

to £30 per annum, as and from the date on which the Separation under this Order shall take effect, and that no other changes of endowment shall be made.

"That the liability (if any) of the Incumbent of Baulking with Woolstone for the repair of the Chancel of the Church of Woolstone shall be transferred to the Incumbent of Uffington with Woolstone.

"That no alteration shall be made in the Patronage of the said Benefices, or either of them."

#### " CONSENTS.

"We, Henry Lindsay Archer-Houblon, being the Patron or person entitled to present to the Benefice of Baulking with Woolstone, and also to the Benefice of Uffington, (in case the same, or either of them, were now vacant), John Southby, Incumbent of the said Benefice of Baulking with Woolstone, and Edward MacGregor Hadow, Incumbent of the said Benefice of Uffington, hereby respectively signify to your Grace our several Consents to the Scheme above proposed and set forth, and to every matter and thing therein contained.

"In testimony whereof we have hereto set our hands this 2nd day of October, 1914.

And whereas the said Archbishop, being satisfied with the said Scheme, hath certified the same, and the Consents aforesaid, to His Majesty in Council by his Report dated the 8th day of October, 1914, as follows:—

"We, the undersigned, Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, do hereby represent to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That the Right Reverend Charles, Lord Bishop of Oxford, has represented unto us (amongst other things):—

"That there is, in the County of Berks, and his Diocese of Oxford, the Benefice or Perpetual Curacy of Baulking with Woolstone, the District of Woolstone having formerly consisted of a Chapelry (in the hereinafter-mentioned Parish of Uffington) the boundaries of which are well known and defined:

"The net income of the said Benefice is £64 14s. 2d., or thereabouts, and the population is 311, or thereabouts:

"There is a Church at Baulking with accommodation for 120 persons, and one at Woolstone with accommodation for 130 persons; the two Churches are 3¼ miles apart:

"That there is also, in the same County and Diocese, the Benefice or Vicarage of Uffington, the Parish whereof contains a population of 518, or thereabouts, with a Church accommodating 500 persons, or thereabouts, and situate about 1½ miles distant from the Church of Woolstone, and the net annual value of the said Benefice is £225, or thereabouts:

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that, under the Pluralities Act, 1838, that part of the Benefice of Baulking with Woolstone known as (and formerly the Chapelry of) Woolstone, may be advantageously separated from the Parish of Baulking with Woolstone, and united to the Parish of Uffington, to which it is contiguous:

"That pursuant to the directions contained

in the 26th Section of the said Act of Parliament, the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a Scheme in writing, describing the mode in which it appears to him that the proposed alterations may best be effected, and how the changes consequent upon such alterations in respect of ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithe, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to Patronage, and Rights to Pews, may be made with justice to all Parties interested, which Scheme, together with the Consents thereto in writing of Henry Lindsay Archer-Houblon, the Patron or person entitled to present to both the said Benefices, (in case the same, or either of them, were now vacant), the Reverend John Southby, the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Baulking with Woolstone, and the Reverend Edward MacGregor Hadow, the Incumbent of the said Benefice of Uffington, has been transmitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration:

"The Representation and Scheme of the said Lord Bishop, and the Consents above referred to, are hereunto annexed:

"And we, the said Archbishop, being on full consideration and inquiry satisfied with the said Scheme, do hereby, pursuant to the said Pluralities Act, 1838, certify the same, and such Consents, as aforesaid, to Your Majesty in Council, to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may, in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make and issue an Order for carrying the said Scheme into effect.

WHEREAS by the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by the Burial Act, 1900, it is provided that, in case it appears to His Majesty in Council, upon the Representation of the Local Government Board, that, for the protection of the public health, the opening of any new burial ground in any City or Town, or within any other limits, save with the previous approval of the Local Government Board, should be prohibited, or that burials in any City or Town, or within any other limits, or in any burial grounds or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order that no new burial ground shall be opened in any City or Town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require) that, after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such City or Town, or within such limits, or in such burial grounds or places of burial, shall be
