At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 28th day of July, 1915.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances Tithings, Hamlets, Chapelries, and other Places or Districts may be separated from the Parishes or Mother Churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and Places altogether extra-parochial may, in some instances, with advantage be annexed to Parishes or Districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate Parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own Diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any Diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop, that any such Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place or District within the Diocese of such Archbishop, or the Diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any Parish or Mother Church, and either be constituted a separate Benefice by itself or be united to any other Parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place, or District, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a

separate Parish or Benefice, or that any Extra-parochial Place may with advantage be annexed to any Parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes; and the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a Scheme in writing (the Scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the Patron or Patrons of the Benefice or Benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such Scheme, or to such modification thereof as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such Scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such Consent as aforesaid, by his Report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such Scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Edward Lee, Lord Bishop of Lincoln, hath made a

Representation in writing, dated the 11th day of July, 1914, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I, the Right Reverend Edward Lee, Bishop of Lincoln, do hereby represent to your Grace that there is, in the County and Diocese of Lincoln, the Vicarage and Parish Church of Gosberton:

"That the population of the Parish of Gosberton according to the Census of 1911 amounts to 1,944 persons, but since the Census was taken a new Parish of Gosberton Clough has been formed containing an estimated population of 1,200 persons, of whom about 740 were included in the above number (1,944):

"That there is one Church belonging to the said Parish of Gosberton affording accommodation for 630 persons:

"That the net annual value of the said Vicarage of Gosberton is £237 0s. 0d., arising from Tithe-rent-charge, Glebe, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty, and Fees:

"That there is a good and sufficient House of Residence for the Incumbent of the said Benefice:

"That the said Vicarage of Gosberton is in the Patronage of the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Lincoln:

"That there is, in the said County and Diocese, the Vicarage and Parish Church of Pinchbeck (St. Mary):

"That the population of the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) according to the Census of 1911 amounts to 1,594 persons:

"That there is one Church belonging to the said Vicarage of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) affording accommodation for 700 persons:

"That the net annual value of the said Vicarage of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) is £545 0s. 0d., arising from Glebe Land and Fees:

"That there is a good and sufficient House of Residence for the Incumbent of the said Benefice:

"That the said Vicarage of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) is in the Patronage of Frank Field Wayet, of the Vicarage, Pinchbeck (St. Mary), in the County of Lincoln, Clerk in Holy Orders:

"That there is, in the said County and Diocese, the Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage and Parish Church of St. Paul, Spalding:

"That the population of the said new Parish of St. Paul, Spalding, according to the Census of 1911 amounts to 603 persons:

"That there is one Church belonging to the said new Parish of St. Paul, Spalding, affording accommodation for 480 persons:

"That the net annual value of the said Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage of St. Paul, Spalding, is £350 0s. 0d., paid by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners:

"That there is a good and sufficient House of Residence for the Incumbent of the said Benefice:

"That the said Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage of St. Paul, Spalding, is in the Patronage of me, the said Bishop, in right of my Bishopric, jointly with the Vicar for the time being of Spalding (St. Mary and St. Nicholas):

"That there is, in the said County and Diocese, the Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage and Parish Church of Surfleet:

"That the population of the said Parish of

Surfleet according to the Census of 1911 amounts to 1,004 persons, but this population has been reduced by the formation of the new Parish of Gosberton Clough:

"That there is one Church belonging to the said Parish of Surfleet affording accommodation for 207 persons:

"That the net annual value of the said Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage of Surfleet is £204 17s. 6d., arising from Tithe-Rent-Charge, Glebe, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty, and Fees:

"That there is a good and sufficient House of Residence for the Incumbent of the said Benefice:

"That the said Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage of Surfleet is in my Patronage by virtue of my Bishopric:

"That two portions of the said Parish of Gosberton, containing an estimated population of 25 and 50 respectively, are situate at distances of 4 miles and 3 miles respectively by the nearest road from the Church of Gosberton, but they are situated at a distance of 3 miles and 2 miles respectively by the nearest road from the Church of Surfleet:

