Board of Trade, Whitehall.

WHEREAS by Royal Proclamation relating to Trading with the Enemy dated the 9th day of September, 1914, it was, amongst other things, declared as follows:—

“The expression ‘enemy country’ in this Proclamation means the territories of the German Empire and of the Dual Monarchy of Austria-Hungary, together with all the Colonies and Dependencies thereof.

“The expression ‘enemy’ in this Proclamation means any person or body of persons of whatever nationality resident or carrying on business in the enemy country, but does not include persons of enemy nationality who are neither resident nor carrying on business in the enemy country. In the case of incorporated bodies enemy character attaches only to those incorporated in an enemy country.”

AND WHEREAS it was also declared by the said Proclamation that from and after the date of the said Proclamation, all persons resident, carrying on business, or being in His Majesty's Dominions were prohibited from doing certain acts therein more specifically referred to:

AND WHEREAS it was further declared by the said Proclamation as follows:

“Nothing in this Proclamation shall be taken to prohibit anything which shall be expressly permitted by Our licence, or by the

licence given on Our behalf by a Secretary of State, or the Board of Trade, whether such licences be especially granted to individuals or be announced as applying to classes of persons.”

AND WHEREAS it appears desirable to grant the licence hereinafter set out;

NOW THEREFORE the Board of Trade, acting on behalf of His Majesty, and in pursuance of the power reserved in the said Proclamation, do hereby give and grant licence to all persons resident, carrying on business, or being in His Majesty's Dominions,

To pay any fees necessary for obtaining the grant, or for obtaining the renewal of patents, or for obtaining the registration of Designs or Trade Marks, or the renewal of such registration in an “enemy country.”

And also to pay on behalf of an “enemy” any fees payable on application for or renewal of the grant of a British patent or on application for the registration of British Designs or Trade Marks or the renewal of such registration.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Section 21 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas from the increase of population, or from other circumstances, it may be expedient that two or more Benefices which have been heretofore united, or which may be hereafter united, under the provisions of this Act, should be disunited," it is, amongst other things, enacted "That when two or more Benefices shall have been united, or may be hereafter united into one Benefice, and, with respect to his own Diocese, it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or the Bishop of any Diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop of the Province, that one or more of the Benefices within his Diocese, of which such United Benefice shall consist, may be separated therefrom with advantage to the interests of religion, the said Archbishop shall inquire into the circumstances of the case, and, if on such Inquiry, it shall appear to him that such union may be usefully dissolved, so far as respects such Benefice or Benefices, he shall, six weeks at least before certifying such Inquiry to His Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own Diocese, a Statement in writing of the facts, and in all other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid Representation to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the Church or in some public and conspicuous place in each of the Benefices forming part of the United Benefice, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they may, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hands to the said Archbishop against any such disunion, and, if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the Archbishop shall certify the Inquiry and Consent, when the Patron's Consent is necessary, to His Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for His Majesty to issue an Order for separating such last-mentioned Benefice or Benefices from such United Benefice, and for declaring the rights of patronage of the several Patrons, if there be more than one Patron, and such Order shall be registered in the Registry of the Diocese to which such United Benefice shall belong, which Order the Registrar of such Diocese, immediately on the receipt thereof, is hereby required to register accordingly, and thereupon immediately, if such United Benefice shall be then vacant, otherwise on the first avoidance thereof, such Union shall be, *ipso facto*, dissolved, so far only as regards such Benefice or Benefices so proposed to be separated from such United Benefice, but in all other respects shall remain in full force and effect, and thenceforward such last-mentioned Benefice or Benefices shall be, and be deemed and taken to be, a separate and distinct Benefice or Benefices to all intents and purposes whatever as if no such Union had taken place, and the Patron or Patrons thereof shall and may according to the terms of such Order present or nominate thereto respectively, and so, from time to time, upon each and every avoidance of the same: Provided always, that no Benefices which have been united for more than sixty years before the passing of this Act shall be disunited without the Consent in writing of the Patron or Patrons thereof."

And whereas by Section 23 of the said Act it is further enacted that "Whenever two or more Benefices which have at any time been united into one Benefice shall be disunited and become separate Benefices under the provisions of this Act, whether the Order for disunion shall extend to the whole number of Benefices of which such United Benefice consisted, or to one or more of such Benefices only, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, on the recommendation of the Archbishop of the Province, with the consent of the Patron or Patrons of such Benefices respectively (such Consent to be signified in writing under the hands of such Patron or Patrons) to assign and attach such portion of the glebe lands, tithes, moduses, rent-charges or other endowments or emoluments belonging to or arising or accruing within the limits of such United Benefice to each of such Benefices respectively as to His Majesty in Council shall seem fit notwithstanding such proportion of glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, moduses, or other endowments or emoluments, or any part thereof, may not arise or accrue within the limits of the Benefice to which the same shall be so assigned and attached as aforesaid, or may not have belonged thereto, and also to divide and apportion between such Benefices all such charges and outgoings as before the disunion thereof were imposed upon the whole United Benefice."

And whereas the Right Reverend Bertram, Lord Bishop of Norwich, hath made a Representation in writing, dated the 29th day of September, 1913, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I, Bertram, Lord Bishop of Norwich, do hereby represent to Your Grace that it appears to me that the Disunion of the United Rectories of Litcham with East Lexham, in the County of Norfolk, and my Diocese of Norwich, by the separation of the said Rectory of Litcham from the said Rectory of East Lexham, may be made with advantage to the interests of religion, with a view to two more desirable unions.

"B. NORWIC."

And whereas, on the 7th day of October, 1913, the said Archbishop inquired into the circumstances of the case.

And whereas the said Bishop did, by a further Representation in writing, dated the 19th day of December, 1913, furnish to the said Archbishop a Statement of Circumstances as follows:—

"Whereas Your Grace, having inquired of me, Bertram, Lord Bishop of Norwich, what are the circumstances of the case on which I found my opinion that the disunion of the United Benefice consisting of the Rectory of Litcham and the Rectory of East Lexham, in the County of Norfolk, and my Diocese of Norwich, by the separation of the Rectory of Litcham from the Rectory of East Lexham, may be made with advantage to the interests of religion, I do hereby represent to Your Grace that the circumstances of the case are as follows, that is to say:—

"That the said Rectory of Litcham and the said Rectory of East Lexham were united in the year 1780, and still continue to be one Benefice.

"That the population according to the last census of Litcham with East Lexham is 852.

"That the endowment of the Rectory of Litcham consists of an apportioned Tithes Rent

Charge of £441, £9 rent of eleven acres of Glebe including Rectory grounds and pasture about 4 acres, and clerical fees averaging about £6 per annum.

"That the endowment of the Rectory of East Lexham consists of an apportioned Tithe Rent Charge of £214, and £32 11s. rent of 32 acres of Glebe.

"That there is a House of Residence for the United Benefices, viz., at Litcham.

"That there is a Parish Church in each of the said Benefices.

"That the separation of the Rectory of Litcham from the Rectory of East Lexham would be of advantage to the interests of religion.

"That it is proposed that, immediately upon the separation of the Rectory of Litcham from the Rectory of East Lexham taking effect by Order in Council, and it becoming a separate Benefice under the provisions of the Act 1 and 2 Victoria, cap. 106, in pursuance of the 23rd

Section of the said Act there shall be transferred from the endowment of the Rectory of East Lexham to the said Rectory of Litcham the sum of £106 15s. 6d. apportioned Tithe Rent Charge, the particulars of which are given in the Schedule hereto, and that the same shall be annexed to and belong to the separated Rectory of Litcham until the next avoidance thereof, and then the said sum of £106 15s. 6d. shall revert and again form part of the endowment of East Lexham aforesaid, and all other the endowments and emoluments belonging or arising within the limits of each of the said Benefices shall remain attached thereto respectively.

