At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 10th day of November, 1914.

#### PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Section Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting "Whereas in some instances Tithings, Hamlets, Chapelries, and other Places, or Districts, may be separated from the Parishes or Mother Churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and Places altogether extraparochial may, in some instances, with advantage, be annexed to Parishes or Districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate Parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own Diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any Diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop, that any such Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place, or District, within the Diocese of such Archbishop, or the Diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any Parish of Mother Church, and either be constituted a separate Benefice by itself or be united to any other Parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining

Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place, or District, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate Parish or Benefice, or that any Extra-Parochial Place may with advantage be annexed to any Parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes; And the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a Scheme in writing (the Scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to Ecclesiastical Jurisdiction, Glebe Lands, Tithes, Rent Charges, and other Ecclesiastical Dues, Rates, and Payments, and in respect to Patronage and Rights to Pews, may be made with justice to all Parties interested; and if the Patron or Patrons of the Benefice or Benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such Scheme, or to such modification thereof Scheme, said Archbishop  $\mathbf{the}$ may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such Scheme, or modification thereof. and shall certify the same and such Consent as aforesaid, by his Report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in

Council to make an Order for carrying such Scheme, or modification thereof, as the case

may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend George Rodney, Lord Bishop of Wakefield, hath made a Representation in writing to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Cosmo Gordon, Lord Archbishop of York, as follows:-

"I, the Right Reverend George Rodney, Lord Bishop of Wakefield, do hereby represent to Your Grace as follows:

"That there is in the County of York, and within my Diocese of Wakefield, the New Vicarage and Parish of Coley particularly delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured Pink.

"That there is also in the same County and Diocese the New Vicarage and Parish of Lightcliffe particularly delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured Blue, Yellow and Purple.

"That the population of the said Parish of

Coley is according to the last Census 2,000. "That the population of the said Parish of Lightcliffe is according to the last Census

4,863.
"That the net annual value of the said

said New Vicarage of Lightcliffe £290. "That George Thomas Jowett, Master of Arts, Doctor of Divinity, is the present Incumbent of the said New Vicarage of Coley, and Andrew Ewbank Burn, Clerk, Doctor of Divinity, Vicar of Halifax, and Prebendary of Lichfield Cathedral, is the Patron or person entitled, in right of his said Vicarage of Halifax, to present to the said New Vicarage were the same now vacant.

"That Charles Lacy Hulbert, Clerk, Master of Arts, is the present Incumbent of the said New Vicarage of Lightcliffe, and the said Vicar of Halifax is also the Patron or person entitled to present to the said New Vicarage were the

same now vacant.

"That the said Patron and Incumbents have all consented to the separation and annexation hereafter proposed, and their Consents in

writing are hereunto annexed.
"That that portion of the said Parish of Lightcliffe (coloured Yellow on the said map or plan hereto annexed) within which is situated part of the Village of Hipperholme is at a distance of two-thirds of a mile from the Parish Church of Lightcliffe, and at a distance of three-quarters of a mile from the Parish

Church of Coley.

"That that portion of the said Parish of Lightcliffe (coloured purple on the said map or plan hereto annexed) within which is situated the Hamlet of Norwood Green is at a distance of one and a third miles or thereabouts from the Parish Church of Lightcliffe, and at a distance of one and a quarter miles or there-

abouts from the Parish Church of Coley.
"That the two portions of the said Parish of Lightcliffe coloured respectively yellow and purple on the said map or plan contain popula-

tions respectively estimated at 511 and 700. "That there is a licensed Mission Church situate within that portion of the Parish of Lightcliffe coloured purple on the said plan, viz. at Norwood Green, sufficient for the Inhabitants there, but beyond this there is no Church or Chapel within either of the said two portions, and it would be more convenient for the Inhabitants of the said portions coloured

yellow and purple to attend Divine Service at the Parish Church of Coley than at the Parish Church at Lightcliffe, and that the Incumbent of Coley could more easily work the said por-tions of the Parish of Lightcliffe coloured as aforesaid yellow and purple than can the Incumbent of Lightcliffe.

