"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, inter alia, that all pay; pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas by Orders in Council dated
the 8th March, 1895, and the 5th March, 1910,
provision is made for the payment to Officers
called into active service from the Reserved
or Retired Lists in time of war or emergency
of the pay and emoluments of their corresponding Ranks on the Active List, together with
a bonus of twenty-five per cent. for every

pound of the full pay earned by them, exclusive of allowances:

"And whereas this arrangement is found to be inequitable in cases where an Officer's retired-pay exceeds the full-pay of his corre-

sponding Rank on the Active List:

the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. This Order may be cited as "The China (Amendment) Order in Council, 1915," and shall be read as one with "The China Order in Council, 1904," and this Order and "The China Orders in Council, 1904 to 1914," may be cited together as "The China Orders in Council, 1904 to 1915."

2. Article 3 of "The China (Amendment) Order in Council, 1914," is hereby repealed. And the Right Honourable Sir Edward Grey, Baronet, K.G., one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein.

THEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 16th and 17th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 50, and of the Act of the 23rd and 24th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 124, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Scheme, bearing date the 14th day of January, in the year 1915, in the words and figures following, that is to say:—

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 16th and 17th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 50, and of the Act of the 23rd and 24th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 124, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Scheme for effecting an exchange of the Patronage of the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Clannaborough, situate in the County of Devon, and in the Diocese of Exeter, for the Patronage of the Benefice (being a Rectory) of Beaworthy, situate in the same County and Diocese.

"Whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Clannaborough is vested in Your Majesty, Your Heirs, and Successors, and is exercised on behalf of Your Majesty by the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain for the time being.

"And whereas the Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Beaworthy is vested in the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Exeter (hereinafter called 'The said Dean and Chapter of Exeter').

"And whereas the Right Honourable Richard Burdon, Viscount Haldane, now Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and the said Dean and Chapter of Exeter have respectively signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said two Benefices of Clannaborough and Beaworthy may be rearranged by way of exchange in the manner which is hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas we have made due inquiry and calculation as to the circumstances and relative value of the said two Benefices and of the Patronage thereof respectively, and we do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council that the circumstances and present values of the said two Benefices are as set forth in the Schedule hereunto annexed.

"And whereas the yearly value of the said Benefice of Clannaborough in Your Majesty's books is £5 17s. $3\frac{1}{2}$ d. and the yearly value of the said Benefice of Beaworthy in the same books is £6 6s.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Richard Burdon, Viscount Haldane, (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Scheme), and with the consent of the said Dean and Chapter of Exeter, (in testimony whereof they have caused their Common or Capitular Seal to be affixed to this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Clannaborough, and the Church thereof, shall be assigned and transferred from Your Majesty, Your Heirs, and Successors, and shall become and be absolutely vested in, and shall and may from time to time, and at all times, be exercised by the said Dean and Chapter of Exeter for ever, and that in exchange for the same the whole Advowson or perpetual right of Patronage of and presentation to the said Benefice of Beaworthy, and the Church thereof, shall in like manner and upon and from the same date be assigned and transferred from the said Dean and Chapter of Exeter, and shall become and be absolutely vested in Your Majesty, Your Heirs, and Successors for ever, and shall and may from time to time, and at all times, be exercised by the said Richard Burdon, Viscount Haldane, or other the Lord High Chancellor

of Great Britain for the time being.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Exeter.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the 8th and 9th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 70, of the Act of the 14th and 15th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 97, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Representation, bearing date the 30th day of July, in the year 1914, in the words and figures following,

that is to say:—
"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 8th and 9th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 70, of the Act of the 14th and 15th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 97, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Representation as to the assignment of a Consolidated Chapelry to the Consecrated Church of Saint James, Pontypool, situate within the Parish of Trevethin, in the County of Mon-

mouth, and in the Diocese of Llandaff.
"Whereas at certain extremities of the said
Parish of Trevethin, and of the Parish of
Panteg, in the said County and Diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the

several Churches of such Parishes.
"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said Parish of Trevethin, and of the said Parish of Panteg, should be formed into a Consolidated Chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said Church of Saint James, Pontypool, situate as aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Joshua Pritchard, Bishop of Llandaff, as such Bishop, (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Representation), with the consent of the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Llandaff, as the Patrons of the Vicarage of the said Parish of Trevethin, (in testimony whereof they have hereunto affixed their Common or Capitular Seal), and with the consent of John Capel Hanbury, of Pontypool Park, in the said County of Monmouth, Esquire, as the Patron of the Rectory of the said Parish of Panteg, (in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this Representation), we, the said Ecclesias-tical Commissioners for England, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all those contiguous portions of the said Parish of Trevethin, and of the said Parish of Panteg, which are described in the Schedule hereunder written, all which portions, together with the boundaries thereof, are delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, should be united and formed into one Consolidated Chapelry for the said Church of Saint James, Pontypool, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint James, Pontypool.'

