3009	Lance-Corporal	Hough, E. ...	2nd Battalion, Royal Scots	For conspicuous gallantry in the attack on the enemy's trenches near Kemmel on 14th December, 1914, and for assisting to rescue a wounded Officer on 6th idem, under a heavy fire.
3831	Lance-Corporal	House, E. ...	16th Lancers ...	For most conspicuous gallantry at Wulverghem on 5th November, 1914, in assisting in leading a body of 40 unattached men in a successful charge against the enemy, in which he was mortally wounded.
50651	Bombardier	How, W. S. ...	93rd Battery, Royal Field Artillery	For gallantry during the period extending from 24th to 30th November, 1914, in constantly repairing telephone wires by night and day, whilst exposed to shell and rifle fire.
5741	Serjeant ...	Hughes, G....	No. 7 Mountain Battery, Royal Garrison Artillery	For gallantry and ability on the night of 31st December, 1914, when he brought a gun into action 400 yards from the enemy's position in support of our Infantry, with great judgment and effect.
7712	Private ...	Hughes, L. ...	2nd Battalion, Dorsetshire Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry and resource on 17th November, 1914, in the engagement at Sahil (Turkey in Asia). After his Officer had been wounded he took charge of the machine gun, which he pushed up close to the enemy, and worked it with excellent effect upon them. During the engagement there was no cover whatever available.
14707	Lance-Corporal	Hulmes, J. ...	1st Battalion, Grenadier Guards	For gallant conduct on 29th October, 1914, near Gheluvelt, in rescuing a wounded Officer under heavy fire.
14000	Lance Corporal (Acting Serjeant)	Humphries, C. F. G.	1st Battalion, Manchester Regiment, formerly No. 207 Army Service Corps	For conspicuous gallantry and coolness at Givenchy, during the attack on 20th-21st December, 1914, and also for gallantry in endeavouring to bring into cover the body of his Company Commander, who had been killed in the engagement.
9281	Lance-Corporal	Hunt, D. ...	2nd Battalion, Highland Light Infantry	For conspicuous gallantry and presence of mind under fire on 2nd November, 1914, in bandaging a wounded Officer and removing him to cover. Has proved himself a most capable soldier under trying conditions in the campaign.
9607	Acting-Serjeant	Husher, J. W. ...	2nd Battalion, West Riding Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry, resource and coolness on many occasions, especially near Hooze, on 11th October, 1914. By his marked ability on this occasion he succeeded in stopping the enemy's advance, although his left flank had become unprotected.
28763	Corporal ...	Huston, G. M. ...	7th Divisional Signal Company, Royal Engineers (Cyclist)	For gallant conduct in conveying messages under shell fire, until machine was destroyed by shrapnel.
8479	Private ...	Hyslop, R. ...	1st Battalion, Gordon Highlanders	For very gallant conduct on 14th December, 1914, in undertaking the delivery of a most urgent message after six men had been killed in the attempt. He succeeded. Again, on the same day, he went forward at dusk to act as guide to an Officer's position, a place of danger situated only fifty yards from the enemy's main trench.
10065	Lance-Serjeant	Inches J. ...	2nd Battalion, Royal Scots Fusiliers	Has been noted for conspicuous gallantry.