"That Augustus Leverton Jessopp, of Lexham Hall, Esquire, is the Patron of Litcham with East Lexham aforesaid, and he has by writing under his hand dated the 12th day of December, 1913, signified his Consent to the proposed Disunion, which consent is hereto annexed.

And whereas, on the 26th day of March, 1914, the said Archbishop certified to His Majesty in Council as follows:—

"We, the undersigned, Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of all England and Metropolitan, do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That the Right Reverend Bertram, Lord Bishop of Norwich, in which Diocese is situate the United Benefice consisting of the Rectory of Litcham and the Rectory of East Lexham, in the County of Norfolk, having represented unto us that the disunion of the said United Benefice by the separation of the Rectory of Litcham from the Rectory of East Lexham may be made with advantage to the interests of religion, we inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such Inquiry it appeared to us that such union might usefully be dissolved and that Augustus Leverton Jessopp, being the Patron or person entitled to present to the said United Benefice of Litcham and East Lexham (if the same were now vacant), consents to the proposed disunion.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such Inquiry and Consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid Representation to be affixed to the principal outer doors of each of the Parish Churches of Litcham and East Lexham, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they might, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands to us, the said Archbishop, against such disunion, but no such cause has been shown.

"The Representation of the said Lord Bishop of Norwich, Our Inquiry into the circumstances of the case, the Statement of Circumstances in reply thereto, the Consent in writing of the said Patron of the said United Benefice, and the copies of the Representation and Notices before-mentioned are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the Inquiry aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council, to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may, in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make and issue an Order for the disunion of the said United Benefice by the separation of the Rectory of Litcham from the Rectory of East Lexham so as to constitute each of them a separate Benefice, with Cure of Souls for ecclesiastical purposes only, and in accordance with the Statement of Circumstances above referred to we recommend that immediately the separation of the Rectory of Litcham from the Rectory of East Lexham takes effect and it becomes a separate Benefice under the provisions of the Act 1 and 2 Victoria, cap. 106, in pursuance of the twenty-third Section of the said Act there shall be transferred from the endowment of the said Rectory of East Lexham to the said Rectory of Litcham the sum of £106 15s. 6d. apportioned Tithe Rent Charge (the particulars of which are given in the Schedule annexed to the aforementioned Statement of Circumstances), and that the same shall be annexed to and belong to the separated Rectory of Litcham until the next avoidance thereof, and then the said sum of £106 15s. 6d. shall revert and again form part of the endowment of East Lexham aforesaid, and all other the endowments and emolu-

ments belonging or arising within the limits of each of the said Benefices shall remain attached thereto respectively."

"RANDALL, CANTUAR."

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said United Benefice consisting of the Rectory of Litcham and the Rectory of East Lexham, situate in the County of Norfolk, and Diocese of Norwich, shall be disunited by separating the said Rectory of Litcham from the said Rectory of East Lexham.

And His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is further pleased, on the recommendation of the said Archbishop, with the consent of the Patron, to order that all the endowments and emoluments arising within the limits of each of the said Benefices shall be attached thereto respectively with the exception following, namely, two sums of apportioned Tithe Rent Charge of £18 8s. 6d. and £88 7s., making together £106 15s. 6d., subject to all outgoings payable in respect thereof, shall be transferred from the endowment of the said Rectory of East Lexham to the said Rectory of Litcham, and shall be annexed and belong to the separated Rectory of Litcham until the next avoidance thereof, and then the said sum of £106 15s. 6d. apportioned Tithe Rent Charge shall, subject as aforesaid, revert and again form part of the endowment of the said Rectory of East Lexham.

And His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice aforesaid, is further pleased to direct that each of the said Benefices shall, subject as aforesaid, bear its own charges and outgoings.

The following Statutes, made by the Governing Body of King's College, Cambridge, on the 13th day of June, 1914, and sealed on the 14th day of September, 1914, have been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of their having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions of "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877."

A STATUTE to alter a Statute made by the Commissioners appointed under The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, (40 and 41 Victoria, Chapter 48), in relation to The King's College of Our Lady and Saint Nicholas in Cambridge, and amended by a Statute, dated the 4th day of March, 1886, duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College, specially summoned for this purpose, held on the 13th day of June, 1914, and passed at such Meeting by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting, and submitted for the approval of His Majesty the King in Council.

WHEREAS by Statute C, Chapter I, made by the Commissioners under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, (40 and 41

Victoria, Chapter 48), in relation to the King's College of Our Lady and Saint Nicholas in Cambridge, as amended by Statute dated the 4th day of March, 1886, and approved by His Majesty the King in Council on the 25th day of March, 1887, it is enacted as follows:

“CHAPTER I.

“*Annual Officers.*

“1. The Annual Officers of the College shall be the Vice-Provost, the Dean or Deans, the Bursars, the Librarian, and the holders of any other annual offices which may from time to time be created by the Annual Congregation.

2. The Vice-Provost shall be elected every year from among the Fellows who are members of the Governing Body. His duty shall be to attend, under the Provost, to the good government of the College, according to the Statutes thereof, to act as the Provost's Deputy in his absence, and to perform all such other acts as are prescribed by these Statutes or as may from time to time be prescribed by the Governing Body. During term he shall reside in College and shall not be absent therefrom, at the same time with the Provost, except for grave cause. In case of his absence at any time, or in case of a vacancy in the Office, the Senior Fellow in residence who is a Member of the Council shall exercise the powers and perform the duties of Vice-Provost.

3. Either one or two Deans, as the Annual Congregation shall from time to time determine, shall be elected every year from among the Fellows who are Members of the Governing Body. The duty of a Dean shall be to provide for the solemn and decorous performance of Divine Worship in the College Chapel, in conformity with such regulations as may from time to time be made by the Governing Body, to maintain discipline and good order among such members of the College as are *in statu pupillari*, and to perform such other acts as are prescribed by these statutes, or as may from time to time be prescribed by the Governing Body. The Dean, or, if there be two Deans, one at least of the Deans, shall reside in College during term, and at such other times as the Annual Congregation shall from time to time prescribe.

4. Either two or three Bursars, as the Annual Congregation shall from time to time determine, shall be elected every year. The Bursars shall have the care of the property of the College, receive all rents and moneys due to the College, and make such payments, under the orders of the Governing Body, as may be due from the same. They shall superintend the buildings, offices, courts and gardens of the College, and provide, under the orders of the Governing Body, for their maintenance and repair. The several departments of these duties shall be distributed among the Bursars according to such regulations as shall from time to time be made by the Annual Congregation. The moneys of the College which shall be received by the Bursars, and shall not be required for immediate College purposes, shall be kept by them in some bank or banks, or otherwise invested according to the orders of the Governing Body, and no loan or temporary or other investment shall be made by them unless in conformity with such orders. The Bursar who has the sole or principal

charge of the internal arrangements of the College shall reside in College during term.

5. Any change in the number of Deans or Bursars shall be made only after due notice (as defined in Statute D II. 6) of the intention to propose such change.

