Rome, Nov. 14.

ON Monday last was held a Consistory, in which were proposed the Archbishop of Aix, and the Bishops of *Pamiers*, *St. Omer*, *Perigord*, and *St. Fleur*, with the usual Formalities; and their Bulls are now dispatching. The Spanish Ambassador had this Week a long Audience of the Pope, about the Affairs of *Italy*; The same day one of his Servants having killed a Man in this City, his Excellency Writ to Cardinal *Spada*, to let him know that he had put the Offender out of his Service, and left him to Justice, to which the Cardinal answered, That he Thanked his Excellency for taking so Just and Prudent a Resolution, and that he would forthwith acquaint the Pope with it. The Emperors Ambassador at this Court solicits Assistances against the Turks, but has not yet obtained an answer to his Satisfaction.

Milan, *November 18*. The last Advices from *Piedmont* inform us that the *French* Troops had repass'd the *Po*, and were retiring towards *Pignerol* and *Susa*; and that the Duke of *Savoy* was thereupon going to separate his Forces, which were Encamped at *Moscalier*, and to send them to their Winter Quarters. The Officers in the Service of this State have orders to recruit their Troops; 3000 Men are expected from *Naples*, and 1000 from *Barcelona*, who are to come by Sea to *Final*, and they talk here besides of raising 2000 *Grifons*. The Commissary General of the Emperors Forces in *Italy* has written to the Dukes of *Parma* and *Modena*, to desire them to provide Winter Quarters for the said Forces, as they did the last Year; and we are told that this Matter is already settled, notwithstanding the *French* Ministers at those Courts have done all they could to hinder it.

Venice, *November 20*. Several Vessels are arrived here this Week from the *Morca*, who bring no other advice than that the Troops are gone into their Winter Quarters. By Letters from *Aleppo* we are told that the *Arabs* continue to give the *Turks* great disturbance in those parts, and that they had taken about the end of *July* a great and rich Caravan that was coming from *Damascus*. We hear by a Merchant

Ship from the Coast of *Barbary*, that a War is declared between the Government of *Algiers*, and that of *Tunis*: and that the *Tripolins* have lately brought in several Prizes which were taken by their Ships that have been cruising in the *Levant*. They write from *Malta* that the Gallies of that order were returned home from the *Venetian* Armada.

Madrid, *Nov. 12*. The King of *Spain*, who was indisposed for several days, is perfectly well again; and on the 6th instant, being his Birth-day, his Majesty received the Compliments of the *Grandeas*, and other Persons of Quality, as also of the Foreign Ministers, and in the Evening their Majesties went to the *Buen Retiro*. The Duke of *Medina Sidonia* has desired to be recalled from the Government of *Catalonia*, and 'tis believed that the Marquis de *Gastanaga*, formerly Governor of the *Spanish Netherlands*, will be named by his Catholic Majesty to succeed him. The Marquis de *los Veles* Died here the last Week.

Dantzicke, *Nov. 21*. The Letters from *Poland* tell us, That the little, or Provincial Diets were going to meet in order to choose the Deputies they are to send to the General Diet, which is to assemble at *Warsaw* on the 20th of *December*. The Forces of that Crown are separated; and there is now a meeting at *Lemberg* of the General Officers, and the Deputies of the Neighbouring Palatinates, to regulate the Winter-quarters and subsistence of the Troops. The Garrison of *Caminiec* is much streightened by the new Forts built near the place, which hinder their Excursions, and their supplying themselves with Provisions out of the Country thereabouts; so that they have now no other Subsistence, but what is brought them in great Convoys by the *Tartars*; and these come so seldom, that the Garrison in the mean time suffers very much.

Vienna, *Nov. 21*. By Letters from General *Veterani* of the 4th instant we understand, that he was still encamped with the Imperial Forces under his Command at *Kapelnss*, on the Frontiers of *Transylvania*; But that having received certain Advice, That the *Tartars* were gone home, and that the *Turks* were separated and marched to their Winter-quarters, he had likewise

...to break up his Camp, and to send the Troops to their several Garrisons in *Transylvania*. They write from *Cassoway* in *Upper Hungary*. That the Receiver General of the Imperial Revenues there, had in pursuance of his Orders from hence, employed several considerable Sums of Money for the providing Magazines in *Transylvania*, and the fortifying *Cinnabach*.

Frankfort, November 29. The *French* are making great Magazines in their Frontier Places on the other side of the *Rhein*; Some of their Troops in Garrison at *Philippsburg* came three or four days ago to *H. Klingens*, but retired again without attempting any thing against the Castle, in which there are about 100 *German* Soldiers. Prince *Louis of Baden* is expected here the next Week from *Gauzbourg*. At *Hilferron* they continue to work on their new Fortifications with great diligence.

Filmuth, November 20. On *Tuesday* last were seen off this Harbour about 30 Sail of Ships standing to the Eastward, supposed to be the *Dutch* *St. Urs* Fleet, with their Convoy; This day came in two *Dutch* Capers from cruising on the *French* Coasts; where one of them took some days ago a *French* Ship laden with Wines, and sent her to *Galicia*.

Plimouth, December 3. On the 28th of the last Month passed by this Port about 20 Sail of *English* and *Dutch* Merchant Ships bound home from *Cuba*, *St. Urs*, and *Lisbon*, under Convey of three Men of War. The 29th arrived here the *Spanish* *Alfonso* Packet Boat, Capt. *John Hutchins* Commander in 6 days from the *Guinea*. The same day arrived in this Port, the *Towns* and *Finnis* of this place in 8 Weeks from *Virginia*; and the *Nova Sigaria* of and for *O. P. M.* from *London*. This day came in the *Black* of *London*, *River* *Gold* Commander from *New*, but left from *Edinburgh*.

Portland, Dec. 4. Last Sunday night we had here a very violent Storm; But the Ship, as usual, did very well, and have received no Damage that we hear of. They write from *Cuba*, That a *Portuguese* Ship, laden the *Santa Helena* of so many Tons, laden with Wine and Fruit for *London*, was blown ashore last Saturday night at *St. Michael's*, where 'twas feared she would be lost, but the Men were saved.
