Naples, Octob. 6.

The new Levies are continued in this Kingdom with good Success for the Service of the State of Milan and Catalonia. The Gallies of Naples are shortly expected here from Port Mahon; and are afterwards designed with a Supply of Men and Provisions to Porto Longone.

Milan, Octob. 14. The Marquis de Leganes, our Governor General, arrived here on Sunday last from Piedmont; and the day following caused the Council of this City to meet, of whom he demanded 300000 Crowns, for the Payment of the Troops and other Services of the War; after which he dispatched an Express to the Court of Spain, and another to Vienna. The Troops that were employed in the Blockade of Casal are marched to Piedmont, and we are told that part of the Garison of Final is also ordered thither to reinforce the Confederate Army. Our Governor will part from hence to morrow on his return to Turin.

Venice, Octob. 16. The Count de St. Maurice has made an Offer to the Senate to raise a Regiment of Suissers for the Service of this Republick, which 'tis believed they will accept of; They give out Commissions daily for new Levies, and intend to reinforce their Army very considerably against next Spring. The Doge Morosini is sailed with the Fleet towards the Archipelago.

Turin, Octob. 17. The Confederate Forces which are encamped near this City, having received a Reinforcement, are preparing to march against the Enemy, who have passed the Po at Polonghera. The Earl of Warwick and Holland, who was Travelling in these Parts, and came out of Curiosity to see the Bombarding of Pignerol, finding the Armies so near each other that they could not separate without a Battle, was desirous to have a share in it, and continued during the whole Action with the Duke of Schonberg, distinguishing himself with great Courage and Forwardness, till at last he was likewise wounded and taken Prisoner; But the next day he was Released upon his Parole, and brought thither; His Wound is in the fleshy part of the Thigh, and in so good a Condition, that his Lordship is out of all danger. The Duke of Schonberg Died this Morning, very much lamented for his Personal Merits and great Conduct and Valour.

Warsaw, Octob. 10. The Meeting of the general Diet of this Kingdom is appointed for the 15th of December next. The Forces of this Crown have passed the River Weyzel at Oflewicze, and were by our last Advice still encamped near that place to observe the Tartars, who are said to be marching in a great Body to supply the Garison of Caminitz with Provisions and other Necessaries to their Subsistence during the Winter: But considering how far the Season is advanced, 'tis thought our Army will now quickly separate and go into their Winter-quarters.

Madrid, Octob. 15. On the 7th instant the King of Spain declared 3 Lieutenant Generals, to wit, the Almirante of Castille, the Constable, and the Duke of Montalto, who are to Command the Militia of the several Provinces of this Kingdom, with a Power Independent of the Viceroys; The Count de Buvarente is made first Gentleman of the Bed-Chamber to his Catholick Majesty in the room of the Duke de Pastrana, lately Deceased. And the Place of President of the Council of the Indies is given to the Duke of Montalto, together with the Superintendantship of his Catholick Majesties Revenues. We are told, That the Spanish Fleet, Comanded by Don Pedro Corbette, is Sailed from Port Mahon in order to return to Cadix.

Vienna, Octob. 21. The Emperor has named the Prince de Furst to reside at the Court of Rome with the Character of his Ambassador Extraordinary, in the Place of the Prince of Lichterstein, who is coming home to be Governor to the Arch-Duke Charles the Emperors Second Son. A considerable Sum of Money has been lately sent to Hungary to be employed for carrying on the new Fortifications that are making at Peter Waradin, Eszacke, and Buda. The last Letters from the Imperial Army are of the 13th instant, and give an account, That General Hiltz, Count of Heydelsheim, was marched with most of the Horse and Dragoons, and some Field Pieces, to joyn with General Hefkirken, who was already posted with several Imperial Regiments near Segedin, in order to cover the Upper Hungary against the Inroads of the Turks and Tartars, who were come with a Body of 8 or 10000 men into the Neighbourhood of Temiswarer. The Duke de Croj remained with the rest of the Imperial Forces near Eszacke, to observe the Grand Visier, who was still encamped between Scwandria and Belgrade. In the mean time an Express has been sent from hence with the Reportation of the Winter-Quarters for the Imperial Forces in Hungary. The Council of VVar meets frequently to consult about the Preparations for the next Campagne.

Strasbourg, Octob. 15. The French Army Comanded by the Marshal de Lorge is marched from Lohr towards Altsprick, where they will continue a few days, and then pass the Rhine.

Frankfort, Octob. 28. The Winter-quarters are settled for the Confederate Forces; Those of Saxony have theirs assigned them between this place and Hailbron. We hear from Strasbourg, That the French Army was going to repossess the Rhine, and to enter into their Quarters; and as soon as they have done so, Prince Lewis of Baden, who lies still about Altingen, will likewise separate his Forces. General Tallard continues with 5 or 6000 French Horse about Creutsnach.

Brussels, Nov. 1. The Troops on both sides are marching to their Winter-quarters. The Cavalry, which is to remain in Garison here, will enter into the place to morrow; and on Wednesday a Review will be taken. The French have 10000 men between Menin and Dixmuyde, Comanded by Monsieur de la Valette. The Duke of Luxembourg is still at Courtray.

Dublin, Octob. 24. The last Week were Published two Proclamations by the Lords Justices and Council, which follow.

WHereas the late Lords Justices and Council did Publish their Proclamation bearing date the Fourth day of February, 1691. in the Tenor following.