6. The Librarian shall be elected every year. He shall have the care of the College Library, and shall exercise such powers and perform such duties in connexion therewith as may from time to time be conferred or imposed upon him by the Governing Body.

7. The Annual Congregation may, from time to time, create any new annual Offices which they may think necessary for the more efficient management of the affairs of the College, or for the better enforcement of its discipline; provided that such Offices may be abolished by the same authority, and that the duties of them may, from time to time, be varied by the Governing Body.”

AND WHEREAS it appears to us, the Provost and Scholars of the said College (being the Governing Body thereof) that it is expedient to alter the said Statute C, Chapter I, in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, we, the Provost and Scholars of the said College, do hereby, in exercise of the powers given us by the 54th section of the said Act, alter and amend Chapter I of the said Statute C, hereinbefore set out, by substituting therefor the following (that is to say)

“CHAPTER I.

“*Annual Officers.*

“1. The Annual Officers of the College shall be the Vice-Provost, the Dean or Deans, the Bursars, the Librarian, and the holders of any other annual Offices which may from time to time be created by the Annual Congregation.

2. The Vice-Provost shall be elected every year from among the Fellows who are Members of the Governing Body. His duty shall be to attend, under the Provost, to the good government of the College, according to the Statutes thereof, to act as the Provost's Deputy in his absence, and to perform all such other acts as are prescribed by these Statutes, or as may, from time to time, be prescribed by the Governing Body. During term he shall reside in College unless the Governing Body shall otherwise determine, and shall not be absent therefrom, at the same time with the Provost, except for grave cause. In case of his absence at any time, or in case of a vacancy in the Office, the Senior Fellow in residence who is a Member of the Council shall exercise the powers and perform the duties of Vice-Provost.

3. Either one or two Deans, as the Annual Congregation shall from time to time determine, shall be elected every year from among the Fellows who are Members of the Governing Body. The duty of a Dean shall be to provide for the solemn and decorous performance of Divine Worship in the College Chapel, in conformity with such regulations as may from time to time be made by the Governing Body, to maintain discipline and good order among such Members of the College as are *in statu pupillari*, and to perform such other acts as are prescribed by these statutes, or as may

from time to time be prescribed by the Governing Body. The Dean, or, if there be two Deans, one at least of the Deans, shall reside in College during term, and at such other times as the Annual Congregation shall from time to time prescribe.

4. Either two or three Bursars, as the Annual Congregation shall, from time to time, determine, shall be elected every year. The Bursars shall have the care of the property of the College, receive all rents and moneys due to the College and make such payments, under the orders of the Governing Body, as may be due from the same. They shall superintend the buildings, offices, courts and gardens of the College, and provide, under the orders of the Governing Body, for their maintenance and repair. The several departments of these duties shall be distributed among the Bursars according to such regulations as shall from time to time be made by the Annual Congregation. The moneys of the College, which shall be received by the Bursars, and shall not be required for immediate College purposes, shall be kept by them in some bank or banks, or otherwise invested according to the orders of the Governing Body, and no loan or temporary or other investment shall be made by them unless in conformity with such orders.

5. Any change in the number of Deans or Bursars shall be made only after due notice (as defined in Statute D II. 6) of the intention to propose such change.

6. The Librarian shall be elected every year. He shall have the care of the College Library, and shall exercise such powers and perform such duties in connection therewith as may from time to time be conferred or imposed upon him by the Governing Body.

7. The Annual Congregation may from time to time create any new annual Offices which they may think necessary for the more efficient management of the affairs of the College, or for the better enforcement of its discipline; provided that such Offices may be abolished by the same authority, and that the duties of them may, from time to time, be varied by the Governing Body.

8. Subject to the provisions of the foregoing sections, the Annual Congregation may, from time to time, make regulations governing the residence of any of the Annual Officers."

A STATUTE to alter a Statute made by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, (40 and 41 Victoria, Chapter 48.), in relation to the King's College of Our Lady and Saint Nicholas in Cambridge, and amended by a Statute dated the 3rd day of December, 1909, duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College, specially summoned for this purpose, held on the 13th day of June, 1914, and passed at such Meeting by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting, and submitted for the approval of His Majesty the King in Council.

WHEREAS by Statute E Chapter II made by the Commissioners under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, (40 and 41 Victoria, Chapter 48.), in relation to the King's College of Our Lady and Saint Nicholas in Cambridge as amended by Statute dated the 3rd day of December, 1909, and approved by His Majesty the King in Council on the 19th day of July, 1910, it is enacted as follows:

" CHAPTER II.

" Conditions of Eligibility.

" 1. The Fellows shall be elected from among the Graduate Members of the College, who shall not have completed seven years from the 25th day of March next preceding the date of their commencing residence in the University.

2. Provided that a Congregation may, at any time, by the vote of an actual majority of the whole Governing Body, direct that all or any of the vacant Fellowships shall, either for the then ensuing year or thenceforth until otherwise determined, be open to all Graduate Members of the University not exceeding the standing mentioned in the first section of this chapter, and also, if thought advisable, to all Graduate Members of the University of Oxford of the like standing.

3. Provided further that in the case of Graduate Members of the College or of the University, who have entered the University as Advanced Students, or who have not kept the residence and passed the examinations generally required by the University for the first degree, the Governing Body shall determine from time to time the period and conditions of eligibility for a Fellowship.

4. Provided further that the Governing Body may direct that in any specified year one or more vacant Fellowships shall be open in the first instance only to persons who have entered the University as Advanced Students, and who are of sufficient merit for election, subject to any conditions as to eligibility or manner of election that they think fit; and may for that year exclude such persons from eligibility to any Fellowships which are open to other candidates.

5. Provided further that the electors may in any year elect to one vacant Fellowship any person not satisfying the conditions for the time being required, whom they shall consider specially fit to be a Fellow of the College as a place of education, religion, learning, and research; and may, if previously authorized thereto by the Governing Body, make it at the time of election a condition that the Fellow so elected shall accept any College office to which he shall be elected or appointed within one year after becoming a Fellow, and shall hold such office until he shall be released from the obligation so to do, either by an express vote of the Governing Body or by his not being re-elected or re-appointed to such office, or until he has become entitled to retain his Fellowship for life: provided also that on any breach of such condition the Fellowship shall become vacant.

6. At every election of Fellows, every person qualified under the first section of this chapter and not coming under the provisions of the third section shall be deemed to be a candidate; and the Governing Body may from time to time

determine what shall be held to constitute a person a candidate under the second, third, fourth, and fifth sections of this chapter, and make regulations restricting the number of Fellowships which may be filled under the provisions of the fifth section of this chapter, and imposing conditions of eligibility for candidates under the same section."

AND WHEREAS it appears to us, the Provost and Scholars of the said College, (being the Governing Body thereof), that it is expedient to alter the said Statute E, Chapter II, in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, we the Provost and Scholars of the said College do hereby in exercise of the powers given us by the 54th section of the said Act alter and amend Chapter II of the said Statute E hereinbefore set out by substituting therefor the following (that is to say)

"CHAPTER II.

"Conditions of Eligibility.

"1. The Fellows shall be elected from among the Graduate Members of the College, who shall not have completed seven years from the 25th day of March next preceding the date of their commencing residence in the University.

2. Provided that a Congregation may, at any time, by the vote of an actual majority of the whole Governing Body, direct that all or any of the vacant Fellowships shall, either for the then ensuing year or thenceforth until otherwise determined, be open to all Graduate Members of the University not exceeding the standing mentioned in the first section of this chapter, and also, if thought advisable, to all Graduate Members of the University of Oxford of the like standing.