"We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal Consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to Your Majesty in Your Royal Wisdom shall

seem meet.

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing Representation has reference.

" The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint James, Pontypool, comprising:

"I. All that portion of the Parish of Trevethin, in the County of Monmouth, and in the Diocese of Llandaff, which is bounded upon the south by the Parish of Panteg, in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say upon the northeast and upon the north-west, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Panteg from the said Parish of Trevethin at the point where the stream called Avon-lwyd is joined by Trosnant Brook, and extending thence north-west-ward along the middle of Avon-lwyd for a distance of thirty-six chains or thereabouts to the centre of the bridge which carries the road leading from Pontypool Park into Commercial Street and Crane Street across Avon-lwyd, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of such road for a distance of five chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Commercial Street and Crane Street, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Crane Street for a distance of eleven chains or thereabouts to its junction with High Street and the road called Upper Park Terrace, and extending thence first eastward and then south-eastward along the middle of Upper Park Terrace for a distance of two chains and a half or thereabouts to a point opposite to the wall or fence forming the southeastern boundary of the premises attached to the Pontypool Charity (Church of England) School, and extending thence first south-westward to and along the said wall or fence, and then north-westward along the wall or fence forming the south-western boundary of the same premises for a distance in all of three chains or thereabouts to the point where the last-mentioned wall or fence meets the eastern side of High Street, and extending thence first westward to, and then first south-westward and then north-westward along the middle of High Street for a distance of fifteen chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with the

roadway running past the western ends of Gwent Street, Bryn-gwyn Place, and Coedcae Terrace and also past the north-western side of the premises attached to the houses known as Ivy Cottage and Sycamore House into Albion Road, and extending thence first south-ward, and then in various directions along the middle of such roadway for a distance of fourteen chains and a half or thereabouts to its junction with Albion Road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Albion Road and of the road in continuation thereof for a distance in all of twenty-one chains or thereabouts to the point beyond the bridge or culvert carrying the lastmentioned road across Trosnant Brook where such road crosses the boundary which divides the said Parish of Trevethin from the said

Parish of Panteg.

N pursuance of the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Most Honourable Privy Council, to order as follows:—

- 1. The Northern and Salford Divisions (as defined by the Order in Council of the 4th day of May, 1864) of the County of Lancaster shall, for the purpose of the next Spring Assizes, be united together under the name of "The Spring Assize County, No. 2."
- 2. The said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be held at Manchester.
- 3. The Court at the said Spring Assizes at Manchester shall have jurisdiction to try any prisoner committed in the said Spring Assize County who may be brought before it, and shall have the same powers with respect to the trial of and passing sentence upon such prisoner as a Court of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery would have had at the Assizes in the County where, but for the said Spring Assizes Act, 1879, such prisoner would have been tried.

The provisions of Section 13 of the Sheriffs Act, 1887, shall apply to the execution of any capital sentence passed at such Assizes as herein mentioned; provided that the expression in the said Section "the Sheriff of such County" shall mean the Sheriff of the County in which the prisoner so sentenced would have been tried if the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, had not been passed.

- 4. The Sheriff of the County of Lancaster shall act for the purpose of the said Spring Assize County.
- 5. The precepts of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to summon the Grand Jurors and Petty Jurors from the County of Lancaster.
- 6. The Gaol Delivery precept of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to cause the prisoners from all the prisons in the said Spring Assize County who under the provisions of this Order will have to be tried at Manchester, to be brought there, and the Sheriff shall cause such prisoners to be brought accordingly without any writ of Habeas Corpus.
- 7. All Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Coroners, Escheators, Stewards, Bailiffs, Gaolers, Constables, Officers, and persons having authority, and being under an obligation to attend the Assizes for either Division

comprised in the said Spring Assize County, or to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper Officer thereof, any indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document, shall have the same authority and be under the same obligation to attend at the said Spring Assizes held for the said Spring Assize County, and to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper Officer thereof, such indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document.

- 8. In all indictments and presentments at the said Spring Assizes the venue laid in the margin thereof shall, in addition to the name of the County where the offence is charged to have been committed, contain the words "Spring Assize County, No. 2."
- 9. Any person who, after the date of this Order, and before the said Spring Assizes, enters into a recognizance to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer before a Court of Oyer and Terminer or General Gaol Delivery, to be holden for either of the Divisions constituting the said Spring Assize County, shall be bound to attend at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.

