway Order, 1898; the Dudley and District Light Railways (Extensions) Order, 1900; and under any other Statute, Order or Award shall pass to, devolve upon, be exercisable by or against, vested in or attached to the Corporation acting by the Council as the sanitary authority of the borough, and from and after the commencement of this Scheme the Corporation shall be and continue the legal successors of the urban district council of Stourbridge for all purposes. The Town Clerk of the borough shall be substituted for and perform the duties of the clerk to the district council.

13. Any rules and regulations under the Public Health Act, 1875; the Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops Order of 1885; the Stourbridge and District Water Board Act. 1909: and any other public general Act or local Act, and any bye-law and any table of fees and charges in force within the said urban district at the commencement of this Scheme shall, unless duly repealed, revoked or varied, and except as hereinafter provided, continue in force and have operation in the borough in like manner, and with the like effect as if the Corporation, acting by the Council and their officers, and the borough were referred to therein; instead of the Stourbridge Improvement Commissioners or the district council (as the case may be), and their officers and the township of Stourbridge, the township, or the district as the case may be. Provided always that the bye-laws with respect to new streets and buildings, the flushing of water closets, slaughter-houses, hackney carriages, houses let in lodgings, and the regulations under the Dairies, Cowsheds and Milk-shops Order, 1885, which are in force at the commencement of this Scheme, shall cease to have effect and to be enforceable after the expiration of one year from the commencement of this Scheme, or of such further period as the Local Government Board may sanction.

14. The bye-laws for the good rule and government of the administrative county of Worcester, so far as they are in force in the said urban district, shall continue in force and be enforced within the municipal borough of Stourbridge until the expiration of two years from the commencement of this Scheme, or until other bye-laws for good rule and government made by the Corporation shall have come into force, whichever shall first occur.

15. Notwithstanding the incorporation of the borough, and the provisions of this Scheme, all rates, assessments, compositions, charges, mortgages, contracts, leases, conveyances, deeds, documents, acts, matters and things made, entered into, or done before the commencement of this Scheme, by, to, or with reference to the district council, shall be as good, valid, and effectual, to all intents and purposes whatsoever for, against and with reference to the Corporation, as if the same had been done, entered into, or done by, to, or with reference to the Corporation instead of the district council, and may be proceeded on or enforced in the same manner in all respects as if the Corporation instead of the district council had been party or privy to the same, and had been named or referred to therein.

16. In case any officer of the district council, who shall have been employed by the district council, shall not be employed by the Council of the said borough nor offered by the said Council a position in their employ of a similar character and of an equal value to that formerly held by him, he shall be entitled to be paid, by way of compensation for the loss of his position, out of the funds of or under the control of the corporation acting by the Council as the sanitary authority for the said borough, and the amount to be paid in each case shall be determined in accordance with the provisions of section 120 of the Local Government Act, 1888, and sub-sections (1) to (7) inclusive of that section, shall apply as if they formed part of this Scheme, with the substitution of the words "borough council" for "county council," and "this Scheme"

for "this Act," and with such other modifications as are necessary to make them applicable thereto.

- 17. Provided, nevertheless, that if any such officer be so employed by the said corporation and discharged by them (otherwise than for misconduct) within four years of the commencement of this Scheme, he shall be entitled to compensation in the same manner as if he had not been employed by the said corporation. Provided that the term "officer" shall include only persons employed by the said Council whose salaries or emoluments are payable at intervals of not less than one month, and no other persons.
- 18. The accounts of the district council and their officers shall be (as soon as conveniently may be) audited by the district auditor in like manner, and subject to the like powers, duties, provisions, and right of appeal as if the charter had not been granted, and the provisions of sections 247 and 250 of "The Public Health Act, 1875," as amended by "The District Auditors Act, 1879," and any regulations duly issued by the Local Government Board with respect to the audit of accounts of local boards, or urban district councils, and of their officers, shall apply to such audit, and the provisions of this Scheme with respect to the district council shall be construed so as to admit of such exceptions as may be necessary to enable such audit to be duly made, but such exceptions shall be strictly limited in time, extent, character, and operation to the purposes of such audit; any money certified to be due from any person by the district auditor at such audit shall be paid by such person to the treasurer of the borough.
- 19.—(1.) Notwithstanding anything in this Scheme the County Council of the County of Worcester shall continue to be the local education authority for the purposes of the Education Act, 1902, till the 1st day of November, 1915, except that as from the commencement of this Scheme the Council of the borough of Stourbridge shall have the powers of a local education authority under Part III of that Act for the purposes of section 20 (b).
- (2.) If on or before the 1st day of May, 1915, the Council of the borough of Stourbridge have not by agreement with the County Council of the County of Worcester and with the approval of the Board of Education relinquished in favour of the County Council all powers and duties under Part III of the Education Act, 1902, the Council of the borough of Stourbridge shall forthwith make and shall have power to make a scheme under section 17 of the Education Act, 1902, establishing an education committee or education committees and shall submit it to the Board of Education for approval.
- (3.) If no such agreement is made with the approval of the Board of Education before the 1st day of November, 1915,
  - (a) the Council of the borough of Stourbridge shall be as from that date the local education authority for the purposes of Part III of the Education Act, 1902.
  - (b) All public elementary schools situate in the borough and provided by the County Council of the County of Worcester and all other land so situate and vested in the County Council for the purposes of Part III

