NOTICE.

On the night of August 4th 1914, the Secretary of State received the following notice from the German Ambassador :—

“The Imperial Government will keep merchant vessels flying the British flag interned in German harbours, but will liberate them if the Imperial Government receive a counter undertaking from the British Government within forty-eight hours.”

On August 5th a copy of the Order in Council issued on August 4th as to the treatment of enemy merchant vessels in British ports at the date of the outbreak of hostilities was communicated to the Ambassador of the United States in London, who was then in charge of German interests in this country, with a request that he would be so good as to cause enquiry to be made of the German Government as to whether the terms of Articles III. to VIII. of the Order in Council constituted an undertaking of the nature the German Government required, and under which they would liberate merchant vessels flying the British flag interned in German harbours.

On August 7th a communication was received from the United States Embassy that the United States Minister at Stockholm had sent the following telegram signed by the United States Ambassador at Berlin :—

“Please state if England has issued Proclamation that she gives permission to enemy ships to leave British ports until midnight, August 14th. If this is so, Germany will issue corresponding orders. Reply through German Legation, Stockholm.”

The United States Embassy added that they did not believe that this telegram was a reply to the message which had been transmitted to Berlin.

On enquiry at the United States Embassy shortly before midnight it was ascertained that no further communication had been received from Berlin.

The Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has therefore no information as to the treatment accorded to British merchant ships and their cargoes in German ports, and has accordingly addressed the undermentioned notification to the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury and to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

MY LORDS,

I have the honour to state that no information has reached me that the treatment accorded to British merchant ships and their cargoes which were in German ports at the date of the outbreak of hostilities or which subsequently entered them is not less favourable than that accorded to enemy merchant ships by Articles III. to VIII. of the Order in Council issued on the 4th day of August, 1914, with reference to enemy ships being in British ports at the outbreak of hostilities or subsequently entering them. Articles III. to VIII. of the said Order in Council will therefore not come into operation.

A PROCLAMATION

PROHIBITING, UNDER SECTION 8 OF "THE CUSTOMS AND INLAND REVENUE ACT, 1879,"
THE EXPORTATION FROM THE UNITED KINGDOM OF CERTAIN WARLIKE STORES,
PROVISIONS AND VICTUAL.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by the 8th Section of "the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879," it is enacted that We may, by Proclamation or Order in Council, prohibit the exportation of, amongst other things, any articles which We shall judge capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of military or naval stores, provisions, or any sort of victual which may be used as food for men :

AND WHEREAS by Our Proclamation dated the 3rd August, 1914, effect was given to the provisions of the above-recited section of the said Act of Parliament as regards the exportation of any articles which We judge capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of military or naval stores by the prohibition of the exportation from the United Kingdom of certain military and naval stores as therein more particularly set forth

AND WHEREAS by Our further Proclamation dated the 5th August, 1914, further effect was given to Our said Proclamation of the 3rd August, 1914, by the prohibition of the exportation from the United Kingdom of "Forage and food of all kinds for animals" :

AND WHEREAS by Our said further Proclamation dated the 5th August, 1914, We, in further exercise of the power conferred by the above-recited section of the above Act of Parliament, did prohibit the exportation from the United Kingdom of "Provisions and victual of all sorts which may be used as food for men" :

AND WHEREAS, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, deem it expedient that certain additions should be made to the list of articles comprised in Our said Proclamations, dated respectively the 3rd August, 1914, and the 5th August, 1914, so far

as relates to articles which We have judged capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of military or naval stores:

AND WHEREAS, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, Do also deem it expedient more exactly to define what is prohibited to be exported by Our Proclamation dated the 5th August, 1914, under the terms "Provisions and victual of all sorts which may be used as food for men":

Now, We, by and with the advice aforesaid, Do hereby order and direct, that from and after the date hereof, the following additional goods, being articles which We have judged capable of being converted into or made useful in increasing the quantity of military or naval stores, that is to say:—

