

Common Tern, Lesser Tern, Roseate Tern, Sandwich Tern, Song Thrush, Bearded Tit (Reedling or Reed Pheasant), Blue Tit, Coal Tit, Crested Tit, Great Tit, Long-tailed Tit, Marsh Tit, Twite, Grey Wagtail, Pied Wagtail, White Wagtail, Yellow Wagtail, Aquatic Warbler, Blackcap Warbler, Dartford Warbler, Garden Warbler, Grasshopper Warbler, Marsh Warbler, Reed Warbler, Sedge Warbler, Willow Warbler, Wood Warbler, Wheatear, Whinchat, Whitethroat, Lesser Whitethroat, Green Woodpecker, Great Spotted Woodpecker, Lesser Spotted Woodpecker, Common Wren, Fire-crested Wren, Golden-crested Wren, Wryneck (Cuckoo's Mate or Snakebird).

Sunday Protection.

VI. During those periods of the year to which the protection afforded by the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, as extended by Clause II of this Order, does not apply, the killing or taking of Wild Birds on Sundays is prohibited throughout the area comprised within the boundaries of the city of Leeds.

Eggs.

The Eggs of Scheduled Birds protected.

VII. The taking or destroying of the eggs of the Birds named in the Schedule to the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1880, as amended by the Act of 1881 (except the Lapwing, Peewit or Green Plover), and of those added to the Schedule by Clause III of this Order, is prohibited throughout the area comprised within the boundaries of the city of Leeds.

The taking or destroying of the eggs of the Lapwing, Peewit, or Green Plover is prohibited after April 14th in each year.

**PONTVILLE SPECIAL INDUSTRIAL
SCHOOL.**

The Secretary of State for the Home Department being satisfied that there is now accommodation at the Pontville Special Industrial School, Ormskirk, for ninety-eight boys and fifteen girls, has sanctioned (1) an increase of thirty in the number of boys allowed to be received into the school and (2) the reception of fifteen girls into the school.

The number of inmates at any one time in the said school, whether sent thereto in pursuance of the provisions of the Children Act, 1908 (8 Edw. 7, cap. 67) or of the Elementary Education Act, 1876 (39 & 40 Vict., cap. 79), or otherwise, shall not exceed one hundred and

thirteen, of which not more than ninety-eight shall be boys and not more than fifteen girls.

The Board of Trade have received a copy of the following Regulations made under the Quarantine Ordinance, 1913 (Southern Nigeria), in respect of quarantine at the Port of Lagos:—

1. Whenever the Port of Lagos shall be declared to be an infected place within the meaning of the Quarantine Ordinance, 1913, these regulations shall forthwith come into operation and shall remain in operation for such time as the said Port continues to be an infected place.