- of the Education Act, 1902, with the furniture, fittings, books and apparatus of the schoolhouses and such of the furniture, fittings, books and apparatus of non-provided schools as belong to the County Council shall in each case by virtue of this Scheme upon the said 1st day of November, 1915, be transferred to and vested in the Borough Council of Stourbridge as the local education authority for the borough for all the estate and interest therein of the said County Council as the local education authority, and all contracts, debts, and liabilities which on the 1st day of November, 1915, are existing or are owing by or attach to the said County Council in respect exclusively of the said public elementary schools, or lands, furniture, fittings, books or apparatus or of any other public elementary school in the said borough or with respect to the officers, teachers and servants of any public elementary schools in the borough shall by virtue of this Scheme on and after the said 1st day of November, 1915, enure to and be carried into effect by the borough council as the local education authority.
- (c) The liability for repayment of so much of any loan raised exclusively in respect of any public elementary school or of any land, furniture, fittings, books or apparatus transferred to and vested in the Borough Council of Stourbridge on the 1st day of November, 1915, by virtue of this Scheme as is owing on the said 1st day of November, 1915, and the liability for the payment of interest on the said part of such loans shall on the said 1st day of November, 1915, be transferred and attach to the Borough Council of Stourbridge as the local education authority, and shall be charged on the borough fund and the borough rate of the said borough, and each such loan shall be repaid by the Borough Council within the period if any for which the loan was originally sanctioned or within which the loan is otherwise required to be repaid or is made repayable.
- (d) Any bye-laws made under the Education Acts, 1870-1911, in force in the borough immediately before the commencement of this Scheme shall from and after that date apply until revoked or altered.
- (e) All managers of public elementary schools within the borough who were appointed by the County Council of the County of Worcester shall on the said 1st day of November, 1915, vacate office.
- (f) Paragraph 22 of the Second Schedule to the Education Act, 1902, shall apply and have effect with respect to any adjustment which for the purposes of the Education Acts, 1870 to 1911, is required by reason of anything in or done in pursuance of any provision of this clause.

The following Scheme for the adjustment of the property, rights, liabilities, etc., of the Urban District Councils of Buxton and Fairfield, in the county of Derby, and for other purposes, as settled by a Committee of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, is published in accordance with the provisions of "The Municipal Corporations Act, 1882":—

Whereas by the Municipal Corporation Acts, 1882 and 1885, it is enacted that where a Petition for a Charter of Incorporation is referred to the Committee of His Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, and it is proposed by the Charter to extend the Municipal Corporation Acts to the Municipal Borough to be created by the Charter, the said Committee of the Council may settle a Scheme for the purposes in the said Acts named and containing such provisions as are in the said Acts particularized:

And whereas on the 10th October, 1911, certain inhabitant householders of the urban districts of Buxton and Fairfield in the county of Derby petitioned His Majesty the King praying for the grant of a Charter of Incorporation:

And whereas the said Petition for a Charter was referred to the Committee of Council, and it was proposed by the Charter to create the urban district of Buxton, together with that part of the urban district of Fairfield comprised within the limits defined in that behalf in the Charter a municipal borough by the name of the "Borough of Buxton," and to incorporate the inhabitants thereof, and to extend the Municipal Corporation Acts to the borough to be created by the Charter:

And whereas it is proposed to exclude from the borough an outlying portion of the parish or township of Fairfield, now forming part of the urban district of Fairfield, and it is expedient to constitute such excluded portion, a separate parish forming part of the rural district of Chapel-en-le-Frith in the said county of Derby, but except for such exclusion the area of the proposed borough is the same as the area of the said urban districts of Buxton and Fairfield combined:

And whereas the Local Government Board have made the following Orders, in pursuance of Section 33 of the Local Government Act, 1894, viz.: (a) on the 23rd day of March, 1895, conferring upon the Buxton Urban District Council the power of appointing overseers of the poor for the parishes or townships of Buxton and Burbage within the said district; (B) on the 16th day of October, 1896, transferring to the Buxton Urban District Council the power of appointing and revoking the appointment of any assistant overseer for the said parishes or townships; (c) on the 12th day of September, 1896, conferring upon the Buxton Urban District Council the powers of a Parish Council under paragraphs (G), (H), (I) and (K), of Sub-Section (1) of Section 8 of the said Act of 1894; and (D) on the 20th day of November, 1896, conferring on the Buxton Urban District Council the powers of a Parish Council under paragraphs (A) and (c) (i) of Sub-section (1) of Section 6 of the said Act of 1894:

And whereas the Urban District Council of Buxton have and are exercising divers powers relating to Gas and Water Supply, Electric Lighting, and other matters, including the control, management, and carrying on of a Pump Room and a Mineral Water Baths Undertaking under the following Acts and Provisional Orders or some of them, which Acts and Orders except so far as the same have been amended

or repealed are in force within the Urban District of Buxton (that is to say):—

The Buxton Gas Act, 1870.