"That it appears to me that the said two portions of the said Parish of Gosberton, as shown upon the plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured red, may, under the provisions of the Act 1 and 2 Victoria, Chapter 106, be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Gosberton and annexed to the said Parish of Surfleet to which they are contiguous:

"That a portion of the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) is situate at a distance of 6½ miles by the nearest road from the Church of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), but is situate at a distance of 3 miles by the nearest road from the said Church of St. Paul, Spalding:

"That it appears to me that the said portion of the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), as shown upon the plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured pale green, may, under the provisions of the said Act 1 and 2 Victoria, Chapter 106, be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) and annexed to the said new Parish of St. Paul, Spalding, to which it is contiguous:

"That a further portion of the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), containing an estimated population of from 70 to 80, is situate at a distance of 2½ miles by the nearest road from the Church of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), but is situate 1 mile by the nearest road from the Church of Surfleet:

"That it appears to me that the said portion of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), as shown upon the plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured yellow, may, under the provisions of the said Act 1 and 2 Victoria, Chapter 106, be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) and annexed to the Parish of Surfleet to which it is contiguous:

"That a portion of the Parish of Surfleet, containing an estimated population of 35, is situate at a distance of 3 miles by the nearest road from the Church of Surfleet, but is situate at a distance of 2 miles by the nearest road from the Church of Gosberton:

"That it appears to me that the said portion of the said Parish of Surfleet, as shown upon the plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured dark green, may, under the provisions of the Act 1 and 2 Victoria, Chapter 106, be advantageously separated from the said Parish of

Surfleet and annexed to the said Parish of Gosberton to which it is contiguous:

"That a further portion of the said Parish of Surfleet, containing an estimated population of 5, is situate at a distance of $9\frac{1}{2}$ miles by the nearest road from the Church of Surfleet, but is situate at a distance of $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles by the nearest road from the Church of St. Paul, Spalding:

"That it appears to me that the said portion of the said Parish of Surfleet, as shown upon the plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured blue, may, under the provisions of the Act 1 and 2 Victoria, Chapter 106, be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Surfleet and annexed to the said new Parish of St. Paul, Spalding, to which it is contiguous:

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th Section of the above-mentioned Act of Parliament, I, the said Bishop of Lincoln, have drawn up a Scheme in writing, appended to this Representation, describing the mode in which it appears to me the alterations above proposed may be best effected, and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to Patronage and Rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested:

"And I do submit the same to your Grace, together with the Consents thereto in writing of the said Dean and Chapter of Lincoln, the Patrons, and the Reverend Charles Arthur Payne, the Vicar, of the said Vicarage of Gosberton, of the Reverend Frank Field Wayet, of the Vicarage, Pinchbeck (St. Mary), in the County of Lincoln, Clerk in Holy Orders, the Patron, and also the Vicar, of the said Vicarage of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), of me, the said Bishop, in right of my Bishopric, and the Reverend Edward Pountney Gough, in right of his Vicarage of Spalding (St. Mary and St. Nicholas), the joint Patrons, and the Reverend Richard Guy Ash, the Perpetual Curate or Vicar of the said Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage of St. Paul, Spalding, of me, the said Bishop, as Patron, and of the Reverend Henry Law James, as Perpetual Curate or Vicar, of the said Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage of Surfleet, to the intent that your Grace may, if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with the Scheme, certify the same and such Consents to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop and the Consents referred to in the said Representation are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"That the two portions of the Parish of Gosberton, which are shown upon the plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured red, and more particularly described in the First Schedule hereto (Parts 1 and 2) be separated from the said Vicarage and Parish of Gosberton and annexed to the contiguous Parish of Surfleet for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that they shall be and remain under the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said Vicarage and Parish of Surfleet now are.

"That the Incumbent of Surfleet shall have exclusive Cure of Souls within the limits of the said two portions of the Parish of Gosberton so to be annexed to the said Parish of Surfleet.

