Naples, January 10. Four Gallies are fitting out here to carry a Reinforcement to the Spanish Garison at Porto-Longo. Our Viceroy has received Orders from Spain to raise in this Kingdom 500 Men to recruit the Neapolitan Regiment in Catalonia; The New Levies are continued at the same time for the State of Milan; and so soon as the Vessels, that were lately sent from hence with Soldiers for that Service, are returned from Genoua and Final, where they landed, several Companies more will be Shipt here, for the farther recruiting our Troops in the Milanese.

Milan, Jan. 20. General Caprara is gone back to Turin, after having had several Conferences with our Governor the Marquis de Leganez about the Affairs of the War. The German Troops are now in their Winter Quarters; four Regiments lie in the Dutchy of Mantua, as many in that of Parma, and the rest in Monferrat. Our Governor is sending an Envoy to Genoua to settle the matter about the Contributions which are demanded of that Republick in lieu of Winter Quarters. The Recruits for the Imperial Troops arrive daily in small Parties from Germany.

Venice, Jan. 22. Yesterday came to the Lido 60 new raised Soldiers, and 350 more are on their march thither from Verona; who, together with those that were before at the Lido, are designed for the Levant with the next Convoy. Divers Persons of Quality are come hither to par-

take of the Divertisements of the Carnival; and the Great Prince and Princess of Tuscany are expected here in few days. We hear from Dalmatia, that the Turks are at present very quiet in those parts, but that they raise all the Men they can for the service of the next Campagne.

Warsaw, Jan. 1. Since the breaking up of the Dyet the Deputies are gone home, and the Senators to wait upon the King (who continues still much indisposed) at Zolkiew, where a Great Council is appointed to be held about the present state of this Kingdom; and some think that another Dyet will be summoned to meet here in March. In the mean time the French Ambassador labours all he can to make a separate Peace between this Crown and the Ottoman Port; though hitherto with little success.

Vienna, Jan. 23. The States of the Lower-Austria have resolved to grant the Emperor a Subsidy suitable to the present urgency of Affairs, but have not yet fixed the Sum. A Train of Artillery is preparing in the Arsenal here, which will be sent by Water to Hungary, with a great quantity of Bombs and Ammunition, so soon as the Danube is open. The last Letters from Peter Waradin tell us, that a Party of that Garison which had been as far as the Save was come back, and brought Intelligence, which they got from the Country People, and some Prisoners they took, that the Turks threatned still to make a great Incurfion this Winter into Sclavonia; That they had supplied Temeswaer and Belgrade with all things necessary for their Defence; and talked very much of their great Preparations for the next Campagne. They write from Upper-Hungary, that the Troops designed for an Enterprize upon Gyula had orders to march, and that General Pollant was in the mean time to command a flying Body of Germans, Hungarians and Radziens between that place and Temeswaer, to observe the Enemy, and to hinder

hinder their sending any Succors to Gyula. Since the arrival of Prince Eugene of Savoy, General Roubin is likewise come hither from Piedmont, to assist at the Conferences that are held here about the prosecution of the War on that side.

Dublin, Jan. 29. We have this day received Advice from Kinsale, that the *Sheerness* Galley came into that Harbour on Wednesday last; having on the 9th Instant been Engaged with two French Privateers (who the day before took two English Merchant Ships out of Kilmare River) from two in the Afternoon till 7 in the Evening, when the said Privateers made all the Sail they could, and got away by the favour of the night. The *Sheerness* received but little damage in her Hull or Rigging, and lost but one Man in the Fight.

Falmouth, Jan. 29. On the 27th in the Evening arrived here the *Newport* Frigate, *Joseph Fennes* Commander, in 21 days from St. Louis; There came out in her Company the *Greyhound*, *Hopewell*, and *Experiment*, Merchant Ships, all bound for London; On the 7th Instant Captain Fennes was separated from the two last off Cape St. Vincent, and on the 11th from the *Greyhound* off Cape Finister; And the night following he fell in with a Fleet of Ships Steering S. S. W. being then 45 Leagues Westward of the Cape, which he believes to have been our outward bound *Streights* Fleet. On the 19th about 120 Leagues W. S. W. of Seily he came up with, and retook a Vessel of 40 Tons called the *Dove* of Bristol, laden from the *Canaries*, which together with another English Merchant Ship, likewise belonging to Bristol, and bound home from the *West-Indies*, was lately taken out of the River of Kilmare in Ireland by two French Privateers. The *Dove* came into this Harbour yesterday.

Plimouth, Jan. 30. On the 28th Instant came into this Port from cruising Their Majesties Ship the *Greenwich*, Captain *Leake* Commander, who brought in with him an English Merchant Ship called the *Exchange* of London, which he re-took on the 6th of this Month about 60 Leagues W. from Usbant; This Vessel was taken about 10 days before by a Privateer of St. Malo's in her Voyage to the *West-Indies*. This afternoon came in Their Majesties Ship the *Berwick*, Captain *Martin* Commander; On the 5th Instant he re-took an English Vessel called the *Thomas and Ruth* of London, bound to the *Barbadoes*, but was separated from her two days after. On the 16th he retook a Dutch Pink, which being very leaky, they could not preserve from sinking. And on the 23d he came up with and retook the *Elizabeth* of Bristol laden with Sugar from the *Barbadoes*, which had been taken by two French Privateers out of Kilmare River in Ireland; but lost Company of her on the 27th of this Month. On Sunday he left Their Majesties Ships the *Monk* and *Adventure* in chase of a French Privateer who had with her a Dutch Guinea Ship, and an English Merchant Man homeward bound from Malaga.

Dartmouth, Jan. 30. On the 28th at night a French Privateer of 10 or 12 Guns was driven ashore and stranded near *Saltcomb*, where the Vessel soon after was broke in pieces, and the Men on board her made Prisoners.

Deal, Febr. 3. Last night arrived in the Downs two Portuguese Ships, one from O. Porto, and the other from Lisbon; The Commander of the latter reports, that on the 27th past off of Seily he met

their Majesties Ship the *Monk*, having with her 3 Prizes.

London, Febr. 3. Yesterday Their Majesties Ship formerly called *The Royal Charles*, and now *The Queen*, was Launched at Woolwich, being a First Rate of 100 Guns, re-built at that place.