Glycerine, crude and refined;
 Lead in all forms
 Saltpetre;
 Nitrate of Sodium;
 Guncotton;
 Carbolic acid;
 Alcohols, ethylic;
 Alcohols, methylic
 Alkaline, iodides;
 Belladonna and its preparations and alkaloids;
 Bismuth and its salts;
 Boric Acid;
 Bromine and alkaline bromides;
 Castor Oil;
 Chloroform;
 Cinchona Bark, Quinine and its salts;
 Coca and its preparations and alkaloids;
 Collodion;
 Corrosive sublimate;
 Cresol and all preparations thereof (including cresylic acid) and nitro-cresol;
 Digitalis and its preparations;
 Ether;
 Ethyl Chloride;
 Formic Aldehyde;
 Henbane and its preparations;
 Iodine and its preparations;
 Lysol;
 Mercury and its salts and preparations;
 Morphia and other alkaloids of opium;
 Nux Vomica and its alkaloids and preparations;
 Opium and its preparations;
 Paraffin, soft;
 Protogol;
 Salicylic Acid and Salicylates;
 Salvarsan;
 All fine chemicals;

shall be and the same are hereby prohibited to be exported from the United Kingdom:

AND WE, by and with the advice aforesaid, Do hereby also order and direct that the terms "Provisions and victual of all sorts which may be used as food for men," which by Our said further Proclamation dated the 5th August, 1914, We prohibited to be exported, shall mean and include:—

Corn, grain, rice, pulse, meal and flour of all kinds;
 Animals, living, for food;
 Meat of all kinds (including poultry and game), fresh, chilled, frozen, salted, or in any way preserved;
 Bread
 Biscuits and cakes
 Butter;
 Margarine
 Cheese;
 Eggs;
 Fish, fresh, cured, dried or salted (but not including pickled);
 Fruit, dried or otherwise preserved, without sugar, all kinds;
 Sugar, unrefined;
 Sugar, refined and candy;
 Glucose;

Molasses and invert sugar ;
 Confectionery of all kinds, including marmalade, jams and fruit jellies ;
 Milk condensed, sweetened or not ;
 Tea, other than green tea ;
 Vegetables ;

WHEREAS by the Aliens Restriction Order, 1914, His Majesty was pleased to impose restrictions upon aliens and to make various provisions for carrying those restrictions into effect :

And whereas it is desirable to extend and amend the said Order in manner hereinafter provided :

Now, THEREFORE, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Carrying on of Banking Business.

1. An alien enemy shall not carry on or engage in any banking business except with the permission in writing of the Secretary of State, and to such extent and subject to such conditions and supervision as the Secretary of State may direct, and an alien enemy who is or has been carrying on or engaged in banking business shall not, except with the like permission, part with any money or securities in the bank where he is or has been carrying on or engaged in business, and shall, if so required, deposit any such money or securities in such custody as the Secretary of State may direct.

Any constable, if authorized by a superintendent of police, or officer of higher rank, may, for the purpose of enforcing the provisions of this Article, enter, if necessary by force, and search or occupy any premises in which the business of banking is or has been carried on by any alien enemy.

For the purposes of this Article, any person who is a member of a firm or a director of a company carrying on banking business in the United Kingdom shall be deemed to be carrying on banking business.

This Article shall have effect as though it were included and had always been included in the Aliens Restriction Order, 1914.

Amendment of Article 12 of the Aliens Restriction Order, 1914.

2. The power under Article Twelve of the Aliens Restriction Order, 1914, of detaining an alien ordered to be deported under that Order whilst awaiting the departure of his ship, and whilst being conveyed to the ship, and whilst on board the ship until the ship finally leaves the United Kingdom, extends so as to include a power of detaining, in such manner as the Secretary of State may direct, any alien so ordered to be deported, until he can, in the opinion of the Secretary of State, be conveniently conveyed to and placed on board a ship about to leave the United Kingdom, and he shall whilst so detained be deemed to be in legal custody.

Amendment of Article 3 of the Aliens Restriction Order, 1914.

3. The following Article shall be substituted for Article Three of the Aliens Restriction Order, 1914:—

“3. An alien enemy shall not land in the United Kingdom at an approved port without the permission of a Secretary of State.”

