His Majesty the KING has been graciously pleased to approve of the appointment of the undermentioned Officers to be Companions of the Distinguished Service Order, in recognition of their gallantry whilst serving with the Expeditionary Force:—

Major and Brevet Lieutenant-Colonel Ernest Brandon Macnaghten, 30th Battery, Royal Field Artillery.

For conspicuous gallantry and ability on 25th January, 1915, during the attack by Germans on the village of Givenchy. Whilst exposed to very heavy fire he obtained valuable information as to the enemy's position, which resulted in the prevention of supports reaching them.

Major William Harley Macalpine-Leny, 115th Battery, Royal Garrison Artillery.

For conspicuous ability and courage at Wulverghem on 24th and 27th January, 1915, when he succeeded in destroying houses occupied by the enemy by the fire of his battery, during which period he had to observe the firing of his guns from a very exposed position.

Major Charles Howard Foulkes, 11th Field Company, Royal Engineers.

For conspicuous gallantry in assisting to rescue a wounded man under heavy fire, and for very valuable services rendered at Cuinchy in placing in a state of defence the position which was captured from the enemy on 6th February, 1915.

Lieutenant Malcolm Roy Wingate, 26th Field Company, Royal Engineers.

For conspicuous gallantry on numerous occasions under dangerous conditions, especially at Givenchy on 27th January, 1915, when he led a small party and blew in the head of the enemy's sap at the White House.

Captain Arthur Leigh-Bennett, 2nd Battalion, Coldstream Guards.

For conspicuous gallantry at Cuinchy on 1st February, 1915. Leading his men with great ability against the enemy, he stopped their advance, and eventually captured their position.
