A PROCLAMATION

REVISING THE LIST OF ARTICLES TO BE
TREATED AS CONTRABAND OF WAR.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS on the 23rd day of December, 1914, We did issue Our Royal Proclamation specifying the articles which it was Our intention to treat as contraband during the continuance of hostilities or until We did give further public notice; and

Whereas on the 11th day of March, and on the 27th day of May, and on the 20th day of August, 1915, We did, by Our Royal Proclamations of those dates, make certain additions to the lists of articles to be treated as contraband of war; and

Whereas it is expedient to make certain further additions to and amendments in the said lists:

Now, therefore, We do hereby declare, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, that the lists of contraband contained in the Schedules to Our Royal Proclamation of the 23rd day of December, as subsequently amended by Our Proclamations of the 11th day of March, and of the 27th day of May, and

of the 20th day of August aforementioned, are hereby withdrawn, and that in lieu thereof, during the continuance of the war or until We do give further public notice, the articles enumerated in Schedule I. hereto will be treated as absolute contraband, and the articles enumerated in Schedule II. hereto will be treated as conditional contraband.

SCHEDULE I.

1. Arms of all kinds, including arms for sporting purposes, and their component parts.
2. Implements and apparatus designed exclusively for the manufacture of munitions of war, or for the manufacture or repair of arms or of war material for use on land or sea.
3. Lathes and other machines or machine tools capable of being employed in the manufacture of munitions of war.
4. Emery, corundum, natural and artificial (alundum), and carborundum, in all forms.
5. Projectiles, charges, and cartridges of all kinds, and their component parts.
6. Paraffin wax.
7. Powder and explosives specially prepared for use in war.
8. Materials used in the manufacture of explosives, including:—Nitric acid and nitrates

of all kinds; sulphuric acid; fuming sulphuric acid (oleum); acetic acid and acetates; barium chlorate and perchlorate; calcium acetate, nitrate and carbide; potassium salts and caustic potash; ammonium salts and ammonia liquor; caustic soda, sodium chlorate and perchlorate; mercury; benzol, toluol, xylol, solvent naphtha, phenol (carbolic acid), cresol, naphthalene, and their mixtures and derivatives; aniline, and its derivatives; glycerine; acetone; acetic ether; ethyl alcohol; methyl alcohol; ether; sulphur; urea; cyanamide; celluloid.

9. Manganese dioxide; hydrochloric acid; bromine; phosphorus; carbon disulphide; arsenic and its compounds; chlorine; phosgene (carbonyl chloride); sulphur dioxide; prussiate of soda; sodium cyanide; iodine and its compounds.

10. Capsicum and peppers.

11. Gun mountings, limberboxes, limbers, military waggons, field forges, and their component parts; articles of camp equipment and their component parts.

12. Barbed wire and the implements for fixing and cutting the same.

13. Range-finders and their component parts; searchlights and their component parts.

14. Clothing and equipment of a distinctively military character.

15. Saddle, draught, and pack animals suitable, or which may become suitable, for use in war.

16. All kinds of harness of a distinctively military character.

17. Hides of cattle, buffaloes, and horses; skins of calves, pigs, sheep, goats, and deer; and leather, undressed or dressed, suitable for saddlery, harness, military boots, or military clothing; leather belting, hydraulic leather, and pump leather.

18. Tanning substances of all kinds, including quebracho wood and extracts for use in tanning.

19. Wool, raw, combed or carded; wool waste; wool tops and noils; woollen or worsted yarns; animal hair of all kinds, and tops, noils and yarns of animal hair.

20. Raw cotton, linters, cotton waste, cotton yarns, cotton piece goods, and other cotton products capable of being used in the manufacture of explosives.

21. Flax; hemp; ramie; kapok.

22. Warships, including boats and their component parts of such a nature that they can only be used on a vessel of war.

23. Submarine sound-signalling apparatus.

24. Armour plates.

25. Aircraft of all kinds, including aeroplanes, airships, balloons and their component parts, together with accessories and articles suitable for use in connection with aircraft.

26. Motor vehicles of all kinds and their component parts.

27. Tyres for motor vehicles and for cycles, together with articles or materials especially adapted for use in the manufacture or repair of tyres.

28. Mineral oils, including benzine and motor spirit.

29. Resinous products, camphor and turpentine (oil and spirit); wood tar and wood-tar oil.

30. Rubber (including raw, waste, and reclaimed rubber, solutions and jellies containing rubber, or any other preparations containing rubber, balata, and gutta-percha, and the

following varieties of rubber, viz.:—Borneo, Guayule, Jelutong, Palembang, Pontianac, and all other substances containing caoutchouc), and goods made wholly or partly of rubber.

31. Rattans.

32. Lubricants.

33. The following metals:—Tungsten, molybdenum, vanadium, sodium, nickel, selenium, cobalt, hematite pig-iron, manganese, electrolytic iron, and steel containing tungsten or molybdenum.

34. Asbestos.

35. Aluminium, alumina, and salts of aluminium.

36. Antimony, together with the sulphides and oxides of antimony.

37. Copper, unwrought and part wrought; copper wire; alloys and compounds of copper.

38. Lead, pig, sheet, or pipe.

39. Tin, chloride of tin, and tin ore.

40. Ferro alloys, including ferro-tungsten, ferro-molybdenum, ferro-manganese, ferro-vanadium, and ferro-chrome.

41. The following ores:—Wolframite, scheelite, molybdenite, manganese ore, nickel ore, chrome ore, hematite iron ore, iron pyrites, copper pyrites and other copper ores, zinc ore, lead ore, arsenical ore, and bauxite.

42. Maps and plans of any place within the territory of any belligerent, or within the area of military operations, on a scale of 4 miles to 1 inch or any larger scale, and reproductions on any scale, by photography or otherwise, of such maps or plans.

SCHEDULE II.

1. Foodstuffs.

2. Forage and feeding stuffs for animals.

3. Oleaginous seeds, nuts and kernels.

4. Animal, fish, and vegetable oils and fats, other than those capable of use as lubricants, and not including essential oils.

5. Fuel, other than mineral oils.

6. Powder and explosives not specially prepared for use in war.

7. Horseshoes and shoeing materials.

8. Harness and saddlery.

9. The following articles, if suitable for use in war:—Clothing, fabrics for clothing, skins and furs utilisable for clothing, boots and shoes.

10. Vehicles of all kinds, other than motor vehicles, available for use in war, and their component parts.

11. Railway materials, both fixed and rolling stock, and materials for telegraphs, wireless telegraphs, and telephones.

12. Vessels, craft, and boats of all kinds; floating docks and their component parts; parts of docks.

13. Field glasses, telescopes, chronometers, and all kinds of nautical instruments.

14. Gold and silver in coin or bullion; paper money.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-eighth day of November, nineteen hundred and fourteen, His Majesty was pleased to make Regulations (called the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914) under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the defence of the Realm:

And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) No. 2 Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915:

And whereas the said Regulations have been amended by Orders in Council, dated the twenty-third day of March, the thirteenth day of April, the twenty-ninth day of April, the second day of June, the tenth day of June, the sixth day of July, the twenty-eighth day of July and the twenty-fourth day of September, nineteen hundred and fifteen:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said Regulations in manner herein-after appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendments be made in the said Regulations:—

1. In Regulation 18, for the words "or war materials" there shall be substituted the words "or aircraft," and for the words "by any such forces or ships" there shall be substituted the words "by any such forces, ships or aircraft, or with respect to the supply, description, condition, transport, or manufacture or storage, or place or intended place of manufacture or storage, of war material."

2. After Regulation 18A the following Regulation shall be inserted:—

18B.—(1) Where an application has been made, whether before or after the date of the making of this order, for the grant of a patent or the registration of a design in the United Kingdom, and the Comptroller-General of Patents, Designs, and Trademarks is satisfied that the publication of the invention or design might be detrimental to the public safety or the defence of the Realm, or might otherwise assist the enemy or endanger the successful prosecution of the war, he may delay the acceptance of the complete specification filed with the application for the patent, or, as the case may be, the registration of the design, and in such case may by order prohibit—

(a) the publication or communication in any way of the invention or design;

(b) application being made for the protection of the invention or design in any enemy or neutral country; and

(c) application being made for the protection of the invention or design in any allied country or in any of His Majesty's Dominions without the permission of the Admiralty and Army Council.

(2) No person shall apply for the grant of a patent in respect of any invention or the registration of a design in any foreign country, or

in any of His Majesty's Dominions, unless he has left at, or sent by post to, the Patent Office, a notice of his intention, together with a provisional specification describing the nature of the invention or, as the case may be, a representation or specimen of the design, nor until after the expiration of one month from the time when such notice was given, and if during the said month the Comptroller-General is satisfied that the publication of the invention or design might be detrimental to the public safety or the defence of the Realm, or otherwise assist the enemy or endanger the successful prosecution of the war, he may make a like order as in respect of cases in which application is made for the grant of a patent or the registration of a design in the United Kingdom.

(3) Before exercising any of his powers under this Regulation as respects any matter the Comptroller-General shall consult with the Admiralty and Army Council and shall not act except upon the request of the Admiralty or Army Council.

(4) If any person contravenes the provisions of this Regulation, or of any order made there-under, he shall be guilty of an offence against these Regulations.

