NOTICE.

THE Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs has received information of a nature to satisfy him that the treatment accorded to British merchant ships and their cargoes in Austro-Hungarian ports is not less favourable than that accorded to Austro-Hungarian merchant ships and their cargoes in British ports, and he has accordingly addressed the undermentioned notification to the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury and to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

My Lords,

I have the honour to state that information has reached me of a nature to satisfy me that the treatment accorded to British merchant ships and their cargoes which were in Austro-Hungarian ports at the date of the outbreak of hostilities, or which subsequently entered them, is not less favourable than that accorded by Articles 3 to 8 of the Order in Council issued on the 4th day of August, 1914, with reference to enemy ships being in British ports at the outbreak of hostilities, or subsequently entering them, which was extended so as to apply to Austro-Hungarian merchant ships by His Majesty's Proclamation issued on the 12th day of August, 1914.

Articles 3 to 8 of the said Order in Council, as extended by the Proclamation dated the 12th August, 1914, will therefore come into full force and effect with regard to Austro-Hungarian merchant ships.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 8th and 9th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 70, of the Act of the 14th and 15th years of Her said late Majesty, chapter 97, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, chapter 55, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Representation, bearing date the 25th day of June, in the year 1914, in the words and figures following,

that is to say:—
"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 8th and 9th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 70, of the Act of the 14th and 15th years of Her said late Majesty, chapter 97, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, chapter 55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Representation as to the assignment of a Consolidated Chapelry to the Consecrated Church of Saint Luke, Ushaw Moor, situate within the Parish of Esh, in the County of Durham, and

in the Diocese of Durham.
"Whereas at certain extremities of the said Parish of Esh, and of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Edmund, Bearpark, in the said County and Diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several Churches of such Parish and New Parish

respectively.

And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said Parish of Esh, and of the said New Parish of Saint Edmund, Bearpark, should be formed into a Consolidated Chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Luke, Ushaw Moor, situate as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Handley Carr Glyn, Bishop of Durham, as such Bishop, (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Representation), with the consent of the Right Reverend Edmund Arbuthnott, Bishop of Manchester, as the Patron of the Vicarage of the said Parish of Esh, (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Representation), and with the consent of the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Durham, as the Patrons of the Vicarage of the said New Parish of Saint Edmund, Bearpark, (in testimony whereof they have caused their common or capitular seal to be affixed to this Representation), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners 5 commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said Parish of Esh, and of the said New Parish of Saint Edmund, Bearpark, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto-annexed, should be united and formed into one Consolidated Chapelry for the said Church of Saint Luke,

Ushaw Moor, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated

Chapelry of Saint Luke, Ushaw Moor.'
"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your
Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the
premises into Your Royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

"The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Luke,

Ushaw Moor, comprising:

"All those contiguous portions of the Parish of Esh, and of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Edmund, Bearpark, both in the County of Durham, and in the Diocese of Durham, which, taken together, are bounded upon the south by the New Parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Brandon, in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the west, upon the north, and upon the east, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Brandon, from the said Parish of Esh at or near the centre of the footbridge which carries the footpath leading from the house called Hare Holme into Flasshall Lane across the River Deerness, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of the said footpath for a distance of thirteen chains or thereabouts to its junction with Flasshall Lane almost opposite to the footpath connecting such lane with the road leading from Esh New Winning to Ushaw Moor, and extending thence north-westward to and along the middle of the last mentioned footpath for a distance of five chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with the last mentioned road and with the roadway leading past the house called Hag House to Esh, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of such roadway for a distance of twenty-nine chains or thereabouts to its junction with the roadway leading into Broadgate Road, and extending thence, first north-eastward and then eastward, along the middle of the last mentioned roadway for a distance of fifty-six chains or thereabouts to its junction with Broadgate Road, and extending thence northward along the middle of Broadgate Road for a distance of five chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with the road leading to Auton Stile, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of the last mentioned road (thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said Parish of Esh from the said New Parish of Saint Edmund, Bearpark), for a distance of one mile or thereabouts to its junction with Whitehouse Lane, and extending thence southward along the middle of Whitehouse Lane for a distance of twenty-nine chains or thereabouts to its junction with Broom Lane, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Broom Lane for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts to a point opposite to the northern end of the wall or fence forming the eastern boundary of the house and premises known as Number 1, Broom Lane Terrace, and extending thence south-westward to and along the said wall or fence, and along the fences in continuation thereof, for a distance of sixteen chains or thereabouts to the fence forming the northern boundary of the Deerness Valley Branch Line of the North-Eastern Railway, and extending thence in a straight line due

south (thereby crossing the said line of railway) for a distance of eight chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the River Deerness upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Edmund, Bearpark, from the said New Parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Brandon."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Durham.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 113, of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, chapter 104, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 16th day of July, in the year 1914, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 3rd and 4th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 113, of the Act of the 6th and 7th years of Her said late Majesty, chapter 37, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, chapter 104, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for constituting a Separate District for spiritual purposes, to be taken partly out of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Thornley, within the original limits of the Parish of Kelloe, and partly out of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Cuthbert, Shadforth, all in the County of Durham and in the Diocese of Durham.