"That Baptisms, Churchings, Marriages, and Burials, in respect of the Inhabitants of

the said two portions of the said Parish of Gosberton shall be performed and shall take place in the Church of Surfleet, and in the Burial Ground thereto belonging, and that the fees for the same and for other ecclesiastical Offices, and all ecclesiastical dues and offerings arising from and in respect of the said two portions of the said Parish of Gosberton, so to be annexed to the said Parish of Surfleet, and usually payable to the Incumbent of a Benefice, shall belong and be paid to the Incumbent of the said Parish and Benefice of Surfleet.

"That the Inhabitants of the same two portions of the said Parish of Gosberton shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the Church of the Parish of Gosberton, or any other Church or Chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said Parish, but shall be liable subject to the provisions of 'The Compulsory Church Rate Abolition Act, 1868,' to repair the said Church of Surfleet.

"That the Inhabitants of the said two portions of the Parish of Gosberton shall be entitled to resort to and attend the said Church of Surfleet as their Parish Church, and to be accommodated with sittings therein, but shall not henceforth be entitled to any accommodation in the Church of the said Parish of Gosberton, or in any Church or Chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said Parish, except nevertheless any person or persons (if any) possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting in the said Parish Church of Gosberton, and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"That the portion of the Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), which is shown on the plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured pale green, and more particularly described in the Second Schedule hereto, be separated from the said Vicarage and Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) and annexed to the contiguous Parish of St. Paul, Spalding, for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that it shall be and remain under the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage and new Parish of St. Paul, Spalding, now are.

"That the Incumbent of St. Paul, Spalding, shall have exclusive Cure of Souls within the limits of the said portion of the Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) so to be annexed to the said new Parish of St. Paul, Spalding.

"That Baptisms, Churchings, Marriages, and Burials, in respect of the Inhabitants of the said portion of the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) shall be performed and shall take place in the Church of St. Paul, Spalding, and in the Burial Ground thereto belonging, and that the fees for the same, and for other ecclesiastical Offices and all ecclesiastical dues and offerings arising from or in respect of the said portion of the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) so to be annexed to the said new Parish of St. Paul, Spalding, and usually payable to the Incumbent of a Benefice, shall belong and be paid to the Incumbent of the said new Parish and Benefice of St. Paul, Spalding.

"That the Inhabitants of the same portion of the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the Church of the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), or any other Church or Chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said Parish, but shall be liable subject to the provisions of 'The Compulsory Church Rate

'Abolition Act, 1868,' to repair the said Church of St. Paul, Spalding.

"That the Inhabitants of the said portion of the Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) shall be entitled to resort to and attend the said Church of St. Paul, Spalding, as their Parish Church, and to be accommodated with sittings therein, but shall not henceforth be entitled to any accommodation in the Church of the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), or in any Church or Chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said Parish, except nevertheless any person or persons (if any) possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting in the said Parish Church of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"That the portion of the Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), which is shown on the plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured yellow, and more particularly described in the third schedule hereto, be separated from the said Vicarage and Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) and annexed to the contiguous Vicarage of Surfleet for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that it shall be and remain under the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage and Parish of Surfleet now are.

"That the Incumbent of Surfleet shall have exclusive Cure of Souls within the limits of the said portion of the Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) so to be annexed to the said Parish of Surfleet.

"That Baptisms, Churchings, Marriages, and Burials, in respect of the Inhabitants of the said portion of the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) shall be performed and shall take place in the Church of Surfleet, and in the Burial Ground thereto belonging, and that the fees for the same and for other ecclesiastical Offices, and all ecclesiastical dues and offerings arising from or in respect of the said portion of the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) so to be annexed to the said Parish of Surfleet, and usually payable to the Incumbent of a Benefice, shall belong and be paid to the Incumbent of the said Parish and Benefice of Surfleet.

"That the Inhabitants of the same portion of the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the Church of the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), or any other Church or Chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said Parish, but shall be liable subject to the provisions of 'The Compulsory Church Rate Abolition Act, 1868,' to repair the said Church of Surfleet.

