"Whereas by Section 1 of the Injuries in War (Compensation) Act, 1914, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Your Majesty, by Your Order in Council, to frame a Scheme as to the pensions, grants, and other allowances in the nature thereof, to be paid to persons, not being Officers or Seamen of the Royal Navy, or Officers or Soldiers of any of Your Majesty's Land or Marine Forces, in respect of injuries suffered by them whilst employed affoat by or under the Admiralty, or Army Council, in connection with warlike operations in which Your Majesty is engaged, and, in the