"Whereas we are satisfied that the said New Parish of Thornley, and the said New Parish of Saint Cuthbert, Shadforth, are Cures wherein or in parts whereof the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the Inhabitants thereof, and it has been made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that the particular portions of the said New Parish of Thornley and of the said New Parish of Saint Cuthbert, Shadforth, which are hereinafter mentioned and described, should be constituted a Separate District, in the manner which is hereinafter set forth.

"And whereas there is not at present within the limits of the said proposed Separate District any Consecrated Church or Chapel in use for

the purposes of Divine Worship.

"And whereas certain hereditaments and premises, situate within the original limits of the said Parish of Kelloe, have become vested in us under the provisions of and for the purposes of the herein-mentioned Acts, or of some or one of them, and we have, in respect of such hereditaments and premises, agreed to make and pay out of the Common Fund created by the firstly herein-mentioned Act a grant of £150 per annum to the Minister of the said proposed Separate District so soon as a Minister shall have been duly licensed in accordance with the provisions of the secondly herein-mentioned Act and to his successors.

"And whereas the said grant of the said yearly sum of £150 will, after the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme, be made and secured by an Instrument to be executed by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, under our Common Seal, in accordance with the provisions of the Act of the 29th and 30th years of Her said late Majesty, chapter 111.

"And whereas a piece of land situate within the said proposed Separate District has been, or is about to be, conveyed to us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, as the site for a permanent Church for such District, and such permanent Church has been erected upon the said piece of land.

"And whereas Henry Frederick Wilkinson, of Number 91A, Waterloo Road, London, S.E., a Major retired in Your Majesty's Army, and Henry Benfield Des Vœux Wilkinson, of Number 3, Eaton Terrace, London, S.W., a Major in Your Majesty's Army, acting on behalf of the Members of their Family, who are the Principal Contributors towards the cost of providing the said permanent Church, have nominated as the persons to whom they desire that the patronage of the said proposed District or New Parish should be assigned the Vicar or Incumbent of the Vicarage of the said Parish of Thornley for the first turn of presentation, and the Bishop of the said Diocese of Durham for the second and every succeeding turn of presentation.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Handley Carr Glyn, Bishop of Durham, (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme) We, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that all those portions of the said New Parish of Thornley, and of the said New Parish of Saint Cuthbert, Shadforth, which are described in the Schedule hereunderwritten, all which portions together with the boundaries thereof are delineated and set forth on the Map or Plan hereunto annexed, shall, upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme as aforesaid, become and be constituted a Separate District for spiritual purposes, and that the same shall be named 'The District of Wheatley Hill.'

"And we further recommend and propose that the whole right of patronage of the said District so recommended to be constituted, and, when such District shall have become a New Parish as aforesaid, then of the said New Parish, and the nomination of the Minister or Incumbent thereof, shall, with-

out any assurance in the law other than this Scheme and any duly gazetted Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying the same, and upon and from the day of the date of the publication of such Order in the London Gazette as aforesaid, be assigned to, and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may be exercised by, the Vicar or Incumbent of the Vicarage of the said Parish of Thornley for the first turn of presentation, and the said Handley Carr Glyn, Bishop of the said Diocese of Durham, and his successors, for the second and every succeeding turn of presentation.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any of them, or of any

other Act of Parliament.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Scheme has reference.

"The District of Wheatley Hill, comprising:—

"I. All that portion of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Thornley, in the County of Durham, and in the Diocese of Durham, which is included within the Civil Parish of Wingate.