4. This Order may be cited as the Aliens Restriction (No. 2) Order, 1914.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Memorial from the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, dated the 6th day of August, 1914, in the words following, viz. :—

“Whereas by Section I. of the Injuries in War (Compensation) Act, 1914, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Your Majesty by Your Order in Council to frame a Scheme as to the pensions, grants and other allowances in the nature thereof, to be paid to persons, not being Officers or Seamen of the Royal Navy or Officers or Soldiers of any of Your Majesty's land or marine forces, in respect of injuries suffered by them whilst employed afloat by or under the Admiralty or Army Council in connection with warlike operations in which Your Majesty is engaged, and in the case of their death to their widows and other dependants:

“And whereas it is further enacted in the said section of the said Act that Your Order in Council shall specify the persons to whom it applies and the conditions under which it becomes applicable, and that Your Order may include persons not in the direct employment of the Admiralty or Army Council, and persons employed in commissioned ships, notwithstanding that by reason of such employment they are subject to the Naval Discipline Act:

“And whereas we are of opinion that the Scheme of pensions, grants, and allowances in the nature thereof, should apply as from the 3rd day of August, 1914, to all Officers and Men of Fleet Auxiliaries (other than ranks and ratings in receipt of Naval pay) to all civilians in Admiralty Service, and to Officers and Men of the War Department Examination Service, who may be injured on duty during employment afloat, and to the dependent relatives of such persons who may be killed on duty during employment afloat, or die within two years thereof, as the result of injuries received on such duty, provided, however, that the Scheme shall not apply to Officers and Men of the Royal Naval Reserve, Royal Fleet Reserve, Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve, or to Naval Pensioners serving in the Fleet and in receipt of Naval rates of pay during such service:

“We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased by Your Order in Council to sanction payment of pensions, grants, and other allowances, on the scales and subject to the conditions specified in the annexed Schedule.

“The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals.”

“ SCHEDULE.

“ SCALE OF PENSIONS, GRANTS, AND OTHER ALLOWANCES.

“ *Injury Pensions.*

“If the injury result in total destruction of earning capacity, a pension equal to two-thirds pay during the period of such total incapacity.

“If the injury result in partial impairment of earning capacity, a pension during the period of such partial impairment of earning capacity equal to:—

“One-sixth pay in respect of slight impairment of earning capacity;

“One-third pay in respect of impairment of earning capacity;

“Half pay in respect of material impairment of earning capacity.

“Such pensions to be awarded to all Officers and Men of Fleet Auxiliaries (other than ranks and ratings in receipt of Naval pay), and to civilians in Admiralty Service and to Officers and Men of the War Department Examination Service, provided that the injury be sustained on duty afloat, and all awards to be subject to periodical review and dependent upon the degree of the impairment of earning capacity for the time being as described above.

“ *Widows' Pensions and Allowances to dependent Relatives.*

“If any of the above-mentioned persons be killed, or die within two years, as the result of injuries sustained on duty afloat, there shall be awarded—

(a) to the widow a pension equal to one-third-pay; and

(b) in respect of each child up to 4 in number until the age of 16, an allowance equal to one twenty-fourth of pay;

so that the maximum possible payment per annum, inclusive of the widow's pension, shall not in any case exceed one-half pay.

“If there be no widow, pensions may be granted to other dependent relatives, at the discretion of the Admiralty or Army Council, not exceeding in the aggregate the sum which might have been awarded in each case as a widow's pension.

“In the event of a widow's re-marriage her pension shall cease, and the Admiralty or Army Council shall have the option of awarding, as may be more beneficial to her, either—

(a) a lump sum equal to the difference by which three years' pay (provided it be not more than £300 or less than £150) exceeds the total sum already paid in compensation; or

(b) continued payment of the children's pensions until age of 16.

“In the event of the adoption of alternative (a) the Admiralty or Army Council shall have power to take any precautions against the squandering of the lump sum—*e.g.*, by entrusting it to trustees to be administered in specified payments or to be applied wholly or partly for the children's education or otherwise.

