*From the Duke of Savoy's Camp before
Pignerol, Aug. 3.*

WE continue our Attack of the Fort of St. Brigide, and have advanced our Trenches very considerably; In which Service we have lost several Men, and the Count de Berne Lieutenant-General was killed yesterday. We have taken a Redoubt, and some other Posts which the Enemy were possessed of at some distance from the said Fort. Yesterday we finished a Battery of 4 Pieces of Cannon; This Evening we have begun another; And shall now quickly be ready to make use of our Mortars. Monsieur Catinat continues about Susa, drawing what Force he can together.

Vienna, Aug. 8. Our News from Hungary is as good as can be expected; For Count Daunwaldt (Son to the late General of that Name) is come hither from the Duke de Croy with an account, that the Army had safely passed the River Save on the 29th and 30th of the last Month with the loss only of five Men, and was advanced near to Belgrade in order to form the Siege of that place, in which the Turks are said to have only a Garrison of 4 or 5000 Men, and no Army together to relieve it; so that the Imperialists hope to be in a short time Masters of this important Fortrefs, and thereby to facili-

tate the Peace, for which the Appearances were never so favourable as they are now.

From the Confederate Army near Hailbron, Aug. 14. We continue still in this Camp to observe the Motions of the Dauphin, part of whose Army repassed the Neckar the 8th instant, and the rest on the 10th; And their whole Army lies at present between Bengen and Bettrigheim. The Boors about Stuttgart having got together to the number of 1500 men, fell upon 200 French who were posted in that place, and having cut most of them in pieces, recovered the Town, and have taken upon them the Defence of it. 'Tis believed, that the Dauphin will in few days march back towards the Rhine.

Hamburg, Aug. 18. The King of Denmark is now in his Camp at Oldsloe with 12000 Men, including a Detachment of 1500 Horse which he has sent into the Country of Saxe-Lauenburg. Ratsburg is well provided for its Defence. In the mean time, the Negotiation is continued for Adjusting this Matter; And the Troops of Sweden and Brandenburg are said to be on their march to preserve the Peace of the Lower-Saxony.

Paris, Aug. 17. The Duke of Orleans returned hither on the 15th instant; And great part of the Forces which were posted on the Coasts under his Orders, are commanded to Flanders. The French King had on the 8th instant a Fit of an Ague, for which he took the Jesuits Powder;