3. In Regulation 27, after the words "or spread reports or make statements" there shall be inserted the words "or commit any act intended to, or."

4. In paragraph (d) of Regulation 45, after the words "calculated to deceive" there shall be inserted the words "or any lights, letters, colours or marks, calculated to lead to the belief that the vessel, building, structure, premises, vehicle or article, is the property or is being used for the service of His Majesty or any Government Department."

5. In Regulation 57, for the words "or, in the case of Regulation 27, of causing disaffection or alarm or prejudicing the recruiting, training, discipline, and administration of any force" there shall be substituted the words "or, in the case of Regulation 27, of causing any such disaffection, interference or prejudice as is mentioned in that Regulation."

6. In Regulation 60, after the words "posted up in pursuance of these Regulations" there shall be inserted the words "or any other notice, advertisement or placard, relating to any of His Majesty's forces or any naval or military matters exhibited or posted up under lawful authority."

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, dated the 10th day of June, 1915, His Majesty was pleased to make Regulations (called the Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915) under the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Act, 1914, and to

issue the same in pursuance of the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) No. 3 Act, 1915, to take effect in any area to which they should be applied under the said Amendment Act:

And whereas His Majesty has been pleased to apply the said Regulations and any Regulations amending the same to divers areas by Orders in Council made under the said Amendment Act:

And whereas it is expedient that there should be made in the said Regulations such amendments as hereinafter appear:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Evidence of Documents.

1. The following paragraph shall be substituted for the fifth paragraph of Regulation 1 of the Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915, (which relates to the evidence of documents):—

“Primâ facie evidence of any order or other instrument issued by the Board may be given by the production of a copy of the order or instrument purporting to be sealed with the seal of the Board and to be certified by the Secretary to the Board or any person therein alleged to be authorised by the Board to act on behalf of the Secretary, to be a true copy.”

Supply of Liquor on Unlicensed Premises.

2. The following Article shall be inserted after Article 2 of the Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915:—

“2. A. Any powers of the Board to make orders in relation to the sale and supply of intoxicating liquors in licensed premises or clubs (including Orders as to treating) shall extend so as to enable the Board to make the same or similar orders in relation to the supply by indirect means of intoxicating liquor to persons frequenting any unlicensed premises being a hotel, restaurant, refreshment house, boarding-house, or any premises or place to which the public have access and where refreshments are sold.

“If any person contravenes the provisions of any such order or any conditions or restrictions imposed thereby, he shall be guilty of a summary offence against the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914.”

Time when Billiard Playing is Allowed.

3. The following Article shall be inserted after Article 10 of the Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915:—

“10. A. For the purposes of Section thirteen of the Gaming Act, 1845, (which relates to the time when billiard playing is allowed), any time when the sale of intoxicating liquor on the premises is unlawful by reason only of any order of the Board shall not, unless the Board in any particular case otherwise direct, be deemed to be a time when the premises are not by law allowed to be open for the sale of wine, spirits or beer or other fermented or distilled liquors.”

WHEREAS under the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 3) Act, 1915, His Majesty has power by Order in Council to define any area wherein it appears to His Majesty on the grounds specified in the said Act to be expedient for the purpose of the successful prosecution of the present War that the sale and supply of intoxicating liquor should be controlled by the State, and to apply to such area so defined the Regulations issued by His Majesty in pursuance of the said Act under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914:

And whereas His Majesty in Council, in pursuance of the said first-mentioned Act has issued the Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915, under the said last-mentioned Act:

And whereas it appears to His Majesty that it is expedient for the purpose of the successful prosecution of the present War that the sale and supply of intoxicating liquor in the area defined and specified in the Schedule hereto should be controlled by the State on the grounds that War material is being made, loaded, unloaded and dealt with in transit therein, and that men belonging to His Majesty's Naval and Military forces are assembled therein:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

The Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915, and any Regulations amending the same shall be, and are, hereby applied to the area defined and specified in the Schedule hereto.

WHEREAS a state of war exists between His Majesty and the German Emperor, the Emperor of Austria King of Hungary, and the Sultan of Turkey:

And whereas His Majesty holds it to be His Prerogative Duty as well as His Prerogative Right to take all steps necessary for the Defence and Protection of the Realm:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that it is essential to the Defence and Protection of the Realm that in the exercise of His Prerogatives as aforesaid He should cause the whole of the insulated spaces in the British steamships named in the Schedule hereto, being British steamships usually engaged in trading between any port or ports in the Argentine Republic, or the Republic of Uruguay, and any port or ports in the United Kingdom, and the Continent of Europe, and being steamships owned by the two Companies also named in the Schedule hereto, to be requisitioned for the carriage of refrigerated produce from any port or ports in the Argentine Republic or in the Republic of Uruguay:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in the exercise of His Prerogatives as aforesaid, and of all other powers Him thereunto enabling, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the whole of the insulated spaces in the aforesaid British steamships shall be, and are hereby, until further ordered, requisitioned by and on behalf of His Majesty for the carriage of such produce from any port or ports in the Argentine Republic, or in the Republic of Uruguay.

And His Majesty is further pleased, by and with the advice aforesaid, to authorize and direct any one of His Principal Secretaries of State, or the President of the Board of Trade, to give effect to this Order in the following way, that is to say:—By causing to be served Notice of Requisition on the Owner and Charterer (if any) of any such steamship.

And His Majesty is further pleased, by and with the advice aforesaid, to declare that service of Notice of Requisition on either of the aforesaid Companies, being the Owner of any such steamship, shall be deemed sufficient and effective if served by being addressed to such Company and left at the registered or other address of such Company, and that service of Notice of Requisition on the Charterer (if any) of any such steamship shall be deemed sufficient and effective if effected as regards such Charterer being a Company in manner similar to that prescribed for service on an Owner being a Company, and if effected as regards such Charterer being an individual, by being addressed to such individual and left at his last known place of business or abode.

And His Majesty is further pleased, by and with the advice aforesaid, to declare that any Notice of Requisition which a Secretary of State or the President of the Board of Trade may respectively cause to be served hereunder may be signed by any person from time to time authorized for such purpose either generally or specially by any such Secretary of State or President of the Board of Trade as the case may be.

WHEREAS His Majesty has been pleased to approve a change, during the period of the War, in the relative precedence of the Military Members of the Army Council, and it is expedient to amend the Order in Council dated the 10th day of August, 1904, as amended by the Order in Council dated the 22nd day of November, 1909:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

During the period of the War the Military Members of the Army Council shall have precedence amongst themselves according to their Army Seniority, and shall cease to be styled First Military Member, Second Military Member, Third Military Member, and Fourth Military Member.

This Order shall have effect as from the 26th day of September, 1915.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by Section 1 of the Injuries in War (Compensation) Act, 1915, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty by Order in Council to frame a Scheme as to pensions, grants, and other allowances in the nature thereof, to be paid to persons in respect of disablement suffered by them and attributable to causes arising out of the operations of the present War:—

(a) Whilst they are employed afloat by or under the Postmaster-General or in pursuance of any agreement made by the Postmaster-General with other persons in connection with the laying, installing, repairing, and operating of submarine cables and telegraphic (including wireless) apparatus; or

(b) Whilst they are being carried afloat to or from any place where they are about to be or have been employed in connection with such purposes; or

(c) Whilst they are employed afloat by the Postmaster-General on duties in connection with the conveyance or sorting of letters and parcels;

and in the case of their death to their widows and other dependants:

And whereas it is further enacted in the said Section of the said Act that the said Order in Council shall specify the persons to whom it applies, and the conditions under which it becomes applicable, and that the said Order may include persons not in the direct employment of the Postmaster-General:

And whereas it is further enacted in the said Section of the said Act that a person to whom any such Order in Council applies shall not, nor in the case of his death shall his widow or other dependants or his personal representatives, in respect of any disablement suffered by him to which the Order in Council applies, be entitled to any compensation under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1906, or to any compensation or damages at common law, or under the Employers' Liability Act, 1880, or any other statute, or to any gratuity or any superannuation or other allowance under the Superannuation Acts, 1834 to 1914, except so far as the Order in Council otherwise provides:

And whereas it is further enacted in the said Section of the said Act that an Order in Council under the said Act may provide that the Order shall have effect as from the 3rd day of August, 1914:

And whereas it is further enacted in the said Section that, for the purposes of the Section, "disablement" means disablement by personal injury or by sickness, but disablement shall not be treated as attributable to causes arising out of the operations of the present War by reason only that the employment in which the disabled person was, or was about to be, or had been, engaged was employment for purposes connected with the present War:

And whereas it has been represented to His Majesty that it is expedient that a Scheme should be framed under the said Section of the said Act providing for payment as from the 3rd day of August, 1914, of the pensions, grants, and other allowances, to the persons, on the scales, and subject to the conditions, hereinafter appearing, and that the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury have signified Their concurrence in the said Scheme:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, in exercise of the powers in that behalf vested in Him by the Injuries in War (Compensation) Act, 1915, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to sanction, with effect from the 3rd day of August, 1914, payment of the pensions, grants, and other allowances, to the persons,

on the scales, and subject to the conditions, specified in the Schedule hereunto annexed.

SCHEDULE.

PERSONS TO WHOM THE SCHEME APPLIES.