“ *Definition of the term 'Pay.'*

“For the purpose of this scheme pay shall be computed as follows:—

(1) In the case of Officers and men serving in Ships chartered by the Admiralty, whether with, or without, demise to the Crown, pay shall be deemed to be the pay (including a victualling allowance at the rate of 3s. a day for Officers and 1s. 6d. a day for men, when pay does not include victualling) of the present rank ruling in the Ship, or in Ships of corresponding size and char-

acter, at a date six months prior to the outbreak of hostilities.

(2) In the case of casual labourers engaged for Fleet coaling afloat pay shall be deemed to be the normal wages of an ordinary unskilled labourer at the place of engagement at a date six months prior to the outbreak of hostilities.

(3) In all other cases pay shall be computed in such manner as is best calculated to give the rate at which the person was being remunerated during the year preceding 3rd August, 1914, provided that when it is impracticable to compute pay in such manner, pay shall be taken to be such amount as the Admiralty or Army Council may determine, having regard to the amount of the earnings of persons in similar employment during the same year.

“Limitation of Benefits in the case of Persons entitled to Compensation under the Workmen’s Compensation Acts, or to the Benefits of the Civil Superannuation and Greenwich Hospital Acts.”

“No person who is eligible to benefit under this Scheme shall lose by virtue thereof any gratuity or other superannuation allowance for which he may be eligible by service under the Superannuation Acts, 1834 to 1909, but

persons entitled to any compensation under the Workmen’s Compensation Act, 1906, or to any compensation or damages at Common Law or under the Employer’s Liability Act, 1880, or under the Greenwich Hospital Acts, 1865 to 1898, or any other statute, or eligible for any gratuity or allowance in respect of injury under Section 1 of the Superannuation Act, 1887, shall be entitled to benefit under this scheme only to the extent of the difference, if any, between the value of the benefits it confers and the value of such other benefits as they may be entitled to under the said Acts, provided, however, that no person shall receive as the result of this scheme a total sum in excess of his pay at the date of the injury.

“Interpretation of the Scheme.”

“In the event of any question arising on the interpretation or administration of this scheme, the decision of the Admiralty or Army Council thereon shall be final.”

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

AN ORDER AUTHORIZING GENERAL OR FIELD OFFICERS TO ISSUE REQUISITIONS OF EMERGENCY.

(UNDER THE ARMY ACT, SEC. 115.)

WHEREAS by Section 115 of the Army Act it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by Order distinctly stating that a case of emergency exists, and signified by a Secretary of State, to authorize any General or Field Officer Commanding His Majesty’s Regular Forces in any military district or place in the United Kingdom to issue a Requisition of Emergency under his hand, requiring Justices of the Peace to issue warrants for the provision, for the purposes mentioned in the Requisition, of carriages, animals, vessels, aircraft, food, forage and stores of every description, as prescribed by the said Act:

AND WHEREAS it is further enacted by the said Act that, whenever a proclamation ordering the Army Reserve to be called out on permanent service or an Order for the embodiment of the Militia is in force, His Majesty’s Order may authorize such Officers to extend such Requisitions to the provision of carriages, animals, vessels, aircraft, food, forage and stores of every description, for the purpose of being purchased, as well as of being hired, on His Majesty’s behalf:

AND WHEREAS a proclamation ordering the Army Reserve to be called out on permanent service is in force:

AND WHEREAS a case of emergency exists within the meaning of the said Act:

NOW, THEREFORE, His Majesty, in pursuance of the said Act is pleased to order and authorize any General or Field Officer Commanding the Regular Forces in any military district or place in the United Kingdom to issue Requisitions of Emergency under the said Act and to extend such Requisitions as by the said Act authorized.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 37, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 10th day of July, in the year 1914, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 37, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for authorizing the sale and disposal of certain property in the parishes of Barling and Hadleigh, in the county of Essex, now vested in us.