10. In all cases in which the like recognizances have been entered into in respect of any offence committed in either of the Divisions constituting the said Spring Assize County prior to the making of this Order, such recognizances shall be deemed to have been entered into for attendance at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and every person bound by such recognizance shall be bound to appear at such last-mentioned Spring Assizes or forfeit his recognizance.

11. Ten days before the day fixed for the opening of the Commission at Manchester, a list of the prisoners to be removed for trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, so far as the same list can then be made out, shall, together with a short statement of the offences with which they are charged, be transmitted by the Gaoler of each prison in which such prisoners may be, to the Sheriff of the County of Lancaster, and the said Sheriff shall cause to be inserted in one or more newspapers in the Spring Assize County the said list and statement, and a notice that the persons bound by recognizances to appear and prosecute or give evidence for or against the prisoners so removed shall appear and prosecute and give evidence at Manchester.

12. sentenced, and proper arrangements have been made for their being sent back to the prison from which they were sent for trial, or sent to any other prison which has been duly appointed as an alternative for such prison. If, however, the said Gaol has itself been duly appointed as an alternative prison for the prison from which such prisoners were sent to trial, the Governor of the said Gaol shall, subject to the orders of the Secretary of State, keep and maintain in the said Gaol such prisoners after sentence, until they are discharged in due course of law.

13. The Clerk of Assize at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall have all powers of taxation of Bills of Costs, expenses of prosecution and witnesses, and all other powers necessary for checking and paying such costs relating to the trial of prisoners that the Clerk of Assize in the County where such prisoners were committed would have had if such prisoners had been tried at the Assizes held in such last-mentioned County.

Where any person is committed for trial, or is bound by any recognizance to appear and answer, in the said Spring Assize County, any Judge of the High Court of Justice, or the committing Justice or Justices, or any two of the Justices of the County or place from which he is committed or admitted to bail, may, upon the application of such person, direct the Treasurer of the County or place where such person was committed, or entered into any recognizance to appear and answer as aforesaid, to advance to such person a sum not exceeding £20 to enable him to defray the travelling expenses of such of his witnesses as may have been bound by recognizances to appear on his behalf, and the Treasurer shall advance such sum, and shall deduct it out of the amount ultimately allowed in respect of such witnesses.

14. In any case where money is ordered by the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize for the said Spring Assize County to be paid in respect of costs and expenses of prosecutors and witnesses, the same shall be paid by the Treasurer of the County or place by whom the same would have been payable had a like order been made by a Court of Oyer and Terminer or Gaol Delivery in the County where the trial would have taken place but for the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, and this Order; and every such Treasurer, or some known Agent on his behalf, shall attend the said Spring Assizes during the sitting of the Court to pay all such orders.

15. Where the Court at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County remand a prisoner or adjourn any trial, or otherwise make an order respecting a prisoner committed for trial but not acquitted or convicted, the Court may make such order with respect to the removal of such prisoner to a prison in the County or place in which he was committed for trial as to the Court seems just, and the prisoner may be removed accordingly, without any writ of Habeas Corpus.

16. Except where the context otherwise requires, terms used in this Order shall have the same meaning as that which the same terms have in the Spring Assizes Act, 1879.

17. This Order, unless earlier revoked, shall be in force during the continuance of the Spring Assizes, 1915.

N pursuance of the Spring Assizes Act,. 1879, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Most Honourable Privy Council, to order as follows:—

- 1. The North and East Riding Division and the West Riding Division (as defined by the Order in Council of the 10th day of June, 1864) of the County of York and the County of the City of York shall, for the purpose of the next-Spring Assizes, be united together under the name of "The Spring Assize County, No. 3."
- 2. The said Spring Assizes for the said. Spring Assize County shall be held at Leeds.
- 3. The Court at the said Spring Assizes at Leeds shall have jurisdiction to try any prisoner committed in the said Spring Assize County who may be brought before it, and shall have the same powers with respect to the trial of and passing sentence upon such prisoner as a Court of Oyer and Terminer and Gaol Delivery would have had at the Assizes in the County where, but for the said Spring Assizes Act, 1879, such prisoner would have been tried.

The provisions of Section 13 of the Sheriffs Act, 1887, shall apply to the execution of any capital sentence passed at such Assizes as herein mentioned; provided that the expression in the said Section "The Sheriff of such County" shall mean the Sheriff of the County in which the prisoner so sentenced would have been tried if the Spring Assizes Act, 1879, had not been passed.

