W Hereas a Report has been raised and spread by Henry Killigrew Esq; Sir Ralph Delaval, and Sir Cloudesley Shovel Kts. Admirals of Their Majesties Fleet; That the Right Honourable the Lord Viscount Falkland, one of the Lords of Their Majesties most Honourable Privy Council, did, upon Reading a Paper at the Board, Stifle something that was Material to their Justification; The Lords of the Council having considered of, and examined into the Matter, are Satisfied, and do Declare, That the said Report is False and Scandalous, although upon the said Examination, it did also appear, that something happened which might mislead the Admirals into that Error: And it is Ordered in Council, That this be Printed and Published in the Gazette.

Venice, Octob. 9. By Letters from our Fleet of the 9th of the last month, we are informed, That the Doge Morosini finding the Turks kept within their Camp near *Thebes*, had posted 6000 Horse and Foot to guard the *Isthmus of Corinth*, and was Sailed with the Men of War and Gallies towards the *Archipelago*. They write from *Rome* of the 3d, That the Courier was returned from *France*, with the Submission of the nominated Bishops, who assisted in the Assembly of the Clergy in 1682, and a respectful Letter from the French King to the Pope on this occasion.

Vienna, Octob. 10. The last Letters from Hungary give an account, That the Imperial Army was still encamped on the 5th instant near *Futack*; That their General, the Duke de *Croy* was dangerously Sick; That some of the Enemies Gallies appeared on the 3d near *Titul*, but retired again without attempting any thing; However it was thought necessary to send thither a Reinforcement of Men, with a supply of Artillery, Provisions, and Ammunition; and Orders were given to Admiral *Assenburg*, to post four Armed Vessels before *Peter Waradin*, where they are to remain during the Winter, to cover that place on the side of the *Danube*. The Turks in the mean time work very hard to repair the Fortifications of *Belgrade*, and are besides making a new Counterscarpe by the Direction of the Ingenier *Cornaro*, to whom the Grand Visier is said to have given the Title of *Basha*, for a Recompence of his Services during the Siege; The Visier had put 6000 Men more into *Belgrade*, and contenting himself with having thus provided for the security of that Fortress, and with sending 7 or 8000

Turks and Tartars over the *Danube*, (upon what design is not known) he was retired with the rest of his Troops towards *Serranaria*. The Count de *Winditzgratz* is returned hither from the *Hague*.

Francfort, Octob. 18. The Confederate Army under the Command of Prince *Louis of Baden*, continues Cantoned about *Harrenberg*; And the French, Commanded by the *Marschal de Lange*, about *Offenburg*; 'Tis said that the latter will repass the *Rhine* on the 22d instant, in order to go into their Winter-quarters. The States of *Frankonia* are assembled at *Nuremberg*, to regulate the Quarters for their Forces.

Cologne, Octob. 20. The *Brandenburg* Cavairy, which is come from the *Upper Rhine* under the Command of Major General de *Witz*, with six Battalions of Foot, are entered into this Archbishoprick, where they design to take their Winter-quarters. Of the Elector of *Saxony's* Forces four Regiments are marching home, and the rest are going into the Winter-quarters assigned them, which reach from *Hailbronn* to *Francfort*. The new Levies made in *Switzerland*, and particularly in the Canton of *Berne*, for the Service of the *United Provinces*, continue to pass in small Parties through this City in their way towards *Holland*; They will make in all a Body of 4000 Men.

Paris, Octob. 19. This Week was Published here an Order of the Council of State, dated the 13th instant, by which, according to the Arbitrary Methods of this Government, leave is given to all Persons to Plow and Sow such Lands as lie Untilled in any Part of this Kingdom, (as they do in many places, by reason the People, under their present Misery and Poverty, cannot go to the excessive Price Corn now bears here, to Sow them,) and to receive all the Fruit and Benefit thereof, without paying any Rent to the Proprietors of the said Lands, or to the Lords on whom they depend; And by the said Order all Persons are forbid to seize any Corn, upon account of the *Taille*, and other Royal Duties. There is Published another Order of the Council, declaring, That the Pieces of Money, heretofore reformed or new Stampd, shall be Currant for the rest of this Month only, the *Louis d'Ors* at 11 Livres 14 Sols, and the Crown Pieces at 3 Livres 3 Sols; and that the pieces of Money which shall be Reformed, or new Stampd, in pursuance of the Edict of *September* last, shall be Currant, the *Louis d'Ors* at 14 Livres, and the Crowns at 3 Livres 12 Sols, and the other pieces proportionably. The Letters from *Pignrol* of the 10th instant, say, That the French Army under Monsieur *Catinat* was marched towards *Geni*. The Confederate Forces were encamped near *Turin*.

