

so from time to time as circumstances may require: Provided always that notice of such Representation, and of the time when it shall please His Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the Churches or Chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the Parishes affected by such Representation, one month before such Representation is so considered: Provided also that no such Representation shall be made in relation to the burial ground of any Parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such Representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and the Vestry Clerk or Churchwardens of such Parish.

And whereas the Local Government Board, after giving to the Incumbent and the Churchwardens of the Parish of Althorpe with Keadby, in the County of Lincoln (Parts of Lindsey), ten days' previous notice of their intention in that behalf, have made a Representation to His Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in the Civil Parish of Althorpe aforesaid, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, and that burials should be discontinued therein as hereinafter directed.

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the 7th day of January, 1915, notice of such Representation was given, and it was ordered that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council, on the 18th day of February, 1915, and that the said Order in Council be forthwith published in the London Gazette, and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the Churches or Chapels of, or on some other conspicuous places within, the Parish affected by such Representation one month before the said 18th day of February, 1915.

And whereas the said Order in Council of the 7th day of January, 1915, has been duly published in the London Gazette, and copies thereof have been affixed in the manner directed by the said Order.

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the opening of any new burial ground in the said Civil Parish of Althorpe, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, be, and the same is hereby, prohibited, and that burials in the said Parish be discontinued as follows, viz.:—

ALTHORPE.—Forthwith and entirely in the Church of Saint Oswald, in the Parish of Althorpe with Keadby, in the County of Lincoln (Parts of Lindsey); and in the two Churchyards attached thereto, with the following exceptions, that is to say:—

(1) In the case of the Churchyard in which the said Church is situate the burial may be allowed of the body of the widow of the late William Gregory Harxley, at her decease, in the walled family grave now existing in such Churchyard, subject to the condition that the coffin containing the body be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented.

(2) (a) In the case of the Churchyard situate immediately to the north-west of the said Church, and abutting on the main street of the Village of Althorpe, the burial may be

allowed in the walled grave belonging, or reputed to belong, to James Stephenson, and in the two walled graves constructed in the years 1859 and 1866 respectively, and belonging, or reputed to belong, to John Thomas Brown, of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such graves, subject in each case to the condition that the coffin containing the body be separately enclosed by stonework or brickwork properly cemented; and

(b) In the last-mentioned Churchyard the burial may be allowed of the bodies of George Middleton and Jane Middleton, at their decease, in a grave space in which no interment has heretofore taken place, and which has been reserved and appropriated as a burial place, with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject in each case to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.