The following scheme of pensions, grants, and allowances in the nature thereof, shall apply, as from the 3rd day of August, 1914, to the following persons:—

1. All persons employed afloat (whether directly or indirectly) by or under the Postmaster-General in any capacity on any cable ship for the time being the property of the Postmaster-General in trust for His Majesty, or hired by the Postmaster-General on behalf of His Majesty, in connection with the laying, installing, repairing, and operating of submarine cables and telegraphic (including wireless) apparatus.

2. All persons employed afloat in any capacity on any cable ship in pursuance of any agreement made by the Postmaster-General with other persons in connection with the laying, installing, repairing, and operating of submarine cables and telegraphic (including wireless) apparatus.

3. All persons carried afloat on any such cable ships or on any boat belonging thereto, by the direction or permission of the Postmaster-General or any of his authorized Officers to and from any place where they are about to be, or have been, employed in connection with the laying, installing, repairing, and operating of submarine cables or telegraphic (including wireless) apparatus.

4. All persons employed afloat by the Postmaster-General on duties in connection with the conveyance or sorting of letters and parcels

who may be disabled by personal injury or by sickness specifically attributable to causes arising out of the operations of the present War during such employment, and to the dependants of any such persons who may be killed by causes arising out of the operations of the present War during such employment, or die from and as the result of a personal injury sustained through such causes and during such employment within seven years of the date on which the personal injury was sustained, or from and as the result of sickness specifically attributable to such causes during such employment within seven years from the commencement of the sickness or the termination of the employment, whichever shall be the earlier. Provided that any such persons shall not be deemed to have been disabled by personal injury or by sickness or to have been killed or died from and as the result of any such personal injury or sickness by causes arising out of the operations of the present War during such employment as aforesaid by reason only that the employment in which the disabled person was, or was about to be, or had been, engaged was employment for purposes connected with the present War.

"Dependants" in this Scheme shall be deemed to include all persons who were in fact dependent wholly or partially on the earnings of persons killed or dying as mentioned above.

SCALES OF PENSIONS, GRANTS, AND OTHER ALLOWANCES, AND CONDITIONS OF PAYMENT.

Injury and Disablement Pensions.

If the disablement results in total destruction of earning capacity, a pension equal to two-thirds pay during the period of such total incapacity.

If the disablement results in partial impairment of earning capacity, a pension during the period of such partial impairment of earning capacity equal to:—

One-sixth pay in respect of slight impairment of earning capacity.

One-third pay in respect of impairment of earning capacity which is more than slight but is not material.

Half-pay in respect of material impairment of earning capacity.

All awards shall be subject to periodical review and dependent upon the degree of impairment of earning capacity for the time being as described above, provided, however, that it shall be lawful for the Postmaster-General to award a pension at the maximum rate for a period not exceeding 6 calendar months from the date of injury irrespective of the degree of impairment of earning capacity.

Pensions and Allowances to Widows and other Dependants.

If any of the above-mentioned persons be killed by causes arising out of the operations of the present War during such employment as aforesaid, or die from and as the result of a personal injury sustained through such causes and during such employment within seven years of the date on which the personal injury was sustained, or from and as the result of sickness specifically attributable to causes arising out of the operations of the present War during such employment within seven years from the commencement of the sickness or the termination of the employment, whichever shall be the earlier, there may be awarded at the discretion of the Postmaster-General:—

(a) To the widow a pension equal to one-third pay, or £26 per annum, whichever be greater, and

(b) To or for the benefit of each child (other than a motherless child) until the age of 16, an allowance equal to one twenty-fourth of pay, or £6 10s. per annum, whichever be greater, but so that if and whilst the number of children (other than as aforesaid) shall be more than four the total amount payable for the benefit of the said children shall not exceed one-sixth of pay, or £26 per annum, whichever be greater, and shall be divided equally between the said children.

(c) To or for the benefit of each motherless child, an allowance equal to one-twelfth of pay, or £13 per annum, whichever be greater, until the age of 16, provided, however, that the total annual sum payable in respect of any one family of motherless children shall in no case exceed the annual sum which might have been paid under this Scheme in respect of the same family had the mother been alive and in receipt of a pension.

Any allowance awarded to or for the benefit of a child may be paid either to the child, or

to the child's mother, or to any other person on behalf of the child.

If there be no award to a widow a pension, or pensions, for life or for a limited period or periods, may be awarded at the discretion of the Postmaster-General to some other dependant or dependants of the deceased man, provided that the annual amount of such pension, or pensions, shall in no case exceed—

(i) If there be no children, the annual amount which might have been paid to a widow, or

(ii) If there be allowances in course of payment to or for the benefit of the deceased man's children, such annual sum as when added to the annual amount of the children's allowances will equal the provision that might have been made under this Scheme for a widow with a like number of children.

The payment of an allowance to any child may be made or continued after such child shall have attained the age of 16, if it be shown to the satisfaction of the Postmaster-General that such child is afflicted with mental or bodily infirmity rendering him or her incapable of making any exertion for his or her own support and that he or she is in distressed circumstances. Provided always that the infirmity dates from a period before the death of the person so killed or dying and before the child reaches the age of 16.

In the event of a widow's re-marriage her pension shall cease, but the Postmaster-General may at his discretion award to her a lump sum not exceeding the amount by which three years' pay or £300 (whichever of the two shall be the less), or £150 (if three years' pay shall be less than £150), exceeds the aggregate of (a) the total sum already paid in respect of her pension and of the allowance (if any) to children and (b) the estimated value of the future allowances (if any) to children. Similarly, in the event of the allowances awarded to the widow, children, or other dependants lapsing before the amount paid in respect thereof equals in the aggregate three years' pay or £300 (whichever be less), or £150 (if three years' pay be less than £150), the Postmaster-General may at his discretion award a lump sum not exceeding the difference to any dependants then remaining.

In the event of any lump sum being awarded the Postmaster-General shall have power to take any precautions against the squandering thereof, e.g., by entrusting it to Trustees to be administered in specified payments or to be applied wholly or partly for the children's education or otherwise.

Proof of dependency may be made a condition of the grant of any pension or allowance whether to a widow or to a child or to any other person.

The Postmaster-General may at his discretion interpret the word "child" as including, in any particular case arising under this Scheme, any dependant under the age of 16, and the words "motherless child" shall include any dependent child to whose mother, although alive, no pension shall have been awarded. Provided that the said words shall not include a child living with any person to whom a pension may for the time being be paid.

Definition of the Term "Pay."

For the purposes of this Scheme pay shall be computed as follows:—

1. In the case of officers and men serving in cable ships chartered or hired by the Postmaster-General, whether with or without demise to the Crown, pay shall be deemed to be the pay (including an appropriate allowance when pay does not include victualling) of the present rank ruling in the ship or in ships of corresponding size and character at a date six calendar months prior to the commencement of the present War.

2. In all other cases pay shall be computed in such manner as is best calculated to give the rate at which the person was being remunerated during the year preceding 3rd August, 1914, provided that, when it is impracticable to compute pay in such manner, pay shall be taken to be such amount as the Postmaster-General may determine having regard to the amount of the earnings of persons employed under similar conditions during the same year.

LIMITATION OF BENEFITS IN THE CASE OF PERSONS ENTITLED TO DAMAGES OR COMPENSATION AT COMMON LAW OR UNDER ANY ACT OTHER THAN THE INJURIES IN WAR (COMPENSATION) ACT, 1915.

No person who is eligible to benefit under this Scheme shall lose by virtue thereof any gratuity or any superannuation or other allowance for which he may be eligible under any provision of the Superannuation Acts, 1834 to 1914, and any person who if this Scheme had not been framed and the Injuries in War (Compensation) Act, 1915, had not been passed would have been entitled to any gratuity or allowance in respect of injury under Section 1 of the Superannuation Act, 1887, or (not being a person or a dependant or legal personal representative of a person in the direct employ of the Crown) to any compensation under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1906, or any damages or compensation at Common Law, or under the Employers' Liability Act, 1880, or any other Statute, shall remain entitled to the gratuity, allowance, pension, compensation, or damages, as the case may be, but shall be entitled to benefit under this Scheme only to the extent if any by which the value of the benefits it confers exceeds the value of the gratuity, allowance, pension, compensation, or damages, as the case may be.

Values for the purposes of this Scheme shall be decided at his sole discretion by the Postmaster-General who may at the like discretion increase or diminish any of them if and whenever circumstances shall change, and may in estimating the value of any compensation payable to dependants under the Workmen's Compensation Act, 1906, take into account the full amount of the compensation payable or awarded without having regard to the mode of its distribution under the said Act, and there shall be no appeal from the decision.

Any pension or allowance awarded under this Scheme may at the discretion of the Postmaster-General be commuted for a single payment, the amount of which shall be settled between the party entitled and the Postmaster-General, and in any case in which the Post-

master-General may think such a course desirable he may award a lump sum of such amount as he may determine in lieu of any pension or allowance.

No disabled person shall receive as the result of this Scheme a total annual payment out of the Public Funds in excess of his pay at the date of the injury or disablement.

Benefits not assignable.

A payment under this Scheme shall not be capable of being assigned, charged, or attached, and shall not pass to any other person by operation of law, and where the Postmaster-General shall consider it desirable in the interest of any person to whom any payment is hereby directed or authorized to be made, he may appoint a trustee or trustees and pay the money to him or them to be administered for the benefit of such person, or his dependants, or any of them, and the receipt of the trustee or trustees shall be a good discharge to the Postmaster-General for the same.

