

which advanced as far as Busco had rejoined the Army, which was going to separate; The Horse had Orders to repair the Mountains, and to Winter in *Franchise-Cumra* and *Burgundy*; and it was believed the Foot would retire to *Pignerol*, *Susa*, and other places within the French Territories.

Brajanis, Dec. 2. The *Brajanis* Troops are going to leave this Country; and to march to *Ligez*. The *Hannover* Horse, which is now here, to the number of 3800, will be made up 5000; and the Elector has ordered Horfes to be bought for remounting the Spanish Cavalry. The French Engineer *Duval*, who was lately discovered to be a Spy, has confessed that the French have a design upon *Newport*, which agreeing with other Accounts, cause taken to post a sufficient number of Troops in the parts thereof, to secure that place, as well as *Offena* and *Brajanis*. The Duke of *Wirtemberg*, and the Count *de Bergoycke* Treasurer General of these Countreys, go on Friday next for *Flanders*, to prepare Quarters for the Regiments that are expelled from *England*. The States of *Brabant* have lately granted his Electoral Highness a Subsidy of 120000 Florins towards the War, and the Commonalty of this City have had several meetings about raising their part of it. The *Marschal de Bauffers* being returned to *Brabant* from visiting the French Garrisons in *Flanders*, went on Friday last to *Charleroy*, and from thence is to go very quickly to *Verisalles*.

Hague, Dec. 4. The Duke of *Holstein Plein* has since his coming hither had several Conferences with the Deputies of the States about the Affairs of the Army. *Monsieur Van Heesteren*, the States Minister at *Stockholm*, has adjusted all matters at that Court with relation to the Swedish Ships taken by the Dutch since the beginning of this War.