"That the said Inhabitants of the said portion of the Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) shall be entitled to resort to and attend the said Church of Surfleet as their Parish Church, and to be accommodated with sittings therein, but shall not henceforth be entitled to any accommodation in the Church of the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), or in any Church or Chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said Parish, except nevertheless any person or persons (if any) possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting in the said Parish Church of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"That the portion of the Parish of Surfleet, which is shown on the plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured dark green, and more

particularly described in the Fourth Schedule hereto, be separated from the said Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage and Parish of Surfleet and annexed to the contiguous Vicarage and Parish of Gosberton for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that it shall be and remain under the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said Vicarage and Parish of Gosberton now are.

"That the Incumbent of Gosberton shall have exclusive Cure of Souls within the limits of the said portion of the said Parish of Surfleet so to be annexed to the said Parish of Gosberton.

"That Baptisms, Churchings, Marriages, and Burials, in respect of the Inhabitants of the said portion of the said Parish of Surfleet shall be performed and shall take place in the Church of Gosberton, and in the Burial Ground thereto belonging, and that the fees for the same and for other ecclesiastical Offices, and all ecclesiastical dues and offerings arising from or in respect of the said portion of the said Parish of Surfleet, so to be annexed to the said Parish of Gosberton, and usually payable to the Incumbent of a Benefice, shall belong and be paid to the Incumbent of the said Parish and Benefice of Gosberton.

"That the Inhabitants of the same portion of the said Parish of Surfleet shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the Church of the Parish of Surfleet, or any other Church or Chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said Parish, but shall be liable, subject to the provisions of 'The Compulsory Church Rate Abolition Act, 1868,' to repair the said Church of Gosberton.

"That the said Inhabitants of the said portion of the Parish of Surfleet shall be entitled to resort to and attend the said Church of Gosberton as their Parish Church, and to be accommodated with sittings therein, but shall not henceforth be entitled to any accommodation in the Church of the said Parish of Surfleet, or in any Church or Chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said Parish, except nevertheless any person or persons (if any) possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting in the said Parish Church of Surfleet, and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"That the portion of the Parish of Surfleet which is shown on the plan hereto annexed, and thereon coloured blue, and more particularly described in the Fifth Schedule hereto, be separated from the said Vicarage and Parish of Surfleet and annexed to the contiguous Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage and new Parish of St. Paul, Spalding, for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that it shall be and remain under the same ecclesiastical jurisdiction as the said Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage and new Parish now are.

"That the Incumbent of St. Paul, Spalding, shall have exclusive Cure of Souls within the limits of the said portion of the said Parish of Surfleet so to be annexed to the said new Parish of St. Paul, Spalding.

"That Baptisms, Churchings, Marriages, and Burials, in respect of the Inhabitants of the said portion of the said Parish of Surfleet shall be performed and shall take place in the Church of St. Paul, Spalding, and in the Burial Ground thereto belonging, and that the fees for the same and for other ecclesiastical Offices, and all ecclesiastical dues and offerings arising from or in respect of the said portion of the said Parish of Surfleet so to be annexed to

the said new Parish of St. Paul, Spalding, and usually payable to the Incumbent of a Benefice, shall belong and be paid to the Incumbent of the said new Parish of St. Paul, Spalding.

"That the Inhabitants of the same portion of the said Parish of Surfleet shall be exonerated from all liability to repair the Church of the said Parish of Surfleet, or any other Church or Chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said Parish, but shall be liable, subject to the provisions of 'The Compulsory Church Rate Abolition Act, 1868,' to repair the said Church of St. Paul, Spalding.

"That the said Inhabitants of the said portion of the Parish of Surfleet shall be entitled to resort to and attend the said Church of St. Paul, Spalding, as their Parish Church, and to be accommodated with sittings therein, but shall not henceforth be entitled to any accommodation in the Church of the said Parish of Surfleet, or in any Church or Chapel now or hereafter to be erected in the said Parish, except nevertheless any person or persons (if any) possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting in the said Parish Church of Surfleet, and who may not be willing to relinquish and give up the same.

