Turin, July 16.

**T**he Troops of the Milaneze are come within 2 or 3 days march of our Camp at *Burialque*, being 11000 Foot, and 3000 Horse and Dragons, besides the Detachment that is left to block up *Casal*; The Garrison whereof will be very much strengthened by the taking of the Castle of *St. George*, which was surrendered to the Germans and Spaniards at discretion, after having held out two days. The Governor of *Milan* is expected here this day in his way to the Army; and the Duke of *Savoy* designed to have gone thither to-morrow or the day following, but yesterday in the afternoon he had a Fit of an Ague, which lasted several hours; And this day his R. H. is to rake the Jesuits Powder. We hear that 6000 Men of the Enemies Troops are posted on the Hill of *St. Bridget* near *Pignorello*.

*Venice*, July 10. We have Advice of the Doge's arrival at *Corfu*, and that he intended to part again on the 20th of the last Month for the *Levant*; From whence we are told, that the Turks have lately reinforced the Garrisons of *Canea* and *Negrepont*, and that they have likewise made several new Fortifications at the last of these places. The *Papal* Gallies and those of *Malta* are gone together to join the Venetian Fleet. They write from *Mantua*, that on the 6th Instant happened there an Earthquake which threw down some Houses.

*Vienne*, July 11. The Duke of *Croy* parted from hence on Wednesday last for *Hungary*, to command the Imperial Army, which according to our last advice, was passing the *Danube* at *Veris-Maron*, in order, as 'tis generally believed, to besiege *Temeswar*. We have yet no account of the march of the Grand Visier, and all the Letters from the Frontiers say, that his Army, which was encamped near *Adrianople*, did not, together with the *Asia-ticks* who had joined it, consist of above 24000 Men; Monsieur *Heemskerck*, the Dutch Ambassador, intended to follow the Visier into the Field; and the Lord *Pages*, and Monsieur *Collier* the other Dutch Ambassador, would go in the mean time to *Constantinople*. The Count de *Bathian* is made Ban or Governor of *Croatia*, upon the death of Count *Nicolas Erdeedy*, and he is accordingly gone thither to take possession of his Government. The Emperor has named the Baron of *Benneberg*, to go in the Quality of his Envoy Extraordinary to the Elector of *Saxony*, to adjust the matter about the command between him and Prince *Lewis of Baden*, and to be with his Electoral Highness during the Campaign.

From the Saxon Camp at *Langen*, July 18. The Dauphin has passed the *Rhine* with his Army at *Philipsburg*, and has joined the Marechal de *Lorge*, who repassed the *Neckar* at *Ladenburg*, and they are both encamped at *Swetzingen* near *Hydelberg*; 'Tis said, that they will march directly towards Prince *Lewis* of *Baden*, who is gone to his old Camp near *Hailbron*, where he is very advantageously posted. Our Army is to break up this day in order to march through the *Odenwald*, and to join Prince *Lewis*. Many Deserters come daily to us, among whom are several Irish, and some English; They say, that there are 4 Regiments of Irish and 300 English in Monsieur de *Lorge's* Army, who will most of them desert when our Army comes near them. We begin just now to march; and are to encamp this night at *Roden*, and to-morrow at *Unstut*.

*Hailbron*, July 18. Prince *Lewis* having received advice, that the Dauphin and the Marechal de *Lorge* were joined, and that they were moving this way, decamped

from *Wimpfen*, and causing his Army (which has been lately reinforced by the Regiment of *Wurtz*, and 6 Battalions of *Bavarians*) to pass the *Neckar*, has posted himself near this City, where he will expect the Forces of *Saxony*, *Brandenburg*, and *Hesse*, who are marching from the Neighbourhood of *Frankfort* to join him.

*Mentz*, July 18. On the 14th Instant the Dauphin marched with his Army from *Heppenheim* to *Ober-John*; He designed to have passed the *Rhine* at *Sandhausen*, but that being found impracticable by reason of the overflowing of the River, the Troops were ordered to pass the *Rhine* at *Philipsburg*, which they did the 16th upon two Bridges, and thence they marched to *J* in the Marechal de *Lorge*, who had quitted the *Bergstrasser*, and repassed the *Neckar* near *Ladenburg*. We are going to make a new Ravelin before one of the Gates of this City. This day were brought in here several French Prisoners.

*Frankfort*, July 19. The Saxons and Hessians decamped yesterday from *Langen* and *Sprenlingen*; 6000 Brandenburgers under General *Fleming* pass the *Main* to-day; and 3000 Neuburgers will do the like to-morrow; These Forces march all towards the Army under Prince *Lewis*, who is encamped near *Hailbron*, and when they are joined together, which they may be in 4 or 5 days, they will be 55000 strong. The Dauphin passed the *Rhine* on the 16th Instant at *Philipsburg*, and joined the Marechal de *Lorge*, who had the day before repassed the *Neckar* at *Ladenburg*; and 'tis the common report, that they take their march directly towards *Hailbron*.