Mode of Payment of Pensions, &c., awarded to Persons of Unsound Mind.

When a person to whom a pension, grant, or other allowance, has been awarded under this Scheme, is certified by a Justice, or a Minister of Religion, and by a Medical Practitioner to be unable by reason of mental disability to manage his or her affairs, the Postmaster-General may pay so much of the allowance as he thinks fit to the institution or person having the care of the disabled person, and may pay the surplus, if any, or such part thereof as the Postmaster-General thinks fit, for or towards the maintenance and benefit of the dependants of the disabled person, and the Government shall be discharged from all liability in respect of any sums so paid.

Interpretation of the Scheme.

In the event of any question arising on the interpretation or administration of this Scheme the decision of the Postmaster-General thereon shall be final.

"And whereas by Order in Council of His late Majesty bearing date the 5th day of March, 1910, it is provided that Officers on the Retired or Pension Lists of the Royal Navy when called out for Service in time of War or Emergency shall receive a bonus of twenty-five per cent. for every pound of the full pay of their rank, earned by them, exclusive of allowances:

"And whereas we are of opinion that such bonus should also be paid to Medical Officers on the Reserve List when similarly called out for Service:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the extension of the provisions of the aforesaid Order in Council accordingly, with effect from the date thereof.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have expressed their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, among other matters, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas Orders in Council of the 20th day of April, 1880, and the 3rd day of May, 1888, secure to Continuous Service Men, who re-engage after completing twenty years Service, the Pensions earned up to date of re-engagement, notwithstanding subsequent breaches of discipline, provided the offences are not mutiny or felony, or of such a nature as to cause the offenders to be discharged from Your Majesty's Service with disgrace:

"And whereas, although possessing general powers in such matters as representing Your Majesty, we desire that similar provision should be made to secure within certain limits the Retired Pay or Pensions of Officers in Your Majesty's Naval and Marine Forces called out for further Service in War or Emergency:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that by virtue of the powers in this behalf by prerogative, statute, or otherwise, vested in Your Majesty, Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to direct:—

"That the Retired Pay or Pensions to which Commissioned, Commissioned Warrant, and Warrant Officers in Your Majesty's Naval and Marine Forces may be entitled at the date of being called out for further Service shall be secured to them notwithstanding any breach of discipline or misconduct committed during the said further Service, provided that the breach of discipline or misconduct be neither:—

(a) mutiny, nor

(b) felony, nor

(c) conduct unbecoming the character of an Officer and in respect of which a sentence of dismissal from Your Majesty's Service with disgrace shall be passed, nor

(d) conduct of such a nature as would, in our opinion, merit a reduction in the rate of Retired Pay or Pension such as would have been made under the Regulations for the time being in force relating to the retirement of Naval or Marine Officers for misconduct, had the Officer concerned been retired or pensioned from the Active List on account of the conduct in question.

"And that in cases falling within Clause (d) we may have the like power and authority, at our discretion, to make a reduction in the Retired Pay or Pension of the Officer concerned, as we should have had if he had been on the Active List at the time of such misconduct, and subject to the Regulations for the time being in force relating to the retirement of Naval or Marine Officers for misconduct, on account of the breach of discipline or misconduct in question.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in these proposals."

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865, it is enacted that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council from time to time, by Order in Council, to define the limits of a Dockyard Port for the purposes of that Act, and to make regulations in relation to any Dockyard Port for all or any of the purposes in the said Act particularly mentioned, and for such other purposes as from time to time seem necessary, with a view to the proper protection of His Majesty's vessels, dockyards, or property, or to the requirements of His Majesty's Naval Service:

And whereas by the same Act it is also enacted that in relation to any Dockyard Port it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council from time to time, by Order in Council, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty and the Board of Trade, to make rules concerning the Lights or Signals to be carried or used, and the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by His Majesty's vessels and other vessels navigating the waters of the Port and of the approaches thereto:

And whereas in pursuance of the said Act certain Regulations and Rules were made by Order in Council, dated the 11th day of October, 1912, and certain additional Rules were made by Order in Council, dated the 9th day of February, 1914, with reference to the Dockyard Port of Plymouth:

And whereas it appears expedient to repeal the said Orders in Council and Regulations and Rules and to substitute therefor this Order and the Regulations and Rules contained in the First and Second Schedules hereto respectively, and to constitute the two Dockyard Ports of Plymouth and Devonport in lieu of the Dockyard Port of Plymouth:

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act or otherwise in Him vested, and, so far as regards the Rules contained in the Second Schedule

hereto, on the joint recommendation of the Admiralty, and the Board of Trade, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

PRELIMINARY.

1. This Order shall take effect from one calendar month from the date hereof.

2. On this Order taking effect the said Orders of the 11th October, 1912, and the 9th February, 1914, shall cease to operate, and in lieu of the Dockyard Port of Plymouth as it is in those Orders defined or referred to, there shall by this Order be defined and constituted the two Dockyard Ports of Plymouth and Devonport, the limits whereof respectively are described in paragraph 4 hereof, and in lieu of the Regulations and Rules by those Orders or either of them made in relation to the said Dockyard Port of Plymouth the Regulations and Rules set forth in the First and Second Schedules to this Order are hereby made and shall have effect in relation to the Dockyard Ports of Plymouth and Devonport.

3. In this Order and in the Schedules hereto:—

The term "vessel" shall mean and include ship, boat, lighter and craft of every kind however propelled;

The term "steam vessel" shall include any vessel propelled by machinery;

The term "Master" shall mean the person having command or charge of the vessel for the time being;

The term "King's Harbour Master" shall mean, as regards the Dockyard Port of Plymouth, the person for the time being appointed to be King's Harbour Master for Plymouth under the Dockyard Ports Regulation Act, 1865; and as regards the Dockyard Port of Devonport, the person for the time being appointed to be King's Harbour Master for Devonport under the said Act.

The term "Dockyard Ports" shall mean the two Dockyard Ports of Plymouth and Devonport as they are respectively defined in paragraph 4 hereof.

DESCRIPTION OF LIMITS.

4. For the purposes of the said Act and of this Order and of the Schedules hereto the terms "Dockyard Port of Plymouth," "Plymouth Sound," "Narrow Waters of Plymouth Sound," "Cattewater," and "Dockyard Port of Devonport" shall be defined as follows:—

Dockyard Port of Plymouth.

The term "Dockyard Port of Plymouth" shall mean the waters, including all the bays, creeks, lakes, pools, and rivers, as far as the tide flows, within or to the northward of a straight line drawn across the entrance of Plymouth Sound from Penlee Point on the west through the Shagstone to the coast on the east, other than the waters included in the Dockyard Port of Devonport as hereinafter defined.

Plymouth Sound.

The term "Plymouth Sound" shall mean all that portion of the Dockyard Port of Plymouth southward of a straight line joining the heads of the two outermost piers at the entrance of Mill Bay, and southward and westward of a

straight line joining Fisher's Nose and the outermost extremity of Mount Batten breakwater, at the entrance of Cattewater.

Cattewater.

The term "Cattewater" shall mean all that portion of the Dockyard Port of Plymouth lying within the straight line drawn from Fisher's Nose to the outermost extremity of Mount Batten breakwater as aforesaid.

Narrow Waters of Plymouth Sound.

The term "Narrow Waters of Plymouth Sound" shall mean all that portion of Plymouth Sound lying north and west of a straight line drawn from Picklecombe Fort to Mount Batten Tower.

Dockyard Port of Devonport.

The term "Dockyard Port of Devonport" shall mean all the waters lying within a straight line drawn from Devil's Point to Wilderness Point, including all the bays, creeks, lakes, pools and rivers, as far as the tide flows.

DELINEATION OF LIMITS.

5. On the chart accompanying this Order are marked all the limits referred to therein.

PENALTIES.

6. Any infringement of the regulations contained in the First Schedule hereto shall render the person infringing liable to the penalty prescribed in Clause 30 of the said Schedule.

LOCAL AUTHORITIES.

7. Nothing in this Order shall affect the authority of the Pier Master at Mill Bay Pier, or of the Dock Master of the Great Western Docks, or of the Quay Master at Stonehouse Pool, or of the Cattewater Commissioners, or of the Sutton Pool Commissioners, under the respective Acts of Parliament relative thereto, but the regulations and rules contained in this Order shall be observed in the areas under the management of the above-mentioned authorities so far as they relate to those areas.

FIRST SCHEDULE.

REGULATIONS.

GENERAL.

1. Moorings for His Majesty's vessels, mark buoys, and other aids to navigation, and such other buoys as may be required for any purpose in connection with Naval or Military operations, may be placed by the King's Harbour Master in such positions as he may from time to time consider the requirements of His Majesty's Service demand.

2. No person shall lay moorings for private vessels, hulks, rafts, pontoons, bathing stages, houseboats, timber or any floating structures in the Dockyard Ports without the permission, in writing, of the King's Harbour Master, and all such moorings shall be in such positions

as the King's Harbour Master shall deem fit, and shall be forthwith removed on the requisition of the King's Harbour Master to that effect.

