Rome, June 13.

ON Tuesday last marched from hence several Companies of Soldiers towards *Civita Vecchia*, to embark on the Popes Gallies designed for the *Levant*, which as we are assured will be ready to Sail by the middle of the next Week. The Cardinal *d'Este*, who was about leaving this place in order to his return to France, has deterr'd his Journey upon the News he received of the Death of the Archbishop of *Lion*, whereby a very rich Abbey is become vacant, which 'tis believed will be given to one of the French Cardinals now here. The Imperial Ambassador continues at *Genova*, expecting the return of the Courier he dispatched lately to *Pisenna*, with an account of what had happened between his Heydukes and the *Sbirris*; And in the mean time the former are privately retired to *Naples*.

*Venice, June 19.* We have Advice that the Doge *Morosini* arrived the 8th Instant at *Liesna* in *Dalmatia*, and that after a short stay there, he proceeded on his Voyage to the *Levant*. The great Convoy which parted from hence on the 3d of the last month, arrived in 15 days in the *Morea*, as we are informed by a Vessel come from *Corfu*; Signior *Priuli*, who commanded this Convoy, failed afterwards with five Men of War, and several other Vessels to *Liesna*, to take on board the Troops which are to be Transported from *Dalmatia* to the *Morea*. General *Mocenigo* was disposing every thing for the opening of the Campaign so soon as the Doge arrived; Several Men of War were gone to Cruise in the *Archipelago*, and others were sent to meet the Doge at *Corfu*.

*Warsaw, June 9.* The Forces of this Crown are marching to their Rendezvous, which is appointed at *Gliniani* in *Podolia*; and at the same time a strong Detachment has been sent to reinforce our Troops, who are posted in the Fort *de la Trinite*, lately built near *Caminic*, to hinder the Incurfions of that Garison. The Envoy from the Cham of *Tartary*, who is now on his departure, has acquainted this Court, that the Cham his Master is sending another Envoy hither with new and more advantageous Proposals of Peace than those he was charged with, but in answer thereunto it has been again told him, That the King of *Poland* is firmly resolved not to enter upon any seperate Negotiation, or do any thing to the prejudice of the Alliance he is at present engaged in with the Emperor, and the Republick of *Venice*.

*Dublin, June 27.* This day was Published here the following Proclamation. His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant intends to Embark on Monday next for *England*. Their Majesties Ships the *Dover*, the *Saphire*, and the *Virgin* Prize, came on Saturday last into this Port from *Kinsale*; and the *St. Albans*, with the *Soefdyke* Yacht from *England*.

Whereas the Queens Most Excellent Majesty, for divers Weighty Reasons and Considerations, hath thought fit to signify Her Royal Will and Pleasure unto Us, That the present Parliament of this

Their Majesties Kingdom of Ireland, which began on the Fifth Day of October last past, and after several Prorogations, was from the Sixth Day of this instant June, further Prorogued until the Fifth Day of September next ensuing, should be Dissolved; And accordingly did Authorize and Require Us forthwith to Dissolve the same by Proclamation: We do therefore hereby Publish and Declare, That the said Parliament of this Kingdom, which so began on the Fifth Day of October last, and now remains Prorogued until the Fifth Day of September next, as aforesaid, Be, and Is hereby Dissolved, and by this Our Proclamation, We do accordingly Dissolve the same. And We do also discharge the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgeses of the said Parliament, from their Meeting on the Fifth Day of September next; and do give Them this Publick Notice, that They may not think Themselves Obliged to any Attendance on the said Day.

Given at Their Majesties Castle of *Dublin*, the 26th Day of June 1693.

*Plimouth, July 2.* This day Sailed out of this Port Their Majesties Ships the *Duchess*, *Winchester*, and *Soldadoes*, to joyn the Fleet. The *Rochester* is come in from Cruising to the Westward.