*Cologne*, June 21. Three *Munster* Regiments quartered in this Diocess, marched on the 19th Instant from *Berchem* and *Kerpen* towards *Meckenheim*, to join with the Troops of the Elector *Palatin*. The Regiment raised by the States of *Cologne* under the command of the Count d'*Arco* is ordered to *Bonne*. Several hundred *Suissers* have lately passed through this City towards *Holland*, being raised for the Service of the States-General.

*Hamburg*, July 21. The Letters from *Copenhagen* of the 17th tell us, that the King of *Denmark* intended to take a Journey to *Holstein*, and that 'twas believed he would set out the Wednesday following. The last Advices from *Poland* say, that the Forces of that Crown were encamped at *Gliniani* on the Frontiers of *Podolia*, and that the King of *Poland* designed to go and take a Review of them.

*Paris*, July 20. The French Court is at *Marli*, where 'tis said an Express arrived two days ago from Monsieur de *Tourville*, but the news it brought is not yet made publick. The Letters from *Piedmont* advise, that the Troops of *Milan* had joined the Duke of *Savoy's* Forces and the Germans near *Burialque*, and that the Artillery was ordered to march from *Turin*. The Marechal de *Catinat* was encamped at *Villars*.

*Brussels*, June 22. The Duke of *Wurtemberg* has since his forcing the French Lines been encamped at *Ottigny*, from whence he has sent out his Parties to raise Contributions. The Marquis de *la Vallette*, who commanded 8000 Men appointed for the Guard of the said Lines, is retired to *Pont a Tresin*, having lost a great many of his Men, as well in the Vigorous Attacks that were made upon them, as by Desertion in his disorderly Retreat.

From His Majesties Camp at *Vellem*, July 23. On Tuesday we marched from *Tirlemont* to *Nether-Hespen*, and this day we encamped here, the right of our Camp being at *Gingelem*, and the left near *St. Tron*; In our march we saw a Body of the Enemies Horse, and thereupon 18 Squadrons of ours were

were detached towards them, but they retired immediately. Count Tilly has been to wait on His Majesty, and assured him, that the loss he received in the late Action near *Tongres* did not amount to 150 Men, and but little Baggage; The French lost about 80 of their Gens d'Armes, and divers Persons of Quality, who pushing upon some Squadrons of *Brandenburg* Dragoons, were very bravely received, and beaten back by them, and among the Enemies slain in this occasion was the Duke of *Moswitz*, nearly related to the *Mareschal de Luxembourg*, who commanded the Detachment in Person, and was very much concerned at the disappointment of his Design. The Castle of *Huy* holds out still; Though the Enemy have possessed themselves of a Fortification which overlooks it; The Marquis de *Harcourt* carries on the Siege; and the Duke of *Luxemburg* lies on this side the *Meuse* to cover him. Orders are given for our Army to march to-morrow towards *Borchloon*, the left of our Camp will be at *Hyperlinge*, and the right towards *Aelft*. We have an account from *Flanders*, that the Duke of *Wurtemberg* has already raised within the French Lines a Million of *Livres* Contribution.

*Hague*, July 24. The States of *Holland* are still assembled, and have resolved to raise another Hundred Penny upon all Real Estates, to be paid in two Terms before the expiration of this year. A considerable number of Men of War is fitting out, and almost ready to sail from *Amsterdam* and the *Maele*, part of them are to cruise to the Northwards, and the rest are to go and meet our *East-India* Ships that are expected home. We have advise by the last Letters from *Germany*, that the Point about the Command of the Confederate Army was adjusted; The Elector of *Saxony* being to command the Right Wing, the Landgrave of *Hesse* the left, and Prince *Lewis* the Main Body; And that the Troops of *Saxony* and *Hesse* would join Prince *Lewis* on the 23d of this month.

*Bridlington*, July 13. Yesterday a small Pink, *Jacob Simpson* Master, was forced ashore near this place by two French Privateers of 10 or 12 Guns each, who fired several Shot at the Pink, and manned out their Boats to board her, but the Master and his Men bravely defended her with two small Guns they had, and some small Arms; At Noon came into this Bay 400 Sail of light Colliers under Convoy of the *Sweepstakes* and *Prudence*. And at night passed by to the Southward about 100 Laden Colliers with their Convoy.

*Plimouth*, July 16. Yesterday arrived here the *Bonadventure* of and for *London*, *Noah Bartin* Master, with Currans, Olives, Wines, &c. and the *Concord* of *London* for *Bristol*, *John Brooking* Master, her Lading the same with the former; They came both from *Leghorn*, but last from the *Groyn*; At the same time came in the *Endeavour* of and for *London*; She was taken by the French on the 25th of *April*, and retaken by the *Cloudsley* Galley on the 3d of *May*. This day came in the *Jamer* Galley from cruising to the Westward.

*Whitehall*, July 18. This day His Excellency the Lord Viscount *Sydney*, Lord Lieutenant of *Ireland*, came to Town, being Accompanied by many of the Nobility and Gentry, who went to meet him at *Barnet*; and presently after his Excellency went to wait upon the Queen at *Kensington*.

*London*, July 19. The last Letters from *Oriz* brought advice, that the *Shandos*, the *Asia*, the *Italian Merchant*, and the *Loyalty*, all 4 bound to *Turkey*, were come to *Gibraltar*.