3. Provided further that in the case of Graduate Members of the College or of the University, who have entered the University as Research Students, or who have not kept the residence and passed the examinations generally required by the University for the first degree, the Governing Body shall determine from time to time the period and conditions of eligibility for a Fellowship.

4. Provided further that the Governing Body may direct that in any specified year one or more vacant Fellowships shall be open in the first instance only to persons who have entered the University as Research Students and who are of sufficient merit for election, subject to any conditions as to eligibility or manner of election that they think fit; and may for that year exclude such persons from eligibility to any Fellowships which are open to other candidates.

5. Provided further that the electors may, at any time, either at an annual election of Fellows, or at a meeting of the electors held for the purpose of an election under this section, elect to a vacant Fellowship any person not satisfying the conditions for the time being required, whom they shall consider specially fit to be a Fellow of the College as a place of education, religion, learning, and research; and may, if previously authorized thereto by the Governing Body, make it at the time of election a condition that the Fellow so elected shall accept any College office to which he shall be elected or appointed within one year after becoming a Fellow, and shall hold such office

until he shall be released from the obligation so to do, either by an express vote of the Governing Body or by his not being re-elected or re-appointed to such office, or until he has become entitled to retain his Fellowship for life: provided also that on any breach of such condition the Fellowship shall become vacant.

6. At every annual election of Fellows every person qualified under the first section of this chapter, and not coming under the provisions of the third section, shall be deemed to be a candidate; and the Governing Body may from time to time determine what shall be held to constitute a person a candidate under the second, third, and fourth sections of this chapter. The Governing Body may also from time to time make regulations restricting the number of Fellowships which may be filled under the provisions of the fifth section of this chapter, and imposing conditions of eligibility for candidates under the same section."

A STATUTE to alter a Statute made by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, (40 and 41 Victoria, Chapter 48.), in relation to the King's College of Our Lady and Saint Nicholas in Cambridge, duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College, specially summoned for this purpose, held on the 13th day of June, 1914, and passed at such Meeting by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting, and submitted for the approval of His Majesty the King in Council.

WHEREAS by Statute E Chapter III made by the Commissioners under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, (40 and 41 Victoria, Chapter 48.), in relation to the King's College of Our Lady and Saint Nicholas in Cambridge it is enacted as follows:

"CHAPTER III.

"Election of Fellows.

"1. All vacancies in the Fellowships shall be filled up at the next annual election of Fellows: provided that the Annual Congregation may, so often as they think fit, order that, if at the election of Fellows then next ensuing the number of vacant Fellowships shall exceed two, one of such Fellowships shall be suspended for a definite period not exceeding six years, and the Dividend of such suspended Fellowship shall be applied, during its suspension, to the payment of Lecturers or to other educational purposes.

2. At any election a Fellowship, which is not actually vacant, but which, so far as can be then foreseen, will be vacated on or before the first day of the Michaelmas Term then next following, may be treated as a vacant Fellowship.

3. An annual election of Fellows shall take place at such time as the Annual Congregation shall from time to time appoint.

4. The intellectual qualifications of the candidates and their proficiency in any branch or branches of the University studies shall be ascertained in such manner as the Governing Body shall determine. The electors shall choose in each case that candidate (being otherwise duly qualified) whom they shall think most fit to be a Fellow of the College as a place of education, religion, learning, and research, but they shall not be bound to elect any candidate whom they shall not consider of sufficient merit for election.

5. The electors to Fellowships shall be the Provost, the Vice-Provost, and at least seven other Fellows, to be annually appointed by the Governing Body.

6. No person shall vote at any election of Fellows who has not taken part in ascertaining the qualifications and proficiency of the candidates.

7. Before proceeding to make their election, the electors shall severally make the following declaration:—

‘I do solemnly declare that I will vote for those candidates who are [that candidate who is] in my judgment the most fit to be Fellows [a Fellow] of the College, as a place of education, religion, learning, and research.’

8. No candidate shall be elected a Fellow without the concurrence of at least one half of the electors present at the election; the Provost, or in his absence the Vice-Provost, or, in the absence of both, the Senior Fellow present, having a second or casting vote in case of an equality of votes. If, for the want of such concurrence, a Fellowship shall remain vacant the dividend thereof shall be applied to the purposes mentioned in the first section of this chapter.

9. Within fifteen days after the election, the Provost, or in his absence the Vice-Provost, and at least four of the Fellows, shall meet in the College Chapel and shall call upon the several Fellows elect to make the following declaration:—

‘I, *M. N.*, elected a Fellow of this College, do solemnly declare that I will observe all the Statutes of the College, and will endeavour to the utmost of my power to promote the interests of the College, as a place of education, religion, learning, and research.’

10. After this declaration the Fellow elect shall be admitted to the Fellowship by the Provost, or in his absence the Vice-Provost, and shall enter upon the emoluments of the same as from the day of his election, provided that any person elected to a Fellowship under the second section of this chapter shall not be entitled to any emolument thereof until the same has become actually vacant.

11. If any person elected a Fellow shall be prevented by illness or other grave cause from being admitted within the fifteen days aforesaid, it shall be lawful to admit him at some later time, on his making the declaration hereinbefore provided.”

AND WHEREAS it appears to us the Provost and Scholars of the said College (being the Governing Body thereof) that it is expedient

to alter the said Statute E Chapter III in manner hereinafter appearing:—

Now, therefore, we the Provost and Scholars of the said College do hereby in exercise of the powers given us by the 54th section of the said Act alter and amend Chapter III of the said Statute E hereinbefore set out by substituting therefor the following (that is to say)

“ CHAPTER III.

“ Election of Fellows.

“ 1. An annual election of Fellows shall take place at such time as the Annual Congregation shall from time to time appoint. At this election all vacancies in the Fellowships shall be filled up, except as hereinafter provided.

2. The Annual Congregation may, so often as they think fit, order that if at the annual election of Fellows then next ensuing the number of vacant Fellowships shall exceed two, one of such Fellowships shall be suspended for a definite period not exceeding six years, and the dividend of such suspended Fellowship shall be applied, during its suspension, to the payment of Lecturers or to other educational purposes.

'I, M. N., elected a Fellow of this College, do solemnly declare that I will observe all the Statutes of the College, and will endeavour to the utmost of my power to promote the interests of the College, as a place of education, religion, learning, and research.'

10. After this declaration the Fellow elect shall be admitted to the Fellowship by the Provost, or in his absence the Vice-Provost, and shall enter upon the emoluments of the same as from the day of his election, provided that any person elected to a Fellowship under the third section of this chapter shall not be entitled to any emolument thereof until the same has become actually vacant.

11. If any person elected a Fellow shall be prevented by illness or other grave cause from being admitted within the fifteen days aforesaid, it shall be lawful to admit him at some later time, on his making the declaration hereinbefore provided."

A STATUTE to alter a Statute made by the Commissioners appointed under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, (40 and 41 Victoria, Chapter 48.), in relation to the King's College of Our Lady and Saint Nicholas in Cambridge, and amended by a Statute dated the 19th day of December, 1902, duly made at a General Meeting of the Governing Body of the said College, specially summoned for this purpose, held on the 13th day of June, 1914, and passed at such Meeting by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting and submitted for the approval of His Majesty the King in Council.