“ Whereas under and by virtue of a certain indenture bearing date the 20th day of June, 1878, and made between James Tabor of Earls Hall, Prittlewell, in the County of Essex, Esquire, of the one part, and us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the other part, certain land, together with a portion of the River Bank and Sea Wall situate in the Parish of Barling, in the County of Essex, and shown by the pink colour on the plan drawn on the deed, became, with the commons, ways, waters, watercourses, easements and appurtenances thereto belonging or enjoyed, and is now vested in us.

“ And whereas under and by virtue of a certain other indenture bearing date the 29th day of September, 1899, and made between Annie Lloyd Harvey of Hazlewood Villa, Hadleigh, in the County of Essex, Widow, of the one part, and us, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, of the other part, the land situate in the parish of Hadleigh aforesaid, containing thirty perches or thereabouts, particularly described in the same indenture and shown by the pink colour on the plan drawn thereon, became, with its appurtenances, and is now vested in us.

“ And whereas none of the said lands and hereditaments are subject to any outstanding beneficial lease or grant but are now in our possession, but some portions thereof on account of their character or situation are unsuitable or inconvenient to be held or applied for the purposes for which estates vested in us are applicable under the Acts by which our proceedings are governed.

“ And whereas, with a view to the advantageous appropriation of the same or of the proceeds thereof for the ultimate improvement of our common fund, it is expedient that the said lands and hereditaments, or such part or parts thereof as we shall at any time and from time to time think fit, should be sold or disposed of and accordingly that we should be empowered to sell or dispose of our interest in such lands and hereditaments, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us advisable.

“ Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, from

time to time to sell or dispose of, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands and hereditaments so vested in us as aforesaid, under and by virtue of either of the said indentures, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable, it being our intention to invest the proceeds of such sale, from time to time as occasion may arise, in the purchase of other lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or hereditaments, or of some estate or interest therein, convenient to be held by us for the purposes of the Acts by which our proceedings are governed as aforesaid, and in the meantime to invest the said proceeds in some Government or Parliamentary Stock or other public securities in England.

“ And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.”

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Chelmsford.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter 134, of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 49, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, chapter 55, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Representation, bearing date the 16th day of July, in the year 1914, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

“ We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 59th year of His late Majesty King George the Third, chapter 134, of the Act of the 2nd and 3rd years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 49, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, chapter 55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before

Your Majesty in Council, the following Representation as to the assignment of a District Chapelry to the Consecrated Church of All Saints, situate at Twickenham in the New Parish (sometime Particular District) of the Holy Trinity, Twickenham, in the County of Middlesex, and in the Diocese of London.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a District Chapelry should be assigned to the said Church of All Saints, situate at Twickenham as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Arthur Foley, Bishop of London (testified by his having signed and sealed this Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would in our opinion be expedient that all that part of the said New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Twickenham, which is described in the Schedule hereunderwritten, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of All Saints, situate at Twickenham, as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of All Saints, Twickenham.'

"And with the like consent of the said Arthur Foley, Bishop of London (testified as aforesaid), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings and burials should be solemnized or performed at the said Church of All Saints, situate at Twickenham, as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said Offices should be paid and belong to the Minister of the same Church for the time being: Provided always, that nothing herein-contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us the said Commissioners to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the said Office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal Consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The District Chapelry of All Saints, Twickenham, being:—All that part of the New Parish (sometime Particular District) of the Holy Trinity, Twickenham, in the County of Middlesex, and in the Diocese of London, which is bounded upon the north-west by the New Parish of Saint Philip and Saint James, Whitton, upon the south-west by the New Parish of Saint Michael and Saint George, Fulwell, both in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the south-east and upon the east, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Michael and Saint George, Fulwell, from the said New Parish of the Holy Trinity, Twickenham, crosses the middle of the northern end of Wellington Road near its junction with Sixth Cross Road and Hampton Road, and extending thence north-eastward to and along the middle of Hampton Road for a

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of London.