"That nothing contained herein shall affect the endowments of the said Vicarage of Gosberton, the said Vicarage of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), the said Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage of St. Paul, Spalding, or the said Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage of Surfleet, or the rights of patronage to any of the said Benefices of Gosberton, Pinchbeck (St. Mary), St. Paul, Spalding, and Surfleet.

"FIRST SCHEDULE.

"PART I.

"All that part of the Parish of Gosberton, delineated on the said Map or Plan hereto appended, and thereon coloured red, and which is bounded on the west by the Great Northern and Great Eastern Joint Railway which divides it from the new Parish of Gosberton Clough, on the south by Bech Bank Drain which divides it from Pinchbeck (St. Mary), on the east by the old boundary between Gosberton and Surfleet, and on the north by Dockholme Gate.

"PART II.

"All that further part of the Parish of Gosberton, also delineated on the said Map or Plan hereto appended, and thereon also coloured red, and which is bounded on the north-west by the Lincolnshire Loop of the Great Northern Railway, on the north by the Risegate Eau and the present boundary between Gosberton and Sutterton, and on the south-east by the present boundary between Gosberton and Surfleet.

"SECOND SCHEDULE.

"All that part of the Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), delineated on the said Map or Plan hereto appended, and thereon coloured, pale green, and which is bounded on the north-west by the River Welland, and on the north-east, south-east, and south by the present boundary between Pinchbeck (St. Mary) and the Parish of St. Paul, Spalding.

"THIRD SCHEDULE.

"All that part of the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), delineated on the said Map

or Plan hereto appended, and thereon coloured yellow, and which is bounded on the north by the old bed of the River Glen marked by boundary stones, which is the present boundary between Pinchbeck (St. Mary) and Surfleet, on the south by Bech Bank Drain from a boundary stone situated on the drain, where the said Drain ceases to be the present boundary between Pinchbeck (St. Mary) and Surfleet, to the River Glen; and by Clinks Drain from the River Glen to the Lincolnshire Loop of the Great Northern Railway, then by a road across Hill Marsh Farm to the Blue Gonet Drain, then by a hedge to the present boundary between Pinchbeck (St. Mary) and St. Paul, Spalding, then by that boundary to the River Welland, and on the south-east by the River Welland.

"FOURTH SCHEDULE.

"All that part of the Parish of Surfleet, delineated on the said Map or Plan hereto appended, and thereon coloured dark green, and which consists of all that portion of the Parish of Surfleet which is situated on the east side of the Great Northern and Great Eastern Joint Railway, and on the west of Sweetland's Way, and surrounded by Gosberton on the north and south.

"FIFTH SCHEDULE.

"All that part of the Parish of Surfleet, delineated on the said Map or Plan hereto appended, and thereon coloured blue, and which is situated on the east side of the River Welland.

"We, the undersigned, Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, do hereby report to Your Majesty in Council:

"That the Right Reverend Edward Lee, Bishop of Lincoln, has represented unto us amongst other things:—

"That there is, in the County and Diocese of Lincoln, the Vicarage and Parish Church of Gosberton, and that the population of Gosberton is about 1,200:

"That there is, in the same County and Diocese, the Vicarage and Parish Church of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), with a population of 1,594:

"That there is also, in the same County and Diocese, the Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage and Parish Church of St. Paul, Spalding, with a population of 603:

"That there is also, in the same County and Diocese, the Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage and Parish Church of Surfleet, with a population not exceeding 1,000:

"That it appears to the said Lord Bishop that under the provisions of the Pluralities Act, 1838—

"(a) two portions of the aforesaid Parish of Gosberton, which are shown upon the Plan annexed to the Bishop's Representation, and are thereon coloured red, may be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Gosberton and annexed to the said Parish of Surfleet to which they are contiguous;

"(b) A portion of the Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), shown upon the said Plan, and thereon coloured pale green, may be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) and annexed to the said New Parish of St. Paul, Spalding, to which it is contiguous;

"(c) A further portion of the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) as shown upon the said Plan, and thereon coloured yellow, may be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) and annexed to the said Parish of Surfleet to which it is contiguous;