WHEREAS by Statute F made by the Commissioners under the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, (40 and 41 Victoria, Chapter 48.), in relation to the King's College of Our Lady and Saint Nicholas in Cambridge as amended by Statute dated the 19th day of December, 1902, and approved by His Majesty the King in Council on the 10th day of August, 1903, it is enacted as follows:—

"1. There shall be forty-eight Foundation Scholarships in the College, of which twenty-four shall be called Eton Scholarships, and twenty-four shall be called Open Scholarships. The Honorary Foundation Scholarships mentioned in Section 21 (a) of this Statute and the Laurence Saunders Scholarship shall not be reckoned in this number; but they shall be deemed to be Foundation Scholarships.

2. Both the Eton and the Open Scholarships shall be divided into Entrance and Undergraduate Scholarships.

3. An Entrance Scholarship shall be tenable in the first instance for two years, but may be prolonged by the Council for a further period or further periods; provided that the total period of prolongation shall in no case exceed two years, the tenure being in each case reckoned from the first day of the term in which the holder of the Scholarship was admitted a Scholar. Any Entrance Scholarship shall be vacated by the election of the holder to an Undergraduate Scholarship or to a Fellowship.

4. An Undergraduate Scholarship shall be tenable until the holder completes five years from the 25th day of March next preceding the date of his commencing residence in the University. But such a Scholarship may be prolonged by the Council for a further period or further periods; provided that the total period of prolongation shall in no case exceed two years. Any Undergraduate Scholarship shall be vacated by the election of the holder to a Fellowship.

5. No Scholarship shall be tenable with any office or emolument on the foundation of any other College in the University, or of any College in the University of Oxford, or of Trinity College, Dublin.

6. Every candidate for a Scholarship, not being already a member of the College, shall bring a satisfactory certificate of moral character.

7. The time and manner of examinations for Scholarships, and the day or days of election and admission thereto, shall from time to time be fixed by the Governing Body.

8. At any election a Scholarship which is, not actually vacant, but which will necessarily be vacated on or before the first day of the Michaelmas Term then next following, may be treated as a vacant Scholarship.

9. The electors to Scholarships shall be the Provost, or in his absence the Vice-Provost, and two or more Fellows to be appointed annually by the Council, who may also appoint any examiners to assist the electors. And notwithstanding anything contained in Statute D. III. 3, the electors to Scholarships shall award all Exhibitions which are offered at any examination for Entrance Scholarships.

10. The manner of electing to Scholarships and all proceedings relating to the election shall be in the discretion of the electors; provided that no candidate shall be elected a Scholar without the concurrence of at least one-half of the electors present, the Provost, or in his absence the Vice-Provost, or, in the absence of both, the senior elector present, having a second or casting vote in case of an equality of votes; provided also that no person shall vote at an election to Entrance Scholarships who has not taken part in the examination for the same.

11. The electors shall not be bound to elect to a Scholarship any candidate whom they shall not consider of sufficient merit for election; and they shall have power to require from any candidate a declaration that he intends to devote himself exclusively to the studies of the University during the whole of the time preceding his admission to his first degree, or such other declaration as to his intention as they may think desirable.

12. Every candidate elected to a Scholar-

ship shall be admitted a Scholar at such time as shall be prescribed by the Governing Body, and shall thereupon be entitled to the emoluments of his Scholarship, which emoluments shall commence in the case of an Entrance Scholarship from the first day of the term in which the Scholar is admitted, and in the case of an Undergraduate Scholarship from the day of election; provided that no holder of an Entrance Scholarship shall, upon election to an Undergraduate Scholarship, be required to be again admitted a Scholar; provided also that any person elected to a Scholarship under the eighth section of this Statute shall not be entitled to any emolument thereof, until the same has become actually vacant.

13. The Governing Body shall from time to time make such regulations as they shall think proper with respect to the University and College examinations that the scholars shall be required to undergo, and with respect to their residence and studies; and any Scholar who shall fail to conform to such regulations, or shall not make reasonable progress in his studies, may be deprived by the Council of his Scholarship, or of the whole or part of the pecuniary emoluments of the same.

14. Every Scholar shall proceed to his degree of Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Laws, or to some equal degree, at his regular time, except with the approval of the Council, given for illness or other grave cause, and any Scholar failing so to proceed may be deprived of his Scholarship by the Council.

15. The following regulations shall apply to Eton Scholarships subject to the provisions of Section 18 of this Statute:

(a) At least six Foundation Scholarships shall be offered every year, of which at least four shall be offered as Entrance Scholarships, but it shall not be necessary to offer more than six Foundation Scholarships in any year, and, subject thereto, the Council shall determine in each year how many Foundation Scholarships shall be offered in that year, and what number shall be offered as Entrance and Undergraduate Scholarships respectively.

(b) The Entrance Scholarships shall be open to all candidates receiving education at Eton School, whether on the foundation or not, who at the commencement of the academical year in which the examination is held are under nineteen years of age, or such less age as shall from time to time be fixed by the Annual Congregation with the consent of the Governing Body of Eton School.

(c) The Undergraduate Scholarships shall be open to all Undergraduates of the College who have been educated at Eton School, whether on the foundation or not, until the expiration of four years from the twenty-fifth day of March next preceding the date of their commencing residence in the University.

(d) The pecuniary emoluments of an Eton Foundation Scholarship shall be such sum, not less than eighty pounds per annum, as the Annual Congregation shall from time to time determine. Provided that when any Eton Undergraduate Scholarship is prolonged the Council may reduce the emoluments of the same.

(e) Whenever any Eton Entrance Foundation Scholarship offered for competition is not awarded, the electors may elect a candidate

who possesses the qualifications required by Section 15 (b) of this Statute to an Eton Entrance Scholarship of less value, which shall be called an Eton Minor Scholarship.

(f) The Council may decide in the case of any Eton Foundation Scholar or Eton Minor Scholar that his tuition fee, or the rent of his rooms, or both, shall be paid out of the Exhibition Fund, if, in their opinion, the Scholar stands in need of such assistance.

16. The following regulations shall apply to Open Scholarships, exclusive of the Laurence Saunders Scholarship, subject to the provisions of Section 17 of this Statute:—

(a) At least six Foundation Scholarships shall be offered every year, but it shall not be necessary to offer more than six in any year, and subject thereto the Council shall determine in each year how many Foundation Scholarships shall be offered in that year, and what numbers shall be offered as Entrance and Undergraduate Scholarships respectively.

(b) The Entrance Scholarships shall be open to all candidates who at the commencement of the academical year in which the examination is held are under nineteen years of age, or such less age as shall from time to time be fixed by the Annual Congregation.

(c) The Undergraduate Scholarships shall be open to all Undergraduates of the College until the expiration of four years from the twenty-fifth day of March next preceding the date of their commencing residence in the University, provided that the Governing Body may in any year declare that any or all of the Undergraduate Scholarships to be offered in that year shall be open to all Undergraduates of the University.

(d) The emoluments of an Open Entrance Foundation Scholarship for the first two years shall be such sum, not exceeding eighty pounds per annum, inclusive of rent of rooms and all allowances, as the Annual Congregation shall from time to time determine. The pecuniary emoluments of an Open Entrance Foundation Scholarship, after the first two years, if the Scholarship be prolonged, and of an Open Undergraduate Scholarship, shall be such sum as the Annual Congregation shall from time to time determine. Provided that when any Open Undergraduate Scholarship is prolonged the Council may reduce the emoluments of the same.