The Buxton Local Board Act, 1873.

A Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board, bearing date the 19th May, 1873, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1873 (No. 2).

A Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board, bearing date the 6th June, 1873, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1873 (No. 4).

A Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board, bearing date the 20th May, 1873, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1873 (No. 5).

A Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board, bearing date the 12th March, 1878, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (Abingdon, etc.) Act, 1878.

A Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board, bearing date the 24th March, 1897, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 2) Act, 1897.

A Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board, bearing date the 1st April, 1901, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 2) Act, 1901.

The Buxton Urban District Council Water Act, 1902.

And whereas the Urban District Council of Fairfield have and are exercising divers powers relating to water supply within the urban district of Fairfield under and by virtue of the Fairfield Local Board Waterworks Act, 1874, and under a Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board, bearing date the 26th February, 1875, and confirmed by the

Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 2) Act, 1875:

And whereas the Urban District Council of Buxton, under the powers conferred upon them by the hereinbefore recited Acts and Provisional Orders or some of them, own the following Undertakings and properties (namely)
The Buxton Gasworks, Waterworks, Electric
Lighting, Sewage and Destructor Works, a
Cemetery, Town Hall, Offices, Public Library and Museum, Pump Room, and Mineral Water Baths, a Fire Station, Isolation Hospital, Surveyor's house, cottages, stables, and slaughterhouse, and other properties incidental and in addition thereto, and the Urban District Council of Fairfield, under the powers conferred upon them by the said recited Act of 1874, own the Waterworks Undertaking, from which water is being supplied to the inhabitants of the Fairfield Urban District, Sewage Works, Public Offices, store yard, Water Swallows Green, an interest in Fairfield Common, and other properties incidental and in addition thereto, and both the said Councils have contracted loans in respect of the said Undertakings and properties or some of them and otherwise for the purpose of providing for the proper administration of their districts respectively, balances of which loans remain outstanding:

And whereas the Urban District Council of Buxton, then the Buxton Local Board, on the 1st day of June, 1864, purchased from the seventh Duke of Devonshire, then the owner thereof, the right to hold and maintain and take tolls in respect of the use of a market in the town of Buxton, within the Urban District of Buxton, and on the 27th October, 1876, purchased a site for the purposes of and provided and still maintain a cattle market, and markets are regularly held accordingly subject to the payment of tolls and charges to the Council in respect thereof:

And whereas the following Acts have been adopted by and are now in force in the district of the Urban District Council of Buxton, that is to say:

The Infectious Disease (Notification) Act, 1889.

The Infectious Disease (Prevention) Act, 1890.

The Infectious Disease (Notification) Extension Act, 1899.

The Public Health Acts Amendment Act,

The Museums and Gymnasiums Act, 1891, so far as it relates to Museums, and The Public Libraries Act, 1892,

and the following Acts have been adopted by, and are now in force in, the district of the Urban District Council of Fairfield, that is to say:--

The Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1890, Part III.

The Infectious Disease (Prevention) Act, 1890, and

The Infectious Disease (Notification) Extension Act, 1899,

and it is expedient that the adoptive Acts should be made to apply uniformly throughout the borough:

And whereas by an Order made by the Local Government Board, dated the 18th day of September, 1913, the following sections and Part of the Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1907, were declared to be in force in the Urban District of Buxton as from the 30th day of October, 1913, that is to say:

Sections 17, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 27, 28, 29,

30, 31, 32, and 33, comprised in Part II. Sections 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 40, 41, 42, 45, 46, 47, 48, 49, 50, and 51, comprised in Part III.

Sections 52, 53, 54, 55, 56, 57, 58, 59, 60, 61, 62, 63, 64, 65, and 66, comprised in Part IV., and Part X.

subject to the conditions and adaptations and repeals of sections of the Buxton Urban District Council Water Act, 1902, in the said Order mentioned:

And whereas under the powers of the Public Health Acts and other Acts them thereunto enabling the Urban District Council of Buxton (previously to the coming into force of the Local Government Act, 1894, styled the Buxton Local Board) have made the following byelaws, and the same are now in force in their said district (namely) with respect to nuisances and with respect to nuisances in connection with the removal of offensive or noxious matters, markets, omnibuses, etc., horses, ponies, mules, and asses, the cemetery, sanitary conveniences, underground bakehouses, lug-gage porters, hackney carriages, etc., pleasure grounds, and new streets and buildings, and also a Schedule of Tolls leviable by the Council in the markets belonging to them:

And whereas under the Public Health Acts the Urban District Council of Fairfield (then styled the Fairfield Local Board) have made bye-laws with respect to new streets and buildings, and the same are now in force in the Urban District of Fairfield:

whereas the Buxton and Fairfield Urban District Councils have both made Regulations under the Dairies, Cowsheds, and Milk-shops Order, 1885, which Regulations are now in force in their respective districts:

And whereas the County Council of the County of Derby have made bye-laws for the good rule and government of the Administrative County of Derby, and the same are now in force in the Urban Districts of Buxton and

