

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said Scheme, hath certified the same, and the Consents aforesaid, to His Majesty in Council by his Report dated the 15th day of May, 1914, which said Report is in the words and figures following:—

"We, the undersigned, Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That the Right Reverend Frederic Edward, Bishop of Salisbury, has represented unto us, amongst other things,

"That there are in the County of Wilts and his Diocese of Salisbury the Benefice of the Rectory of Berwick St. Leonard, with the Chapelry of Sedgehill annexed, and the Rectory of East Knoyle, otherwise Bishop's Knoyle, otherwise Great Knoyle.

"That the Parish of Berwick St. Leonard is not adjacent to the Chapelry of Sedgehill, and is distant therefrom, measuring the distance by road from the Church of the one Parish to the Church of the other, about 5½ miles.

"That the said Chapelry of Sedgehill is adjacent to the said Parish of East Knoyle.

"That on the map marked 'A,' annexed to the Representation and Scheme of the said Lord Bishop, the part of the said Parish of East Knoyle which it is proposed to separate is coloured yellow and the said Chapelry of Sedgehill is coloured blue.

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that under the provisions of the Act of Parliament of the first and second years of the reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 106, and also of the Act of the second and third years of the same reign, chapter 49, it will be with advantage to the interests of religion to separate the said Chapelry of Sedgehill, coloured blue on the said map, from the Parish of Berwick Saint Leonard, and the portion of the Parish of East Knoyle, coloured yellow on the said map, and described in the First Schedule to the said Scheme, from the remainder of the said Parish of East Knoyle, and to annex such severed portion to the said Chapelry of Sedgehill, and to constitute them a separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes by the name of the Perpetual Curacy and Benefice of Sedgehill.

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the twenty-sixth Section of the said first-mentioned Act of Parliament the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a Scheme, in writing, describing the mode in which it appears to him the alterations above proposed may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithe rent charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested, which Scheme, together with the Consents thereto, in writing, of the Right Reverend Charles, Lord Bishop of Oxford, the Patron in right of his Bishopric of the Benefice of East Knoyle (being a Rectory), the Reverend William Neville, Rector of the said Rectory, the Lady Octavia Shaw Stewart, the Patron of the Benefice of the Rectory of Berwick St. Leonard, with the Chapelry of Sedgehill annexed, and the Reverend Eldon Ormonde Judkin Butler, Rector of the said Rectory, has been transmitted to us for our consideration.

"The Representation and Scheme of the said

Lord Bishop of Salisbury and the Consents above referred to are hereunto annexed.

"And we, the said Archbishop, being on full consideration and inquiry satisfied with the said Scheme, do hereby, pursuant to the Pluralities Act, 1838, certify the same and such Consents as aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council, to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may, in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make and issue an Order for carrying the said Scheme into effect.

WHEREAS it is expedient to amend certain provisions of the Northern Rhodesia Order in Council, 1911, (hereinafter referred to as the "Principal Order"):

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Northern Rhodesia (Customs) Amendment Order in Council, 1914, and shall be construed and read as one with the Principal Order.

2. Article 19 of the Principal Order is hereby revoked and the following substituted in lieu thereof, that is to say:—

No Customs duties levied on any articles other than tobacco in any form and intoxicating liquors of any kind, produced or manufactured in any part of His Majesty's Dominions or in any British Protectorate and imported into Northern Rhodesia shall exceed in amount the duties levied on similar articles from oversea according to the tariff in force in the South African Customs Union at the date of coming into operation of the Southern Rhodesia Order in Council, 1898, or the tariff contained in the Customs Union Convention concluded between the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope, the Orange Free State and Natal in May, 1898, whichever are the higher: Provided that in fixing the customs duties regard shall be had to any treaty obligations affecting the territory within the limits of the Principal Order or any portion of it.

3. This Order shall come into operation forthwith, and shall be published in the Gazette; and the High Commissioner shall give directions for the publication of this Order at such places and in such manner and for such time or times as he thinks proper for giving due publicity thereto.

4. His Majesty may from time to time revoke, alter, add to, or amend this Order.
