

Lieutenant Cyril Gordon Martin, 56th Company, Royal Engineers.

At Le Cateau, on the 26th of August, he held, with his Section, a post from which Infantry had been driven, and remained there under a very fierce fire until the Infantry relieved him.

Captain The Honourable Archibald Rodney Hewitt, 1st Battalion, The East Surrey Regiment.

For moving out of the trenches at Le Cateau, under heavy shell fire, and bringing back men who were dribbling to the rear.

Captain John Curteis Burnett, 2nd Battalion, The Duke of Wellington's (West Riding Regiment).

Trained and commanded the 5th Divisional Cyclist Company, on the remarkable efficiency, disregard of risk in reconnaissance and vigilance of which the security of the 5th Division has often entirely depended.

Major William Algernon Ireland Kay, 2nd Battalion, The King's Royal Rifle Corps.

Made a personal reconnaissance of great value on 1st October, reaching a point within 100 yards of the enemy's outposts.

Lieutenant The Honourable George Edward Boscawen, Royal Field Artillery.

For gallantly fighting his section of guns in front of La Bassee on 13th of October, when all his detachment except himself were wounded, and all Infantry had fallen back from where the guns were.

Lieutenant Guy Robert Howard, The Essex Regiment (Special Reserve).

While in command of a Patrol of the 2nd Battalion, Essex Regiment, on the 24th of September, to the south of Vregny, made a valuable reconnaissance through a thick wood, reaching a point 150 yards from the enemy's trenches.

Second Lieutenant Charles John Aris, 16th (The Queen's) Lancers.

For gallantry and determination when on patrol at Katsberg on the 12th of October, in charging and driving off a German Patrol, and, although twice wounded, persisting in sending in his report to his Squadron leader.

Captain Robert Forbes Stanley Stanley-Creek, 1st Battalion, The Queen's (Royal West Surrey Regiment).

For conspicuous gallantry and able leading in the attack on the Inn on the 23rd of October. This attack, made in conjunction with the 2nd Infantry Brigade, was so successful, that many German prisoners were taken, and 70 of our men previously captured were released.

Captain Robert Edward Rising, 1st Battalion, The Gloucestershire Regiment.

Went up with supports and conspicuously controlled the defence of the Battalion's trenches against a determined attack by the Enemy. But for this stout defence the line must have been penetrated.

Captain Hubert Conway Rees, 2nd Battalion, The Welsh Regiment.

In the course of the action on 21st of October, by his particularly skilful reconnaissance and by gallant leading, successfully supported the advanced line with a Company under a heavy fire, relieving the pressure on the South Wales Borderers.
