1836	Lance-Corporal	Venters, A....	2nd Battalion, Royal Highlanders	For conspicuous gallantry and dash on 23rd and 24th November, 1914, in voluntarily assisting in the leading of parties of the 58th Vaughan's Rifles, which resulted in the recapture of the enemy's trenches.
1883	Company Serjeant-Major	Ventham, E.	2nd Siege Battery, Royal Garrison Artillery	For gallantry and ability in his work in the forward observation station, whilst continually under fire.
10884	Private	Viney, E.	2nd Battalion, Royal West Surrey Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on 15th December, 1914. Went with a message to recall an advanced party, and, although mortally wounded, succeeded in completing his duty before losing consciousness.
4858	Company Serjeant-Major	Vivian, F. W.	1st Battalion, Dorsetshire Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry and great ability throughout the campaign, especially at Givenchy on 13th October, 1914. The retirement of his Company in safety, when faced by great odds, from the position at Font Fixe, was largely due to his excellent endeavours.
7215	Corporal	Wagstaff, C. J.	2nd Battalion, Rifle Brigade	For gallant conduct in assisting to remove the body of an Officer which was lying 20 yards from the enemy's trenches.
14195	Private	Walker, A. E.	4th Battalion, Middlesex Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on 26th August, 1914, at Audencourt, in voluntarily attending on the wounded with great coolness under heavy shell fire.
6843	Corporal	Walker, W. H. G.	1st Battalion, Wiltshire Regiment	For gallant conduct. When on duty in a forward observation trench he observed the enemy threatening the flank of his Company and immediately conveyed the information to his Headquarters, being wounded in so doing.
36137	Serjeant	Waller, A. C.	8th Brigade Ammunition Column, Royal Field Artillery	For gallantry and resource on 14th September, 1914, near St. Marguerite, in removing the wounded, under heavy shell fire, into safety.
23523	Serjeant	Walsh, P.	5th Signal Company, Royal Engineers	For conspicuous gallantry on 28th October, 1914, under fire. Although wounded he removed the telephone wire across an open stretch of ground to the trenches, and restored the communications at a critical moment.
10002	Private	Walton, J. M.	1st Battalion, Royal Scots Fusiliers	For conspicuous gallantry on 14th December, 1914. During the bombardment preceding our attack on the German position, the telephone communication became broken and Private Walton voluntarily undertook the task of finding the break, covering a distance of nearly 500 yards under severe fire. He subsequently showed the utmost gallantry in conveying messages under fire.
11839	Private	Warner, J. W.	1st Battalion, Grenadier Guards	For gallantry on many occasions on 1st November, 1914, in conveying messages under very heavy fire.
5874	Private	Warwick, A.	1st Battalion, Middlesex Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry at La Boutillerie on 30th October, 1914, when he fired down a trench occupied by the enemy, greatly demoralising them, being largely instrumental in enabling the trench to be captured.
8757	Private	Warwick, J.	2nd Battalion, Durham Light Infantry	For gallant conduct on 20th September, 1914, at Troyon, valley of the Aisne, when he voluntarily assisted in the rescue of a wounded Officer under a heavy fire.
