

which advanced as far as Busto had rejoined the Army, which was going to separate; The Horse had Orders to repass the Mountains, and to winter in France-Campe and Burgundy; and 'twas believed the Fédé would retire to Pignerol, Suſa, and other places within the French Territories.

Braſas, Dec. 1. The Brandenborg Troops are going to leave his Country; and to march to Liege. The Horse, which is now here, to the number of 300, will be made up 500; and the Elector has ordered Horses to be bought for remounting the Spanish Cavalry. The French Engineer Duras, who was lately discovered to be a Spy, has confessed that the French have a design upon Namur, which agreeing with other Accounts, cause is taken to post a sufficient number of Troops in the parts therabouts, to secure that place, as well as Orléans and Bruges. The Duke of Württemberg, and his Count de Berggrave, Treasurer General of the Countries, go on Friday next for Flanders, to prepare Quarters for the Regiments that are expected from England. The States of Brabant have lately granted his Electoral Highness a Subſidy of 1200000 F. orins towards the War, and the Commonalty of this City have had several meetings about raising their part of it. The Mareſchal de Boufflers being returned to them from visiting the French Garrisons in Flanders, went on Friday last to Charleroy, and from thence is to go very quickly to Versailles.

Hague, Dec. 4. The Duke of Holstein Plesen has since his coming hither had several Conferences with the Deputies of the States about the Affairs of the Army. Mofieur Van Heezen, the States Minister at Stockholm, has adjusted all matters at that Court with relation to the Swedish Ships taken by the Dutch since the beginning of this War.