"II. And also all that contiguous portion of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Cuthbert, Shadforth, in the said County and Diocese, which is bounded upon the south by the above-mentioned portion of the said New Parish of Thornley, upon the northeast by the New Parish of Shotton with Haswell, in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the north-west and upon the west, by an imaginary line commencing at the point where the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Shotton with Haswell from the said New Parish of Saint Cuthbert, Shadforth, crosses the middle of the footpath leading from Salter's Lane and the house called Flemingfield across Crowshouse Moor to Thornley, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the said footpath, (thereby crossing Crowshouse Moor), for a distance of forty-seven chains or thereabouts, to the point where it crosses the middle of the Ludworth Branch Line of the North-Eastern Railway, and extending thence in a straight line due south for a distance of twentytwo chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint Cuthbert, Shadforth, from the said New Parish of Thornley."

And whereas drafts of the said Scheme have, in accordance with the provisions of the secondly hereinbefore-mentioned Act, been transmitted to the Patrons and to the Incumbents of the Cures out of which it is intended that the District recommended in such Scheme to be constituted shall be taken, and such Patrons and Incumbents have respectively signified their assent to such Scheme.

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by His Majesty in Council.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts. And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Durham.

WHEREAS by Section 26 of Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting "Whereas in some instances Tithings, Hamlets, Chapelries, and other Places, or Districts, may be separated from the Parishes or Mother Churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and Places altogether extraparochial may, in some instances, with advantage, be annexed to Parishes or Districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted. separate Parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own Diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any Diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop, that any such Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place, or District, within the Diocese of such Archbishop, or the Diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any Parish or Mother Church, and either be constituted a separate Benefice by itself or be united to any other Parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining. Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place, or District, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate Parish or Benefice, or that any Extra-Parochial Place may with advantage be-annexed to any Parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes; And the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a Scheme in-writing (the Scheme of such Bishop to be-transmitted to the said Archbishop for his con sideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best beeffected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Rent-charges, and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates, and Payments, and in respect to Patronage and Rights to Pews, may be made with justice to all Parties interested; and if the Patron or Patrons of the Benefice or Benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such Scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such Scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such Consent as aforesaid, by his Report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such Scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Edgar

And whereas the Right Reverend Edgar Charles Sumner, Lord Bishop of Gloucester, hath made a Representation in writing, dated the 28th day of March, 1914, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I, Edgar Charles Sumner, by Divine Permission Bishop of Gloucester, do in pursuance of the 26th Section of the Pluralities Act, 1838, hereby represent to your Grace as follows:—

"1. There is in the City of Gloucester and County of Gloucester, and within my Diocese of Gloucester, the Vicarage of St. Mary de Lode, the Parish whereof contains an estimated present population of 3,964. The net annual value of this Benefice, arising from glebe rents, income payable by the Ecclesiastical Commission and Queen Anne's Bounty, and fees and other sources, is about £218.

"2. There is also in the same City and Diocese, the Vicarage of St. Catharine, the Parish whereof contains an estimated present population of 3,704. The net annual value of this Benefice, arising from tithe rentcharge, glebe rents, income payable by the Ecclesiastical Commission and Queen Anne's Bounty, and fees and other sources, is about £292.

"3. A certain District of the said Parish of St. Mary de Lode, situate at Wotton, in and near the said City of Gloucester, lies at a distance of about a mile from the Parish Church of St. Mary de Lode, and about the same distance from the Parish Church of St. Catharine, but it contains within it a new Church now nearing completion which is intended to be made the Parish Church of St. Catharine.

"4. It appears to me that under the provisions of the said Pluralities Act the District referred to in the last preceding paragraph may advantageously be separated from the said Parish of St. Mary de Lode, and annexed to the said Parish of St. Catharine to which it is contiguous.

"5. The Benefice of St. Mary de Lode is in the patronage of the Dean and Chapter of Gloucester. The Benefice of St. Catharine is in my own patronage by virtue of my Bishoprick.

"6. The Reverend William Christian Macklin is the present Incumbent of the Benefice of St. Mary de Lode. The Reverend Samuel Richmond Robertson is the present Incumbent of the Benefice of St. Catharine.

'7. Pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th section of the said Pluralities Act, I, the said Bishop, have drawn up a Scheme in writing, annexed to this Representation, describing the District so as aforesaid proposed to be annexed to the said Parish of St. Catharine, and the mode in which it appears to me the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent thereon in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rentcharges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; And I do hereby submit the same to your Grace together with the Consents in writing of the said Patrons and Incumbents to the intent that, if your Grace shall on full consideration and inquiry be satisfied with such Scheme, you may certify the same and such Consents by your Report to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"That a District shall be separated from the said Parish of St. Mary de Lode, and annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the contiguous Parish of St. Catharine; That the said District is delineated and described in the plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured red, and is situated at Wotton, in the said City of Gloucester.

