

entanglements under very severe fire, and they were eventually driven in after losing 50 per cent. in casualties.

Second Lieutenant Parkinson then went out twice and rescued two wounded men whilst exposed to heavy fire.

Second Lieutenant George Streynsham Rawstorne, 2nd Battalion, Seaforth Highlanders (Ross-shire Buffs, the Duke of Albany's).

For conspicuous gallantry and ability on 4th July, 1915, north of Ypres, when he commanded the storming party which captured a German sap and covered the Royal Engineer party detailed to destroy the sap. He showed the greatest dash in carrying out this difficult task, and finally, although wounded, carried out the withdrawal most satisfactorily.

Second Lieutenant Arthur William Roberts, 4th Battalion, The Worcestershire Regiment.

For gallantry and coolness during the operations in the Gallipoli Peninsula in leading his men across the open in face of a very heavy fire and capturing some Turkish trenches on 18th-19th June, 1915.

Second Lieutenant William Parr Aldous Robinson, 135th Battery, Royal Field Artillery.

For conspicuous gallantry and ability during operations between 6th and 8th July, 1915, south of Pilkem.

He rafted his 18-pounder gun across the Yser Canal under fire, placed it in the fire trenches within 60 yards of the enemy's sap, and blew in the sap and some 30 yards of thick wire entanglements under very heavy shell fire, thus greatly assisting our infantry in capturing the enemy's position.

He showed great enterprise, and inspired confidence by his coolness. The gun was safely brought back the following night.

Second Lieutenant Arthur Eustace Stevens, 2nd Battalion, The Prince of Wales's Volunteers (South Lancashire Regiment), attached 1st Battalion, The Hampshire Regiment.

For conspicuous gallantry in the operations south of Pilkem, on 6th July, 1915, when in charge of the Grenadier platoon of the Hampshire Regiment, he led his men with the greatest courage, was the first man into the German trenches, and used his grenades with deadly effect until he was wounded.

Temporary Second Lieutenant George Wheldon Wanstall, Royal Engineers.

For conspicuous gallantry on several occasions during the operations on the Gallipoli Peninsula, especially on the 19th June, 1915, when he successfully repaired telegraph lines, with the assistance of three men, making 35 joints in a space of 150 yards, whilst under heavy shell fire.

Lieutenant Wanstall performed similar valuable service on 5th and 7th July, on all occasions under shell fire.

Second Lieutenant Eric Fitzwater Wilkinson, 1st/8th Battalion, West Yorkshire Regiment (Leeds Rifles), Territorial Force.

For conspicuous gallantry and coolness on

15th July, 1915, near St. Julien, in assisting to carry a wounded soldier for a distance of 120 yards into cover under circumstances of great difficulty and danger.

Serjeant-Major George Edward Framingham, 1st Battalion, The Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers.

For conspicuous gallantry on 18th and 19th June, 1915, during operations on the Gallipoli Peninsula. In the final counter-attack on the Turkish trench he played a conspicuous part in bomb throwing and in driving out the enemy. His gallantry on this occasion was very marked, and he has done excellent work throughout the operations since 25th April.

Serjeant-Major Edgar Paul, 1st Battalion, Prince Albert's (Somerset Light Infantry).

For conspicuous ability and gallantry throughout the period of the campaign.

Has rendered very valuable service at all times in the firing line, especially near Pilkem on 6th July, 1915, when he organised carrying and working parties and supervised them under heavy shell fire.
