A PROCLAMATION

FOR PROHIBITING THE IMPORTATION OF PAPER-MAKING MATERIALS, PAPER, TOBACCO, FURNITURE WOODS, AND STONES AND SLATES INTO THE UNITED KINGDOM.

GEORGE R.I.

WHEREAS by Section forty-three of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, it is provided that the importation of arms,

ammunition, gunpowder, or any other goods may be prohibited by Proclamation:

And whereas it is expedient that the importation into the United Kingdom of certain goods of a bulky character should be prohibited as hereinafter provided:

Now, THEREFORE, We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, in pursuance of the said Act and of all other powers enabling Us in that behalf, do hereby proclaim, direct and ordain as follows:—

As from and after the First day of March, 1916, subject as hereinafter provided, the importation into the United Kingdom of the following goods is hereby prohibited, viz.:—

All materials for the manufacture of paper, including wood pulp, esparto grass, and linen and cotton rags.

Paper and cardboard (including strawboard, pasteboard, millboard and wood pulp board) and manufactures of paper and cardboard.

All periodical publications exceeding 16 pages in length, imported otherwise than in single copies through the post.

Tobacco, unmanufactured and manufactured (including cigars and cigarettes).

Furniture woods, hard woods and veneers.

Stones and slates.

Provided always, and it is hereby declared, that nothing in this Proclamation shall apply to any goods of the descriptions specified which are imported under licence given by or on behalf of the Board of Trade, and subject to the provisions and conditions of such licence.

This Proclamation may be cited as the Prohibition of Import (Paper, Tobacco, Furniture Woods, and Stones) Proclamation, 1916.

Given at Our Court at *Buckingham Palace*, this Fifteenth day of February, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and sixteen, and in the Sixth year of Our Reign.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council dated the twenty-eighth day of November, nineteen hundred and fourteen, His Majesty was pleased to make Regulations (called the "Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914") under the Defence of the Realm Consolidation Act, 1914, for securing the public safety and the Defence of the Realm:

And whereas the said Act has been amended by the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) (No. 2) Act, 1915, and the Munitions of War Act, 1915:

And whereas the said Regulations have been amended by various subsequent Orders in Council:

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said Regulations in manner herein-after appearing:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendments be made in the said Regulations:

1. After Regulation 2A the following regulation shall be inserted:—

"2B. It shall be lawful for the Admiralty or Army Council or the Minister of Munitions to take possession of any war material, food, forage and stores of any description and of any articles required for or in connection with the production thereof."

2. For Regulation 7 the following regulation shall be substituted:—

"7. The Admiralty or Army Council or the Minister of Munitions may by order require the occupier of any factory or workshop in which arms, ammunition, food, forage, clothing, equipment or stores of any description or any articles required for the production thereof, are or may be manufactured or in which any operation or process

required in the production, alteration, renovation or repair thereof is or may be carried on, to place at their disposal the whole or any part of the output of the factory or workshop as may be specified in the order, and to deliver to them or to any person or persons named by them the output or such part thereof as aforesaid in such quantities and at such times as may be specified in the order: and the price to be paid for the output so requisitioned shall, in default of agreement, be determined by the arbitration of a judge of the High Court selected by the Lord Chief Justice of England in England, of a judge of the Court of Session selected by the Lord President of the Court of Session in Scotland, or of a judge of the High Court of Ireland selected by the Lord Chief Justice of Ireland in Ireland.

"In determining such price regard need not be had to the market price, but shall be had to the cost of production of the output so requisitioned and to the rate of profit usually earned in respect of the output of such factory or workshop before the war, and to any other circumstances of the case.

"If the occupier of the factory or workshop fails to comply with the order, or without the leave of the Admiralty or Army Council or the Minister of Munitions, delivers to any other person any part of the output of the factory or workshop to which the order relates, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations.

