

a distance of 28 chains or thereabouts to a point in the middle of the road leading past Pouchen End to Bourne End, and extending thence southward along the middle of such road for a distance of $25\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to its junction, north of Pouchen End, with the footpath leading to Green End, and extending thence eastward along the middle of such footpath for a distance of 14 chains or thereabouts to a point due north of the centre of the bridge which carries the line of the London and North Western Railway across the Grand Junction Canal, and extending from the said point in the middle of the footpath in a straight line due south (thereby crossing the boundary which divides the said Parish of Hemel Hempstead from the said New Parish of Boxmoor) for a distance of $32\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the centre of the said bridge upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Boxmoor from the said Parish of Bovingdon, and extending thence first north-eastward, and then in various directions, along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby following in one part the middle of the said Grand Junction Canal, and in another part the middle of the River Bulbourne) for a distance of 47 chains or thereabouts to the point where such boundary crosses the middle of the road leading from Fishery House into London Road at or near the southern side of the bridge which carries the said line of the London and North Western Railway across such road, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of the last-mentioned road for a distance of 7 chains or thereabouts to its junction with London Road and Box Lane, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Box Lane for a distance of 1 mile and 32 chains or thereabouts to its junction with the footpath running past the southern end of Gorsefield Wood, and extending thence north-westward in a straight line for a distance of $35\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the point where the road leading from Newhouse Farm to Bourne End is joined by the footpath leading from Lower Farm, upon the boundary which divides the said New Parish of Saint John the Evangelist, Ashley Green, from the said Parish of Bovingdon, and extending thence first north-eastward, and then in various directions, along the last-mentioned boundary (thereby following for a short distance the middle of the last-mentioned road) for a distance of 1 mile and 16 chains or thereabouts to the point where such boundary crosses the middle of the footpath leading from Lower Farm to Long Green, at which point the said imaginary line commenced."

And whereas the said Representation has been approved by His Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Representation, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts,

And His Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said Diocese of Saint Albans.

WHEREAS by the Burial Act, 1855, it was, amongst other things, enacted that it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act, (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, should or should not have arrived), as to His Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, might seem fit:

And whereas an Order in Council was made on the 8th February, 1855, directing the discontinuance of burials in certain places within the City of Canterbury, from the time specified in such Order:

And whereas the said Order in Council of the 8th February, 1855, was varied by Orders in Council of the 26th February, 1897, the 16th February, 1903, the 28th March, 1903, and the 25th June, 1903, so far as it affected burials in Canterbury Cathedral:

And whereas it seems fit to His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that the said Orders in Council be further varied:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, notwithstanding anything in the said Orders in Council of the 8th February, 1855, 26th February, 1897, 16th February, 1903, 28th March, 1903, and 25th June, 1903, in the grave now existing in the Cloisters of the said Cathedral in which the body of the late Most Reverend Frederick Temple, Archbishop of Canterbury, has been buried, the burial may be allowed of the body of his widow.
