tribution for the year over the amount so paid, provided that there shall be no deduction on this account from the initial contribution to the University of two pounds for every one hundred pounds of net revenue.

7. The existing Lee's Readers shall continue to hold their offices on the same terms as if this Statute had not been made, and the foregoing clauses of this Statute shall not come into operation, as respects the Lee's Professorship of Anatomy, until the occurrence of a vacancy in the Lee's Readership in Anatomy, as respects the Lee's Professorship of Chemistry, until the occurrence of a vacancy in the Lee's Readership in Chemistry, and, as respects the Lee's Professorship of Experimental Philosophy, until the occurrence of a vacancy in the Lee's Readership in Physics.

8. Upon any vacancy occurring in any of the existing Lee's Readerships, the Governing Body may appoint a qualified person as Reader to give instruction within the House in the branch of science at present assigned to the Readership falling vacant and such other branches of science (if any) as, in the opinion of the Governing Body, can conveniently be combined therewith. The Readers appointed under this clause shall not be more than three in number and shall be known as Dr. Lee's Reader in Anatomy, Dr. Lee's Reader in Chemistry, and Dr. Lee's Reader in Physics respectively.

9. Each Lee's Reader shall be appointed for such period and subject to such conditions as to the tenure of his office and the work to be performed by him as the Governing Body shall at the time of his appointment determine, and, subject to the provisions of these Statutes, the Lee's Readers shall be eligible for election to official Studentships.

10. The stipend of the Lee's Readers shall, unless they shall have been elected to official Studentships, be such a yearly sum, to be paid out of the general revenues of the House, as the Governing Body shall from time to time determine. Each Lee's Reader shall receive, whether or not he shall have been elected to an official Studentship, a variable sum, to be paid out of the Tuition Fund, which shall depend partly on the length of service and partly on the amount of work required from each Reader. Such last-mentioned sum shall be determined from time to time by the Salaries Board.

11. The Governing Body may out of the income of Dr. Lee's foundation, or, if there shall not be sufficient funds available from this source, then out of the Corporate revenue, apply a sum not exceeding  $\pounds 400$  in any year to the Laboratory, and other expenses incidental to the teaching of the Lee's Readers.