"For the purpose of ascertaining the amount of the output of any factory or workshop or any plant therein and the cost of production of such output, and the rate of profit usually earned in respect of the output of such factory or workshop before the war, the Admiralty or Army Council or the Minister of Munitions may require the occupier of any such factory or workshop, or any officer or servant of the occupier, or where the occupier is a company any director of the company, to furnish to the Admiralty or Army Council or the Minister of Munitions such particulars as to such output, cost, and rate of profit as they may direct, and may require any such particulars to be verified in such manner as they may direct, and if any such person fails to comply with any such requirement he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations."

3. At the end of paragraph (a) of Regulation 8A the following words shall be inserted:—

"and to require returns as to the nature and amount of work done in any factory or workshop."

At the end of the same Regulation the following paragraph shall be inserted:—

"Where under this regulation any return has been required or any directions regulating the priority to be given to work at any factory, workshop, or other premises, have been given, and any person in any such return or in any certificate or document given or issued for the purpose of securing priority for any work in pursuance of such directions makes any false statement or false representation, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations."

4. For Regulation 10A the following regulation shall be substituted:—

"10A. Where the competent naval or

military authority has control of or uses or occupies any dock premises or any part of any dock premises for naval or military purposes, he may by order prohibit any person from bringing into or having in his possession within the dock premises or any limited portion thereof, or on board any vessel therein, any intoxicating liquor, except for such purposes, and subject to such conditions, exceptions and restrictions as may be specified in the order, and if any person contravenes any provision of the order he shall be guilty of an offence under these regulations, and any person authorised by the competent naval or military authority, or any police constable, may search any person entering or within the premises to which the order applies, and may seize any intoxicating liquor found on him in contravention of the order."

5. At the end of Regulation 29A the following words shall be inserted:—

"nor shall this regulation apply to any persons or classes of persons who, as respects any particular factory, workshop or other place, may be exempted by order of the Admiralty or Army Council or the Minister of Munitions."

6. After the second paragraph of Regulation 40 the following paragraph shall be inserted:—

"If any member of the crew of a ship belonging to, or chartered, hired, or requisitioned by, the Admiralty or Army Council, without lawful authority gives, sells, procures or supplies, or offers to give, sell, procure or supply, any intoxicant, to or for any member of His Majesty's forces embarked as a passenger on board the ship, he shall be guilty of an offence against these regulations."

7. In paragraph (10) of Regulation 56 after the words "any power of the High Court" there shall be inserted the words "or any power of any court of summary jurisdiction."

8. For paragraph (14) of Regulation 56 the following paragraph shall be substituted:—

"(14) Where a person is alleged to be guilty of an offence against these regulations which appears to the Minister of Munitions to be a munitions offence as hereinafter defined, the case, instead of being referred to the competent naval or military authority, shall be referred to the Director of Public Prosecutions, the Lord Advocate, or the Attorney-General for Ireland, as the case may be, who shall investigate the case and determine whether or not the case is to be proceeded with, and if it is to be proceeded with, whether it is to be tried by a court of summary jurisdiction, or by a civil court with a jury, or, subject to the rights of the offender if a British subject under the Defence of the Realm (Amendment) Act, 1915, and to the consent of the Admiralty or Army Council, by court martial.

"For the purposes of this provision 'munitions offence' means an offence in contravention of any order made or any directions, regulations, or restrictions given or issued by the Minister of Munitions under these regulations, or an offence against these

regulations in respect of any matter within the scope of the powers and duties for the time being assigned to the Minister of Munitions, and the decision of the Minister of Munitions as to whether an alleged offence is a munitions offence shall be conclusive."

The last paragraph of Regulation 42 commencing with the words "This regulation so far as it relates" is hereby revoked.

And whereas it is expedient further to amend the said Regulations in manner herein-after appearing:—

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following amendment be made in the said Regulations:—

At the end of Regulation 2 the following paragraph shall be inserted:—

"Where by any Order of the Board the sale of intoxicating liquor in licensed premises in any area is restricted to a total of five-and-a-half hours a day, or less, the weekly half-holiday required to be given to the assistants employed in such premises under section 1 of the Shops Act, 1912, may begin not later than three instead of half past one o'clock in the afternoon, but this provision shall not apply to any licensed premises in which any assistant is employed for more than sixty-five hours in any week exclusive of meal times."