"That it appears to me that the said two portions of the said Parish of Lightcliffe, coloured respectively yellow and purple on the said plan, may, under the provisions of the Acts of Parliament passed in the First and Second years of the Reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 106, and the 2nd and 3rd years of the Reign of Her said Majesty, Chapter 49, be advantageously separated from that Parish, and be annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the Parish of Coley.

"That, pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th Section of the first beforementioned Act of Parliament, I, the said George Rodney, the said Lord Bishop, have drawn up a Scheme in writing appended to this Representation describing the mode in which it seems to me that the alteration above proposed may be made with justice to all parties interested, and I do submit the same to Your Grace to the intent that Your Grace may, if on full consideration and Inquiry you shall be satisfied with the said Scheme, certify the same and such Consents as aforesaid to His Majesty in Council.'

And whereas the said Scheme, drawn up by the said Bishop, and the Consents referred to in the said Representation, are as follows:-

#### "SCHEME.

"It is proposed to separate two portions of the Parish of Lightcliffe, in the County of York, and Diocese of Wakefield, more particularly delineated on the map or plan annexed hereto, and thereon coloured respectively yellow and purple, from the said Parish of Lightcliffe to which they belong, and to annex them to the Parish of Coley, in the same County and Diocese, to which they are con-tiguous, for all ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the Vicar of the said Parish of Lightcliffe shall cease to have cure of souls within the said two portions of Lightcliffe proposed to be transferred as aforesaid, and the Vicar of the said Parish of Coley shall have sole and exclu-

sive charge of souls within the same.

"That the inhabitants of the said two portions of Lightcliffe, proposed to be transferred as aforesaid, shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the Parish Church of Lightcliffe, or any other Church or Chapel now or hereafter to be erected within that Parish, but shall be liable as other Inhabitants of the said Parish of Coley to the repairs of the said Parish Church of Coley, and the Inhabitants of the said two portions shall have the same rights as to Pews and the performance of all Offices and Services of the Church at the said Parish Church of Coley, and otherwise in relation to the same Church and the Parish belonging thereto, as the other Inhabitants of the same Parish.

"That the Fees for such Offices and Services performed for the Inhabitants of the said two portions of Lightcliffe as aforesaid, or arising within the limits of the same, and usually payable to the Incumbent of a Benefice, shall belong to the Incumbent of the Benefice of

Coley.

"That no alteration shall be made in respect of the Patronage, or any Glebe Land, Tithe, Tithe-Rent-charge, or other Endowment of either of the said Benefices of Coley and Light-

#### "CONSENTS.

"We, George Thomas Jowett, Clerk, Master of Arts, Doctor of Divinity, the present Incumbent of the New Vicarage of Coley, Charles Lacy Hulbert, Clerk, Master of Arts, the present Incumbent of the New Vicarage of Lightcliffe, both in the County of York and Diocese of Wakefield, and I, Andrew Ewbank Burn, Clerk, Doctor of Divinity, Vicar of the Vicar-age and Parish Church of Halifax, in the same County and Diocese, the Patron or person entitled (in right of my said Vicarage of Halifax) to present to the said two Benefices were the same now vacant, do hereby give this our consent in writing to the foregoing Representation and Scheme, and to the several matters and things therein stated and proposed.

"As witness our hands this 17th day of April, 1914.

