Cadiz, July 13.

He French Fleet which had lain feveral days before this piace, weighed on the 8th Instant, and flood away to the Westward. On the 10th we had an account from Gibraltar, that 14 French Men of War, and two Bomb Kerches, detached from their main Fleet, came on the 8th into that Bay, to burn the Merchantmen that were there; that the Town and Ships within the Mole had fired upon the Enemy all that day; and that the French had possessed themselves of 8 Danes and Suedes who were in that Harbour. On the 11th in the morning were Ent away in two Spanish Long Boats from on board the Smirns-Fastor, and Merchantmen that are here, about 90 Seamen, to affish the English Ships at Gibraltar. The fame day came in an Express from thence with ad-wice, that the French had fired upon our Ships, and sent in one of their Men of War, but he was 6 warmly received, that the rest were obliged to send Boats to tow him est, and on this occasion the Guns from the Shoar sunk one of their Bons; Then the French began to sling Bombs upon the New Mould, where the 4 English Ships lay; and thereupon the Commanders bored holes in their Ships, and sunk them; but a Dutch Ship bound home from Smirna was burn; but she had before landed all her Goods. After this the French Ships went away to the Westward.

fis, that the Marcschal de Tourville passed the Streights on the 19th Instant with the whole French Fleet, and having joined with the Count d'Estree, they came on the 20th to an Anchor before Malaga, placing their Ships within half Muket Shot of the Town; Monsteur Tourville sent a Boat ashore to acquaint the Governor, That his deagn was not against the Town, but to burn the English and Dutch Merchant Ships in the Port, but if the Town desended tham, he would certainly bombard it; To which the Governor answered, That he might do what he pleased; that the Merchantmen were under the K. of Spain's Protection, and he would desend them. In the Moid lay four Dutch and one English Merchant Ships; The latter called the Union Frigat, straing what might happen, had before landed 85 Bills of Silk; The French attempted twice to burn these Ships with their Boats, but were both times repulsed with sime damage, however the Commanders having done all they could to defend their Ships, thought it adviseable to sink them, which they did, but the English Ship being half laden with Oyl, though she had 8 foor Warer in Hold sink por to the bottom and the Reench Ship being half laden with Oyl, though the had 8 foot Water in Hold, funk not to the bottom, and the French got her off; The Town defended themall they could, and havedone somedamage to one or two of the French ships; the Fight lasted six hours between the City and them; their

The Moors, at the insigation of the Sieur A'Olon, who was lately sene by the French King to the Emperor of Merace, have made an attempt upon Oran, but were repulsed with the loss of 3000 men, and thereupon the rest retired.

From the Duke of Savoy's Camp on the Hills near Pignerol, behind \$1. Brigide, July 25. On the 18th instant his Royal Highness, accompanied by all the Generals, went to his Campat Buriasso, where it was resolved to attack the Enemy by three several ways, to force them from the Hills near Pignerol; His Royal Highness, with General Captars and the Duke of Schooberg, commanding one Attack; the Governor of Milan the second; and Prince Eugene of Savoy the third; But though the Enemy who guarded these Hills, were 10000 strong, and that the Posts they were Master of were extreamly advantageous, and very well intended, yet they abandoned them without striking a stroke; And we have been encamped there since yesterday noon. The Marquis de Leganez has forced 10 or 12 Redoubts in the Valley of Perous, and sound the Town of that Name, though fortisted, abandoped by the Enemy. Monseus Caings is retired to the Col cel Ersestrelle.

From the Duke of Savoy's Camp before Pignerol, Aug. 1. His Royal Highness having caused this Fortress to be invessed, and resolving in the first place to attack the Fort of St. Brigide, the Trenches were epened against it last night with little loss; and the Duke of Schonberg is to relieve them this Evening with 5000 Men. We expect our heavy Cannon to morrow, or the day following, and in the mean time are preparing our Batteries. The Marquis de Leganes is posted with the Spaniards on the side of Perouse; And the Germans have made several Excursions, almost as far as the Col del Fenestrelle.
