Rome, July 18.

ON the 3d Instant the Pope entered into the third year of his Pontificate, and was thereupon Complimented by the College of Cardinals, and the Foreign Ambassadors. The Emperor's Ambassador is come to Town again from *Frescati*, but does not appear at Court, insisting, in pursuance of the Orders he has received from *Vinna*, to have satisfaction given him concerning the seizing of some of his Servants by the Sbirris or Officers of Justice, and that a stop be put to the Process begun against his Heydukes; but on the other side they seem here resolved to proceed with it.

Venice, July 24. There are Letters come by the way of *Otranto*, which advise, that the Doge *Morosini* arrived at *Napoli di Romania* about the end of the last Month; That he had already taken a Review of the Forces, and was preparing for some great design, having in the mean time detached a Squadron of Men of War to cruise in the *Archipelago*. Another great Convoy is making ready for the *Levant*, on which will be embark'd several new raised Troops who are now at the *Lido*; and 'tis probable they will depart in 4 or 5 days.

Warsaw, July 7. 'Tis said that the King of *Poland* intends to take a Journey some time this Month towards *Prussia*; and that he has sent Orders to the Great Generals of *Poland* and *Lithuania* to draw their Forces together, and to march towards the Frontiers of *Moldavia* to give the Enemy a Diversion, and to hinder the Tartars from sending any considerable Body of their Troops to the assistance of the Turks in *Hungary*. The last Letters from *Lembergh* tell us, that the Crown-General had sent out a strong Detachment of Horse to destroy all the Corn and Forage about *Caminiec*, thereby to streighten that Garrison, which already suffers very much through the scarcity of Provisions. The Envoy from the *Kam of Tartary* will be dispatched in few days with the same Answer that was given to the other Envoy of *Tartary* who departed from hence about two month ago, to wit, *That the King will not Enter upon any Treaty of Peace, but with the Concurrence of his Allies.*

Vienna, July 25. The Imperial Army in *Hungary* advances along the *Danube* towards *Peterwaradin*, where a Bridge is laid over that River; The Fleet of Barks and Galleys, commanded by the *Sieur d'Assinberg*, is ordered to repair forth-

with thither; and 'tis generally believed that the Imperialists design to besiege *Belgrade* or *Temeswar*; for which a fair opportunity seems to be offer'd them by the backwardness of the Enemies preparations for the Campaign; For the last Advices we have from *Adrianople* say, that the Aga of the Janisaries with only 4 or 5000 Men was to encamp on the 13th of the last Month near the Gates of that City; That the Grand-Vizier would not go to his Tents till the 22d following, and that 'twould be the beginning of *July* before he would begin his march towards *Sophia*. The Count *de Heydelsheim* went hence this week, with a considerable Sum of Money to the Army, with a great quantity of Bombs and Ammunition has been lately sent from our Magazines in *Hungary*. Count *Marsigli* is gone to *Segedin* with Orders to lay a Bridge there over the *Theyssa*.

Cologne, August 4. The Letters from the Confederate Camp near *Hailbron* of the first Instant tell us, That the Dauphin having passed the *Neckar* with the whole French Army not far from *Marbach*, advanced on the 31th of the last Month, within half a League of our Camp, insomuch that the two Armies lay in sight of each other; The Enemy were reckoned to be about 60000 strong; and the Confederates 50000; But the latter expected to be joined in 2 or 3 days by 6000 Brandenburgers, and 3000 Neuburgers; and in the mean time were very advantageously posted. The Command of the Confederate Army is settled as follows. The Elector of *Saxony* commands the Right Wing, having under him General *Chauvet*, and Count *Styrum*; The Landgrave of *Hesse-Cassel* commands the Left Wing, with the Generals *Fleming*, Duke *Fredericke Charles* of *Wirtemberg*, and the Count *de Lippe*; The main Body is commanded by Prince *Lewis* of *Baden*, and under him by the Margrave of *Bareith*, the Prince of *Baden-Dourlach*, and General *Steinap*. On Saturday last passed through this City 200 Suiffers towards *Nimeguen*, who have been raised in the Canton of *Bern* for the Service of the States-General of the United-Provinces. The Troops of the Elector of *Cologne* are marched to join with those of the Elector *Palatin*, who are encamped near *Cornelis-Munster*.