WHEREAS by the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by the Burial Act, 1900, it is enacted that, in case it appear to His Majesty in Council, upon the representation of the Local Government Board, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in any city or town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, or that burials in any

city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that no new burial ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require: Provided always that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please His Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before such representation is so considered: Provided also that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and the Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such parish:

And whereas by the Burial Act, 1855, it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, shall or shall not have arrived), as to His Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, may seem fit:

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the 11th day of January, 1900, it was ordered that burials should be discontinued in (amongst other places) the parish church of Llanfihangel, in the county of Montgomery, and also in so much of the churchyard as is not situated (a) within fifteen yards of the west, south, and east boundaries thereof; or (b) to the north side of the church, with certain exceptions in the said Order in Council specified:

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the churchwardens of the said parish of Llanfihangel ten days' previous notice of their intention in that behalf, have made a representation that, for reasons of public health, so much of the said Order in Council of the 11th day of January, 1900, as relates to burials in the parish church and the churchyard of Llanfihangel aforesaid, should be varied so as to provide that burials should be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the said churchyard: Provided that in the said churchyard the burial might be allowed of the bodies of Ann Griffith and D. C. Davies, for whom grave spaces have been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave:

And whereas His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 18th day of June, 1914, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same should be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council, on the 30th day of July, 1914, and that the said Order should be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof should be affixed in the manner required by the Burial Act, 1853:

And whereas copies of the said Order have been so affixed accordingly:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that so much of the said Order in Council of the 11th day of January, 1900, as relates to burials in the parish church and the churchyard of Llanfihangel, in the county of Montgomery, be varied so as to provide that burials shall be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the said churchyard: Provided that in the said churchyard the burial may be allowed of the bodies of Ann Griffith and D. C. The following STATUTE made by the Governing Body of Emmanuel College, Cambridge, on the 29th day of July, 1914, has been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions of "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

STATUTE.

WHEREAS Emmanuel College in the University of Cambridge is now governed by a Code of Statutes made under the authority of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, and approved by Her late Majesty the Queen in Council on the 3rd day of May, 1882, as altered by certain amending Statutes approved by Her late Majesty the Queen in Council on the 16th day of May, 1893, and further altered by certain amending Statutes approved by Her late Majesty the Queen in Council on the 19th day of May, 1898, and again altered by certain amending Statutes approved by His late Majesty the King in Council on the 29th day of February, 1908, and again altered by certain amending Statutes approved by His Majesty the King in Council on the 19th day of July, 1910.

And whereas it is expedient to alter certain of the said Statutes and also certain of the said amending Statutes.

Now We the Governing Body of the said College by virtue of the said Act and according to the provisions thereof do by a resolution passed at a General Meeting of the said Governing Body specially summoned for the purpose by the votes of not less than two-thirds

of the number of persons present and voting make the following alterations in the aforesaid Statutes as altered by the said amending Statutes.

STATUTE XXIII. OF THE ELECTION OF SCHOLARS.

By repealing Sections 1 and 2 of Statute XXIII and substituting therefor the following Sections to form respectively amended Sections 1 and 2 of the same Statute.

1. The Scholars shall be elected by the Governing Body at a meeting duly summoned in accordance with the provisions of these Statutes. When an examination has been held for the purposes of selection this meeting shall be held at the earliest convenient date subsequent to the examination. The Governing Body being met together in the College there shall be read in their presence the foregoing Statute "Of the Scholars" and a list of the names of the persons recommended for election. The votes shall be taken by means of written voting papers which shall be filled up and delivered to the Master by those present. The Master shall audibly declare his own and the other votes and shall declare those persons to be elected Scholars who shall have obtained the votes of a majority of the electors present or of a moiety including the Master. Provided that the election to each Scholarship shall not necessarily be by separate voting.

2. The persons elected Scholars shall be admitted at once or at such subsequent meeting of the Governing Body as may be convenient. Each before he is admitted shall make the following declaration in the presence of a meeting of the Governing Body. "I A.B. hereby declare that I will faithfully observe the Statutes of this College so far as they concern me. I will pay due respect and obedience to the Master and all others in authority and will set an example of order and diligence and good conduct, and to the best of my ability I will promote everything which shall tend to the honour and advantage of the College and the University." And thereupon the Master shall admit the person or persons elected in the customary form.

