

on or near the principal outer door of the Church, or in some Public and conspicuous place in each of such Benefices, Sinecure Rectories, or Vicarages, with Notice to any Person or Persons interested that he, she, or they may, within such 6 weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop, against such Union; and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the Inquiry and Consent aforesaid to His Majesty in Council, and thereupon it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such Benefices, Sinecure Rectory or Rectories, Vicarage or Vicarages, into one Benefice, with Cure of Souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only."

And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, hath, pursuant to the provisions of the said Acts, duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Certificate in Writing, bearing date the 19th day of March, 1915, in the words following:—

"We, Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of All England and Metropolitan, do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That the Right Reverend Frederic, Lord Bishop of Salisbury, as Bishop of the Diocese within which are situate the Vicarage of Bishop's or West Lavington and the Rectory of Cheverell Parva or Little Cheverell, both in the County of Wilts, having represented unto us that the said Benefices are contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population does not exceed 1,500 persons, might, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one Benefice, we inquired into the circumstances of the case:

"That on such Inquiry it appeared to us that such Union might be usefully made, and would not be of inconvenient extent, and that the said Lord Bishop of Salisbury in right of his Bishopric being the Patron or person entitled to present to the Benefice of Bishop's or West Lavington, (if the same were now vacant), and also to the Benefice of Cheverell Parva or Little Cheverell, (the same being now vacant), has consented to the proposed Union:

"That 6 weeks and upwards before certifying such Inquiry and Consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a Copy in Writing of the aforesaid Representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed to the principal outer door of the Parish Church of each of the said Benefices, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they, might, within such 6 weeks show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand, or hands, to us, the said Archbishop, against such Union, and no such cause has been shown:

"The Representation of the said Lord Bishop of Salisbury, our Inquiry into the circumstances of the case, the Statement of Circumstances in reply thereto, the Consent in Writing of the said Lord Bishop as Patron of both the said Benefices, and the copies of the Representation and Notices before mentioned, are hereunto annexed:

"And we do hereby certify the Inquiry and Consent aforesaid to Your Majesty in Council, to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may, in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make and issue an Order for

uniting the said Benefices into one Benefice with Cure of Souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

Now, therefore, His Majesty in Council, by and with the advice of His said Council, is pleased to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the Vicarage of Bishop's or West Lavington, situate in the County of Wilts, and the Diocese of Salisbury, and the Rectory of Cheverell Parva or Little Cheverell, situate in the same County and Diocese, shall be united into one Benefice with Cure of Souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

The following Statute duly passed on the 12th day of June, 1915, and sealed on the 18th day of June, 1915, by the Governing Body of Corpus Christi College, Oxford, has been submitted for the approval of His Majesty in Council, and notice of its having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions contained in "The Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877":—

Whereas the Governing Body of Corpus Christi College, in the University of Oxford, did, under the provisions of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act, 1877, on the 12th day of June, 1915, at a General Meeting of the said Governing Body of the College, specially summoned for the purpose, by the votes of not less than two-thirds of the number of persons present and voting, make by Statute the following alterations in Clause 13 (b) of the Statutes of the College:

And whereas the said Governing Body of the College did, on the 18th day of June, 1915, affix the Common Seal of the College to the said alterations of the Statutes of the College:

Now, therefore, the said Governing Body of Corpus Christi College, in the University of Oxford, doth hereby submit to His Majesty The King in Council, for His approval, the said alterations of the Statutes of the College.

In the Statutes made for Corpus Christi College, in the University of Oxford, by the University of Oxford Commissioners, and approved by Her late Majesty Queen Victoria in Council on the 3rd day of May, 1882:—

In Clause 13 (b) after the words "hereinafter specified" add the words "free of income tax."

In the same Clause (13 (b)) add the following words:—"Emoluments paid to an Official Fellow out of the General Revenues of the College, in addition to the Emoluments of his Fellowship, shall up to £150 per annum be free of income tax up to 2s. 6d. in the pound."