"(d) A portion of the said Parish of Surfleet, as shown upon the said Plan, and thereon coloured dark green, may be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Surfleet and annexed to the Parish of Gosberton to which it is contiguous;

"(e) A further portion of the said Parish of Surfleet, shown upon the said Plan, and thereon coloured blue, may be advantageously separated from the said Parish of Surfleet and annexed to the said new Parish of St. Paul, Spalding:

"That pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th Section of the said Act of Parliament the said Lord Bishop has drawn up a Scheme in writing, describing the mode in which it appears to him that the several alterations proposed may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested, which Scheme, together with the several Consents thereto in writing of The Very Reverend the Dean of the Cathedral Church of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Lincoln, and the Chapter of the same Church, the Patrons or persons entitled to present or nominate to the Vicarage of Gosberton in case the same were now vacant, The Reverend Charles Arthur Payne, Incumbent of the said Vicarage of Gosberton, The Reverend Frank Field Wayet, of the Vicarage, Pinchbeck (St. Mary), in the County of Lincoln, Clerk in Holy Orders, the Patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said Vicarage of Pinchbeck (St. Mary) in case the same were now vacant, and also the Incumbent of the said Vicarage of Pinchbeck (St. Mary), the said Bishop in right of his Bishopric, and The Reverend Edward Pountney Gough, Clerk, Vicar of the Vicarage of Spalding (St. Mary and St. Nicholas) in right of his Vicarage, the joint Patrons or persons entitled to present or nominate to the said Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage of St. Paul, Spalding, in case the same were now vacant, The Reverend Richard Guy Ash, Clerk, the Incumbent of the said Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage of St. Paul, Spalding, and the said Bishop in right of his Bishopric the Patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage of Surfleet in case the same were now vacant, and the Reverend Henry Law James, Clerk, the Incumbent of the said Perpetual Curacy or Vicarage of Surfleet, has been transmitted to us by the said Lord Bishop for our consideration:

"The Representation and Scheme of the said Lord Bishop, and the Consents above referred to, are hereunto annexed:

"And we, the said Archbishop, being on full consideration and inquiry satisfied with the said Scheme, do hereby pursuant to the said Pluralities Act, 1838, certify the same, and such Consents as aforesaid, to Your Majesty in Council to the intent that Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make an Order for carrying the said Scheme into effect.

WHEREAS by Section 26 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, after reciting that "Whereas in some instances Tithings, Hamlets, Chapelries, and other Places or Districts may be separated from the Parishes or Mother Churches to which they belong, with great advantage, and Places altogether extra-parochial may, in some instances, with advantage be annexed to Parishes or Districts to which they are contiguous, or be constituted separate Parishes for ecclesiastical purposes," it is, amongst other things, enacted, "That when with respect to his own Diocese it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, or when the Bishop of any Diocese shall represent to the said Archbishop, that any such Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place or District within the Diocese of such Archbishop, or the Diocese of such Bishop, as the case may be, may be advantageously separated from any Parish or Mother Church, and either be constituted a separate Benefice by itself or be united to any other Parish to which it may be more conveniently annexed, or to any other adjoining Tithing, Hamlet, Chapelry, Place, or District, parochial or extra-parochial, so as to form a separate Parish or Benefice, or that any Extra-Parochial Place may with advantage be annexed to any Parish to which it is contiguous, or be constituted a separate Parish for ecclesiastical purposes, and the said Archbishop, or Bishop, shall draw up a Scheme in writing (the Scheme of such Bishop to be transmitted to the said Archbishop for his consideration) describing the mode in which it appears to him that the alteration may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alteration in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction, glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect to patronage and rights to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested; and if the Patron or Patrons of the Benefice or Benefices to be affected by such alteration shall consent in writing under his or their hands to such Scheme, or to such modification thereof, as the said Archbishop may approve, and the said Archbishop shall, on full consideration and inquiry, be satisfied with any such Scheme, or modification thereof, and shall certify the same and such Consent as aforesaid, by his Report to His Majesty in Council, it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make an Order for carrying such Scheme, or modification thereof, as the case may be, into effect."

