Madrid, Octob. 1. N. S.

By an Express from *Barcelona*, we have Advice, That 40 Men of War had appeared off of that place, supposed to be part of the French Fleet, which is returning towards the Ocean. The Marquis de los Velez has resigned the place of President of the Council of the Indies, which is given to the Duke of Montalto.

From the Imperial Army under the Command of the Duke de Croy near Futack, Octob. 2. N. S. On the 22d of the last month the whole Army passed the *Danube* at *Peter Waradin*, and encamped along the River about a Mile from that place. The 25th the General received Advice, That the Grand Visier was still encamped near *Belgrade*, employing his Foot to repair the Fortifications which were ruined during the late Siege; That his Cavalry lay dispersed in small Bodies, that they might be the better able to supply themselves with Forage; That the Tatars were posted near the *Sava*, and sent their Parties frequently over that River to make Incursions into *Sclavonia*; And that the Grand Visier had sent a Detachment of 4000 men to Conduct a Convoy of Provisions to *Temeswar*. This News was confirmed on the 27th, with this farther account, That 'twas believed the Turks, after having supplied *Temeswar*, would march on towards *Gyula*; and the same day Expresses were dispatched to give notice thereof to General *Veterani*, who Commands the Emperors Forces on that side. The 29th Major General *Hofkirken* marched from our Camp with his own Regiment of Horse, and *Vaudemonts* and *Bajompieres* towards *Segedin*, to cover those Parts against the Enemies Incursions, and to join, if he found it necessary with General *Veterani*. The same day Major General *Arco* left the Camp with two Bavarian Regiments, one of Foot, and the other of Dragoons, and took his march towards *Veris-Marton*, having Orders to return home. On the 30th the Army marched to this place; a Garison of 2500 Men, Commanded by an old Experienced Officer, being left in *Peter Waradin*.

Vienna, Octob. 9. N. S. The Emperor went from hence on Sunday last in the Evening to *Ebersdorf*, having before held a great Council of War to consider of making early and vigorous Preparations for the next Campaign. The Letters from *Croatia* acquaint us with the following Particulars of the late Expedition of their Ban *Bathiany* into *Bosnia*. On the 17th he began his march with the Troops of that Province from *Costanizza*, and the 19th in the Afternoon arrived near *Brunzeni Mayden*, which he resolved to Attack; and having accordingly posted his Troops, began the next Morning to fire upon the place with several pieces of Cannon. He summoned the Turks to give up the Town, but they answered, that they would defend it to the last: And thereupon the Ban ordered an Assault to be made; and after a Dispute of two hours, the *Croatians* entered the Town, and made themselves Masters of it; About Six Hundred Turks were put to the Sword, and many others were saved and made Prisoners after the first fury of the Soldiers was over: In this storm about Twenty of the *Croatians* were killed, and as many wounded. The Bassa of *Bosnia* lay all this while with some Troops he had drawn together at a place called *Vetouje*, and the Turks at *Mayden* expected he would have come to their assistance, but he did not stir; The Ban of *Croatia* sent out Parties to destroy all the Country two or three miles round, which they performed, and having rejoined their Main Body, he caused the Town of *Mayden* to be burnt, after having taken the Bombs and Ammunition out of the Magazine the Turks had there, and then returned home with a great Booty.

From Prince Lewis of Baden's Head Quarters at *Herenberg*, Oct. 7. N. S. The Imperial Forces, with those of *Bavaria*, *Franconia*; and *Saxia*, are still posted near this place to observe the Enemy;

who on the 4th instant left their Camp near *Kiel* and marched to *Lohr*, where they will continue till they go into Winter-quarters. One of our Parties, Commanded by Major *Zalm*, met 2 or 3 days ago a French Party not far from their Camp, and put them to the Rout, killing 40 of the Enemy upon the place, and bringing back several Prisoners and 50 Horses.

Hailbron, Oct. 10. N. S. Prince Lewis of Baden is expected in few days at *Nuremberg*, to assist at a Meeting which is appointed to be held there for settling the Winter-quarters, and other Matters relating to the Subsistence of the Confederate Forces; at which the Count de *Hohenlae* is to be present on the part of the Emperor, and the Baron *Van Posen* from the Elector of *Saxony*.

Cologne, Oct. 16. N. S. Six Regiments of *Brandenburg* Horse, who served on the *Upper Rhine* this Summer, passed that River some days ago at *New-Wiedt*, between *Coblentz* and *Andernac*, under the Command of Major-General de *Witz*, and to-morrow or the day following they will enter into the Archbishoprick of *Cologne*, where they are to have their Winter-quarters, together with five Battalions of Foot who come by Water from *Mentz*; though the Repartition of the said Quarters is not yet settled by the States of this Country. Yesterday came into this place a Battalion of *Munsteriens*, and another is expected in 2 or 3 days to remain in *Garison* here during the Winter. Our last Advices from the *Palatinate* tell us; That the French Army was posted at *Lohr*, not far from *Strasbourg*, and the Confederates about *Herenberg*, but that both Armies were going to separate, and to enter into Winter-quarters.

Hamburg, Oct. 16. N. S. The Ministers that have assisted in the Negotiation about the Business of *Ratzburg*, having happily concluded the same, and seen the Ratifications exchanged, are most of them parted from hence on their return home. The Treaty is as follows.