3. If at any time the anchor of any merchant or other private vessel hooks any Government moorings, or any electric cables, or moorings of buoys, or any pipe, the master of such vessel shall not proceed to unhook the same, but shall forthwith give notice thereof to the King's Harbour Master, in order that aid may be given for clearing such moorings or cables or pipe without doing damage to the same.

4. No merchant or other private vessel of above five tons, compelled or allowed to anchor in or near any of the navigable channels of the Dockyard Ports shall be left at any time without a shipkeeper.

5. No fishing from boats shall be carried on within one hundred feet of His Majesty's Dockyards or other Government establishments.

6. No ballast, stones, earth, clay, refuse, ashes, rubbish, dust, filth of any description, nor refuse from any quarry, mine or pit, nor any other matters solid or liquid whatsoever, shall be unladen, cast, or allowed to fall into the waters of the Dockyard Ports, except in such places as may be appointed by the King's Harbour Master; or upon the banks or any portion of the shores of the Dockyard Ports where the same may be liable to be washed into the waters of the Dockyard Ports by rain, tide, or otherwise; or into or upon the shores of any rivers or streams discharging into the Dockyard Ports where the same may be liable to be washed into the said rivers or streams by rain, flood, or otherwise.

7. The steam syren shall not be used within the limits of the Dockyard Port of Devonport except to prevent collision or in case of fog.

8. No firearm nor air-gun shall be discharged from any vessel or from the shore, over the water within the limits of the Dockyard Port of Devonport navigable for ships, from its southern limit to an imaginary line drawn from Neil to Warleigh Points in the River Tamar and to abreast of Antony Ferry in the River St. Germans; or in the shallow waters of St. Johns, Sango, or Milbrook Lakes outside an imaginary line joining Trevol and Palmer Points, or in Weston Mill Lake outside the Cornwall railway viaduct, or within 200 yards of any ship or vessel elsewhere in the Dockyard Ports, excepting always such discharge of firearms as may be necessary by His Majesty's naval and military forces and the Metropolitan Police employed within the limits of the Dockyard Ports, for drill or practice, and for the protection of His Majesty's vessels and the naval and military magazines and establishments.

9. No ship's gun on board any merchant or other private vessel shall be kept loaded, nor shall any such gun be discharged except as a signal of distress in the Dockyard Ports.

10. Whenever it may be necessary for mining or gunnery operations or experiments, dredging operations, or other naval or military purposes, to reserve any area for such operations or purposes, the area will be marked by buoys coloured green and white, or by posts coloured red; and after twenty-one days' warning notice has been issued by the Admiralty, and published in the London Gazette, no vessel

shall anchor within or pass through the area so marked, unless compelled to do so by stress of weather, or to avoid accident; nor when such area is uncovered, or nearly uncovered, at low water, shall any person pass through it, or remain in it, unless by permission of, and under such arrangements as may be from time to time made by, the Officer in charge of such operations.

ANCHORAGE.

General.

11. All merchant or other private vessels shall be subject to the direction of the King's Harbour Master.

12. No merchant or other private vessel shall make fast to, or lie at, any of the buoys marking the channels or shoals in the Dockyard Ports.

13. No merchant or other private vessel shall without licence in writing from the Naval Commander-in-Chief, Admiral Superintendent, or King's Harbour Master, be moored or fastened to any of the forts, Government moorings, buoys, piles or vessels in the Dockyard Ports.

14. No vessel shall anchor on the line of any pipe or electric cable laid down in the Dockyard Ports when such line is indicated by posts, or other discernible marks erected on shore, or when it lies within an area shown on the Admiralty Charts as a space in which anchorage is prohibited on account of the presence of pipes or telegraph or other electric cables, and a warning has been conveyed to mariners by notice issued by the Admiralty.

15. All vessels subject to or being in quarantine shall anchor in such place as the King's Harbour Master may direct.

Dockyard Port of Plymouth—Plymouth Sound.

16. The outer anchorage in Plymouth Sound within and near the breakwater shall be for the exclusive use of His Majesty's vessels of war.

17. Anchorage in Plymouth Sound within a space to be called the Merchant Vessels' Anchorage, is reserved specially for merchant and other private vessels, and is bounded by the following straight lines, namely:—

To the southward by a line drawn from Ram's Cliff Point towards the west, indicated by two white masonry beacons on Ram's Cliff Point:

To the northward by a line drawn from Mount Edgecumbe House through the Canteen on Drake's Island to the eastern shore of Plymouth Sound:

To the westward by a line drawn from the east end of Windsor Terrace, in the Town of Plymouth, to the Smeaton's Tower on the Hoe, and continuing through the white-washed diamond sea-mark on the rocks to the before-mentioned line drawn from Ram's Cliff Point, which anchorage is delineated on the chart annexed to this Order.

18. Merchant or other private vessels may anchor only either in the Merchant Vessels' Anchorage, or in such positions out of the fairway and other than those enumerated in Clause 19 of this Schedule, as may from time to time be permitted by the King's Harbour Master.

Vessels must avoid anchoring on or near the leading mark for the Smeaton Pass.

19. No merchant or other private vessel shall be anchored, moored or placed in either the Eastern or Western entrances to the Sound, or in any part of the fairway on the west side of the Merchant Vessels' Anchorage, or in the Smeaton Pass, or in the Asia Pass eastward of a straight line drawn from the Melampus buoy to a position one cable south (true) of the Asia buoy, or in any part of the fairway from the Asia and Smeaton Passes to the line marking the entrance of the Dockyard Port of Devonport or northward of Drake's Island within 50 fathoms of the centre of any moorings for the use of His Majesty's Vessels, or in Barn Pool.

Cattewater.

20. An open channel of not less than 50 fathoms in width on the north side of the harbour shall be kept clear for the navigation of vessels from the entrance of Cattewater up towards the Bear's Head and Turnchapel Point, and as far as His Majesty's breakwater establishment at Oreston, and no merchant or other private vessel shall anchor in or obstruct this channel.

Note.—In addition to the Regulations and Rules contained in this Order special regulations made by the Cattewater Commissioners for merchant and other private vessels are in force in the area under their jurisdiction.

Dockyard Port of Devonport.

21. No merchant or other private vessel shall be anchored or moored in the fairway between the Government moorings in the Dockyard Port of Devonport so as to swing within 100 fathoms from the centre of any of those moorings, or in such a position as to be liable to foul any of His Majesty's vessels at those moorings or elsewhere, or in front or abreast of any of His Majesty's dockyards or arsenals or of His Majesty's gunwharf, unless consigned thereto and unless permission is granted by the King's Harbour Master or unless forced thereto by unavoidable accident.

22. No merchant or other private vessel shall be made fast to or be moored to or secured by any of the moorings, anchors, or chains belonging to His Majesty to which access can be had when the tide is out, or be anchored or moored so as to swing within 100 fathoms of any buoys or piles belonging to His Majesty or in such a manner as to prevent access to His Majesty's docks, wharves, arsenals, gunwharf, or victualling yard.

23. No merchant or other private vessel shall be anchored or moored in any place within the Dockyard Port of Devonport, except on the eastern side of Stonehouse Pool, to the eastward of a straight line drawn between the end of the west pier of the Royal William Victualling Yard basin and the south extreme of the Stonehouse Pool wharves and a channel for boats and barges shall be kept clear from the fairway in the Dockyard Port of Devonport to the Admiral's Hard, and up Stonehouse Lake to the Royal Naval and Military Hospitals above Stonehouse Bridge.

24. A navigable channel for small steam vessels, barges, and boats shall be kept clear

from the fairway in the Dockyard Port of Devonport to the quays at South Down, in Millbrook Lake, and also in Millbrook Lake, to the village of Millbrook, when the tide shall permit.

25. No merchant or other private vessel shall be anchored, moored or placed nearer any of the wharves of the Royal William Victualling Yard than 60 fathoms or within the line of mooring buoys as laid down at the date of this Order, or at any time thereafter, or nearer than 50 fathoms to any Government moorings off the said Victualling Yard.

26. Nothing however in the foregoing provisions shall be deemed to exclude such vessels as require admission to the wharves, docks and other establishments at Mutton Cove, North Corner, New Passage, and elsewhere for loading and unloading cargoes, and all such vessels shall continue to enjoy their accustomed privileges in this respect as fully as if this Order had not been made, provided that such vessels do not impede nor interfere with the navigation of His Majesty's vessels.

Prevention of Fire.

27. No vessel when passing the powder magazine at Bull Point or any of the powder ships (painted red), shall pass inside the red buoys off Bull Point, or between the powder ships and the red buoys placed to guard them.

28. No merchant or other private vessel shall be breamed in any part of the Dockyard Port of Devonport, except on the shore of Stonehouse Pool or at Rogers' boat-building yard at Cremill.

29. Within the distance of 200 yards from any of His Majesty's vessels, or of any hired vessel in His Majesty's service, or of any of His Majesty's docks, dockyards, arsenals, powder magazines, or wharves—

(a) No pitch, tar, resin, turpentine, grease, tallow, oil, nor other combustible matter, shall be boiled or heated on board any merchant or other private vessel;

(b) No fire shall be kept on board any merchant or other private vessel in the Dockyard Port of Devonport, except in steam vessels' furnaces, between 11 o'clock in the evening and 5 o'clock in the morning from the 1st October to the 31st March inclusive, or between 11 o'clock in the evening and 4 o'clock in the morning between the 1st April and the 30th September inclusive.