And whereas the Right Reverend Frederic Edward, Lord Bishop of Salisbury, hath made a Representation in writing, dated the 10th day of August, 1914, to the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, as follows:—

"I, the Right Reverend Frederic Edward,

Bishop of Salisbury, do hereby represent to your Grace, that there are, in the County of Wilts, and my Diocese of Salisbury, the Vicarage of Downton with the Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham annexed, and the Rectory of Odstock:

"That the said Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham is distant from the Parish of Downton, measuring the distance by road from the Church of Downton to the Chapel of Nunton and Bodenham, about 4 miles:

"That the said Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham adjoins the said Parish of Odstock:

"That the boundaries of the Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham are well known and defined, and the Chapel is less than 1 mile from the Church of Odstock:

"That on the map hereunto annexed the said Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham is coloured blue, and the said Parish of Odstock is coloured pink:

"That according to the last available Census Report the population of the said Parish of Downton excluding the said Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham was 1933, the population of the said Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham was 285, and the population of the said Parish of Odstock was 158:

"That there is in each of the Parishes of Downton and Odstock a Parish Church, and in the Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham a Chapel:

"That the Parish Church of Downton contains accommodation for 700 persons, that the Chapel at Nunton and Bodenham contains accommodation for 150 persons, and that the Parish Church of Odstock contains accommodation for 80 persons:

"That the net annual value of the Benefice of Downton including the Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham is £494 or thereabouts, and that the net annual value of the Benefice of Odstock is £150 or thereabouts:

"That there are Houses of Residence belonging to each of the Benefices of Downton and Odstock, and there is a House of Residence vested in Trustees for the Benefit of the said Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham:

"That the patronage of the Benefice of Downton with the Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham belongs to the Warden Scholars and Clerks of Saint Mary College of Winchester, and the Reverend Lenthall Greville Dickenson is the present Incumbent thereof:

"That the patronage of the Benefice of Odstock belongs to the Right Honourable Jacob, Earl of Radnor, and the Reverend Francis Edward Overton is the present Incumbent thereof:

"That it appears to me that under the provisions of the Act of Parliament passed in the Session holden in the first and second years of the Reign of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 106, the said Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham may be advantageously separated from the said Benefice of Downton and annexed to the said Benefice of Odstock:

"That, pursuant to the directions contained in the 26th section of the said Act of Parliament, I have drawn up a Scheme in writing, describing the mode in which it appears to me that the alterations may best be effected, and how the changes consequent on such alterations in respect to ecclesiastical jurisdiction,

glebe lands, tithes, rent-charges, and other ecclesiastical dues, rates, and payments, and in respect of patronage and right to pews, may be made with justice to all parties interested, which Scheme, together with the Consents thereto of the before-mentioned Patrons and Incumbents I do submit to your Grace, to the intent that your Grace may, if on full consideration and inquiry you shall be satisfied with such Scheme, certify the same and such Consents by your Report to His Majesty in Council."

And whereas the said Scheme drawn up by the said Bishop of Salisbury, and the Consents referred to in the said Representation, are as follows:—

"SCHEME.

"1. That the said Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham shall be separated from the said Parish of Downton and annexed for ecclesiastical purposes to the said Parish of Odstock.

"2. That the Incumbent of the Benefice of Odstock with Nunton and Bodenham annexed shall have the sole and exclusive Cure of Souls within the said Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham so annexed to Odstock.

"3. That the Parishioners of the Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham shall cease to be entitled to any right or accommodation in the Parish Church of Downton, except nevertheless any person or persons (if any) possessing a legal right by faculty or otherwise to any pew or sitting in such Parish Church, and who may not desire to give up or relinquish the same.

"4. That the Inhabitants of the aforesaid Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham shall have such and the same right to have Marriages, Baptisms, Churchings, and Burials, solemnized and performed and other rights in the Parish Church of Odstock as they might have had in the Parish Church of Downton.