City of Gloucester.
"That the Incumbent of the said Parish of
St. Catharine to which such District shall be
annexed shall have the sole and exclusive cure

of souls within the said District.

"That the Parishioners of the said District shall be entitled to accommodation in the Church of the said Parish of St. Catharine, but shall cease to be entitled to accommodation in the Church of the said Parish of St. Mary de Lode, excepting nevertheless any person or persons possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting in the said Parish Church of St. Mary de Lode, and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"That marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials shall be solemnized and performed for the Inhabitants of the said District in the Parish Church for the time being of St.

Catharine.

"That all fees, dues, ecclesiastical offerings, and emoluments, (including all tithes and tithe-rentcharge), arising from the said District shall belong to the Incumbent of the said Parish of St. Catharine to which such District shall be annexed.

"That no alteration shall be made in the patronage or endowment (except as aforesaid) of the said Benefices or either of them."

"CONSENTS.

"We, the Dean and Chapter of Gloucester, being the Patrons or persons entitled to present to the Benefice of St. Mary de Lode, in the City and County of Gloucester, and Diocese of Gloucester, (in case the same were now vacant), the Reverend William Christian Macklin, being the Incumbent of the same Benefice, Edgar Charles Sumner, Lord Bishop Gloucester, being by virtue of our Bishoprick the Patron or person entitled to present to the Benefice of St. Catharine, in the City and Diocese of Gloucester, (in case the same were now vacant), and the Reverend Samuel Richmond Robertson, the Incumbent of the same Benefice, do hereby respectively signify to your Grace our several Consents to the Scheme above proposed and set forth, and to every matter and thing therein contained.

"In testimony whereof we, the said Dean and Chapter, have caused our Common Seal to be hereunto affixed, and I, the said Bishop, and we, the said William Christian Macklin, and Samuel Richmond Robertson, have hereunto set our hands this 28th day of March, 1914.

"That there is in the City of Gloucester, and his Diocese of Gloucester, the Vicarage of St. Mary de Lode, the Parish whereof contains an estimated present population of 3,964.
"That there is also in the same City and

Diocese the Vicarage of St. (Catharine, the Parish whereof contains an estimated present

population of 3,704.

'That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that a certain District of the said Parish of St. Mary de Lode situate at Wotton, in and near the said City of Gloucester, lying at a distance of about a mile from the Parish Church of St. Mary de Lode, and about the same distance from the Parish Church of St. Catharine, may, under the provisions of the Pluralities Act, 1838, be advantageously separated from the said Parish of St. Mary de Lode, and annexed to the said Parish of St. Catharine, to which it is contiguous.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the said Pluralities Act the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a Scheme in writing describing the mode in which it appears to him that the proposed alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent upon such alteration in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithe rentcharges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested, which Scheme, together with the Consents thereto in writing of the Dean and Chapter of Gloucester, the Patrons or persons entitled to present to the said Benefice of St. Mary de Lode, (in case the same were now vacant), the Reverend William Christian Macklin, the Incumbent of the same Benefice, the said Edgar Charles Sumner, Lord Bishop of Gloucester, by virtue of his Bishoprick the Patron or person entitled to present to the said Benefice of St. Catharine, (in case the same were now vacant), and the Reverend Samuel Richmond Robertson, the Incumbent of the same Benefice, has been transmitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration.

"That the said Chapelry of Sedgehill is adjacent to the said Parish of East Knoyle.

"That on the map marked 'A,' hereunto annexed, the part of the said Parish of East Knoyle which it is proposed to separate is coloured yellow, and the said Chapelry, of Sedgehill is coloured blue.

"That according to the last census the population of the said Parish of Berwick St. Leonard was 77, the population of the said Parish of East Knoyle was 789, and the population of the said Chapelry of Sedgehill was 160.

"That there is in the said Parish of Berwick St. Leonard a Parish Church, and there is also a Church in the said Chapelry of Sedgehill.

"That the Parish Church of Berwick St. Leonard contains accommodation for 50 persons, that the Parish Church of East Knoyle contains accommodation for 345 persons, and that the Church or Chapel of the Chapelry of Sedgehill contains accommodation for 150 persons.

"That the net annual value of the said Benefice of Berwick St. Leonard, with Sedgehill, is £206 10s. or thereabouts, of which a gross sum of £76 10s. is derived from Berwick St. Leonard, and £130 from Sedgehill, and that the net annual value of the said benefice of East Knoyle is £609 or thereabouts.