And whereas the said Scheme hath been transmitted by the said Bishop to the said Archbishop for his consideration:

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said Scheme, hath certified the same, and the Consents aforesaid, to His Majesty in Council by his Report dated the 22nd day of May, 1914, which said Report is in the words and figures following:—

"We, the undersigned, Cosmo Gordon, by Divine Providence Lord Archbishop of York, Primate of England and Metropolitan, hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council that The Right Reverend George Rodney, by Divine Permission Lord Bishop of Wakefield, has represented to Us that it appears to him that the two portions of the Parish of Lightcliffe (more particularly described in the Map and Scheme hereto annexed and on the said map coloured yellow and purple) in the County of York, and Diocese of Wakefield, may be advantageously united and consolidated with the contiguous Parish of Coley, in the same County and Diocese, for ecclesiastical purposes.

"That the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a Representation, and Scheme, in writing, and has transmitted the same to Us for our consideration, describing the mode in which it appears to him that the separation and union may best be effected with justice to all parties.
"That the Patronage of the said two Bene-

fices of Coley and Lightcliffe is vested in the Reverend Andrew Ewbank Burn, Clerk, Doctor of Divinity, Vicar of the Vicarage and Parish Church of Halifax, in the same County and Diocese, in right of his said Vicarage of Halifax.

"That the Reverend George Thomas Jowett, Clerk, Master of Arts, Doctor of Divinity, is the present Incumbent of the New Vicarage of Coley, and the Reverend Charles Lacy Hulbert, Clerk, Master of Arts, is the present Incumbent of the New Vicarage of Lightcliffe.

"That the Patron and Incumbents of the

said Benefices of Coley and Lightcliffe are consenting parties to the Scheme hereinafter proposed.

"The Representation of the said Lord Bishop, together with the Consents of the Patron and Incumbents are hereunto annexed. and we, the said Archbishop, on full consideration and inquiry, being satisfied with such Scheme do hereby certify the same, and such Consents as aforesaid, to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may, in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make and issue an Order for carrying such Scheme into

"Cosmo Ebor."

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said Scheme be carried into effect.

  - (i) prohibiting or regulating the movement of swine within the whole of their district or within any part or parts thereof;
  - (ii) regulating the movement of swine from any market, fairground, or saleyard within their District;
  - (iii) regulating the detention and isolation of swine so moved.
- (2) Nothing in any Regulation made under this Order shall affect, and no Licence or Declaration under any such Regulation shall be required for, the movement of swine which are being moved with a licence granted under any other Order of the Board.

#### Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

2.—(1) Every person in charge of a pig or thing being moved, where under this Order or under any Regulation of a Local Authority under this Order, a Movement Licence or Declaration is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the Movement Licence or Declaration, if any, authorizing the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Every person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or

other officer.

#### Provisions as to Regulations of Local Authority.

- -(1) A Local Authority shall forthwith send to the Board a copy of every Regulation made by them under this Order.
- (2) If the Board are satisfied on inquiry, with respect to any Notice served or any Regulation made by a Local Authority under this Order, that the same is for any reason objectionable, and direct the revocation

thereof, the same shall thereupon cease to operate.

#### Offences.

- (2) If a pig is not isolated as required by any Regulation made by a Local Authority under this Order, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the occupier of the place where the pig is detained shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.
- (3) If a person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order, or under any Regulation made by a Local Authority under this Order, a Movement Licence or Declaration is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

To empower the Council in connection with their existing and authorized tramways and the tramways to be authorized by the intended Act to make from time to time such crossings, passing places, sidings, loops, junctions and other works, in addition to those specified herein, as may be necessary or convenient to the efficient working of such tramways or any of them, or for affording access to the stables, carriage houses, sheds and works of the Council or their lessees, or for effecting junctions with the tramways or railways of the Council or of any other corporation, district council, company or person, and to lay down double in lieu of single lines and single in lieu of double lines or interlacing lines in lieu of double or single lines, and to enable the Council to exercise all or any of the before-mentioned powers, whether with or without the consent of the Board of Trade or of the owners or occupiers of premises abutting on the streets in which such powers may be exercised.

