Regimental No.	Rank.	Name.	Corps.	Action for which commended.
8584	Private ...	Savage, J. ...	2nd Battalion, Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry on the 13th May, 1915, and on many previous occasions. On the 16th May, 1915, near Le Toquet, he voluntarily went down a mine, which was full of gas, several times, and rescued men suffering from gas poison. Finally he was himself overpowered by the fumes, and lost his life.
8405	Private ...	Scadden, F. ...	2nd Battalion, Dorsetshire Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty on 14th April, 1915, in Turkey in Asia, when, as stretcher bearer, he attended two seriously wounded men under very heavy fire, and whilst doing so was himself wounded. He continued, however, to render first aid until he collapsed from loss of blood. He has since died of wounds.
19903	Corporal ...	Scothern, W. ...	122nd Heavy Battery, Royal Garrison Artillery	For conspicuous gallantry on many occasions, and especially on the 23rd-24th April, 1915, near Frezenberg. Corporal Scothern repeatedly volunteered to repair telephone wires under heavy fire, and displayed the greatest courage and coolness while so doing. He gave a notable example of devotion to duty to all with him. He was wounded while repairing the wires.
8744	Corporal ...	Scott, H. ...	2nd Battalion, Dorsetshire Regiment	For gallant conduct and resource at Barjisiyah (Turkey in Asia) on 14th April, 1915, in attending to a seriously wounded Officer in the firing line. When he found that an artery was badly cut, he held on to it as a makeshift tourniquet for an hour under heavy fire at 400 yards.
640	Serjeant ...	Scott, L. ...	Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry	For conspicuous gallantry and resource on the 8th May, 1915, at Hooge. All the Officers having been killed or wounded, he collected a party of men and succeeded in holding a trench in spite of a very heavy attack.
5360	Bombardier (Acting Corporal)	Scott, R. J. ...	22nd Trench Mortar Battery, Royal Garrison Artillery	For gallant conduct on the 24th May 1915, near Shell Trap Farm. After the infantry had been driven from their trench by a gas attack and heavy shell fire, he made a gallant attempt to save his guns, but was rendered unconscious by the gas fumes, and so failed in his effort.
59188	Gunner ...	Seaman, A. J. ...	No. 2 Section, 2nd Divisional Ammunition Column, Royal Field Artillery	For conspicuous gallantry on the 9th May, and between the 16th and 20th May, 1915, at Rue du Bois, when he maintained communication between the Observing Station and the Battery by continually repairing the wires whenever cut, and laying new lines under constant and heavy shell fire. The observing party were shelled out of three stations, and Gunner Seaman was wounded.
7909	Private ...	Sedgbeer, C. ...	2nd Battalion, Dorsetshire Regiment	For conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty at Barjisiyah (Turkey in Asia) on 14th April, 1915, when he carried a wounded Officer out of the firing line, and then returned and took charge of some Indian troops in his vicinity whose officer had been wounded. He set them a fine example by his coolness and courage.
334	Corporal ...	Shanley, A. C. ...	2nd Highland Company, Royal Engineers (T.F.)	For conspicuous gallantry on 16th May, 1915, at Festubert, when laying out a communication trench under heavy rifle fire. In doing this Corporal Shanley was severely wounded.