And whereas by an Order dated the 24th day of January, 1896, made by the said Derbyshire County Council under the Isolation Hospitals Act, 1893, the Urban District of Fairfield and other areas were formed into a United District called the High Peak Joint Hospital District:

And whereas it is intended that arrangements shall be made for the consolidation of the Police Force of the Borough of Buxton when constituted by Charter with the Police of the County of Derby:

And whereas the Buxton Urban District Council is an authority having powers under the Education Act, 1902, and has under Section 17 of that Act established an Education Committee, constituted in accordance with a Scheme made by the Council and approved by the Board of Education:

And whereas the Buxton and Fairfield Urban District Councils are local authorities

within the meaning of the Municipal Corporation Acts, 1882 and 1885:

And whereas this Scheme before being settled by the Committee of Council was referred for consideration to His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, the Board of Trade, the Local Government Board, and the Board of Education:

And whereas it is expedient that a Scheme should be made and settled containing the provisions hereinafter set forth:

Now, therefore, pursuant to the Municipal Corporation Acts, 1882 and 1885, and the Local Government Act, 1894, and every other power enabling them in that behalf, the Committee of Council have settled a Scheme containing the provisions herein, and do hereby direct, order, and declare as follows:—

# Preliminary Provisions.

- 1. This Scheme may be cited for all purposes as the Borough of Buxton Scheme, 1914.
- 2. The Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the Borough of Buxton are in this Scheme referred to as "the Corporation."
- 3. This Scheme when confirmed shall come into operation on the day of the first meeting of the Council of the municipal borough created by the said Charter, and this Scheme shall be construed and applied as if it had been dated and confirmed by Parliament or Order in Council on the day before the day of the said first meeting, and everything thereunder shall be done and had accordingly. This date is hereinafter referred to as "the commencement of this Scheme." So far as may be necessary this Scheme shall operate retrospectively.
- 4. From and after the commencement of this Scheme, the municipal borough created by the said Charter shall be placed within the jurisdiction of the Corporation, acting by the Council of the borough as the Sanitary Authority and as the Local Education Authority, for the purposes of Part III of the Education Act, 1902 (as the case may be), of the said borough.
- 5: The Buxton and Fairfield Urban District Councils and their powers, duties, rights, obligations and privileges, shall respectively continue and be deemed to have respectively continued to exist until the commencement of this Scheme, unaffected in any manner whatsoever by the grant of the said Charter or the creation of the said borough. From and after the commencement of this Scheme, the said Urban District Councils shall be, and the same are hereby abolished, and the respective powers, rights, duties, obligations and privileges thereof shall cease and determine.
- 6. All the jurisdiction, powers, rights, duties, and property respectively, vested in or possessed by the said Urban District Councils or by any person or body in trust for them or any of their members as such (and not otherwise dealt with or transferred by or under any part of this Scheme), shall vest in the Corporation and shall be exercised, held, and applied, for the municipal and public purposes of the said borough.

The hereinbefore recited Orders of the Local Government Board under Section 33 of the Local Government Act, 1894, dated respec-

- tively the 23rd day of March, 1895, the 16th day of October, 1896, the 12th day of September, 1896, and the 20th day of November, 1896, shall continue in force and effect in the Borough and in favour of the Corporation as fully as they have been in the Urban District of Buxton, and in favour of the Buxton Urban District Council.
- 7. All duties and liabilities which immediately before the commencement of this Scheme respectively attached to, and were enforceable against, the said Urban District Councils or the property thereof shall attach to and be enforceable against the Corporation except as otherwise provided by this Scheme.
- 8. Any investigation, legal proceedings or remedy in respect of any debt, liability, penalty or forfeiture, due to or incurred by or on behalf of the said Urban District Councils respectively, before the commencement of this Scheme, may be continued, prosecuted or enforced by or against the Corporation.
- 9. From and after the commencement of this Scheme all that part of the parish or township and urban district of Fairfield situate beyond the borough shall become and be a separate parish by the name of Green Fairfield, and form part of the union of Chapel-en-le-Frith in the county of Derby.
- 10. Every person who shall on or before the commencement of this Scheme have acquired a settlement in the existing parish or township of Fairfield, shall be deemed to have acquired such settlement in the parish or township comprising the area in which the acts or circumstances conferring such settlement shall have been done or taken place, or if such acts or circumstances shall have been done or taken place in more than one such area, such settlement shall be in the parish or township comprising the place of residence of such person at the time of acquiring such settlement. Any person who shall have become irremovable from the existing parish or township of Fairfield shall be deemed to have become irremovable from the parish or township comprising the area in which he shall reside at the commencement of this Scheme, or if he shall then be in receipt of relief shall be deemed to be irremovable from the parish or township comprising the area in which he was residing at the time of becoming chargeable.
- 11. Notwithstanding the alteration of parish effected by this Scheme, all contribution orders made by the guardians of the poor of the Chapel-en-le-Frith Union shall be as valid in law as if this Scheme had not been made.
- 12. All recoverable arrears of the poor rates, due at the time when this Scheme comes into operation, shall be recovered by the overseers of the existing parish or township of Fairfield as if such parish had not been altered by this Scheme.
- 13. Until a new valuation list is made, the portion of the valuation list of the parish or township of Fairfield, which relates to hereditaments in the portion of the said parish or township which is hereby constituted a separate parish, shall be deemed to be the valuation list of such separate parish, and the remaining portion of the valuation list of the said parish or township of Fairfield shall be deemed to be the valuation list of such remaining portion of that parish or township.