Whereas We are Informed that several Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, and other Magistrates, presuming on their Power in the Country, have by Colour of their Authority in a most Illegal and Arbitrary Manner, and Contrary to the known Laws of this Kingdom, Dispossessed several of their Majesties Subjects, not only of their Goods and Chattels, but of their Lands and Tenements to the Disturbance of the Quiet and Peace of this Kingdom, the Subversion of the Law, and the Reproach of their Majesties Government. We therefore Command and Require all Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs and other Magistrates whatsoever, that they forbear all such Illegal Proceedings. And that they do not so far Presume on their Authority as to meddle with the Property, Right, Title or Possession of the Estates Goods or Chattels of any their Majesties Subjects, other than as by due Course of Law, they are required and

as they should be able to justify. And We Require all Sheriffs to Cause this Our Proclamation publickly to be Proclaimed, in every Market-Town within their respective Counties the next Three Market-Days succeeding after this shall come to their Hands, to the End Their Majesties Subjects who have been any wise Grieved, may have Notice of this Our Resentment of such Unlawful Proceedings, so that they may make Complaint if they think fit to the next Sitting Judges at the respective Assizes, in Order to have Redress for the Injuries done them, and that the Offenders may be dealt with according to Law.

Whereas that the said Proclamation Aimed at the Publick Good, yet the same has not had the Full and desired Effect, but that notwithstanding the Publication thereof, the same Evil Practices are still continued (do think fit) and do hereby Publish and Declare, That if any Justice of the Peace or Sheriff shall presume to Offend in the Premises, he shall be Discharged of his respective Office and Employment, and shall be further Prosecuted and Punished with the utmost Severity of Law.

Whereas divers of Their Majesties Subjects of this Kingdom, moved thereunto by the hopes of Gain, which they prefer before the Interest and Safety of their Country, have not only of late Traded from France, and Imported hither divers Goods and Merchandizes of the Growth, Product and Manufacture of the Dominions of the French King, contrary to Law; but also, knowing that the French King and his Subjects are at this time distressed for want of Corn and Provisions, they have, as We are informed, Bought up and have Agreed to Buy up great Quantities of all sorts of Corn, Grain, and other Provisions, in order to Transport the same into France, for the Relief of their Majesties Enemies; which Offence in all Persons concerned therein is by the known Laws of this Realm, High-Treason: And to cover their Disloyal and Wicked Practices, they pretend to Enter such Corn, Grain, and other Provisions, for Spain, and other Countreys in Amity and Alliance with their Majesties. And whereas other Their Majesties good Subjects, who intend nothing but to Trade and Merchandize with the Kingdom of England, and their Majesties Allies, have been frequently surprized by French Privateers, who have carried their Ships and Cargoes into France, whereby the Exporters have been Ruined, and their Majesties Enemies supplied in their Extream Want and Necessity. For the speedy Prevention thereof, and in Obedience to Her Majesties Pleasure, signified to Us, We the Lords Justices, by Advice of the Council here, have caused a strict Charge and Directions to be given to the Collectors and other Their Majesties Officers, at the several Ports and Creeks in this Kingdom, That they take especial Care to hinder all Importation and Exportation, to and from France. And moreover, that they stay all Ships Laden, or which shall be Laden, with any sort of Corn or Grain, from going out of any Port or Creek of this Realm without sufficient Convoys to be assigned by their Majesties for that Purpose. Whereof We the Lords Justices and Council do think fit to give Notice by this Our Publick Proclamation, to the end that none of their Majesties Subjects may pretend to be surprized or prejudiced for want of due Notice thereof.

And We do hereby Require and Command the Collectors and other Their Majesties Officers of the several Ports and Creeks of this Kingdom, that they give speedy Notice from time to time, to the Commissioners and Chief Governors of their Majesties Revenue, of all Ships Outward-Bound with Corn or Grain, to the end We may have timely Notice thereof, in order to the providing sufficient Convoys for them, as aforesaid.

Given at the Council-Chamber in Dublin, the Nineteenth day of October, 1693.

Westminster, Octob. 26. The Parliament met this day, and was by Commission farther Prorogued till the 7th of November next ensuing.

London, Oct. 30. This day Sir William Ashurst, Elected Lord Mayor of this City for the year ensuing, went to Westminster by Water, accompanied by the late Lord Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, and Sheriffs, and the several Companies in their respective Barges, and was according to Custom Sworn before the Barons of the Exchequer; After which they returned by Water to Black Fryers Strait, and from thence Rode through the City, with the usual Solemnity to Greaves-Hall; where a Noble Dinner was provided, at which were present the Lords of their Majesties Privy Council, the Judges, and many other Persons of great Quality.

Westminster, Octob. 31. The King Embarked last Saturday on the Mary Yacht, and Sailed the same Morning

out of the Masse, being attended by a Squadron of Men of War, under the Command of Rear Admiral Mitchell. On Sunday about 4 in the Afternoon His Majesty landed at Harwich, and went from thence to Colchester, where His Majesty lay at Sir Isaac Rebours; and last Night about Eleven a Clock His Majesty came to Kensington. The publick Joy for His Majesties Safe and Happy Return was expressed in all Places through which His Majesty passed, and especially in the Cities of London and Westminster, with Ringing of Bells, Bonfires, and Illuminations.

Tuesday Night being the last of October, the Recorder of London did Commit to Newgate one Abraham Stacy, a Notorious Beglar and Highwayman, who lately received Mercy, and since has Committed several Robberies and Felonies: Any that have been lately Robbd may have the sight of him in Newgate, and may Prosecute the next Sessions if they can give Evidence against him. He stood upon his Defence in Fleetstreet, and was dangerously wounded the Constable.