(e) Whenever any Open Entrance Foundation Scholarship offered for competition is not awarded, the electors may elect a candidate who possesses the qualifications required by Section 16 (b) of this Statute to an Entrance Scholarship of less value, which shall be called an Open Minor Scholarship.

(f) The Governing Body in each year shall determine what number, if any, of Open Minor Scholarships shall be offered for competition, in addition to any which may be awarded under Section 16 (e) of this Statute.

(g) The Council may decide in the case of any Open Foundation Scholar or Open Minor Scholar that his tuition fee shall be paid out of the Exhibition Fund, if, in their opinion, the Scholar stands in need of such assistance.

17. If at any election to Entrance Scholarships a candidate who is eligible for an Eton Scholarship shall be elected to an Open Foundation Scholarship, he shall be entitled to tuition

free during his tenure of the Scholarship, and of any Scholarship to which he may subsequently be elected, together with rooms rent-free until he takes his first degree, in addition to the pecuniary emoluments mentioned in Section 16 of this Statute; and the Council may assign rooms rent-free to any such Scholar after taking his first degree, if he shall, with their permission, reside in College.

18. If at any election to Scholarships a candidate who is eligible for an Eton Scholarship be elected to an Open Foundation Scholarship, then and in every such case one of the Eton Scholarships then offered shall not be awarded, and an Open Foundation Scholarship may be awarded in addition to those then offered; provided that, for the purpose of Sections 1 and 22 of this Statute, such Scholarship shall be counted as an Eton Scholarship.

19. At any election to Entrance Scholarships the electors may award one or more Eton Exhibitions each of a value not less than £40 a year, tenable for two years, to candidates receiving education at Eton School, and standing in need of pecuniary assistance in order to obtain a University education; provided that the whole sum so awarded at any election shall not exceed the amount of the pecuniary emoluments for one year of the Eton Foundation Scholarships then offered and not awarded, except in accordance with Section 18 of this Statute, less the amount of the pecuniary emoluments for one year of any Minor Scholarships awarded under Section 15 (c).

20. The Governing Body may, from time to time, make regulations as to the principles on which the Council shall prolong Undergraduate Scholarships and fix the pecuniary emoluments of the same.

21 (a). Any candidate for an Entrance or Undergraduate Scholarship may signify in writing to the Provost his wish not to receive the emoluments of the same if elected thereto, and he may thereupon be elected either to an Honorary Foundation Scholarship or to an Honorary Minor Scholarship.

(b) Any Scholar may at any time signify in writing to the Provost his wish not to receive the pecuniary emoluments of his Scholarship during his tenure of the same, and thereupon such emoluments shall be paid into the Exhibition Fund, and he shall thenceforth be entitled an Honorary Scholar.

(c) Any Scholar may signify in writing to the Provost his wish not to receive the pecuniary emoluments of his Scholarship during any period of his tenure of the same, and thereupon such emoluments shall not be paid to him during such period, but shall be paid into the Exhibition Fund.

22. If under the foregoing provisions of this Statute the number of Eton Foundation Scholarships or of Open Foundation Scholarships be in any year increased beyond twenty-four, then not more than six such Scholarships shall be offered in any subsequent year until their number is again reduced to twenty-four.

23. The provisions of Sections 3, 5, 6, 7, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, of this Statute shall apply in the case of all Entrance Scholarships.

24. If at any time it shall be made to appear to the satisfaction of the Visitor that, owing to any cause, the revenues of the College are, or, without the exercise of the power hereby conferred, would be likely to become insufficient to

meet the charges created by these Statutes without injury to the general interests of the College, it shall be lawful for the Visitor, on a petition in writing presented to him by order of the Governing Body at a Congregation specially summoned for that purpose, to direct that any Eton or Open Scholarship shall be kept vacant and that the number of Scholarships to be offered under Sections 15 and 16 of this Statute shall be reduced, or that the charges created by these Statutes in respect of Scholarships shall be diminished for such limited period as shall seem desirable in the interests of the College.

25. Every person elected to a Scholarship before the day on which this Statute shall come into operation shall hold such Scholarship, and any other Scholarship to which he may be subsequently elected, for the same period and on the same conditions, and the emoluments of such Scholarship or Scholarships shall be the same as if the Statute under which he was first elected had continued in operation."

And whereas it appears to us the Provost and Scholars of the said College (being the Governing Body thereof) that it is expedient to alter the said Statute F in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now, therefore, we the Provost and Scholars of the said College do hereby in exercise of the powers given us by the 54th section of the said Act alter and amend the said Statute F hereinbefore set out by substituting therefor the following (that is to say)

"1. There shall be forty-eight Foundation Scholarships in the College, of which twenty-four shall be called Eton Scholarships, and twenty-four shall be called Open Scholarships. Foundation Scholarships held without emoluments under Section 21 (a) of this Statute and the Laurence Saunders Scholarship shall not be reckoned in this number; but they shall be deemed to be Foundation Scholarships.

2. A Scholarship to which the holder was elected before entering the College shall be called an Entrance Scholarship, and a Scholarship to which the holder was elected after entering the College shall be called a Senior Scholarship.

3. An Entrance Scholarship shall be tenable in the first instance for two years, but may be prolonged by the Council for a further period or further periods; provided that the total period of prolongation shall in no case exceed two years, the tenure being in each case reckoned from the first day of the term in which the holder of the Scholarship was admitted a Scholar. Any Entrance Scholarship shall be vacated by the election of the holder to a Senior Scholarship or to a Fellowship.

4. A Senior Scholarship shall be tenable until the holder completes five years from the 25th day of March next preceding the date of his commencing residence in the University. But such a Scholarship may be prolonged by the Council for a further period or further periods, provided that the total period of prolongation shall in no case exceed two years. Any Senior Scholarship shall be vacated by the election of the holder to a Fellowship.

5. No Scholarship shall be tenable with any office or emolument on the foundation of any other College in the University, or of any College in the University of Oxford, or of Trinity College, Dublin.

6. Every candidate for a Scholarship, not being already a member of the College, shall bring a satisfactory certificate of moral character.

7. The time and manner of examinations for Scholarships, and the day or days of election and admission thereto, shall from time to time be fixed by the Governing Body.

8. At any election a Scholarship which is not actually vacant, but which will necessarily be vacated on or before the first day of the Michaelmas Term then next following, may be treated as a vacant Scholarship.

9. The electors to Scholarships shall be the Provost, or in his absence the Vice-Provost, and two or more Fellows to be appointed annually by the Council, who may also appoint any examiners to assist the electors. And notwithstanding anything contained in Statute D. III. 3, the electors to Scholarships shall award all Exhibitions which are offered at any examination for Entrance Scholarships.

10. The manner of electing to Scholarships and all proceedings relating to the election shall be in the discretion of the electors; provided that no candidate shall be elected a Scholar without the concurrence of at least one-half of the electors present, the Provost, or in his absence the Vice-Provost, or in the absence of both the senior elector present, having a second or casting vote in case of an equality of votes; provided also that no person shall vote at an election to Entrance Scholarships who has not taken part in the examination for the same.

11. The electors shall not be bound to elect to a Scholarship any candidate whom they shall not consider of sufficient merit for election; and they shall have power to require from any candidate a declaration that he intends to devote himself exclusively to the studies of the University during the whole of the time preceding his admission to his first degree, or such other declaration as to his intention as they may think desirable.