- 14. The area beyond the borough, by this Scheme constituted a separate parish or township by the name of Green Fairfield, shall as from the commencement of this Scheme be annexed to and form part of the rural district of Chapel-en-le-Frith.
- 15. The term "property" in this Scheme means and includes all property, real and personal, and all things in action and all rights of common and commonable rights, and rights to toll, and all franchises, privileges and rights which have any pecuniary value, and all charters, records, deeds, books and documents, and all rights and all claims to relief and all rights to avoid contracts or otherwise, and includes any estate or interest, legal or equitable, in or in respect of any property so defined.
- 16. The District Fund and General District Rate of the Borough of Buxton shall, subject to this Scheme, for all purposes whatsoever (subject to the provisions of the Municipal Corporations Act, 1882, with respect to the Borough Fund and Borough Rate and Watch Rate respectively), take the place of and be substituted for the District Fund and General District Rate respectively of the Buxton and Fairfield Urban District Councils and all sums of money respectively payable to, from or out of and all liabilities charged upon or attaching to the District Fund and General District Rate of the said urban districts, shall (subject as aforesaid) be paid to, from or out of and shall be charged upon the said District Fund and General District Rate of the said borough respectively.
- 17. All the rights, interests, powers, property, privileges, liabilities or obligations, vested in or attached to the Buxton Urban District Council under the following local Acts and Provisional Orders, viz.:—

The Buxton Gas Act, 1870; The Buxton Local Board Act, 1873;

A Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board bearing date the 19th May, 1873, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1873 (No. 2);

A Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board bearing date the 6th June, 1873, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1873 (No. 4);

A Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board bearing date the 20th May, 1873, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1873 (No. 5);

A Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board bearing date the 12th March, 1878, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (Abingdon, etc.) Act, 1878;

A Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board bearing date the 12th May, 1880, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (Abingdon, etc.) Act, 1880;

A Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board bearing date the 10th May, 1881, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (Acton, etc.) Act, 1881;

A Provisional Order made by the Local

Government Board bearing date the 4th May, 1886, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 4) Act, 1886;

The Buxton Local Board Act, 1892;

A Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board bearing date the 2nd April, 1892, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation Act, 1892.

The Buxton Electric Lighting Order, 1894, confirmed by the Electric Lighting Orders Confirmation (No. 1) Act, 1894;

A Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board bearing date the 24th March, 1897, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 2) Act, 1897;

A Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board bearing date the 1st April, 1901, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 2) Act, 1901;

The Buxton Urban District Council Water Act, 1902;

The Buxton Urban District Council Act, 1904, or under any other Statute, Order, Bye-Law or Regulation;

and all the rights, interests, powers, property, privileges, liabilities or obligations vested in or attached to the Fairfield Urban District Council under the following Act and Provisional Order, viz.:—

The Fairfield Local Board Waterworks Act, 1874, and

A Provisional Order made by the Local Government Board bearing date the 26th February, 1875, and confirmed by the Local Government Board's Provisional Orders Confirmation (No. 2) Act, 1875, or under any other Statute, Order, Bye-Law or Regulation,

shall pass to, devolve upon, be exercisable by or against, vested in or attached to the Corporation acting by the Council as the Sanitary Authority of the Borough, and from and after the commencement of this Scheme the Corporation shall be and continue the legal successors of the Urban District Councils respectively for all purposes. The Town Clerk of the Borough shall be substituted for and perform the duties of the Clerks to the District Councils respectively:

Provided always that in respect of the execution of their powers and duties under the Buxton Urban District Council Water Act, 1902, and the Fairfield Local Board Waterworks Act, 1874, if any difficulty shall arise in securing uniformity owing to any inconsistency between the provisions of those Acts respectively, the provisions of the Buxton Act of 1902 shall prevail, and shall be deemed in respect of the matter as to which such inconsistency exists to be in full force and effect throughout the borough, and the provisions of the Fairfield Act of 1874 shall in that respect be deemed to be altered or repealed.

18. The adoptive Acts hereunder mentioned which have been adopted by the Buxton Urban District Council as hereinbefore recited shall from the commencement of this Scheme be in

force throughout the borough as if the same had been adopted by the Council thereof after the creation of the said borough, viz.:—

The Infectious Disease (Notification) Act, 1889;

The Infectious Disease (Prevention) Act, 1890;

The Infectious Disease (Notification) Extension Act, 1899;

The Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1890;

The Museums and Gymnasiums Act, 1891, so far as it relates to Museums, and The Public Libraries Act, 1892;

and so much of the said Acts as is in force within the Chapel-en-le-Frith rural district shall continue in force in that district as enlarged by this Scheme and so much of the said Acts as is not in force within the said rural district shall cease to be in force in the area added to that district by this Scheme, but without prejudice to any rights, privileges, obligations or liabilities acquired, accrued or incurred under the said Acts with respect to such area at the commencement of this Scheme.