To empower the Council from time to time when by reason of the execution of any work in or the alteration of any street, road, highway or thoroughfare in which any tramway shall be laid it is necessary or expedient so to do, to alter, remove or discontinue all or any of such tramways, and to make and lay down, temporarily or permanently, in the same or adjacent street, road, highway thoroughfare, a substituted tramway or substituted tramways.

To provide for the repair by the Council, their lessees or other persons, of any streets or roads in which any tramway may for the time being be laid, and for the use or disposition of any materials or things found in the construction or repair of any of the intended tramways.

To empower the Council from time to time to take up and remove any of the existing or intended tramways or any part thereof respectively, and to relay the same in such part of the streets or roads as the Council may think

To empower the Council to erect and maintain shelters and waiting rooms in connection with their tramways, and to enable them to make bye-laws and regulations with regard to any of the proposed tramways.

To provide that so much of section 34 of the Tramways Act, 1870, as limits the extent of any carriages used on any tramway beyond the outer edge of the wheels of such carriages shall not apply to carriages used on the said intended tramways.

To authorize the Council and their lessees to work the said intended tramways and to place and run carriages thereon, and to demand and take tolls in respect of the use of such carriages.

To authorize the Council and their lessees or other the person or persons working the said intended tramways to levy tolls, rates and charges for the use thereof and for the conveyance of passengers, goods, parcels, minerals, animals, merchandise and other traffic upon the same, and for such purposes to increase the tolls, rates and charges (including fares for workmen) which the Council or their lessees are empowered to levy in respect of the existing tramways, and to levy differential tolls, rates and charges (including fares for workmen) in respect of the said intended tramways or any one or more of them, and to confer exemptions from tolls, rates and charges.

To empower the Council and their lessees for the purpose of working the said intended tramways to erect, place, make and maintain works, engines, machinery, dynamos and apparatus for the production, storage and supply of electricity or other power, and to generate electricity upon any existing and authorized generating station, and to lay down, erect, construct, maintain, above, upon and below the surface of the ground, and to attach to houses and buildings, mains, wires, pipes, conductors, cables, ropes, posts, brackets, boxes, apparatus and things necessary or proper for the transmission of electricity or other power and the working of the intended tramways or any of them by electricity or other power.

To confer special powers upon the Council in respect to the granting of a lease of all or any of the intended tramways to the Rhondda Tramways Company, Limited, or any other company, body or person, for such periods (extending if thought fit beyond the period of 21 years named in the Tramways Act, 1870), at such rent, nominal or otherwise, and upon and subject to such terms and conditions (including the payment or contribution of money by the Council to the lessees) as may be agreed upon or prescribed by the intended Act, to provide for the construction by the lessees of any tramways so leased, and to prescribe the terms upon which the same shall be purchased by the Council upon the expiration of any such lease, and for those purposes, or any of them, to vary or amend the provisions of the Tramways Act, 1870, and of the Rhondda Urban District Council (Tramways, &c.) Act, 1902, and the Rhondda Urban District Council (Tramways Extensions, &c.) Act, 1910.

To confirm any agreement which may have been or which during the progress of the Bill may be entered into touching any of the matters aforesaid.

To incorporate in the intended Act and to apply to the Council and their lessees, with or without alteration, all or some of the provisions of the Tramways Act, 1870, and to

make all other provision which may be necessary or convenient for all or any of the purposes of constructing, maintaining and working the proposed tramways.

To empower the Council to make and maintain the following works and improvements in the said parish of Rhondda (that is to say):—

Work No. 1. A new road at Tonypandy, 36 feet wide, commencing by a junction with Berw-road at or near the north-western corner of the premises of the Conservative Club, and terminating by a junction with Court-street at a point in that street 44 yards measured in an easterly direction from the junction of Davies-street with Court-street.

Work No. 2. An alteration (by increasing the headway) of the bridge carrying the Rhondda and Swansea Bay Railway over Blaenrhondda-road, and an alteration of the levels of the said road for a distance of 61 yards in a northerly direction and of 97 yards in a southerly direction from the centre of such bridge.