PENALTIES.

30. The master of every merchant or other private vessel to which this Order relates shall observe and cause to be observed the said Regulations in this Schedule as far as they relate to his vessel, and if any master or other person acts in any respect in contravention of any of the said Regulations, or fails to observe or to cause the same to be observed, he shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding the sum of ten pounds.

Note.—The King's Harbour Master or any Officer acting directly under his authority will, when afloat and in the execution of the duties pertaining to his office as such, wear in the bows of the vessel a Union flag with a white border and, in the centre of the flag, the letters K.H.M. surmounted by a Crown.

SECOND SCHEDULE.

RULES.

GENERAL.

Observance of "Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea."

1. All sea-going vessels, when within the limits of the Dockyard Ports, shall carry such lights as are prescribed by the "Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea" made from time to time under the Merchant Shipping Act; and all vessels of every description shall also observe the steering and sailing rules set forth in such Regulations, except in so far as they are affected by the Rules hereinafter contained.

Lights for Small Steam Vessels.

2. Small steam vessels of a length over all of, or exceeding, 40 feet shall, between sunset and sunrise, when within the limits of the Dockyard Ports carry the lights prescribed for sea-going steamships in the said Regulations and in such a manner that:—

(a) The green and red sidelights shall be carried at such a height as to show over any objects in the vessel and shall not be less than 2 feet apart horizontally.

(b) The white light shall be carried amidships and at least 2 feet above the sidelights.

3. Small steam vessels of a length over all of less than 40 feet, when under way between sunset and sunrise within the limits of the Dockyard Ports, shall carry the lights mentioned in Rule 2 of this Schedule or—

(a) A combined lantern showing a green light and a red light from right ahead to two points abaft the beam on their respective sides. Such lantern shall be carried amidships and at such a height as to show over any object in the vessel.

(b) A white light similar to that required in Rule 2. Such light shall be carried, if possible, at least 2 feet above the combined lantern.

4. The lights mentioned in Rules 2 and 3 are to be of such a character that, on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, the coloured sidelights shall be visible at least 1 mile and the white lights at least 2 miles.

Vessels exempted from carrying Anchor Lights.

5. Coal and other hulks moored head and stern in the Dockyard Port of Devonport, ships without shipkeepers lying to the northward of the steam ferry at Torpoint, coal and oil lighters moored out of the fairway to the northward and southward of the steam ferry at Torpoint and off Kinterbury Pier, and Dockyard lumps and lighters moored off the Dockyard wall between Mutton Cove and the south end of No. 1 Jetty, need not carry anchor lights.

Lights for Boats at Anchor.

6. Small fishing boats, and all other boats of every description at anchor in any part of Plymouth Sound at night, shall exhibit a white light visible all round at a distance of at least 1 mile.

Lights for Boats under Way.

7. Small fishing boats and all other boats of every description under way in any part of the Dockyard Ports at night shall have ready at hand a white light, and shall exhibit the same on approaching or being approached by any vessel or boat under way.

Dredgers.

8. A dredger when at work or in position for working shall carry the following Lights and Signals, viz.:—

Lights between Sunset and Sunrise:—

(a) *Forward*.—In the forward part of the dredger at a height of not less than 20 and not exceeding 40 feet above the hull, a white light in a lantern so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least 1 mile.

(b) *Amidships*.—Three such white lights placed in a triangular form at least 8 feet apart, at right angles to the keel and with the apex uppermost, the base of the triangle to be at least 10 feet higher than the forward light and to be also higher than, and clear of the framework, funnels, or other erections upon the dredger. If so moored or working as to make it necessary to prohibit the passage of vessels on one or both sides, a red light or lights in a lantern so constructed as to show a clear, uniform and unbroken light visible all round the horizon at a distance of at least 1 mile, is, or are, to be substituted for the lower light or lights of the triangle on the side or sides of which passage is prohibited.

(c) *Aft*.—One such white light at or near the stern of the dredger and at such a height that it shall not be less than 15 feet lower than the forward light.

Signals between Sunrise and Sunset:—

Amidships.—Three black balls of not less than two feet in diameter placed in a triangular form at least eight feet apart, at right angles to the keel with the apex uppermost, the base of the triangle to be higher than and clear of the framework, funnels or any other erection upon the dredger. If so moored or working so as to make it necessary to prohibit passage on one or both sides, a red flag or flags at least five feet in the hoist is, or are, to be substituted for the lower ball or balls of the triangle on the side or sides on which passage is prohibited.

Signal in Fog:—

In fog, mist, falling snow or heavy rain storms, a dredger at work or in position for working shall at intervals of not more than one minute sound a gong rapidly for about five seconds.

Vessels to keep clear of His Majesty's Vessels.

9. When one of His Majesty's vessels or other vessel in charge of His Majesty's Officers intends to pass between the Dockyard Port of Devonport and Plymouth Sound she shall hoist O flag (International Code—Alphabetical) by day, or a red light by night, at the foremast head, and all other of His Majesty's vessels present in the Port shall hoist the Pilot Jack by day, or show position lights (two white

lights vertical, 8 feet apart hoisted at the peak, or if no gaff, hoisted abreast of the maintop in the middle line of the ship or on the ensign staff) by night, as a general warning. The Pilot Jack shall also be hoisted by day, or position lights by night, on the flagstaff at Mount Wise for the same purpose, and all other vessels under way in the Dockyard Port of Devonport, or in the narrow waters of Plymouth Sound, shall keep out of the way of the said vessel flying the O flag, or showing the red light at the foremast head; provided always that the said vessel shall be navigated with due care and at a moderate speed.

10. When any of His Majesty's vessels is about to enter or leave any of the docks, basins, jetties, &c., at His Majesty's Dockyard at Devonport, the Pilot Jack will be hoisted at the yardarm of the flagstaff at the North and South Yard, according to the Yard at which the movement may be taking place, and while this flag is hoisted, all merchant and other private steam vessels, and all small craft propelled by steam or other mechanical power when navigating along the eastern shore in the Dockyard Port of Devonport, shall keep out of the way of the vessel which is being moved, and also of the tugs which may be in attendance on her.

11. Merchant and other private steam vessels when navigating along the western shore in the Dockyard Port of Devonport between Petre and Carew Points, shall keep outside or to the eastward of the Admiralty moorings in that locality. All such vessels shall also keep outside or to the northward of the ships of the Submarine Establishment moored off the Cre-mill Obelisk.

12. Merchant and other private steam vessels navigating along the eastern shore in the Dockyard Port of Devonport shall keep outside, or to the southward and westward of, the moorings for lighters and lumps between Mutton Cove and the south end of No. 1 Jetty.

Sailing and Small Craft to keep clear of Steamers.

13. When any seagoing steamship, steam vessel towing, steam dredger, or steam hopper within the limits of the Dockyard Ports shall by reason of the crowded nature of the channel or anchorage, or from other cause find it unsafe or impracticable to keep out of the way of a sailing vessel, or of a boat under oars or sail or steam or other mechanical power, she shall signify the same to the sailing vessel or boat by four short blasts of the steam whistle or syren blown in rapid succession, when the sailing vessel or boat shall keep out of the way of the other vessel; provided always that the latter shall be navigated with due care and at a moderate speed.

Sound Signals for Vessels in sight of one another.

14. Whenever steam vessels within the limits of the Dockyard Ports are in risk of collision, they shall, in addition to the signals required by Article 28 of the "Regulations for preventing Collisions at Sea," indicate their own action as follows:—

If steaming ahead, by one long blast on the whistle or syren;

If stopped, by two long blasts.

Ferries.

15.—(a) Any ferry vessel plying in the Dockyard Port of Devonport or across the Tamar River, however propelled, shall between sunrise and sunset when there is risk of collision, keep out of the way of His Majesty's vessels by stopping or going astern, as necessary.

(b) Every such ferry vessel, propelled by means of chains, or in any other way confined to a fixed track, shall, instead of the lights directed to be carried by the "Regulation for Preventing Collisions at Sea," carry four lights, one at each corner, showing white ahead and astern in the direction of the ferry track, and red on the beam or athwart the ferry track, each light to be visible for at least two miles.

Steam Vessels crossing the Dockyard Port of Devonport.

16. Steam vessels crossing from one side to the other in the Dockyard Port of Devonport shall keep out of the way of vessels proceeding up or down the Port.

Locomotive Torpedo Practice.

17. Whenever practice with locomotive torpedoes takes place, a red flag will be hoisted at the firing point to warn vessels and boats not to cross the range. While the practice is proceeding, no craft shall anchor for fishing or other purposes, nor shall any cruising or pleasure sailing take place in the area considered dangerous, details of which are to be published from time to time in notices issued by the Admiralty and in the London Gazette.

Prohibition of Trawling and Net Fishing in Certain Areas.

18. No trawling or fishing by nets, whether drift nets or set nets, shall be at any time carried on in the main fairways to, or in the centre portion of Plymouth Sound, the prohibited area of which shall be limited as follows:—

On the western side by a straight line drawn from Eastern King Point to the position marked by the Melampus buoy; thence to the position marked by the Queen's Grounds buoy; and thence in the direction of the position marked by the Draystone buoy;

On the Eastern side by a straight line drawn from Fisher's Nose to the outermost extremity of Mount Batten Breakwater; thence to the position marked by the Northern Hospital Hulk in Jenny Cliff Bay; thence to the position marked by the Duke Rock buoy; thence to the extremity of Bovisand Pier; and thence to the Shagstone.