19. The Order of the Local Government Board dated the 18th September, 1913, declaring certain provisions of the Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1907, to be in force in the urban district of Buxton as hereinbefore recited shall (subject to the provisions of any Order which may be hereafter made by the said Board) have effect as if the said Order had declared such provisions to be in force throughout the borough.

20. The bye-laws under the Public Health Acts and Incorporated Acts, and provisions and the regulations under the Dairies, Cowsheds, and Milkshops Order, 1885, and the Schedule of Tolls leviable in the market belonging to the council made by the Urban District Council of Buxton, as hereinbefore recited, shall, from and after the commencement of this Scheme, and until duly repealed, altered, or revoked, be and continue in force and have operation throughout the borough in like manner and with the like effect as if the Corporation, acting by the Council and their officers, had made the same, and as if the Corporation and their officers and the borough were referred to therein instead of the Urban District Council of Buxton and their officers and the district, and any bye-laws and regulations made by the Urban District Council of Fairfield shall cease to operate without prejudice nevertheless to any rights, privileges, obligations, or liabilities acquired, accrued, or incurred thereunder at the commencement of this Scheme. Provided that the bye-laws with respect to nuisances, and with respect to nuisances in connection with the removal of offensive or noxious matters, in force in the Urban District of Buxton, shall continue in force for a period of two years only after the commencement of this Scheme, unless repealed before the expiration of that period.

21. The bye-laws for the good rule and government of the administrative county of Derby, so far as they are in force in the urban districts of Buxton and Fairfield, shall continue in force and be enforced within the municipal borough of Buxton until the expiration of two years from the commencement of this Scheme, or until other bye-laws for good rule

and government made by the Corporation shail have come into force, whichever shall first occur.

22. (A) From and after the commencement of this Scheme the Council of the borough of Buxton shall be the Local Education Authority for the purposes of Part III of the Education Act, 1902, and the Scheme for the establishment of an Education Committee made by the Buxton Urban District Council, as hereinbefore recited, on the day of 1914, under section 17 of the said Act, shall have effect as if for reference in that Scheme to the Urban District Council were substituted references to the Council of the borough.

(B) All public elementary schools situate in the borough and provided by the County Council of the county of Derby, and all other lands so situate and vested in the County Council for purposes of Part III of the Education Act, 1902, with the furniture, fittings, books, and apparatus of the schools and schoolhouses, and such of the furniture, fittings, books, and apparatus of non-provided schools as belong to the County Council shall in each case, from and after the commencement of this Scheme, be transferred to and vested in the Council of the borough as the Local Education Authority for the borough for all the estate and interest therein of the said County Council as the Local Education Authority, and all contracts, debts, and liabilities which at the commencement of this Scheme are existing or are owing by or attached to the said County Council in respect exclusively of the said public elementary schools, or lands, furniture, fittings, books, or apparatus, or of any other public elementary school in the said borough, or with respect to the officers, teachers, and servants of any public elementary schools in the borough shall from and after the commencement of this Scheme enure to and be carried into effect by the Council of the borough as the Local Education Authority.

(c) The liability for the repayment of so much of any loan raised exclusively in respect of any public elementary school or of any lands, furniture, fittings, books, or apparatus transferred to and vested in the Council of the borough by virtue of this Scheme as is owing at the commencement thereof, and the liability for the payment of the interest on such part of any such loan shall, on the commencement of this Scheme be transferred and attached to the Council of the Borough as the Local Education Authority, and shall be charged on the Borough Fund and the Borough Rate of the said borough, and each such loan shall be repaid by the Council of the borough within the period (if any) for which the loan was originally sanctioned, or within which the loan is otherwise required to be repaid or is made repayable.

(D) Any bye-laws made under the Education Acts, 1870 to 1911, in force in the borough immediately before the commencement of this Scheme shall from and after that day apply until revoked or altered by the Council of the borough.

(E) All managers of public elementary schools within the borough who were appointed by the County Council of the county of Derby shall at the commencement of this Scheme vacate office.

(F) Paragraph 22 of the Second Schedule to the Education Act, 1902, shall apply and

have effect with respect to any adjustment which for the purposes of the Education Acts, 1870 to 1911, is required by reason of anything in or done in pursuance of any provisions of this Scheme.

23. All mortgages, stock, charges, loans, and debts of the Buxton and Fairfield Urban District Councils shall be the mortgages, stock, charges, loans and debts of the Corporation, and all mortgages of and charges upon the undertakings, rates, and property of the said Urban District Councils respectively shall be mortgages of and charges upon the same undertakings, district fund, general district rate, and property of the Corporation.

24: All arrears or any general district rates and other rates and payments, which on the commencement of this Scheme are due or are owing to the Buxton and Fairfield Urban District Councils or either of them in respect of hereditaments beyond the borough, may be collected, levied, and recovered by the Corporation.