*Whitehall, July 4.* By Letters from Sir *Francis Wheeler*, Commander in Chief of Their Majesties Ships in the *West Indies*, dated the 4th of June last, in the Latitude of 34; we have the Account which follows.

On the 30th of *March* the Fleet Sailed from the *Barbadoes*, having on Board the Regiments of *Foulke*, *Goodwin*, 200 Recruits of *Lloyds*, and the two *Barbadoes* Regiments of *Salter* and *Butler*; and on the first of *April* they arrived at *Martinico*, and Anchored in the *Cul de Sac Marine* the S. E. part of the Island, about a Mile and half from the Shore. Sir *Francis Wheeler*, Colonel *Foulke* Commander in Chief of the Land Forces, and Colonel *Lloyd*, went in a Sloop to see for a convenient place in order to Land our Men; The Enemy had several small Guards along the Shore, from one of which a Musket Shot struck Sir *Francis* under the Right Pap, and fell down at his Feet, having only left a great Contusion; Orders were given for Landing the Forces, but the Wind blowing very fresh it was deferred till the 2d, when about nine in the morning Colonel *Foulke* landed with One Thousand Five Hundred Men without any opposition; the Boats were immediately sent back, and towards Evening the rest of the Forces were likewise landed; On the 3d they continued afove, and burnt and destroyed all the Houses and Plantations about *Cul de Sac Marine*, most of which were good Sugar Works, the Inhabitants and Negroes flying into the Woods. The 4th the Forces

Forces returned on board. The 5th Sir Francis Wheeler went ashore with a Detachment of 500 Men in the Bay towards the Diamond, and burnt several Houses and Plantations, and at Night came on Board again; The same day a Lieutenant of one of the Barbadoes Regiments going ashore to a Plantation without Order, with 6 or 7 Soldiers, besides the Boats Crew, they were way-layed by the Enemy, 2 of them killed, and the rest taken Prisoners. The 6th, Lieutenant Colonel Lidston was sent ashore with a strong Party to destroy the Country on the side of the Bay towards the Diamond, and having performed the same, returned on Board with his Men towards Night. The 7th the Experiment brought advice, That Colonel Godrington was at Sea with the Forces of the Leeward Islands, who joyned us on the 9th and 10th, together with Colonel Loyds Regiment. On the 12th, in pursuance of what had been resolved on in a Council of War, the whole Fleet weighed, and sailed down towards Fort Royal and Port St. Pierre. On the 15th we got into the Bay of Port St. Pierre; On the 16th all Things were prepared for Landing our Men, and the Fleet came to an Anchor within Musket shot of the Shore. Our Men Landed on the 17th, and our advanced Parties had some Skirmishes with the Enemy; Colonel Foulke Commanded an Eminency to be possessed, and sent our several Parties, who advanced into the Country, destroying all before them. On the 18th our Forces posted themselves on a Hill, within Cannon Shot of the Town of St. Pierre, and several Field Pieces were brought ashore, which plaid upon the Enemy, who lay behind their Intrenchments. On the 19th the Enemy made a Salley upon our Out-Guards, but were repulsed by part of Colonel Foulke's Regiment, led by Captain Sproston, and pursued to their Trenches, where the Officer that Commanded them was killed; This Party was seconded by Colonel Blackston and his Regiment; after which the Enemy ventured out no more. Our Forces continued ashore till the 22d, when having destroyed great part of the Island, and our Men growing very Sickly, it was at a Council of War, not thought adviseable to attempt the Fort, which is a Regular Fortification, and very strong, but rather to Embark again our Men and Cannon, which we did the same day in the Morning, having had in all about 120 Men killed, and 160 wounded, with some few Officers. The 23th the Fleet came to Dominica, and on the 4th of May to St. Christophers, where having Watered, they set Sail again on the 11th. Colonel Godwin Died at St. Christophers, and Colonel Foulke at Sea, with Major Abraham, and several other Officers. But when these Letters came away the Distemper was greatly abated, and both the Soldiers and Seamen were in a much better State of Health.
