9484	Acting Company Serjeant-Major	Thornton, P. ...	1st Battalion, Royal Warwickshire Regiment	For gallant conduct in endeavouring, whilst wounded and accompanied by only a few men, to capture the enemy's machine guns. In this attempt he failed owing to there being no support at hand at the moment.
68571	Gunner ...	Thoumire, A. E. A.	28th Brigade, Royal Field Artillery	For gallantry on 23rd October, 1914, at Festubert in saving telephone equipment whilst under fire and isolated.
4312	Serjeant-Major	Titmas, E. C. ...	2nd Battalion, Royal Scots Fusiliers	Has been noted for conspicuous gallantry.
S. S. 1087	Provisional Lance-Corporal	Tooley, G. J. ...	Army Service Corps...	For conspicuous gallantry, resource and coolness on 5th November, 1914, at Ypres, when the building in which the horses and grooms were quartered was struck by a shell; he showed great gallantry and ability in dressing the men's wounds before the arrival of Medical Officers.
9210	Private ...	Tripp, A. V. T. ...	1st Battalion, Scottish Rifles	For gallant conduct, resource and coolness at Culvert Farm on 4th February, 1915. During a heavy bombardment all the drivers had left their horses (except one man), and Private Tripp by skilful handling of the animals, and with much difficulty, prevented a general stampede.
5102	Serjeant ...	Trotter, H. ...	2nd Battalion, King's Royal Rifle Corps	For conspicuous gallantry and ability on many occasions, especially at Troyon on 14th September, 1914, when he led a patrol and obtained valuable information, and again on 17th idem for rescuing a wounded man from a very exposed position in front of the firing line. On a previous occasion he rescued another wounded man under heavy fire.
8239	Serjeant ...	Tuersley, C. ...	1st Battalion, Royal Fusiliers	For gallant conduct and ability on 9th November, 1914, near Fleurbaix; whilst attending on a wounded man he was himself severely wounded, but remained with his men very gallantly until assistance arrived.
8192	Private ...	Turnbull, J. T. ...	1st Battalion, Royal West Kent Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry, coolness and resource between 13th and 19th November, 1914. Repeatedly left his trench by day and night to reconnoitre the enemy's position, under heavy fire, and obtained reliable information. He accounted for six German snipers and brought back their rifles.
53320	Corporal ...	Turner, F. H. ...	25th Battery, Royal Field Artillery	For gallantry and ability between 22nd-27th October, 1914, in signalling and conveying messages under heavy fire of every description.
11772	Private ...	Turner, G. ...	2nd Battalion, King's Own Scottish Borderers	For gallant conduct at Missy Bridge on 14th September, 1914, in carrying ammunition to the firing line under a heavy fire. On a previous occasion he rescued three wounded men whilst under fire.
5979	Serjeant ...	Underwood, H. ...	2nd Battalion, Wiltshire Regiment (attached Royal Engineers)	For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty between 20th and 30th October, 1914, often under very heavy fire. Although wounded he remained at his post repairing telephone line.
6061	Private ...	Urquhart, G. ...	2nd Battalion, Scots Guards	For gallant conduct and resource at Kruseik, in repairing a telephone wire under very heavy fire, and also for conveying a message under heavy fire at great risk.
2303	Acting-Lance-Serjeant	Usher, W. ...	1st Battalion, Irish Guards	For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. When ordered to retire with his platoon in an emergency, he went back and rescued one of his wounded men under a heavy fire.