STATUTE XLIII. OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF THE COLLEGE REVENUE.

By repealing Section 4 of Statute XLIII and substituting therefor the following section to form amended Section 4 of the same Statute.

4. The residue shall be divided into such a number of equal parts as will give

32 parts to the Scholarship Fund
9 parts to the Education Fund
4 parts to a fund to be called the Reserve Fund
10 parts to the Master
5 parts to each Senior and Junior Fellowship

and one part to each Senior Fellow who has for fifteen years held and is still holding the office of Dean Tutor Bursar Lecturer or Assistant Tutor (whether the office so held has been the same throughout or not) and such parts shall be paid accordingly. Provided that if at any time the payment of the five parts allotted to each Senior and Junior Fellow would exceed two hundred and fifty pounds (£250) the excess above two hundred and fifty pounds (£250)

shall be devoted to such other purposes as the Governing Body shall determine.

The following STATUTES made by the Governing Body of Queens' College, Cambridge, on the 20th day of June, 1914, have been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of their having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions of "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

STATUTES to add to alter and amend the Statutes framed by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, (40 and 41 Vict. c. 48) in relation to Queens' College in the University of Cambridge duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College specially summoned for this purpose held on the twentieth day of June, One thousand nine hundred and fourteen, and passed at such Meeting by the unanimous vote of all persons present and voting (there being then present the President and eight Fellows) and submitted for the approval of His Majesty the King in Council.

We the President Fellows and Scholars of the said College do hereby in exercise of the powers given us by the fifty-fourth section of the said Act add to alter and amend the Statutes framed by the said Commissioners in relation to our said College in the following manner namely:— Statutes xiii, xiv, and xxii. By revoking these Statutes and by substituting therefor the following Statutes, namely:—

XIII. *Of Honorary Fellows.*

The Governing Body, at a special Meeting called for the purpose, by a vote of at least three-fourths of their whole number may elect as Honorary Fellows of the College any persons distinguished in Science or Literature or who have done good service to the State or to the University. The Governing Body may by a like vote terminate the tenure of an Honorary Fellowship. Honorary Fellows shall not by virtue of such Fellowship possess any voice or authority in the College, nor be entitled to any emolument. With these exceptions, the Governing Body may grant them such privileges as they think fit.

XIV. *Of the proceeding to Degrees by Fellows and of the Vacation of Fellowships.*

Every Fellow who at the time of his election is a member of the University, but has not taken any Degree qualifying him to be a member of the Senate, shall proceed to some Degree so qualifying him as soon as he is of standing to take such Degree.

Fellows not so proceeding to their Degrees in due course, unless prevented by illness or other cause to be approved by the Governing Body, shall forfeit their Fellowships.

Every Fellow shall vacate his Fellowship at

the end of six years from his election, except in the following cases:—

1. If he hold the Professorial Fellowship, he shall hold his Fellowship so long as he holds his Professorship, as required by Statute x.

2. If he hold the office of Tutor, Assistant Tutor or Lecturer in the College, he shall hold his Fellowship so long as he holds such office.

3. If he have held the office of Tutor, Assistant Tutor or Lecturer in the College, and if his tenure of any one or more of such offices, whether continuous or not, shall have amounted to twenty-five years, he shall continue to hold his Fellowship for life, provided that he shall have reached the age of fifty-five.

4. If he hold the office of Tutor, Assistant Tutor or Lecturer in the College and be in the opinion of the Governing Body incapable of fulfilling the work of his office in consequence of ill-health, the Governing Body may by a vote of two-thirds of the whole Body continue his Fellowship for a period or periods of not more than five years each, provided that in any case the whole period do not exceed the time for which he has served as Tutor, Assistant Tutor or Lecturer of the College.

5. If a member of the Governing Body, other than the Professorial Fellow, be elected to a Professorship, to the office of Public Orator in the University, or to a Readership, the Governing Body may, at a Meeting specially called for the purpose, continue his Fellowship for a period or periods not exceeding seven years each.