Net fishing shall, however, be permitted around the breakwater, inside the area bounded as follows:—

South of the breakwater, by a straight line passing from the western extremity of the breakwater, successively through the positions marked by the following buoys, namely, the Knap buoy, West Tinker buoy, East Tinker buoy, and the two western buoys of the Eastern channel, to the eastern extremity of the breakwater;

North of the breakwater, by a straight line passing from the eastern extremity of the breakwater to a position one hundred and fifty yards North (true) of the breakwater fort; and thence to the western extremity of the breakwater.

Marking of Wrecks.

19. Should a vessel sink or become a wreck in any part of the Dockyard Ports, so that an obstruction in a navigable fairway is caused, which in the opinion of the King's Harbour Master it is necessary to mark, such vessel or wreck will be indicated by the following marks or lights, exhibited from the wreck itself or from a wreck-marking craft:—

By Day.—Three balls on a yard 20 feet above the sea, two placed vertically at one end and one at the other, the single ball being on the side nearer the wreck.

By night.—Three white fixed lights similarly arranged, but not the ordinary riding light.

If the obstruction is not considered by the King's Harbour Master of sufficient importance to be marked both by day and night, a green buoy only will be used with the word "Wreck" on it in white letters.

PENALTIES.

Note.—The master of every merchant or other private vessel to which the rules in this Schedule relate must observe and cause to be observed the provisions of these Rules as far as they relate to his vessel, and any such master by his wilful default infringing or causing any infringement of any of the provisions of these rules is guilty of a misdemeanour.

WHEREAS by an Order of His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh in Council, bearing date the 15th day of February, 1909, and entitled the Eastern African Protectorates (Court of Appeal) Order in Council, 1909, a Court, called His Majesty's Court of Appeal for Eastern Africa, was constituted for the hearing and determining of appeals from His Majesty's Courts in the East Africa, Uganda, and Nyasaland Protectorates:

And whereas by an Order of His Majesty in Council, bearing date the 21st day of January, 1914, and entitled the Eastern African Protectorates (Court of Appeal) Amendment Order in Council, 1914, provision was made for the hearing and determining of appeals from His Britannic Majesty's Court for Zanzibar by His Majesty's said Court of Appeal for Eastern Africa:

And whereas by an Order of His late Majesty King Edward the Seventh in Council, bearing date the 15th day of February, 1909, and entitled the Eastern African Protectorates (Appeal to Privy Council) Order in Council, 1909, provision was made for regulating appeals from His Majesty's said Court of Appeal for Eastern Africa to His Majesty in Council:

And whereas by Article 6 of the last recited Order, hereinafter referred to as the Principal Order, it was, amongst other things, provided that leave to appeal under Article 3 should only be granted by the Court in the first instance upon condition of the Appellant, within a period to be fixed by the Court but not exceeding three months from the date of the hearing of the application for leave to appeal, entering into good and sufficient security to the satisfaction of the Court in a sum not exceeding Rs. 5,000 for the purposes there specified, and it is expedient to amend the said provision:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf by the Foreign Jurisdiction Act, 1890, or otherwise in His Majesty vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as "The Eastern African Protectorates (Appeal to Privy Council) Amendment Order in Council (No. 2), 1915," and shall be construed and read as one with the Principal Order.

2. Article 6 of the Principal Order is hereby amended by substituting for the words and figures "in a sum not exceeding Rs. 5,000" the words and figures "in a sum not exceeding Rs. 7,500."

3. This Order shall commence and have effect forthwith.

And the Right Honourable Andrew Bonar Law, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by Section 421, Sub-section (2), of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is provided that His Majesty in Council, on the application of any person having authority over the waters of any harbour, river, or inland navigation, or, if there is no such person, any person interested in the navigation thereof, may make Rules concerning lights and signals to be carried, or the steps for avoiding collision to be taken, and that those Rules shall, as regards vessels navigating the said waters, be of the same force as if they were part of the Collision Regulations:

And whereas by Section 738 of the said Act it is provided that where His Majesty has power under the Act, or any Act thereafter to be passed amending the same, to make an

Order in Council, His Majesty may from time to time make that Order in Council, and by Order in Council revoke, alter, or add to any Order so made:

And whereas under and by virtue of the Clyde Navigation Acts, 1858 to 1914, the Trustees of the Clyde Navigation (hereinafter called the Trustees) are the Authority owning and exercising jurisdiction over the Harbour of Glasgow and the waters of the River Clyde as defined by Section 75 of the Act of 1858, and by Section 43 of the Act of 1904, and Section 19 of the Act of 1911:

And whereas in the year 1890 the Trustees submitted certain Rules to the Board of Trade concerning the signal lights to be carried, and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by vessels—to wit dredgers—moored in the River Clyde and Harbour of Glasgow, within the jurisdiction of the Trustees, which were sanctioned by Her late Majesty Queen Victoria by Order in Council dated the 23rd February, 1891, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that it is desirable to revoke these Rules:

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Him by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to direct that as from the 1st day of December, 1915, the said Rules so sanctioned by the aforesaid Order in Council, dated the 23rd February, 1891, shall be altogether revoked, repealed, and abrogated.

WHEREAS by Section 421 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, it is provided: (1) that any Rules made before or after the passing of this Act under the authority of any local Act, concerning lights and signals to be carried, or the steps for avoiding collision to be taken, by vessels navigating the waters of any harbour, river, or other inland navigation, shall, notwithstanding anything in this Act, have full effect, and (2) that where any such Rules are not and cannot be made, His Majesty in Council, on the application of any person having authority over such waters, or, if there is no such person, any person interested in the navigation thereof, may make such Rules, and those Rules shall, as regards vessels navigating the said waters, be of the same force as if they were part of the Collision Regulations:

And whereas under and by virtue of the Clyde Lighthouses Acts, 1755 to 1912, the Trustees of the Clyde Lighthouses (hereinafter

called the Trustees) are the Authority owning and exercising jurisdiction over the waters of the River and Firth of Clyde, as defined by Section 11 of the Clyde Lighthouses Act, 1880:

And whereas the Trustees have no power to make any Rules as aforesaid, and they have accordingly submitted certain Rules to the Board of Trade concerning the signal lights to be carried and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by vessels—to wit dredgers—moored in the River and Firth of Clyde within the jurisdiction of the Trustees:

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that these proposed Rules are proper and reasonable:

And whereas the provisions of Section 1 of the Rules Publication Act, 1893, have been complied with:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Him by the Merchant Shipping Act, 1894, and by and with the advice of His Privy Council, is pleased to make the Rules which are set forth in the Schedule hereto annexed, and to direct that the same shall come into operation and be in force as and from the 1st day of December, 1915.

SCHEDULE.

Rules concerning the lights to be carried and concerning the steps for avoiding collision to be taken by dredgers moored in the River or Firth of Clyde within the jurisdiction of the Trustees of the Clyde Lighthouses.

Every dredger moored in the River or Firth of Clyde within the jurisdiction of the Trustees of the Clyde Lighthouses shall, between sunset and sunrise, exhibit three bright white lights from globular lanterns of not less than eight inches diameter, placed athwart ships on the top of the framework, not less than six feet apart, forming a right-angled triangle. *Vessels shall pass on that side only which shows the two lights in a vertical line.* The lights shall be of sufficient power to be distinctly visible, with a clear atmosphere on a dark night, at a distance of at least two miles. By day three black balls or shapes shall be shown in substitution for the three bright lights. Vessels shall approach and pass the dredger with caution and at reduced speed.

WHEREAS by the Burial Act, 1855, it is, amongst other things, provided that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether

(3) That the heading "Harness and saddlery which can be used for military purposes, including metal fittings for such harness or saddlery" in the list of goods the exportation of which is prohibited to all destinations should be deleted, and there be substituted therefor the heading "Harness and saddlery, including metal fittings for such harness or saddlery."

(4) That the heading "Leather, undressed or dressed, suitable for saddlery, harness, military boots or military clothing" in the list of goods the exportation of which is prohibited to all destinations should be deleted, that there be substituted therefor the heading "Leather, undressed or dressed, suitable for saddlery, harness, or military boots," and that there be inserted in the list of goods the exportation of which is prohibited to all destinations abroad other than British Possessions and Protectorates the heading "Leather, undressed or dressed, suitable for military clothing."

(5) That the headings "Goatskins, dressed and undressed," "Sheepskins, tanned," and "Sheepskins, whether woolled or not" in the list of goods the exportation of which is prohibited to all destinations abroad other than British Possessions and Protectorates should be deleted, and there be substituted therefor the headings "Sheepskins, woolled," and "Skins of sheep and goats, undressed or dressed, other than those the exportation of which is specifically prohibited to all foreign countries in Europe and on the Mediterranean and

Black Seas, other than France, Russia (except through Baltic ports), Italy, Spain and Portugal."