Work No. 3. An alteration (by increasing the headway) of the bridge carrying the Rhondda and Swansea Bay Railway over Blaen-y-cwm-road, and an alteration of the levels of the said road for a distance of 42 yards in an easterly direction and of 25 yards in a westerly direction from the centre of such bridge.

To empower the Council to make and carry out an improvement and alteration of the levels of the following public streets or parts of streets in the said parish of Rhondda (namely):

- (a) Of Berw-road from its junction with Llwynypia-road to a point 30 yards measured in a north-westerly direction from its junction with School-terrace and Thistle-terrace.
- (b) Of Thistle-terrace from a point 35 yards measured in a southerly direction from its junction with Berw-road to such junction, and of School-terrace from its junction with Berw-road to a point 22 yards measured in a northerly direction from such junction.
- (c) Of Court-street from a point 45 yards measured in a westerly direction from the junction of Waun-road with Court-street to a point 41 yards measured in a westerly direction from the junction of Fern-terrace with Court-street.
- (d) Wern-street from a point 30 yards measured in an easterly direction from the junction of Oak-street with Wern-street to the western end of Wern-street.

To authorize the Council in connection with the before-mentioned works and improvements or otherwise for the purpose of the intended Act to make all necessary approaches, excavations, retaining walls, piers, abutments, embankments, girders, girder-bed-stones, bridges, arches, roads, footways, piling, sewers, drains, culverts and other works and conveniences, to replace the road metalling and footways, paving and channelling, to take down, build and rebuild so far as may be necessary any ironwork or masonry that may require to be taken down, built, or rebuilt, to make good any ironwork or masonry disturbed during and consequent on the construction of the before-mentioned works and improvements, and to make junctions and communications with any streets or roads which may be intersected or interfered with by the before-mentioned works and improvements or may be adjacent thereto, and to make diversions or alterations in the lines and levels of existing carriageways and footways of any streets or roads for the purpose of connecting the same with or making a convenient communication therewith, and to authorize the Council for the purposes of the intended Act and of the before-mentioned works and improvements to remove or alter the position of or interfere with any steps, areas, forecourts, railings, walls, fences, works or apparatus.

To make provision, if thought fit, for the repair and maintenance by the Rhondda and Swansea Bay Railway Company of the beforementioned works and improvements so far as they affect the property of that Company, and to enable the Council and that Company to enter into and carry into effect agreements with reference to the construction, maintenance and repair of such works and improvements.

To authorize the Council, in connection with any of the intended works, to stop up or cause to be stopped up temporarily all or any part of any carriageway or footway which it may be deemed necessary to stop up, and to construct temporary works for keeping any such carriageway or footway open for traffic, and to make such orders for regulating the traffic as may be necessary or expedient.

To empower the Council to widen the carriageway of any road along which the existing or intended tramways are or will be laid by reducing the width of the footpath or otherwise as may be expedient for or in connection with the construction of any of the intended works.

To empower the Council in the construction of any of the intended works and improvements (other than tramways) to deviate laterally and vertically from the lines and levels shown upon the deposited plans and sections hereinafter mentioned, and to underpin, support, and otherwise strengthen walls and buildings near to or which may be affected by any of the proposed works, without being required to purchase the same.

To enable the Council for all or any of the purposes of the intended Act to stop up, break up, alter, divert, and interfere with, either permanently or temporarily (and if permanently to appropriate the site and soil of and to extinguish all rights of way over), and to cross over, under or upon all such public or private streets, roads, highways, bridges, thoroughfares, railways, tramways, rivers, navigations, canals, streams, brooks, water-courses, footways, sewers, drains, gas and water and other pipes, and telegraphic, telephonic, and electric and other apparatus as it may be necessary or convenient to do for any of the purposes of the intended Act.