"That there is in the Chapelry of Sedgehill a house of residence for the said Benefice of Berwick St. Leonard with Sedgehill, but there is no house of residence in the Parish of Berwick

St. Leonard; that there is a house of residence for the said Parish of East Knoyle.

"That the patronage of the said Benefice of Berwick St. Leonard with Sedgehill belongs to the Lady Octavia Shaw Stewart, and that the Reverend Eldon Ormonde Judkin Butler is the present Incumbent thereof, and that the patronage of the said Benefice of East Knoyle belongs to the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Oxford, in right of his Bishopric, and that the Reverend William Neville is the present Incumbent thereof.

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 106, and also of the Act of the second and third years of the same reign, chapter 49, it will be with advantage to the interests of religion

"To separate—

(a) the said Chapelry of Sedgehill from the Parish of Berwick St. Leonard,

(b) and the portion of the Parish of East Knoyle coloured yellow on the said map from the remainder of the said Parish of East Knoyle, and to annex such severed portion to the said Chapelry of Sedgehill, and to constitute them a Separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes.

The Unemployment Insurance (Supplementary) Regulations, 1914, dated August 10th, 1914, made by the Board of Trade under Part II of the National Insurance Act, 1911, and the National Insurance (Part II Amendment) Act, 1914.

Whereas in pursuance of section 91 of the National Insurance Act, 1911, Regulations have been made by the Board of Trade, entitled the Unemployment Insurance Regulations, 1912, and dated May 6th, 1912, and the Unemployment Insurance (Supplementary) Regulations, 1913, and dated January 8th, 1913, respectively, now the Board, in further exercise of their powers under the said section of the National Insurance Act, 1911, and in exercise of their powers under the National Insurance (Part II Amendment) Act, 1914, and all other powers in this behalf, make the following Regulations:

- 1.—(1) These Regulations may be cited as the Unemployment Insurance (Supplementary) Regulations, 1914, and shall be construed as one with the Unemployment Insurance Regulations, 1912, and the Unemployment Insurance (Supplementary) Regulations, 1913.
- (2) These Regulations shall come into operation on the date hereof.
- 2. In these Regulations the expression "the Act "means the National Insurance Act, 1911, and the expression "the amending Act" means the National Insurance (Part II Amendment) Act, 1914.

3. The following sub-section (4) shall be added to Regulation 3 of the Unemployment

Insurance Regulations, 1912:-

(4) Whilst the employer is responsible for the custody of the book in accordance with these Regulations, he shall produce it for inspection at any reasonable time when required to do so by an Inspector appointed for the purposes of Part II of the Act."

4. Regulation 13 of the Unemployment Insurance Regulations, 1912, is hereby repealed, and the following Regulation shall be substituted therefor:

Where a Court of Referees have recommended that a claim for unemployment benefit should be allowed, and the recommendation has been referred by the Insurance Officer to the Umpire, the workman shall be entitled to receive unemployment benefit as from the date of the recommendation until the claim is finally determined by the Umpire as if the Insurance Officer had not disagreed with the recommendation and in accordance with subsection 3 of section 2 of the amending Act such benefit received by the workman shall, except as is hereinafter provided, be deemed to be duly paid, and shall not be recoverable from the workman;

Provided that where for the purpose of obtaining such benefit the workman has made any false statement or representation or has concealed any material facts, he shall, without prejudice to any other liability under section 101 of the Act or otherwise, be liable to repay to the Unemployment Fund the amount of such benefit received by him whilst the statutory conditions were not fulfilled in his case, or whilst he was disqualified for receiving unemployment benefit, and the amount of such benefit may, in accordance with sub-section 5 of section 101 of the Act, be recovered as a debt due to the Crown.

- 5. The following paragraph shall be added after the words "on the Court" in Regulation 21 (1) of the Unemployment Insurance Regulations, 1912:-
- "Provided that any claim or question which is reported or referred to a Court of Referees may be proceeded with in the absence of any member or members of that Court other than the Chairman, but only if the claimant or

person or Association in whose case the question arises consents, and in such case the Court shall be deemed to be properly constituted, and the Chairman shall, if the number of the members of the Court is an even number, have a second or casting vote."
6. The expression "Insurance Year" re-

ferred to in sub-section 2 of section 18 of the

amending Act means

(i) the period commencing on the 15th day of July, 1914, and ending on the 17th day of July, 1915;

(ii) thereafter the period commencing on the day next after the last day of the preceding insurance year, and ending on the Saturday nearest to the 14th day of July in the following calendar year, and so on from year to year.