- 4. The Sheriff of the County of York shall alone act for the purpose of the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and subject to the provisions of this Order shall have jurisdiction for that purpose over the whole district constituting the said Spring Assize County, and precepts and other documents relating to the said Spring Assizes shall be addressed to him alone.
- 5. The Gaol Delivery precept of the Judges to the said Sheriff shall direct him to summon the Grand Jurors and Petty Jurors from the County of York; and the Jurors so summoned shall be deemed to be good and lawful men of the body of the several Counties constituting the said Spring Assize County; and the Grand and Petty Jury formed out of those Jurors shall be deemed to be a Grand and Petty Jury respectively of the body of the said Counties respectively, and shall have jurisdiction accordingly.

In all matters not before specifically mentioned the precepts to the said Sheriff shall direct him to issue, and he shall issue the like notices, precepts, warrants, and documents, and perform the same acts (mutatis mutandis) as if he were Sheriff for the whole of the said Spring Assize County, and all Under Sheriffs.

Bailiffs, Constables, and Officers in the said Spring Assize County shall obey accordingly.

- 8. The said Sheriff shall, as to all matters in relation to such Spring Assizes for which no specific provision is made by this Order, have the same power, jurisdiction, and responsibility as if he were Sheriff for the whole of the said Spring Assize County, except that this provision shall not authorize the said Sheriff to carry sentences into execution outside the County of York, or to levy outside the said County fines imposed or recognizances estreated at the said Spring Assizes.
- 9. All Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Coroners, Escheators, Stewards, Bailiffs, Gaolers, Constables, Officers, and persons having authority, and being under an obligation to attend the Assizes for either of the Counties comprised in the said Spring Assize County, or to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper Officer thereof, any indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document, shall have the same authority, and be under the same obligation to attend at the said Spring Assizes held for the said Spring Assize County, and to certify, transmit, or deliver to the Court of Assize, or the proper Officer thereof, such indictment, inquisition, recognizance, examination, deposition, or document. Any person who, after the date of this Order and before the said Spring Assizes, enters into a recognizance to appear and prosecute, or give evidence, or to appear and answer before a Court of Oyer and Terminer or General Gaol Delivery, to be holden for any of the Counties constituting the said Spring Assize County, shall be bound to attend at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County.
- 12. In all cases in which the like recognizances have been entered into in respect of any offence committed in any of the Counties constituting the said Spring Assize County prior to the making of this Order, such recognizances shall be deemed to have been entered into for attendance at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, and every person bound by such recognizance shall be bound to appear at such last-mentioned Spring Assizes, or forfeit his recognizance.
- 13. Ten days before the day fixed for the opening of the Commission at Leeds, a list of the prisoners to be removed for trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County, so far as the same list can then be made out, shall, together with a short statement of the offences with which they are charged, be transmitted by the Gaoler of each prison in which such prisoners may be, to the Sheriff of the County of York, and the said Sheriff shall cause to be inserted in one or more newspapers in the Spring Assize County the said list and statement, and a notice that the persons bound by recognizances to appear and prosecute or give evidence for or against the

prisoners so removed shall appear and prosecute and give evidence at Leeds.

- 14. It shall be lawful for the Gaoler of the Gaol in which prisoners who are to take their trial at the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County shall be in custody, three days before the day upon which the said Spring Assizes for the said Spring Assize County are appointed to be held, to send, without any writ of Habeas Corpus, such prisoners to His Majesty's Gaol at Leeds, for the purposes of their trial, and to take all proper steps for their transmission to the said Gaol, and their maintenance by the way, and the Gaoler of the said Gaol shall receive such prisoners into his charge and custody on their arrival, and shall keep and maintain them in the said Gaol until they are either ordered to be discharged or remanded by proper authority, or until they shall have been tried and sentenced, and proper arangements have been made for their being sent back to the prison from which they were sent for trial, or sent to any other prison which has been duly appointed as an alternative for such prison. SHEFFIELD ALLOTMENTS (SWINE-FEVER) ORDER OF 1915.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

Premises to which this Order applies.

1.—(1.) This Order shall apply to the premises described in the Schedule hereto, and also to any other premises in the city of Sheffield to which this Order may be applied by a Notice to that effect signed by an Inspector of the Board or of the Local Authority of the said city and served upon the occupier of the premises described in such Notice.

(2.) This Order shall cease to apply to any premises upon service on the occupier thereof of a Notice to that effect signed by an Inspector

of the Board.

(3.) A copy of every Notice served under this Article shall forthwith be sent to the Board by the Inspector signing the same.

Restrictions on Movement of Swine from or to Premises to which this Order applies.

2. Swine shall not, except as expressly authorised by this Order, be moved from or to any premises to which this Order applies.

Movement of Swine for Immediate Slaughter.