To empower the Council for the purposes of the intended works and improvements and of the intended Act to purchase and take, by compulsion or agreement, all or any of the lands, houses and buildings shown upon the deposited plans and described in the deposited books of reference thereto hereinafter referred to, and also any rights and casements in or over any such lands, houses and buildings, and to empower the Council to appropriate and use for the purposes of the intended Act any lands belonging to or vested in them, and to make exchanges of land with other bodies and persons, and upon any such exchanges to pay or receive money for equality of exchange, and to empower the Council to retain and hold and appropriate any lands acquired by them under the intended Act and not required for the purposes of the intended works and improvements freed from the provisions of the Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845, with respect to superfluous lands, and to erect buildings thereon, and to grant leases of such lands and buildings.

To empower the Council to purchase so much only of or such easements or right in, under or over any property as they may require for any of the purposes of the Bill, and to exempt the Council from the liability imposed by section 92 of the Lands Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845.

To make special provisions as to determining the purchase money and compensation payable in respect of lands and property acquired for the purposes of the intended Act, and to provide for limiting the amount thereof and claims in respect thereof in cases of recent buildings and alterations and recently created interests therein, for taking into account the increased value of any lands retained by the claimants by reason of the proposed works, and as to the payment of costs in certain cases of disputed compensation by persons failing to send in sufficient particulars of their claims.

To confer on the Council new and enlarged. powers, and to make further provisions with reference to the width of new streets in certain cases, the widening of new streets by owners of property on either side, the restriction on placing of rails, beams or other apparatus over streets, the fencing of forecourts from streets, the prohibition of the erection of retaining walls except in a manner to be prescribed, and in accordance with approved plans, sections, and specifications, the building up of chimneys in case of buildings erected to greater height than adjoining buildings, the taking down or repair of dilapidated buildings, the materials to be used in the construction of buildings, the provision of accommodation for storage of food in new houses, the floor area of habitable rooms, the construction of specially large sewers in new streets, the laying of drains in private streets, the reconstruction of drains, the ventilation of soil pipes, the submission of plans before watercourses are culverted or covered over, and to provide that choked-up streams and watercourses be deemed a nuisance within the meaning of the Public Health Acts.

To confer further powers on the Council with regard to infectious diseases, sanitary and other matters, and in particular:-To make provision for restricting the attendance children in Sunday Schools when infectious disease exists and to close Sunday Schools; to require information to be furnished in case of infectious disease; to prevent the contact of other persons with the body of a person who has died of infectious disease, and to make regulations for the conveyance of the body of any such person by railway or other conveyance; the examination of inmates of common lodging-houses where infectious disease is supposed to exist; the removal of persons suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis to hospital; to enable the Council to cleanse houses infested with vermin and the contents of such houses, and to cleanse verminous persons and their clothing; to compel dairymen, cowkeepers, and purveyors of milk to cleanse milk vessels; to

provide for imposition of penalties for wilful damage to drains and sanitary apparatus; to prohibit any place where food is stored being used as a sleeping place; to extend the provisions of the Public Health Acts and Sale of Food and Drugs Acts so as to authorize the inspection, taking of samples and seizure by officers of the Council of meat and other foodstuffs, whether exposed for sale or not, and to prohibit the sale thereof except after such inspection; to define the establishment of a new business; the appointment of additional inspectors nuisances; to make provision for the inspection of slaughterhouses and the registration and licensing of slaughtermen; and to confer upon the Council and their officers powers of entry and inspection of premises in respect of all or any of the foregoing matters.

To prohibit the letting or use of land for circuses, shows, fairs and other similar purposes without proper provision for water supply and sanitary conveniences, and the approval of plans, sections and other particulars of any building, tent, van or shed intended to be used for such purposes.

To enable the Council to grant occasional licences for hackney carriages and other public vehicles.

To make further provision with regard to the gas undertaking of the Council, and particularly with regard to the following matters:—

The pressure and testing of gas; the payment of a minimum charge for gas supplied to any person having a separate supply of gas or of electricity, and the terms and conditions upon which a supply in such cases is to be given by the Council, and the entry by the Council upon premises to remove gas fittings.

