Rome, November 14.

**T**He Popes Gallies are returned to *Civita-Vicchia*, and most of the Officers are come hither; and have given the Pope an account of their Expedition in the *Levant*; where they lost a great many Men by Sickness. Two days ago passed through this City an Express from the Marquis de Leganes to the Viceroy of Naples, to hasten the Succors, which the latter has Orders to send to the State of Milan.

*Venice, Nov. 13.* Five Venetian Men of War are arrived in *Iffria* from the Armada, and are expected here in a day or two to refit. A Convoy will sail with the first fair Wind with 1000 Land Soldiers for the *Levant*; The last Advices from thence inform us, that the Doge *Morofini* returned to *Napoli di Romania* on the 19th of the last Month; That he had sent two Regiments of Foot in 5 Gallies and 2 Galleasses to Winter at *Corfu*; That he had put the rest of the Troops in Winter-Quarters in the *Morea*, and was gone himself with a Body of Horse towards the Isthmus of *Corinth*, to view the two new Forts he had ordered to be built for the greater security of that Pass.

*Turin, Nov. 16.* Our Army is still encamped at *Mascalier* to observe the Enemy; who lay, according to our last Advice, about *Saluffes*, having sent back their heavy Cannon to *Pigneroi*; Their Troops are very much harrassed; and the Country People kill all the Straglers they meet with; They have not only been disappointed in their design upon *Coni*; but likewise in that of changing the Garison of *Cazal*, which is reduced to a very ill condition, by the hardships they have suffered for a long time. The Duke of *Savoy* came hither this day from the Camp.

*Vienna, Nov. 21.* The Letters from *Hungary* give an account, that the Imperial Troops are gone to their Winter Quarters; That they had taken away the Bridge of Boats at *Peter-Waradin*, because of the danger 'twas in of being broke by the high Winds during the Winter; and that a Party of that Garison had made an Incurion towards the *Save*, and brought back several Prisoners, who confirmed, that the Tartars were gone home, and the Turks to their Quarters, having left strong Garisons in *Belgrade* and *Temeswarer*. By the way of *Transilvania*, we have advice, that the Grand Visier was returned to *Adrianople*, and had sent Officers to the several Provinces of the Ottoman Empire to raise Men, and make other preparations for the next Campagne. At this Court the Consultations are continued with great diligence, and application to settle the necessary Fonds for

the services of the War; Divers Officers are come hither, who are to be employed in the new Levies, and the Commissions for that purpose will be speedily given out. There are besides Negotiations on foot with several Princes of the Empire about taking some of their Troops into the Emperor's Service; part of which are to be employed on the *Rhine*, and the rest sent to the assistance of the Duke of *Savoy*.

*Francfort, Nov. 29.* The Troops on both sides being now in their Winter Quarters, there is little to be advised from these parts. The General Count *Van Thungen*, and the Baron *Vander Lippe*, are now in this City; and Prince *Lewis* of *Baden* is expected in few days. Commissaries are come hither from the States of *Franconia* and *Suabia* to provide Magazines in this and other places for the service of the next year.

*Cologne, Dec. 1.* At *Hildesheim* they are going to choose a Coadjutor; and the Count *de Coningsecke* has Orders to repair thither, to promote the pretensions of the Archbishop of *Cologne*, who is in Nomination; his Competitors are the Bishops of *Munster* and *Paderborne*. 'Tis said that the French are sending more Troops from *Germany* to reinforce their Army in *Piedmont*.

*Hamburg, Dec. 1.* The Elector of *Brandenburg* makes Levies, as well for recruiting his Troops, as the forming several new Regiments; We are told likewise that the House of *Lunenbourg* is going to augment its Forces. 'Tis said that the Bishop of *Munster* will send several thousand Men to the Emperor's assistance in *Hungary* against the next Campagne, and a considerable Body of his Troops besides, to the *Rhine*.

*Paris, Nov. 30.* The Commissioners continue their meetings to find out Ways for the Relief of the Poorer sort of People, who are under great Extremities. The Magistrates of this City are likewise employed in raising, by a Tax upon the Inhabitants, the 5 Millions of Livres they have given the French King towards the Charges of the War. The Popes Nuncio and the Ambassador of *Venice* had Audiences on Wednesday last at *Versailles* about the Affairs of *Italy*; 'Tis said that the Count *de Rabenac* will be forthwith sent thither to endeavour to divert those Princes from granting Winter Quarters and Contributions to the Germans; but in all probability he will have no better success now than he had the last year, when he was employed upon the same Errand. The Count *de la Vauguyon* shot himself some days ago, with a Pistol in his Chamber, having before sent away his Servants, and died presently after. The Letters from *Piedmont* of the 19th tell us, that the French Army had been encamped at *Saluffes* since the 14th, being busied in sending back to *Pigneroi*, the Cannon and Ammunition that was drawn from thence for the Siege of *Coni*, and that the Detachment which

which advanced as far as Busco had rejoined the Army, which was going to separate; The Horse had Orders to repair the Mountains, and to Winter in Franche-Comte and Burgundy; and to believe the Foot would retire to Pignerol, Susa, and other places within the French Territories.

**Brussels, Dec. 2.** The Brabanting Troops are going to leave this Country; and to march to Liege. The Hanover H. H. which is now here, to the number of 3800, will be made up 5000; and the Elector has ordered Horfes to be bought for remounting the Spanish Cavalry. The French Engineer Duvall, who was lately discovered to be a Spy, has confessed that the French have a design upon Newport, which agreeing with other Accounts, case is taken to post a sufficient number of Troops in the parts thereabouts, to secure that place, as well as Ostend and Bruges. The Duke of Wirtemberg, and the Count de Bergeycke Treasurer General of these Countries, go on Friday next for Flanders, to prepare Quarters for the Regiments that are expected from England. The States of Brabant have lately granted his Electoral Highness a Subsidy of 120000 Florins towards the War, and the Commonalty of this City have had several meetings abt raising their part of it. The Marschal de Boufflers being returned to Mons. from visiting the French Garrisons in Flanders, went on Friday last to Charleroy, and from thence is to go very quickly to Versailles.

**Hague, Dec. 4.** The Duke of Holstein Plein has since his coming hither had several Conferences with the Deputies of the States about the Affairs of the Army. Monsieur Van Hestren, the States Minister at Stockholm, has adjusted all matters at that Court with relation to the Swedish Ships taken by the Dutch since the beginning of this War.

**Weitzhall, Nov. 30.** This day his Grace the Duke of Sr. Albans was Sworn Captain of Their Majesties Band of Pensioners, in the Place of the Lord Lovelace deceased.