Brussels, Octob. 21. The Elector of *Bavaria* is returned hither; and the greatest part of the Forces that were lately encamped at *Nimue*, are now

now Cantoned along the Canal, between Alost, Dendermonde, and this City; We are told that Orders are given for the Fortifying the first of these Places, and that three Walloon Regiments are marched thither from *Leeuwe*. The French Forces are separated and gone into Quarters, and the Duke of *Luxemburg* began his Journey the 16th instant for *Versailles*; The French have put three Battalions into *Charleroy*; and have posted 17 Battalions along the *Sambre*; to protect their Workmen who are employed to repair the Fortifications of that place, the Government whereof is given to Monsieur *Boissier*, who was formerly Governor of *Limerick* in *Ireland*; They do likewise fortify *Contraire*, and have lodged several Battalions in the Villages thereabouts. The Count de *Guisane* is with a Body of French Horse in the *Condros*, who intend to subsist there during the rest of this month. The Duchess Dowager of *Hanover* arrived yesterday in the Evening at *Hall*; His Electoral Highness of *Bavaria* has sent the Count de *Freyburg* to Compliment her Highness, and his Guards to attend her to *Malines*, where she will be this Night. The Duke of *Wurtemberg* went from hence yesterday to *Ghent*, where the Danish Troops are in Garrison; And Monsieur *Dickvelt* returned the same day to the *Hague*.

Hague, Octob. 23. The Wind being Easterly last Night, His Majesty went from hence very early this Morning to the Sea side, over against the *Brill*, in order to Embark, but the Wind coming about again to the N. W. His Majesty returned hither in the Evening, having given Orders that all things should be in a readiness for His Majesties Embarking with the first slatch of Wind. The Elector of *Bavaria* has received a Letter by Express from the Marquis de *Leganez*, Governor of *Milan*, of the 9th instant, giving an account of the late Battle in *Piedmont*, which in substance is the same that has already been made publick here; to wit, That the Horse of the Left Wing of the Confederate Army having given way, the Enemy attackt our Corps de *Bataille* in Flank and Rear, who after a very brave and vigorous Resistance, was at last over-powered by the Enemies numbers; That the Right Wing of the Allies, composed of the Emperors Cuirassiers, had all along the better of the Enemies Left, consisting of their Gens d'Armes, and at last made a good Retreat, still beating back the Enemies Troops that came to Charge them: That the loss in this Battle was almost equal on both sides, and he speaks with great Admiration of the Bravery of the Duke of *Schenberg*, without mentioning his being in any danger by his Wound, from whence we conclude he was on his Recovery. They write from *Paris*, That the French King had dispatched Monsieur de *Chanlay* to *Piedmont*, to make Proposals of Peace to the Duke of *Savoy*, but we are assured that his Royal Highness has resolved not to hearken to any Overtures of this kind, but to remain firm in the Alliance he is engaged in.

Edinburg, Octob. 17. Yesterday was Published here a Proclamation, forbidding a new all Commerce and Correspondence with *France*, and especially the supplying the French Kings Dominions with Corn from this Kingdom, or bringing any thing from thence under very severe Penalties. Two days ago arrived in our Frith a Ship belonging to *London*, *Archur Montreiff* Master, bound home from *Virginia*.

Pembroke, Octob. 20. On Sunday last came into this Harbour a Ship of *Brissol*, which was taken by the French, and retaken by the *Dragon*, laden with Sugars and Cotton from *Martinico*; And on Tuesday arrived here the *Sarah* of *London*, *Thomas Gillingham* Master, from *Barbadoes*

and *Antegoa*; He brings no News, having been long in his Voyage.

Hull, Octob. 21. Yesterday S. S. d out of *Humber* above 60 Sailing Merchant Ships bound for *Rotterdam*, under Convey of two Dutch Men of War.

Plimouth, Octob. 21. The 20th arrived in this Port the *America* of *Plimouth*, *Walter Lagger* Master, from *Malaga*, with Oil and Fruit for *Liphara*.

Staff, Octob. 22. This day arrived here the Packet *B. A.* the Mail of Friday last was Sennight from *Holland*, having been 8 days at Sea.