25. If at any time the district fund and general district rate of the borough are insufficient to provide the sums required for interest or repayment of principal on or in respect of any money borrowed wholly or partly on the security of the district fund or general district rate of the Urban District Council of Fairfield, then (but not otherwise) notwith-standing anything in this Scheme, the rights of the creditors against the part of the said urban district excluded from the borough shall be deemed to be subsisting, and the Rural District Council of Chapel-en-le-Frith shall, if required by one-third in value of the creditors, or by an Order of any competent Court, levy, or cause to be levied, in or upon the part of the said urban district excluded from the borough, such portion of the said moneys, then due and unpaid, as bears the same proportion to the whole of the said moneys, then due and unpaid, as the then rateable value for sanitary purposes of the property in such excluded part bears to the sum of such rateable value to-gether with the rateable value for sanitary purposes of the property in the part of the said urban district included within the borough, and the said Rural District Council shall levy and cause to be levied from or in the said excluded part the said portion of the said moneys by the same means and in the same manner as nearly as may be as contributions for special expenses are levied under the Public Health Act, 1875. Any sum or sums paid by the said Rural District Council under this clause shall and may be recovered by the said Rural District Council as a debt due to the said Rural District Council from the Corporation, and any sum or sums so repaid by the Corporation shall be treated as contributions for special expenses, or shall be made applicable in such other way as the Rural District Council with the consent of the Local Government Board may determine.

26. An equitable adjustment shall be made as regards the property (if any) and the debts and liabilities of the township or parish of Fairfield, as existing before the date of the Charter, as between the respective parts thereof dealt with by the Charter and this Scheme, and also as regards the property (if any) and the debts and liabilities of the Fairfield Urban District Council, as between or in respect of

the parts thereof included in the borough, and transferred to the rural district of Chapel-enle-Frith respectively. Any such adjustment may be made by and between the Councils or Authorities concerned by agreement, or failing agreement, shall be settled by arbitration in the manner provided by Section 68 of the Local Government Act, 1894, as if the adjustment were under and for the purposes of that Act, and the provisions of that section as far as applicable, with the necessary modifications, shall apply with respect to the objects and purposes of the adjustment, and the borrowing and application of capital moneys and otherwise as may be found convenient, provided that as regards any sum payable by the Rural District Council of Chapel-en-le-Frith the sum shall be charged on the parish of Green Fairfield as if it were in respect of special expenses incurred on account of that parish under the provisions of the Public Health Act, 1875.

27. Notwithstanding the exclusion from the borough of the portion of Fairfield District by this Scheme constituted a separate parish or township, the Corporation may supply gas within the whole of the limits defined or referred to in the Buxton Gas Act, 1870, as amended by the Chapel Whaley and District Gas Act, 1911, under and subject to the terms and provisions of those Acts respectively.

28. Notwithstanding the incorporation of the borough and the provisions of this Scheme all rates, assessments, orders, apportionments, notices, compositions, charges, mortgages, contracts, leases, conveyances, deeds, documents, acts, matters, and things made, entered into, given or done before the commencement of this Scheme by, to, or with reference to the Buxton and Fairfield Urban District Councils, or either of them, shall be as good and valid and effectual to all intents and purposes whatsoever for, against, and with reference to the Corporation instead of the said Urban District Councils respectively, and may be proceeded on and enforced in the same manner in all respects as if the Corporation instead of such Council had been party or privy to the same, and been named or referred to therein.

29. In case any officer of the Urban District Council of Buxton or the Urban District Council of Fairfield or the said County Council, in respect of elementary education in either of the districts included in the borough, who shall have been employed by such Council for a period of not less than five years, shall not be employed by the Council of the borough nor offered by the last-mentioned Council a position in their employ of a similar character and of an equal value to that formerly held by him, he shall be entitled to be paid by way of com-pensation for the loss of his position out of the funds of or under the control of the Corporation, acting by the Council as the Sanitary Authority or Education Authority (as the case may be) for the said borough, and the amount to be paid in each case shall be determined in accordance with the provisions of Section 120 of the Local Government Act, 1888, and Sub-sections (1) to (7) inclusive of that section shall apply as if they formed part of this Scheme with the substitution of the words "Borough Council" for "County Council" and "this Scheme" for "this Act," and with such other modifications as are necessary to make them applicable thereto:

Provided nevertheless that if any officer be so employed by the said Corporation and discharged by them (otherwise than for misconduct) within four years of the commencement of this Scheme, he shall be entitled to compensation in the same manner as if he had not been employed by the said Corporation:

been employed by the said Corporation:
Provided also that the term "officer" shall include only persons employed by the said urban district councils respectively, whose salaries or emoluments are payable at intervals of not less than one month and no other

persons.

The provisions of this clause shall apply to a teacher employed in any public elementary school at the commencement of this Scheme within either of the aforesaid districts as if he were an officer employed by the county council, provided that in the case of a teacher employed in a non-provided school the provisions hereinbefore contained shall only apply if such teacher be discharged by the Corporation or by the direction or with the consent of the Corporation (otherwise than for misconduct) within four years of the commencement of this Scheme.

