69952	Gunner ...	Buckingham, H. C.	37th Battery, Royal Field Artillery	For gallant conduct in conveying important messages under fire when the telephone failed. Was wounded whilst on this duty.
4048.	Serjeant ...	Buckle, J. ...	59th Company, Royal Engineers	For gallantry and ability near Richebourg, in directing the work of his section when erecting wire entanglements close to the enemy's position.
7600	Private ...	Bullock, P. ...	1st Battalion, 'King's Royal Rifle Corps	For conspicuous gallantry on the 19th September, 1914, at the Soupir Ridge, in obtaining valuable information as to the enemy's position whilst exposed to shell fire. Was again brought to notice on 27th November, for gallant conduct near Zonnebeke, in conveying messages on several occasions under very heavy machine-gun and shell fire.
9155	Serjeant ...	Burge, B. ...	1st Battalion, Somerset Light Infantry	For gallant conduct on 18th December, 1914, at Ploegsteert Wood, in remaining for two hours reconnoitring the enemy's position, being within 50 yards of their trenches.
8070	Acting Serjeant	Burgess, E. ...	1st Battalion, Royal Berkshire Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry and ability at Givenchy on 20th February, 1915. In the attack he was wounded in the head on entering the German trench, but went on and bayoneted two of the enemy. When his Officer had been wounded he assumed command of the covering party and conducted operations with ability.
7629	Private ...	Burns, P. ...	2nd Battalion, Scots Guards	For gallantry under fire at Kruseik, and also for good service in repairing telephone wire several times under very heavy fire.
10103	Acting Company Serjeant-Major	Burns, T. J. ...	1st Battalion, Gordon Highlanders	For conspicuous gallantry on 14th December, 1914, in an attack on the German trenches near Kemmel, when he conducted the advance of his platoon with great coolness and ability under heavy fire after his Officer had been wounded.
5343	Private ...	Burt, A. ...	1st Battalion, Cameron Highlanders	For conspicuous gallantry, coolness, and resource on 22nd December, 1914, near Givenchy. In company with another man (who was killed) he went out to rescue a wounded comrade, but, being unable to carry him, Private Burt feigned death for a period of two hours and then returned to our trenches, obtained assistance, and brought the wounded man into safety.
6549	Private ...	Burton, E. ...	1st Battalion, Norfolk Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry at Festubert on 25th October, 1914, in voluntarily conveying messages on several occasions over fire-swept ground, and also for rescuing a wounded comrade whilst exposed to the fire of snipers.
9694	Lance-Corporal	Burton, J. D. ...	1st Battalion, East Yorkshire Regiment	For coolness and resource near Vieux Berquin on 14th October, 1914. When carrying orders he succeeded in avoiding a German cavalry patrol. On the 19th October, he was brought to notice for gallantry in carrying messages on several occasions under fire.
6836	Private ...	Butler, J. ...	1st Battalion, East Lancashire Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry at Le Gheer on 15th January, 1915, in voluntarily going a distance of 35 yards in front of his trench in daylight and assisting in the rescue of a wounded man (who was still being fired at) and conveying him into cover, whilst exposed to heavy fire.