The Governing Body shall have power to grant leave of absence for a period not exceeding one year to a Fellow of the College, who has served not less than ten years as a Lecturer. During such absence he shall receive his stipend as Fellow but not count his period of absence towards his term of service.

No person shall be eligible for re-election to a Fellowship, except he have been elected under Statute XI; provided that the Governing Body may re-elect to a Fellowship a former Fellow who has been appointed Tutor, Assistant Tutor or Lecturer.

No Fellow shall vacate his Fellowship in passing from one educational office to another.

If a Fellow hold more than one educational office at the same time, his tenure of Fellowship after vacation of office shall be computed as if he had held not more than one office at the time.

Notwithstanding any previous provision of these Statutes, no Fellow shall retain his Fellowship after his admission to the office of President, or to a Fellowship or Headship in any other College, or for a period longer than one year after his institution to any benefice in the gift of the College the net annual income of which, after deducting all legal charges and the pension, if any, of a previous incumbent, exceeds four hundred pounds a year, or for a period longer than one year after the net annual income of such benefice shall exceed four hundred pounds a year by reason of the cesser of the pension of a previous incumbent.

If any question shall arise as to the fact of any Fellowship having become vacant, the same shall be determined by the Governing Body, subject to an appeal to the Visitor.

XXII. *Of the Tutors, Assistant Tutors and Lecturers.*

No Undergraduate member of the College, and no Bachelor, except a Fellow, shall be without a Tutor.

The number of Tutors, Assistant Tutors and Lecturers shall be from time to time determined by the Governing Body.

Each Tutor shall be nominated by the President, and any person so nominated shall be submitted to the Governing Body for election to the office of Tutor for a probationary period of two years, and on the expiration of such period the Governing Body shall have power to confirm the Tutor so elected in his office for a further period of eight years. He may be re-appointed for a further period or periods, not exceeding five years each, if the needs of the College seem to demand it. A Tutor shall vacate his office on reaching the age of sixty-five, and in no circumstances shall a Tutor hold office for more than twenty years. A Tutor may at any time be removed from his office by a vote of two-thirds of the Governing Body at a Meeting specially called for the purpose.

An Assistant Tutor shall be nominated by the President. Any person so nominated shall be submitted to the Governing Body for election, and shall hold office for such period as the Governing Body may determine.

The Lecturers shall be nominated by the President, shall be submitted to the Governing Body for election, and after a probationary period of two years shall hold office for such period or periods as the Governing Body may from time to time determine.

The President shall be eligible for any of the above-mentioned offices.

AMENDMENT OF SECTION ONE OF STATUTE XII OF THE STATUTES OF THE COLLEGE APPROVED BY HIS LATE MAJESTY KING EDWARD THE SEVENTH IN COUNCIL ON THE 24TH DAY OF OCTOBER, 1904.

Exhibitions to be held by boys other than Scholars.

1. The following rules shall apply to the Exhibitions hereafter to be offered under

section one of the above-mentioned Statute XII:—

(1) Not less than three Exhibitions shall be offered for competition in each year.

(2) Each Exhibition shall be of the value of fifty pounds a year; Provided that the Warden and Fellows shall have power to increase the value of any Exhibition to such sum, not exceeding eighty pounds a year, as they shall think proper, if they be satisfied that the increase is justified by the pecuniary circumstances of the Exhibitioner.

(3) No boy shall be eligible for an Exhibition, unless his parent or other guardian shall have satisfied the Warden and Fellows that the pecuniary emoluments of the Exhibition are of material importance to him in making arrangements for the education of the boy at the School: Provided that this rule shall not affect the power of the Warden and Fellows to award, for merit shown in the Examinations for Scholarships and Exhibitions, nominal Exhibitions to which no pecuniary emoluments are attached.

(4) The procedure for giving effect to the foregoing rules shall be such as the Warden and Fellows shall from time to time determine.

2. Upon the approval of this Statute by His Majesty the King in Council, the provisions of section one of the above-mentioned Statute XII shall be modified and controlled by the provisions of this Statute.