"5. That all fees and other ecclesiastical dues and payments for Marriages, Burials, Churchings, and other ecclesiastical Offices, and all such other ecclesiastical dues, offerings, and emoluments, usually payable to the Incumbent of a Parish or Benefice which shall arise or become payable for or in respect of the said Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham when it has been annexed to the said Parish of Odstock shall belong and be payable to the Incumbent of the Benefice of Odstock with Nunton and Bodenham annexed.

"6. That all that portion of the Tithe-Rent-Charge belonging to the said Benefice of Downton and arising from the said Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham, particulars whereof are set out in the Schedule hereto, and which is now payable to and received by the Vicar of Downton, shall cease to be so paid and received and shall belong to and be attached to the proposed Benefice of Odstock with Nunton and Bodenham annexed and be held received and enjoyed by the Incumbent thereof for the time being accordingly.

"7. That all glebe lands and buildings situate in the said Chapelry of Nunton and Bodenham which now belong to the Vicar of Downton shall cease to so belong, and shall belong and be attached to the said proposed Benefice of Odstock with Nunton and Bodenham annexed for ever, and be held and enjoyed by the Incumbent thereof for the time being accordingly.

"8. That no other alteration shall be made in respect of the Tithe-Rent-Charges and other endowments of any of the said Benefices.

"9. That the Patronage of the said Benefice of Downton shall remain vested in the Warden Scholars and Clerks of Saint Mary College of Winchester and that the Patronage of the Benefice of Odstock with Nunton and Bodenham annexed shall be vested in the Right Honourable Jacob, Earl of Radnor.

**BRITISH OWNED CARGO ON AUSTRIAN
VESSELS DETAINED IN ITALY.**

His Majesty's Ambassador at Rome is informed by the Italian Government that in order to obtain release of British owned goods on Austrian vessels detained in Italy the interested parties should present their applications for release of such goods direct to the Italian Minister of Marine, together with all documents available in support of their claim to ownership. The Minister of Marine will then determine which goods can be released without further formalities, and which it will be necessary to submit to the decision of the Italian Prize Court.

STREET COLLECTIONS.

**REGULATIONS UNDER THE METROPOLITAN
STREETS ACT, 1903.**

In pursuance of the power conferred on me by Section 1 of the Metropolitan Streets Act, 1903, I hereby make the following Regulations to be observed by all persons within the general limits of the Metropolitan Streets Act, 1867, with respect to the places where and the conditions under which persons may collect money in any street for charitable or other purposes:—

1. No collection shall be made in any part of the carriage way of any street; nor shall any collection be made on the footway so as to cause any obstruction thereof or any annoyance to foot passengers.

2. Not more than two persons shall act as

collectors at the same collecting place, and they shall occupy a stationary position on the footway.

3. No collecting place shall be within 30 yards from any other collecting place.

4. No person under the age of 16 shall act as a collector.

5. No collector shall use a table for the purpose of any collection so as to cause actual or possible obstruction. No table used shall exceed 30 inches in length and 20 inches in width.

6. No collector shall use a box at the end of a pole intended to reach upper windows or the roofs of conveyances.

7. No collector shall be accompanied by any animal.

8. No collector shall importune any person to the annoyance of such person.

9. No collection shall be made for any charitable purpose without a permit from the Commissioner of Police, which permit shall be granted by the Commissioner if he be satisfied by the Certificate of an Advisory Committee (appointed by him and approved by the Secretary of State) or otherwise that the collection is made in good faith, and solely for the purposes of the charity. Application for a permit should be made not later than the first day of the month preceding that month in which it is proposed that the collection shall be held.

10. No collection shall be made by any paid Collector.

Any person wilfully disregarding or refusing to conform to these Regulations is liable to a penalty not exceeding 40 shillings for each offence.

The general limits referred to are such parts of the Metropolis as are enclosed in a circle of which the centre is Charing Cross, and the radii are six miles in length as measured in a straight line from Charing Cross.

N.B.—Compliance with the above Regulations shall not exempt a person from proceedings under the Vagrancy Acts or other statutory provisions, or any bye-laws made by any Local Authorities.