30. The accounts of the Buxton and Fairfield Urban District Councils and their officers shall be made up to the date of the commencement of this Scheme, and shall be (as soon as conveniently may be) audited by the district auditor in like manner and subject to the like powers, duties, provisions and right of appeal as if the Charter had not been granted, and the provisions of sections 247 and 250 of the Public Health Act, 1875, as amended by the District Auditors Act, 1879, and any regulations duly issued by the Local Government Board with respect to the au 'it of accounts of local boards or urban district councils and of their officers shall apply to such audit, and the provisions of this Scheme with respect to the district council shall be construed so as to admit of such exceptions as may be necessary to enable such audit to be duly made, but such exceptions shall be strictly limited in time, extent, character and operation to the purposes of such audit. Any money certified to be due from any person by the district auditor at such audit shall be paid by such person to the treasurer of the borough.

Hugh Adamson, who is a labourer employed at the Gasworks, had just left the engine-house on a message for the manager, and was thrown down by the force of the explosion. On getting up he saw the exhauster house in flames, and, hearing the manager's call for help, burst open the door, which had jammed. He found the manager enveloped in flames, but managed to drag him outside and then collapsed. On recovering Adamson succeeded in turning the gas into another gasometer, thereby saving the premises from being blown up, though the engine-house was actually destroyed. Adamson was severely burned, and the manager succumbed to his injuries a few days later.

# FACTORY AND WORKSHOP ACT, 1901.

Notice is hereby given, pursuant to section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, that the Secretary of State for the Home Department proposes, at the expiration of 40 days from the date of this Notice, to make an Order under section 116 of the Factory and Workshop Act. 1901, requiring particulars of work and rates of wages to be given to all persons paid by the piece who are employed in factories and workshops in which the manufacture of articles of metal (not being machinery) is carried on, or who are employed in that class of work as outworkers.

The Order, which will consolidate and supersede the existing Orders relating to the making of Pens (12th July, 1900), the making of Locks, Latches and Keys (14th July, 1902), the making of Chains, Anchors, and Cart Gear (14th July, 1902), the making of Iron Safes (29th April, 1911), and the making of Files (23rd December, 1911), is drawn so as to apply to the same classes of work (other than the manufacture of machinery) as are covered by the definition of "metal works" in paragraph (13) of the Sixth Schedule to the Act, with the inclusion, however, of workshops as well as of factories; but it will not apply to any of the other works (e.g., Blast Furnaces, Copper

Mills, Iron Mills, or Foundries) defined in the other paragraphs of that Schedule; nor will it apply to any work to which the Order of the 23rd September, 1907, relating to the Mixing, Casting, or Manufacture of Brass or Articles of Brass and the Electro Depositing of Brass applies.

To the County Council of BUCKING-HAM;—

And to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by sub-section (1) of section 9 of the Motor Car Act, 1903 (hereinafter referred to as "the Act"), it is enacted that, within any limits or place referred to in Regulations made by Us, the Local Government Board, with a view to the safety of the public, on the application of the local authority of the area in which the limits or place are situate, a person shall not drive a motor car at a speed exceeding ten miles per hour;

And whereas the County Council of Buckingham having made application to Us to make a Regulation in pursuance of the said subsection putting the above-mentioned provisions of that sub-section in force within the limits comprising parts of certain roads in Chalfont St. Peter, within the County of Buckingham, We directed a Local Inquiry to be held into the matter by one of Our Inspectors, and the Inquiry was held accordingly, and Report has been made to Us thereon:

NOW THEREFORE, in pursuance of the powers given to Us in that behalf, We do, by this Our Order, make the following Regulations:—

ARTICLE I.—The provisions of sub-section (1) of section 9 of the Act with respect to the driving of a motor car at a speed not exceeding ten miles per hour shall apply and have effect within the limits comprising the parts of roads in the village of Chalfont St. Peter which are specified in the Schedule hereto.

ARTICLE II.—These Regulations shall come into operation on the sixth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and fourteen.

#### SCHEDULE.

So much of the main road from Amersham to Uxbridge passing through the village as extends from a point opposite the southern boundary fence of "the Elms" on Gravel Hill to a point situate 267 yards south of the junction of Gold Hill Lane with the said main road; and

MOTOR CAR ACT, 1903.

BOROUGH OF NEW WINDSOR.

Animals (Landing from Ireland) Amendment Order of 1914 (No. 17).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1911, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

#### Regulation of Landing.

1. The Animals (Landing from Ireland) Amendment Order of 1914 (No. 14) is hereby revoked, and cattle, sheep, goats or swine brought from Ireland may be landed in Great Britain in accordance with the provisions of

the Animals (Landing from Ireland) Orders of 1913, except that no such animal put on board at Cork shall, unless and until it is otherwise ordered by the Board, be landed at any port or place in Great Britain.

Local Authority to Enforce Order.

2. The provisions of this Order, except where it is otherwise provided, shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

#### Commencement.

3. This Order shall come into operation on the fourth day of July, nineteen hundred and fourteen.

Short Title.

4. This Order may be cited as the ANIMALS (Landing from Ireland) Amendment Order of 1914 (No. 17).