To make further provision with regard to the water undertaking of the Council, and particularly with regard to the following matters:

—The repair by the Council at the expense of the owner or occupier of communication pipes; the contribution towards the maintenance of a common pipe by the owner or occupier of the houses supplied by that pipe; to empower persons liable to maintain pipes and apparatus to open the ground between the mains of the Council and the premises of such person for the purpose of maintaining, repairing and relaying such pipes and apparatus; and to empower the Council to make additional charges for water used for washing horses; carriages and motorcars.

To enable the Council to subscribe to local government associations and to pay the expenses of deputations from the Council and their officials in attending conferences and other meetings, and the expenses of or connected with public ceremonies.

To empower the Council to appoint and remove such clerks, collectors and other officers as they may deem necessary to assist the Overseers in the discharge of their duties, to provide for the payment of their salaries, and to require them to give security for the performance of their duties.

To empower the Council to borrow or raise money for the purchase of land for and the construction of the intended tramways, and of the several works and improvements to be authorized by and for other the purposes of the intended Act, and to charge such money on the district fund and general district rate or other local rates and the undertakings, rates, rents, revenues and other property of the Council or on any of such securities, and to grant and issue mortgages, stock, debentures, debenture stock and annuities in respect thereof, and to authorize the Council to apply any of their funds or any money which they are authorized to borrow to any of the purposes of the intended Act, and to exclude any sums so borrowed from calculations as to the limit of borrowing powers under the Public Health Acts

To vary or extinguish all rights and privileges inconsistent with, or which would or might in any way interfere with the objects of the intended Act, and to confer other rights and privileges.

To alter, repeal or amend, or to extend and apply to the intended Act all or some of the provisions of the following local Acts and Orders (namely):—The Ystrad Gas and Water Acts, 1868, 1874, and 1890; the Ystrad Gas and Water Orders, 1872, 1879, and 1883; the Ystradyfodwg Urban District Council (Gas and Water) Act, 1896; the Rhondda Urban District Council Act, 1899; the Rhondda Urban District Council (Tramways, etc.) Act, 1902; the Rhondda Urban District Council Act, 1905; the Rhondda Urban District Council (Tramways Extensions, etc.) Act, 1910; the Rhondda Urban District Council Act, 1911; and any other Act or Order relating directly or indirectly to the Council or to their tramway, gas and water undertakings.

To incorporate and apply, with or without modification, or render inapplicable, all or some of the provisions of the following public Acts:
—The Public Health Acts; the Local Loans Act, 1875; the Lands Clauses Acts; the Tramways Act, 1870; the Light Railways Act, 1896; the Gasworks Clauses Acts, 1847 and 1871; the Waterworks Clauses Acts, 1847 and 1863; the Railways Clauses Consolidation Act, 1845; the Arbitration Act, 1889; and all Acts amending those Acts respectively.

Plans and sections of the proposed tramways and other works, including plans of the lands proposed to be acquired or used compulsorily under the authority of the intended Act, together with a book of reference to such plans, and a copy of this Notice as published in the London Gazette, will, on or before the 30th day of November instant, be deposited for public inspection with the Clerk of the Peace for the county of Glamorgan, at his office, at Cardiff, and with the Clerk to the Rhondda Urban District Council, at his Office, at Pentre.

Printed copies of the intended Act or Bill will be deposited in the Private Bill Office of the House of Commons on or before the 17th day of December next.

(Powers to Corporation of Bury to Construct Additional Tramways in the Borough, to be Worked by Animal, Electrical or other Mechanical Power, and to Run Carriages Thereon, and Take Tolls and Charges for the Use Thereof; Breaking up Streets; Levying Tolls, Rates and Charges; Borrowing Moneys; Incorporation and Amendment of Acts.)