3.—(1.) Swine (not being in a Swine-Fever Infected Place and their movement not being prohibited by Notice of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board given under any Order of the Board) may be moved from any premises to which this Order applies to any slaughter-house for the purpose of immediate slaughter if accompanied by a licence in the Form D set forth in the First Schedule to the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908, as amended by the Swine-Fever Order of 1911, authorising such movement, granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the city of Sheffield, which licence shall be in force for not more than eight days, inclusive of the day of issue.

(2.) Before a licence is granted by an Inspector under this Article the owner of the swine, or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose, shall sign, and deliver or send by post to the Inspector a declaration in the Form E set forth in the First Schedule to the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908, which shall be retained by the Inspector.

(3.) The swine shall, before the movement is commenced, be marked by and at the expense of the owner by the painting with an indelible composition of red colour of a broad line down the back and another broad line across the loins of each of the swine, thus +, each line being not less than nine inches long.

(4.) A copy of a licence which authorises movement of swine to premises in a District other than the District of the Local Authority of the city of Sheffield shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Local Authority of the District in which the place of destination specified in the licence is situate.

(5.) The swine moved under this Article shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay, and shall, after their arrival at the slaughter-house, be there

detained until they are slaughtered.

(6.) During the movement the swine shall not be permitted to come in contact with swine not marked in manner prescribed by this Article.

Cleansing and Disinfection of Vehicles used for Conveyance of Swine.

- 4.—(1.) Any float, cart or van which has been used for the conveyance of swine under the preceding Article shall immediately after each occasion of such use be cleansed and disinfected by and at the expense of the person using the same for such purpose as follows:
 - (i.) The floor of the float, cart or van and all other parts thereof with which the swine, or their droppings, have come in contact shall be scraped and swept, and the scrapings and sweepings, and all dung, sawdust, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom; then

(ii.) The same parts of the float, cart or van shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed

or scoured with water; then

- (iii.) The same parts of the float, cart or van shall be disinfected in one of the modes prescribed by the Diseases of Animals (Disinfection) Order of 1906.
- (2.) The scrapings and sweepings, and the dung, sawdust, litter, and other matter removed under this Article shall forthwith be well mixed with quicklime, and be effectually removed from contact with swine.

Movement of Swine to Premises to which this Order applies.

5.—(1.) Swine may be moved to any premises to which this Order applies, if accompanied by a licence in the Form A set forth in

- the First Schedule to the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908 authorising such movement, granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the city of Sheffield, under this Order or under the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908, as the case may be. The licence shall be in force for not more than eight days, inclusive of the day of issue.
- (2.) Before a licence is granted by an Inspector under this Article the owner of the swine, or his agent authorised in writing for this purpose, shall sign, and deliver or send by post to the Inspector, a declaration in the Form B set forth in the First Schedule to the Swine-Fever (Regulation of Movement) Order of 1908, countersigned as hereinafter provided.
- (3.) The declaration shall not be effective until it is countersigned by a police officer of the district where the swine are, who, before countersigning the declaration, shall, so far as is practicable, satisfy himself as to the correctness of the statements contained therein.
- (4.) The declaration shall be retained by the Inspector granting the licence thereon.
- (5.) The swine moved under this Article shall be moved by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay.
- (6.) Swine while detained on premises to which this Order applies need not be kept separate from other swine.

Production of Licences; Names and Addresses.

6.—(1.) Any person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, shall, on demand of a Justice, or of a constable, or of an Inspector or other officer of the Board or of a Local Authority, produce and show to him the licence, if any, necessary for the movement, and shall allow it to be read and a copy of or extract from it to be taken by the person to whom it is produced.

(2.) Any person so in charge shall, on demand as aforesaid, give his name and address to the Justice, or constable, or Inspector or

other officer.

Licences after Completion of Movement.

7. A licence under this Order authorising movement of swine to any premises shall forthwith after completion of the movement be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest Police Station in the same District by the person in charge of the swine at the time of completing the movement.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

8. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

9.—(1.) If a pig is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the pig, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the pig is moved, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

(2.) If a pig is not marked as required by

this Order, the owner, consignee, or other person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an

offence against the Act of 1894.

(3.) If any person, with a view unlawfully to evade or defeat the operation of this Order, by washing, or in any other manner, takes out, effaces, or obliterates, or attempts to take out, efface, or obliterate, any mark painted on any pig as required by this Order, the person doing the same, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the same to be done, and the owner of the pig, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of

(4.) If a person in charge of a pig being moved, where under this Order a licence is necessary, on demand made under this Order, fails to give his true name and address, or gives a false name or address, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Act of 1894.

Interpretation.

10. In this Order.—

"The Board" means the Board of Agricul-