BE it known to every one; Whereas great Differences have arisen between his Royal Majesty of *Denmark*, *Norway*, &c. on the one side, and the most Serene House of *Brunswicke Lunenburg*, *Zell*, and *Hanover*, on the other, by reason of the new Fortifications made at *Ratzburg*, and the considerable number of Men that has been brought over to this side the *Elbe*, and put into that place; For preventing the dangerous Consequences thereof, by the Interposition of his Imperial Majesty, and of Their Royal Majesties of *Great Britany* and *Sweden*, the States General of the *United Provinces*, and his Electoral Highness of *Brandenburg*, and under the Guarantee promised by each of them, the Matter is amicably Adjusted and Agreed, as follows.

I. The former Friendship and good Correspondence between the King of *Denmark* and the House of *Brunswicke Lunenburg*, is hereby Renewed and Reestablished, and whatsoever may have passed on either side upon occasion of these Differences, contrary to the same, shall be wholly abolished and forgotten.

II. The House of *Brunswicke Lunenburg* Declares, That they will demolish the Fortification made in and about the Town of *Ratzburg*, and begin therewith the day after the Exchange of the Ratification of this Treaty; That the

said Demolishing shall be continued without any Intermission, and finished within 3 Weeks at farthest.

III. The House of Lunenburg declares farther, That immediately after the entire Demolishing of Ratzburg, they will withdraw the Men and Artillery they have put into that place, and cause the same to return over the Elbe into their own Territories, except 200 Men, who may remain in the Dutchy of Saxe Lawenburg, and be quartered therein as the House of Lunenburg shall think fit for maintaining the possession thereof.

IV. The King of Denmark declares on the other side, That after the Exchange of the Ratifications of this Treaty he will draw all his Troops from before Ratzburg, and out of the Country of Saxe Lawenburg into his own Dominions; That he will begin to do this the day after the Exchange of the Ratifications; and that in four days his Forces shall entirely quit the Country of Saxe Lawenburg, except two Regiments of Horse, and 6 Battalions of Foot, which shall remain with the Artillery; But that these Troops, together with the said Artillery, shall march out of the said Country within 14 days at farthest after the Ratification; That they shall take nothing from the Country but Hay and Straw; the King of Denmark providing Bread and all other Subsistence for his Troops. After the Signing of this Treaty there shall be free liberty to go in and come out of Ratzburg; and the Artillery shall immediately after the Ratification be withdrawn from their Posts to the distance of half a Mile from Ratzburg, where the said Troops shall subsist till the entire quitting of the Country, which is to be within a Fortnight at farthest as aforesaid.

V. Farther 'tis agreed, That all Hostilities shall cease on both sides from the day of the Signing this Treaty, and that besides the Contributions already demanded by the King of Denmark in August last, there shall be no farther Sums of Money exacted from the Country; That the Danish Forces shall in their marching away observe good Order and Discipline, and they that do otherwise shall be punished according to their Demerit.

VI. That the King of Denmark will in no manner meddle with the Succession of Saxe Lawenburg, by force, against the House of Brunswick Lunenburg, much less disturb the same directly or indirectly in the Possession thereof, but shall leave this Business to be determined according to Right.

VII. The Mediators do promise to take upon them the Guaranty of this Treaty, and as there shall be occasion, faithfully to execute the same.

In Witness whereof four Copies of this Agreement have been Prepared and Signed by the Ministers and Counsellors Empowered thereunto by both Parties, and Corroborated by their Seals; who have further Promised and Agreed, That the Ratifications thereof shall be exchanged within 3 days; and that the same shall be dispatched by his Highness Duke George William, in the Name of the most Serene House of Brunswick Lunenburg, Zell, and Hanover; 'Tis also Promised and Agreed in the Name of all the Mediators, by their respective Ministers, that the several Instruments of Guaranty shall be procured within 6 Weeks, and delivered to the Ministers of the Parties, empowered for that purpose. Done at Hamburg, Octob. 9. N.S. 1693.

Hull, Octob. 11. Yesterday Sailed from hence 2 Dutch Men of War for Amsterdam, with divers Merchant Ships belonging to this Town, and several others from the Northwards.

Bristol, Octob. 14. On Thursday last came in here the Three Brothers of London, of 130 Tuns, and 10 Guns, Wilmoit Commander, in 21 days from Malaga; He met on the 10th instant off of Scilly with a French Privateer of 12 Guns, and fought him above four hours, when the Privateer bore away, having as its supposed lost divers Men, though Captain Wilmoit had the good fortune not to have one Man killed or wounded, but the Ship is much damaged in her Hull, Rigging, and Sails, her Mizen Mast shot down, and her Main Mast much damaged.

Plimouth, Octob. 15. On the 12th came into this Port Their Majesties Ship the Dunkirk, one of Sir Francis Wheeler's Squadron, from which she was separated about 10 days ago in bad Weather. The same day came in the John of London from Malaga. On the 13th arrived here the Hudsons Bay Frigate, Captain Michael Grimmonston Commander, from Hudsons Bay, who brings the good News, That the Hudsons Bay Company have retaken from the French the Forts and Factories which they took from them in time of Peace.

London, Octob. 18. There are arrived in the River several Ships from Malaga, whence they came on the 23d of the last month, and bring an account, That the Governor had that Morning received Advice by an Express, That the Marechal de Tessy was come with 9 Capital Ships into the Bay of Almeria, about 18 Leagues to the East-

ward of Malaga, and that the rest of the French Fleet was several Leagues to the Eastward of the said Bay, plying Westward. A Genouise is also arrived in the River, who came from Cadix on the 24th of September, and brings advice of the safe arrival there of 3 Ships from Buenos Ayres in the West Indies, all 3 very Rich, having a great quantity of Silver on Board.