12. Every candidate elected to a Scholarship shall be admitted a Scholar at such time as shall be prescribed by the Governing Body, and shall thereupon be entitled to the emoluments of his Scholarship, which emoluments shall commence in the case of an Entrance Scholarship from the first day of the term in which the Scholar is admitted, and in the case of a Senior Scholarship from the day of election: provided that no holder of an Entrance Scholarship shall, upon election to a Senior Scholarship, be required to be again admitted a Scholar; provided also that any person elected to a Scholarship under the eighth section of this Statute shall not be entitled to any emolument thereof, until the same has become actually vacant.

13. The Governing Body shall from time to time make such regulations as they shall think proper with respect to the University and College examinations that the Scholars shall be required to undergo, and with respect to their residence and studies; and any Scholar who shall fail to conform to such regulations, or shall not make reasonable progress in his studies, may be deprived by the Council of his Scholarship, or of the whole or part of the pecuniary emoluments of the same.

14. Every Scholar shall proceed to his degree of Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Laws, or to some equal degree, at his regular time, except with the approval of the Council,

given for illness or other grave cause, and any Scholar failing so to proceed may be deprived of his Scholarship by the Council.

15. The following regulations shall apply to Eton Scholarships subject to the provisions of Section 18 of this Statute:—

(a) At least six Foundation Scholarships shall be offered every year, of which at least four shall be offered as Entrance Scholarships, but it shall not be necessary to offer more than six Foundation Scholarships in any year, and, subject thereto, the Council shall determine in each year how many Foundation Scholarships shall be offered in that year, and what number shall be offered as Entrance and Senior Scholarships respectively.

(b) The Entrance Scholarships shall be open to all candidates who were receiving education at Eton School, whether on the foundation or not, within three months of the commencement of the academical year in which the examination is held, and who at the commencement of the academical year in which the examination is held are under nineteen years of age, or such less age as shall from time to time be fixed by the Annual Congregation with the consent of the Governing Body of Eton School.

(c) The Senior Scholarships shall be open to all resident members of the College who have been educated at Eton School, whether on the foundation or not, until the expiration of five years from the twenty-fifth day of March next preceding the date of their commencing residence in the University.

(d) The pecuniary emoluments of an Eton Foundation Scholarship shall be such sum, not less than eighty pounds per annum, as the Annual Congregation shall from time to time determine. Provided that when any Eton Senior Scholarship is prolonged the Council may reduce the emoluments of the same.

(e) Whenever any Eton Entrance Foundation Scholarship offered for competition is not awarded, the electors may elect a candidate who possesses the qualifications required by Section 15 (b) of this Statute to an Eton Entrance Scholarship of less value, which shall be called an Eton Minor Scholarship.

(f) The Council may decide in the case of any Eton Foundation Scholar or Eton Minor Scholar that his tuition fee, or the rent of his rooms, or both, shall be paid out of the Exhibition Fund, if, in their opinion, the Scholar stands in need of such assistance.

16. The following regulations shall apply to Open Scholarships, exclusive of the Laurence Saunders Scholarship, subject to the provisions of Section 17 of this Statute:—

(a) At least six Foundation Scholarships shall be offered every year, but it shall not be necessary to offer more than six in any year, and, subject thereto, the Council shall determine in each year how many Foundation Scholarships shall be offered in that year, and what numbers shall be offered as Entrance and Senior Scholarships respectively.

(b) The Entrance Scholarships shall be open to all candidates who at the commencement of the academical year in which the examination is held are under nineteen years of age, or such less age as shall from time to time be fixed by the Annual Congregation.

(c) The Senior Scholarships shall be open to all resident members of the College until the expiration of five years from the twenty-fifth day of March next preceding the date of their

commencing residence in the University, provided that the Governing Body may in any year declare that any or all of the Senior Scholarships to be offered in that year shall be open to all Undergraduates of the University.

(d) The emoluments of an Open Entrance Foundation Scholarship for the first two years shall be such sum, not exceeding eighty pounds per annum, inclusive of rent of rooms and all allowances, as the Annual Congregation shall from time to time determine. The pecuniary emoluments of an Open Entrance Foundation Scholarship, after the first two years, if the Scholarship be prolonged, and of an Open Senior Scholarship, shall be such sum as the Annual Congregation shall from time to time determine. Provided that when any Open Senior Scholarship is prolonged the Council may reduce the emoluments of the same.

(e) Whenever any Open Entrance Foundation Scholarship offered for competition is not awarded, the electors may elect a candidate who possesses the qualifications required by Section 16 (b) of this Statute to an Entrance Scholarship of less value, which shall be called an Open Minor Scholarship.

(f) The Governing Body in each year shall determine what number, if any, of Open Minor Scholarships shall be offered for competition, in addition to any which may be awarded under Section 16 (e) of this Statute.

(g) The Council may decide in the case of any Open Foundation Scholar or Open Minor Scholar that his tuition fee shall be paid out of the Exhibition Fund, if, in their opinion, the Scholar stands in need of such assistance.

17. If at any election to Entrance Scholarships a candidate who is eligible for an Eton Scholarship shall be elected to an Open Foundation Scholarship, he shall be entitled to tuition free during his tenure of the Scholarship, and of any Scholarship to which he may subsequently be elected, together with rooms rent-free until he takes his first degree, in addition to the pecuniary emoluments mentioned in Section 16 of this Statute; and the Council may assign rooms rent-free to any such Scholar after taking his first degree, if he shall, with their permission, reside in College.

18. If at any election to Scholarships a candidate who is eligible for an Eton Scholarship be elected to an Open Foundation Scholarship, then and in every such case one of the Eton Scholarships then offered shall not be awarded, and an Open Foundation Scholarship may be awarded in addition to those then offered; provided that, for the purpose of Sections 1 and 22 of this Statute, such Scholarship shall be counted as an Eton Scholarship.

19. At any election to Entrance Scholarships the electors may award one or more Eton Exhibitions each of a value not less than £40 a year, tenable for two years, to candidates receiving education at Eton School, and standing in need of pecuniary assistance in order to obtain a University education; provided that the whole sum so awarded at any election shall not exceed the amount of the pecuniary emoluments for one year of the Eton Foundation Scholarships then offered and not awarded, except in accordance with Section 18 of this Statute, less the amount of the pecuniary emoluments for one year of any Minor Scholarships awarded under Section 15 (e).

20. The Governing Body may, from time to time, make regulations as to the principles on which the Council shall prolong Senior Scholar-

ships and fix the pecuniary emoluments of the same.

21 (a). Any candidate for a Scholarship, whether a Foundation Scholarship or a Minor Scholarship, may signify in writing to the Provost his wish not to receive the emoluments of the same if elected thereto, and he may thereupon be elected to a Scholarship without emoluments.

(b) Any Scholar may at any time signify in writing to the Provost his wish not to receive the pecuniary emoluments of his Scholarship during his tenure of the same, and thereupon such emoluments shall be paid into the Exhibition Fund.

(c) Any Scholar may signify in writing to the Provost his wish not to receive the pecuniary emoluments of his Scholarship during any period of his tenure of the same, and thereupon such emoluments shall not be paid to him during such period, but shall be paid into the Exhibition Fund.

22. If under the foregoing provisions of this Statute the number of Eton Foundation Scholarships or of Open Foundation Scholarships be in any year increased beyond twenty-four, then not more than six such Scholarships shall be offered in any subsequent year until their number is again reduced to twenty-four.

23. The provisions of Sections 3, 5, 6, 7, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, of this Statute shall apply in the case of all Entrance Scholarships.

24. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Statute the Annual Congregation may from time to time make regulations reducing the periods of eligibility to Scholarships and of the tenure of Scholarships in the case of Research Students and Affiliated Students, and any other students who are under special regulations with regard to the period of residence required for a degree.

25. If at any time it shall be made to appear to the satisfaction of the Visitor that, owing to any cause, the revenues of the College are, or, without the exercise of the power hereby conferred, would be likely to become insufficient to meet the charges created by these Statutes without injury to the general interests of the College, it shall be lawful for the Visitor, on a petition in writing presented to him by order of the Governing Body at a Congregation specially summoned for that purpose, to direct that any Eton or Open Scholarship shall be kept vacant and that the number of Scholarships to be offered under Sections 15 and 16 of this Statute shall be reduced, or that the charges created by these Statutes in respect of Scholarships shall be diminished for such limited period as shall seem desirable in the interests of the College.

26. Every person elected to a Scholarship before the day on which this Statute shall come into operation shall hold such Scholarship, and any other Scholarship to which he may be subsequently elected, for the same period and on the same conditions, and the emoluments of such Scholarship or Scholarships shall be the same as if the Statute under which he was first elected had continued in operation."

VESSELS DETAINED OR CAPTURED BY THE FRENCH NAVAL AUTHORITIES.

With reference to the notices which appeared in the Supplementary London Gazette of the 12th inst. and the London Gazette of the 22nd inst. on this subject, His Majesty's Government have now received from the French Ambassador a copy of a notification which was published in the Journal Officiel of the 10th inst., and of which the following is a translation:—

"All persons having any interest in cargoes other than enemy cargoes laden on enemy ships captured and brought into French ports, and requiring a release of such cargoes or portion of cargoes, should make inquiries of the 'Préfet Maritime' of the district in which the ship is detained.

"The 'Préfet Maritime' will, through the intermediary of the 'Commissaire Chef du Service de la Solde' or his representative, require proof of ownership and particulars as to freight, whether paid or unpaid."

In cases where the title of the subjects or citizens of the allied or neutral States is clear and established without doubt to the satisfaction of the "Préfet Maritime," such cargoes or portions of cargoes will be released with as little delay as possible, provided that no question of contraband arises, and subject to the adjustment of any matters relating to freight or other charges falling on the cargo. In doubtful cases recourse to the ordinary Prize Court procedure will be necessary."

With regard to cases which come before the French Prize Court established at Bordeaux (21 Rue Vauban), the French Ambassador states that the interested parties should present their claims to the Court through the intermediary of an Advocate of the Council of State.

NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE.

The National Health Insurance (Navy and Army Insurance Fund) Order, 1914, dated 22nd September, 1914, made by the Insurance Commissioners under section 78 of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (1 & 2 Geo. 5, c. 55).

Whereas by section 78 of the National Insurance Act, 1911 (in this Order called "the Act"), it is amongst other things provided that if any difficulty arises in bringing Part I. of the Act into operation the Insurance Commissioners (in this Order called "the Commissioners"), with the consent of the Treasury, may by Order do anything which appears to them necessary or expedient for bringing Part I. of the Act into operation, and any such Order may modify the provisions of the Act so far as may appear necessary or expedient for carrying the Order into effect:

And whereas by paragraph (h) of subsection (3) of section 46 of the Act it is provided that a man discharged from service as a seaman, marine, or soldier who proves that the state of his health is such that he cannot obtain admission to an approved society may, if he so elects, on making application to the Commissioners in the prescribed manner within three months of his discharge or such longer time as may be prescribed, become entitled to benefits (other than additional benefits) provided under Part I. of the Act, the cost of which benefits shall be payable out of the Navy and Army Insurance Fund (in this Order called "the Fund"):

And whereas by paragraph B of the First Schedule to the National Insurance Act, 1913, and regulations made thereunder dated the 26th day of May, 1914, and entitled the National Health Insurance (Navy and Army Insurance Fund: Persons of Unsound Mind) Regulations, 1914, it is provided that the Admiralty or Army Council, as the case may require, may, if they think fit, appoint a person to exercise on behalf of any seaman, marine, or soldier being of unsound mind and entitled to become a member of the Fund any right of election which that person is, under the Act, entitled to exercise:

And whereas in certain cases seamen, marines, and soldiers have been discharged from the Navy or Army and by reason of their being of unsound mind at the date of discharge have been unable to make application to the Commissioners to become members of the Fund, until persons could be appointed under the power contained in the said Regulations to elect on their behalf, and in consequence

thereof they have been deprived of benefit during the period between the date of their discharge and the date when the election was made on their behalf, and a difficulty has thereby arisen within the meaning of the said section 78:

Now, therefore, the Insurance Commissioners, in pursuance of the powers conferred on them by the National Insurance Acts, 1911 to 1913, and all other powers enabling them in that behalf, with the consent of the Treasury, hereby order as follows:—

1. Every seaman, marine, or soldier who having been discharged from the Navy or Army while of unsound mind has before the date of this Order been admitted as a member of the Fund and become entitled to benefits out of the Fund, shall be deemed to have made application under paragraph (h) of subsection (3) of section 46 aforesaid on the day following the date of his discharge and to have been entitled to benefits out of the Fund on and after that date.

2. This Order may be cited as the National Health Insurance (Navy and Army Insurance Fund) Order, 1914.

LINCOLNSHIRE (PARTS OF LINDSEY) (FOOT - AND - MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1914 (No. 6).

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Modification of Orders.

1. The Lincolnshire (Parts of Lindsey) (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1914 (No. 4) and the Lincolnshire (Parts of Lindsey) (Foot-and-Mouth Disease) Order of 1914 (No. 5), hereinafter referred to as "Order (No. 4)" and "Order (No. 5)" respectively, are modified in manner hereinafter appearing.

Movement into or within the Prohibited Area No. 1 for immediate slaughter only.

2.—(1.) An animal may be moved by railway or by vessel without a licence from premises not situate within the Scheduled District to a railway station or landing-place situate within the Prohibited Area No. 1 described in the Schedule to Order (No. 5), hereinafter referred to as the "Prohibited Area No. 1"; and an animal so moved may be moved from the railway station or landing-place to any slaughterhouse situate within the Prohibited

Area No. 1 if accompanied by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the railway station or landing-place is situate.

(2.) An animal may also be moved from any premises situate in Zone III or in Zone II, or in Zone I (including the Prohibited Area No. 1), to any slaughterhouse in the Prohibited Area No. 1, if accompanied in each case by a Movement Licence granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the slaughterhouse is situate.

Movement of animals by Licence as regards Prohibited Area No. 2.

3. The Prohibited Area No. 2 described in the Schedule to Order (No. 5) shall cease to be a Prohibited Area.

Movement within Zone I (except Prohibited Area No. 1) for any necessary or expedient purpose.

4. Where an Inspector of the Local Authority considers it necessary or expedient that an animal in his district should be permitted to be moved for any purpose from premises in Zone I (except the Prohibited Area No. 1) to any other premises in that Zone (except the Prohibited Area No. 1), he may authorise such movement by a Movement Licence.

Free movement of animals between Zone II and Zone III, and holding of markets, etc., in Zone II; Movement out of Zones II and III.

5.—(1.) For the purposes of Order (No. 5) Zone II shall be treated as part of Zone III.

(2.) Part III of Order (No. 4), and Articles 4 and 5 (2) of Order (No. 5), are hereby revoked.