(6) That the headings "Deerskins, dressed and undressed," and "Pigskins, dressed or undressed," in the list of goods the exportation of which is prohibited to all destinations abroad other than British Possessions and Protectorates should be deleted, and there be inserted in the list of goods the exportation of which is prohibited to all foreign countries in Europe and on the Mediterranean and Black Seas, other than France, Russia (except through Baltic ports), Italy, Spain and Portugal, the heading "Deerskins and pigskins, undressed or dressed."

(7) That the heading "Salts of aluminium (other than alunite and nitrate of aluminium)" in the list of goods the exportation of which is prohibited to all foreign countries in Europe and on the Mediterranean and Black Seas, other than France, Russia (except through Baltic ports), Italy, Spain and Portugal, should be deleted, and there be substituted therefor the heading "Salts of aluminium (other than alunite, ammonium alum and nitrate of aluminium, the exportation of which is already prohibited to all destinations abroad other than British Possessions and Protectorates)."

(8) That the exportation of the following goods should be prohibited to all destinations abroad other than British Possessions and Protectorates:—

Leather belting, hydraulic leather, pump leather, and picking bands;

Stearine pitch and other pitches derived from fatty oils and acids.

Captain G. P. Dawnay, D.S.O., M.V.O., Reserve of Officers, Coldstream Guards.

His Majesty The KING has been pleased to award the Victoria Cross to the undermentioned Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Men:—

Captain Alfred John Shout, 1st Battalion, Australian Imperial Force.

For most conspicuous bravery at Lone Pine trenches, in the Gallipoli Peninsula.

On the morning of the 9th August, 1915, with a very small party Captain Shout charged down trenches strongly occupied by the enemy, and personally threw four bombs among them, killing eight and routing the remainder.

In the afternoon of the same day, from the position gained in the morning, he captured a further length of trench under similar conditions, and continued personally to bomb the enemy at close range under very heavy fire until he was severely wounded, losing his right hand and left eye.

This most gallant officer has since succumbed to his injuries.

Lieutenant William John Symons, 7th Battalion, Australian Imperial Force.

For most conspicuous bravery on the night of 8th-9th August, 1915, at Lone Pine trenches, in the Gallipoli Peninsula.

He was in command of the right section of the newly captured trenches held by his battalion, and repelled several counter-attacks with great coolness. At about 5 a.m. on 9th August a series of determined attacks were made by the enemy on an isolated sap, and six officers were in succession killed or severely wounded, a portion of the sap being lost.

Lieutenant Symons then led a charge and retook the lost sap, shooting two Turks with his revolver. The sap was under hostile fire from three sides, and Lieutenant Symons withdrew some fifteen yards to a spot where some overhead cover could be obtained, and in the face of heavy fire built up a sand barricade. The enemy succeeded in setting fire to the fascines and woodwork of the head-cover, but Lieutenant Symons extinguished the fire and rebuilt the barricade.

His coolness and determination finally compelled the enemy to discontinue their attacks.

Lieutenant Frederick Harold Tubb, 7th Battalion, Australian Imperial Force.

For most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty at Lone Pine trenches, in the Gallipoli Peninsula, on 9th August, 1915. In the early morning the enemy made a determined counter-attack on the centre of the newly captured trench held by Lieutenant Tubb. They advanced up a sap and blew in a sandbag barricade, leaving only one foot of it standing, but Lieutenant Tubb led his men back, repulsed the enemy, and rebuilt the barricade. Supported by strong bombing parties, the enemy succeeded in twice again blowing in the barricade, but on each occasion Lieutenant Tubb, although wounded in the head and arm, held his ground with the greatest coolness and rebuilt it, and finally succeeded in maintaining his position under very heavy bomb fire.

2nd Lieutenant Hugo Vivian Hope Throssell, 10th Light Horse Regiment, Australian Imperial Force.

For most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty during operations on the Kaiakij Aghala (Hill 60) in the Gallipoli Peninsula on 29th and 30th August, 1915. Although severely wounded in several places during a counter-attack he refused to leave his post or to obtain medical assistance till all danger was passed, when he had his wounds dressed and returned to the firing line until ordered out of action by the Medical Officer.

By his personal courage and example he kept up the spirits of his party and was largely instrumental in saving the situation at a critical period.

No. 4/515 Corporal Cyril Royston Guyton Bassett, New Zealand Divisional Signal Company.

For most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty on the Chunuk Bair ridge in the Gallipoli Peninsula on 7th August, 1915.

After the New Zealand Infantry Brigade had attacked and established itself on the ridge, Corporal Bassett, in full daylight and under a continuous and heavy fire, succeeded in laying a telephone line from the old position to the new one on Chunuk Bair. He has subsequently been brought to notice for further excellent and most gallant work connected with the repair of telephone lines by day and night under heavy fire.

No. 384 Corporal Alexander Stewart Burton, 7th Battalion, Australian Imperial Force, and No. 2130 Corporal William Dunstan, 7th Battalion, Australian Imperial Force.

For most conspicuous bravery at Lone Pine trenches in the Gallipoli Peninsula on the 9th August, 1915.

In the early morning the enemy made a determined counter-attack on the centre of the newly captured trench held by Lieutenant Tubb, Corporals Burton and Dunstan and a few men. They advanced up a sap and blew in a sandbag barricade, leaving only one foot of it standing, but Lieutenant Tubb

with the two corporals repulsed the enemy and rebuilt the barricade. Supported by strong bombing parties the enemy twice again succeeded in blowing in the barricade, but on each occasion they were repulsed and the barricade rebuilt, although Lieutenant Tubb was wounded in the head and arm and Corporal Burton was killed by a bomb while most gallantly building up the parapet under a hail of bombs.

No. 943 Private John Hamilton, 1st Battalion, Australian Imperial Force.

For most conspicuous bravery on 9th August, 1915, in the Gallipoli Peninsula.

During a heavy bomb attack by the enemy on the newly captured position at Lone Pine, Private Hamilton, with utter disregard to personal safety, exposed himself under heavy fire on the parapets, in order to secure a better fire position against the enemy's bomb throwers. His coolness and daring example had an immediate effect. The defence was encouraged and the enemy driven off with heavy loss.

No. 958 Private Leonard Keysor, 1st Battalion, Australian Imperial Force.

For most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty at Lone Pine trenches in the Gallipoli Peninsula.

On 7th August, 1915, he was in a trench which was being heavily bombed by the enemy. He picked up two live bombs and threw them back at the enemy at great risk to his own life, and continued throwing bombs, although himself wounded, thereby saving a portion of the trench which it was most important to hold.

On 8th August at the same place, Private Keysor successfully bombed the enemy out of a position, from which a temporary mastery over his own trench had been obtained, and was again wounded. Although marked for hospital he declined to leave, and volunteered to throw bombs for another company which had lost its bomb throwers.

He continued to bomb the enemy till the situation was relieved.

Second Lieutenant Benjamin Handley Geary, 4th Battalion (attached 1st Battalion), The East Surrey Regiment.

For most conspicuous bravery and determination on "Hill 60," near Ypres, on April 20th and 21st, 1915, when he held the left crater with his platoon, some men of the Bedfordshire Regiment and a few reinforcements who came up during the evening and night. The crater was first exposed to very heavy artillery fire which broke down the defences, and afterwards throughout the night to repeated bomb attacks which filled it with dead and wounded. Each attack was, however, repulsed mainly owing to the splendid personal gallantry and example of Second Lieutenant Geary. At one time he used a rifle with great effect, at another threw hand grenades, and exposed himself with entire disregard to danger in order to see by the light of flares where the enemy were coming on. In the intervals between the attacks he spent his whole time arranging for the ammunition supply and for reinforcements. He was severely wounded just before daylight on 21st April.

RURAL DISTRICT OF EPSOM.

NOTICE is hereby given, that by an Order made by the Local Government Board and dated the 28th day of September, 1915, it is ordered that on and after the 8th day of November, 1915, Sections 15, 16, 17, 18, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, and 33 comprised in Part II; Sections 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 44, 45, 46, and 49 comprised in Part III; and Sections 52, 53, 54, 55, 56, 57, 58, 59, 60, 62, 63, 64, and 65 comprised in Part IV of the Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1907, shall be in force in the several contributory places within the Rural District of Epsom subject to the following conditions and adaptations, viz. :—

Nothing in Section 27 shall apply to any temporary building erected or set up for use by the Territorial Force.

Nothing in Section 30 shall apply to any wall or other structure in so far as the same is used either for the support of any street or public footpath or for the protection of any street or public footpath from damage or obstruction by reason of the surface of the street or footpath being above or below the level of the surface of the adjoining land, unless the wall or other structure was built after the street or footpath became a highway repairable by the inhabitants at large by or at the expense of a person other than the Highway Authority responsible for the repair of the street or footpath.

Section 35 so far as it relates to the deposit of material shall have effect subject to the first proviso to Section 91 of the Public Health Act, 1875.

Bye-laws made in pursuance of Section 16 of the Local Government Act, 1888, for the prevention and suppression of nuisances shall not, in relation to any subject matter of this Section, be of any force or effect in any contributory place within the district.

Nothing in Section 38 shall prejudicially affect any power or right exercisable by or attaching to an owner or occupier of premises by virtue of Section 22 of the Public Health Act, 1875, or of Section 18 of the Public Health Acts Amendment Act, 1890.

Nothing in Section 59 shall apply to a public or circulating library which is not in any contributory place within the district.
