His MAJESTY THE KING has approved of the grant of the Medal for Distinguished Conduct in the Field to the undermentioned Non-commissioned Officers and Men, for acts of gallantry and devotion to Duty, whilst serving with the Expeditionary Force :—

Regimental No.	Rank.	Name.	Corps.	Action for which commended.
3049	Company Quarter-master-Serjeant	Blake, G. H.	1st Scots Guards	On the 14th September, for gallantry in bringing up ammunition under a heavy shell fire.
9488	Lance-Corporal	Brett, A. R.	1st Lincolnshire Regiment	At Le Cateau he left the trenches to fetch ammunition, and distributed it under a heavy shell fire.
9157	Lance-Serjeant	Clay, C. P. P.	2nd Royal Sussex Regiment	Acted as Scout leader, sent in very good reports on the 14th September, and several times later. He has pushed well forward and reconnoitred on occasions right up to the enemy's lines.
4997	Serjeant	Davids, G.	9th Lancers	For gallant conduct in assisting to save the guns of the 119th Battery, Royal Field Artillery, near Doube, on the 24th of August, by manhandling them into shelter, only three gunners of the Battery being left alive.
9971	Private	Day, F.	1st Liverpool Regiment	When one of a patrol on the 5th of October, got some considerable distance in front of his patrol, located an observation station of the enemy and also four guns concealed in a wood. As a result our artillery were able to direct their fire on to the enemy's guns.
10492	Lance-Corporal	Delaney, J.	2nd Royal Irish Regiment	For smart scouting at the crossing of the river Petit Morin, at Orly, on the 5th September, when he discovered the position of the enemy in time to warn the advanced guard of danger.
7409	Private	Ford, T.	2nd West Riding Regiment	Volunteered to charge two motor cars occupied by German Staff Officers, and stayed behind to collect ammunition at Le Cateau when the trenches were abandoned, and was the first man to advance to re-occupy them.
5752	Serjeant	Graham, C.	5th Lancers	Near Messines on the 14th October, for engaging with his revolver the enemy behind a barricade, and, although wounded in the hand (which he will lose), giving a clear account of his reconnaissance whilst his hand was being dressed.
9465	Serjeant	Hunt, P. J.	1st Bedford Regiment	On 24th August was in charge of the trenches after his officer had been wounded, and, although once completely surrounded by the enemy a mile in rear of the 3rd Division rear-guard, he effected the retirement of his platoon.
12953	Lance-Corporal	Jonas, J.	No. 5 Field Ambulance, Royal Army Medical Corps	For bravery on the 14th of September at Pont Arcy in carrying in under a heavy fire Serjeant Stansfield, 49th Battery, Royal Field Artillery, who was dangerously wounded.
9065	Private	Malone, W. T.	3rd Worcestershire Regiment	Though wounded in the head at Caudry on 26th August he continued in the firing line, showing excellent example of coolness under fire.
9275	Serjeant (now 2nd Lieutenant)	Marillier, F. C. J.	2nd Royal Sussex Regiment	Led a party on the night of 1st October, and successfully filled one of the enemy's trenches.
16202	Lance-Corporal	McDonnell, P.	2nd Grenadier Guards	On 27th September made a first rate reconnaissance and discovered an unsuspected German trench.
7816	Acting Corporal	Munday, R.	1st Royal Berkshire Regiment	For ability and courage in scout leading in action near Le Metz Farm during 10th to 12th October.
5005	Private	Mutlow, A.	2nd South Staffs Regiment	This man volunteered to go and inform the Wiltshire Regiment of the presence of the South Staffordshire Regiment on the 20th September. In order to do so he had to cross an open fire-swept zone, where he ran considerable danger.
823	Company Serjeant-Major	Palmer, A. G.	56th Company, Royal Engineers	For gallantry and coolness at Le Cateau on 26th August, in assisting Lieutenant C. G. Martin, Royal Engineers, in the defence of a Post from which Infantry had been driven.
