A PROCLAMATION

FOR APPOINTING TUESDAY, AUGUST 4, WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 5, AND THURSDAY,
AUGUST 6, BANK HOLIDAYS THROUGHOUT THE UNITED KINGDOM.

GEORGE R.I.,

WE, considering that it is desirable in view of the critical situation in Europe and the financial difficulties caused thereby that Tuesday, the 4th instant, Wednesday, the 5th instant, and Thursday, the 6th instant, should be observed as Bank Holidays throughout the United Kingdom, and in pursuance of the provisions of the Bank Holidays Act, 1871, Do hereby, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, and in exercise of the powers conferred by the Act aforesaid, appoint Tuesday, the 4th instant, Wednesday, the 5th instant, and Thursday, the 6th instant, as special days to be observed as Bank Holidays throughout the United Kingdom, under and in accordance with the said Act, and We do, by this Our Royal Proclamation, command the said days to be so observed, and all Our loving Subjects to order themselves accordingly.

Given at Our Court at *Buckingham Palace* this Third day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and fourteen, and in the Fifth year of Our Reign.
