Residence situate at Ulceby shall be the House of Residence of the Vicarage of Ulceby, and that the House of Residence situate at Croxton shall be the House of Residence of the said Rectory of Croxton.

"That, if your Grace shall be satisfied that such an apportionment will under the circumstances be right and proper, it is desired that you shall recommend to His Majesty in Council, conformably with the provisions of the 23rd Section of the Act I and 2 Victoria, Chapter 106, that His Majesty in Council do assign and attach to the said Vicarage of Ulceby all the following pieces or parcels of land, situate in the Parish of Croxton aforesaid, and now belonging to and forming part of the endowments of the said Rectory of Croxton, namely:—

together with a right of way over and along the south-eastern side of Field numbered 39 which said pieces or parcels of land and right of way are delineated and set forth in the Map or Plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured yellow, subject to all charges and outgoings in respect thereof, such assignment to be in lieu of and substitution for the aforesaid charge of £170 per annum which is now payable out of the income of the said Rectory of Croxton to the Incumbent for the time being of the said Vicarage of Ulceby, under the provisions of the aforesaid Order in Council of the 13th day of August, 1855, such charge to utterly cease and determine : And further that His Majesty in Council do order that the whole of the outstanding Mortgage Debts upon the United Benefice of Ulceby with Croxton, and amount-ing to £31 9s. 1d. and £19 9s. 1d. respectively, due to the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne shall be a debt or charge upon the Glebe and Revenues of the said Benefice of Croxton exclusively, and that the said Vicarage of Ulceby shall be exempted from all liability to pay the said debts or any part thereof: That the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, as such Mortgagees as aforesaid, do consent to such recommendation, as appears by an Instrument in writing under their Common Seal hereunto annexed: In all other respects the said Vicarage of Ulceby and the said Rectory of Croxton shall each retain its own original endowments and emoluments, and bear its own charges and outgoings.

"That this proposed Disunion forms part of an intended rearrangement of certain Benefices in my said Diocese, which rearrangement when carried into effect will be an advantage to the interests of religion, as it will make better provision for the growing population in certain districts not now ecclesiastically well served: For this reason it appears to me that the Disunion of the said United Benefice of Croxton and Ulceby will be an advantage to the interests of religion.

"That the said Right Honourable Richard Burdon, Viscount Haldane, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, acting for and on behalf of His Majesty The King as such Patron as aforesaid, consents to such Disunion, and to the several matters and thingsabove proposed, as appears by an Instrument in writing under his hand hereunto annexed.

And whereas on the 29th day of June, 1914, the said Archbishop certified to His Majesty in Council as follows:—

in Council as follows:— "We, the undersigned, Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of all England and Metropolitan, do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That the Right Reverend Edward Lee, Lord Bishop of Lincoln, in whose Diocese is situate the United Benefice consisting of the Vicarage of Ulceby and the Rectory of Croxton, in the County of Lincoln, having represented unto us that the Disunion of the said United Benefice, by the separation of the Rectory of Croxton from the Vicarage of Ulceby, may be made with advantage to the interests of religion, we inquired into the circumstances of the case.

"That on such Inquiry it appeared to us that such Union might usefully be dissolved, and that the Right Honourable Richard Burdon, Viscount Haldane, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, acting for and on behalf of His Majesty The King being the Patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said United Benefice of Ulceby with Croxton in case the same were now vacant, consents to the proposed Disunion.

"That six weeks and upwards before certifying such Inquiry and Consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid Representation to be affixed to the principal outer doors of each of the Parish Churches of Ulceby and Croxton with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they might, within such six weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands to us the said Archbishop against `such Disunion, but no sufficient cause has been shown.

"The Representation of the said Lord Bishop of Lincoln, our Inquiry into the circumstances of the case, the Statement of Circumstances in reply thereto, the Consent in writing of the said Patron of the said United Benefice, and the Copies of the Representation and Notices before mentioned, are hereunto annexed.

"And we do hereby certify the Inquiry and Consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council, to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may, in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make and issue an Order for the Disunion of the said United Benefice by the separation of the Rectory of Croxton from the