Amsterdam, August 7. Yesterday the Directors of the *East-India* Company received Advice of the arrival on our Coasts of 6 Ships from *Batavia*, and this day they have an account that 4 of them are come into the *Texell*, and two to *Helvoetsluys*. They came from *Batavia* on the 30th of *November* last, and from the *Cape of Good Hope* on the 17th of *April* following; and we are told that 8 Dutch *East-India* Ships more are expected home this year. The last Letters from *Denmark* tell us, that our Fleet of Merchantmen bound home from the *Sound*,

had been put back by contrary Winds, after having been 5 days at Sea. They were from *Misfelds*, that on the 23d past were brought into *Toulon* 14 Merchant Ships, which were taken by the French Fleet off of *Lagos*, of which 6 or 7 were Dutch; the rest Danes and Hamburgers.

Plimouth, August 1. Their Majesties Ship the *Richmond*, and *St. Alban-Prize*, with the Merchant Ships that failed hence on the 30th past, were put back yesterday by contrary Winds. This day came in from *Barbadoes* Captain *Agerton*, Capt. *Bond*, Capt. *Gallant*, all 3 of and for *Londos*, and the *George* of this place bound also for *London*. They came from *Barbadoes* the 18th of *June* last in company of 18 Sail more, 10 of which are put into *Falmouth*, one of them coming from *Guzna*, and the other 8, among which are two homeward bound *East-India* Ships, are gone North about. This day arrived here the *St. Anthony* in 18 days from *Lisbon*, laden with Fruit for *London*, the Master whereof says, that according to the freshest news they had at *Lisbon* of the French Fleet when he came away, they were still in *Lagos* Bay.

Deal, August 3. Last night came into the *Downes* Their Majesties Ship the *New-Falmouth*, with two Portuguese Ships a d a *Leghornese*. And this morning the *Falmouth* sailed again to the Westward, as did also the *Leghornese*; but the Portuguese are still here. This morning came in a *Suede* laden with Wine from *O. Porto*.

W. Isl. August 3. This day came in here two Vessels; One from *Waterford*, the Master whereof reports, that at his coming away News was brought thither of Sir *George Rooke's* arrival at *Kinsale*; The other Vessel came last Sunday from the River *Shannon*, and passing by the *Old-Head of Kinsale* on Tuesday saw a Fleet of Ships in that Harbour, which, as the Fishermen informed them, was the Fleet returned with Sir *George Rooke*.

Bristol, August 5. By a Person who came from *Corke* on the 2d Instant, and arrived here this day from *Minshend* where he Landed, we have an account, that Sir *George Rooke* arriv'd at *Kinsale* on the 29th past with 16 Men of War, and 36 Merchant Ships; And that in his way thither the *Monks*, (who had before rejoined the Fleet) and the *Chatham*, had taken two rich Prizes, one outward bound from *France* to the *West Indies* with Soldiers Cleaths, Brandy, Wine, &c. and the other bound home from *Martinezco* valued at 14000 l. of about 30 Guns each. Sir *George Rook* had not touch'd in any Port till his arrival at *Kinsale*, and of all the English Men of War that went out with him, he missed only the *Sheerness* Galley; Who put into the *Goyne* the 23d of the last Month, as we understood by the last Letters from thence.

Whitehall, August 6. This day arrived here a Gentleman from *Dublin*, whence he came on Wednesday last in the Evening, and brings the Confirmation of Sir *George Rooke's* arrival at *Kinsale* with the Squadron of Men of War under his Command, and about 40 English and Dutch Merchantmen.

The Dutch Letters of Tuesday last are not yet come in.

The other by the name of *George Hutchinson*, a well set Man, fair Complexion, round Face, aged about 30, wears a light bob Wig, a light coloured Cloth Coat, a striped Calamianca Waistcoat Fringed, a red Cloth pair of Breeches, and white Stockings. A third Person now in the Gaol here by the name of *Luke Page*, he is indifferent tall, aged between 30 and 40, fresh coloured, pitted with the Small Pox, Hazel Eyed, and wears a black Campaigne Wig, having two Scars, one on the left side of his Nose, the other on the right side of his Cheek. Such as have been robbed by any of them may have a view of them at the Gaols aforesaid. And these are further to give notice to

any Person that was robbed of a white Stone Ring in Oxford or Worcester Coach in April last in a Lane near *Wheatley-Bridge*, let them repair to the said Keeper of *Newgate*, where they may have Information of the said Ring, and the same restored to the Person who lost it, proving the Ring to be the same that was taken from him.