And whereas it appears to His Majesty that it is expedient for the purpose of the successful prosecution of the present War that the sale and supply of intoxicating liquor in the area defined and specified in the Schedule hereto should be controlled by the State on the grounds that war material is being made, loaded, unloaded, and dealt with in transit therein, and that men belonging to His Majesty's Naval and Military forces are assembled therein:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

The Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915, and any Regulations amending the same, shall be, and are, hereby applied to the area defined and specified in the Schedule hereto.

And whereas it appears to His Majesty that it is expedient for the purpose of the successful prosecution of the present War that the sale and supply of intoxicating liquor in the area thereby constituted and defined and specified in the Schedule hereto should be controlled by the State on the grounds that war material is being made, loaded, unloaded and dealt with in transit therein, and that men belonging to His Majesty's military forces are assembled therein:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

The Defence of the Realm (Liquor Control) Regulations, 1915, and any regulations amending the same shall be, and are, hereby applied to the area defined and specified in the Schedule hereto.

And whereas it has been made to appear to His Majesty that it is essential to the Defence and Protection of the Realm that, in the exercise of His Prerogatives as aforesaid, He should prohibit as from and after the First day of March, 1916, any British steamship registered in the United Kingdom exceeding 500 tons gross tonnage, except steamships engaged in the coasting trade of the United Kingdom, from proceeding on any voyage, unless the owner or charterer of such steamship has been granted a licence as hereinafter provided:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in exercise of His Prerogatives as aforesaid and of all other powers Him thereunto enabling, to order and it is hereby ordered that, from and after the First day of March, 1916, no British steamship registered in the United Kingdom exceeding 500 tons gross tonnage, except steamships engaged in the coasting trade of the United Kingdom, shall proceed on any voyage, unless a licence to do so has been granted to or in favour of the owner or charterer of such steamship by the Licensing Committee appointed by the President of the Board of Trade under the provisions of the aforesaid Order in Council of November 10th, 1915, which licence may be general in reference to classes of ships or their voyages or special.

And the President of the Board of Trade is to act and give instructions and directions accordingly.

Provided that, subject as aforesaid, where in Scotland the sheriff depute, or a sheriff substitute, as the case may be, is appointed a member of an Appeal Tribunal, he shall *ex officio* be Chairman of the Tribunal.

And whereas the said Act and Regulations have been amended by certain other Acts and Regulations, which Acts and Regulations have been extended to the Isle of Man by Orders in Council, dated the 27th day of May, 1915, the 28th day of July, 1915, the 14th day of September, 1915, and the 30th day of November, 1915, subject to the adaptations therein contained:

And whereas the said Regulations have been further amended by Order in Council dated the 30th day of November, 1915:

Now, therefore, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Regulations amending the Defence of the Realm (Consolidation) Regulations, 1914, issued by His Majesty by Order in Council dated the 30th day of November, 1915, shall extend to the Isle of Man with the exception of Regulation 14c.

"Whereas by Section 3 of the Naval and Marine Pay and Pensions Act, 1865, it is enacted, *inter alia*, that all pay, pensions, or other allowances in the nature thereof, payable in respect of services in Your Majesty's Naval or Marine Force to a person being or having been an Officer, Seaman, or Marine therein, shall be paid in such manner, and subject to such restrictions, conditions, and provisions, as are from time to time directed by Order in Council:

"And whereas by Order in Council of His

late Majesty, bearing date the 15th February, 1909, a Climate Allowance was granted for service in the Persian Gulf during the months of June, July, August, and September, at the following rates:—

3s. a day to each Commissioned Officer,

1s. a day to each Warrant Officer,

6d. a day to each of the rest of the Ship's Company:

"And whereas the discomforts inseparable from service in the vicinity of the Red Sea are certainly not less than those experienced in the Persian Gulf:

"We beg leave humbly to recommend that Your Majesty may be graciously pleased, by Your Order in Council, to sanction the payment of an Allowance at the same rates, and under the same conditions in regard to period of payment, in respect of service in Vessels continuously employed for more than 10 days in the Red Sea and Gulf of Aden (between the meridians of 33° and 50°) provided they are not merely passing through that area; payment to take effect from the 1st June, 1915, and to be made in respect of all Ranks and Ratings other than men of colour.

"The Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury have signified their concurrence in this proposal."

His Majesty, having taken the said Memorial into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve of what is therein proposed. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS by Section 17 of the Navy and Marines (Property of Deceased) Act, 1865, it is enacted that His Majesty in Council may, from time to time, make such Orders in Council as seem meet for the better execution of any of the purposes of the said Act:

And whereas by an Order in Council dated the 28th December, 1865, and made in pursuance of the said Act, certain provisions were ordered which it is desirable to amend as hereinafter provided:

Now, therefore, His Majesty, by virtue of the powers in this behalf by the said Act, or otherwise, in Him vested, is pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that Clause 33 of the Order in Council of the 28th December, 1865, shall be cancelled from the date of this Order, and in lieu thereof shall be substituted the following:—

"33. Any medal to which an Officer, Seaman, or Marine is entitled, but which is not issued at the time of his death, shall be disposed of as follows:—

"(1) When bequeathed by Will, the medal shall be sent to the Legatee.

"(2) When not bequeathed by Will, the medal shall be sent to the person standing nearest in the following order of relationship:—

1. Widow.
2. Eldest surviving son.
3. Eldest surviving daughter.
4. Father.
5. Mother.
6. Eldest surviving brother.
7. Eldest surviving sister.
8. Eldest surviving half-brother.
9. Eldest surviving half-sister.

"(3) When the medal cannot be disposed of as above, it may be sent to some other relative or interested party at the discretion of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty.

The same procedure shall be followed in the case of unissued decorations, except where specific direction as to their disposal is contained in the statutes or rules of the various Orders."

WHEREAS by Section 16 of the Pluralities Act, 1838, as amended by the Pluralities Act, 1850, it is, amongst other things, enacted, that whenever it shall appear to the Archbishop of the Province, with respect to his own Diocese, and whenever it shall be represented to him by the Bishop of any Diocese, or by the Bishops of any two Dioceses, that two or more Benefices, or that one or more Benefice or Benefices, and one or more Spiritual Sinecure Rectory or Rectories, Vicarage or Vicarages, in his or their Diocese or Dioceses, being either in the same Parish or contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population shall not exceed 1,500 persons, may, with advantage to the interests of religion, be united into one Benefice, the said Archbishop of the Province shall inquire into the circumstances of the case; and if on such Inquiry it shall appear to him that such Union may be usefully made, and will not be of inconvenient extent, and that the Patron or Patrons of the said Benefices, Sinecure Rectory or Rectories, Vicarage or Vicarages respectively, is or are consenting thereto; such Consent being signified in writing under the hands of such Patron or Patrons, the said Archbishop shall, 6 weeks before certifying such Inquiry and Consent to His Majesty as hereinafter directed, cause, with respect to his own Diocese, a Statement in Writing of the facts, and in other cases a copy in writing of the aforesaid Representation, to be affixed on or near the principal outer door of the Church, or in some public and conspicuous place in each of such Benefices, Sinecure Rectories, or Vicarages, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they may, within such 6 weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to the said Archbishop against such Union;

and if no sufficient cause be shown within such time, the said Archbishop shall certify the Inquiry and Consent aforesaid to His Majesty in Council; and thereupon it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council to make and issue an Order or Orders for uniting such Benefices, Sinecure Rectory or Rectories, Vicarage or Vicarages, into one Benefice, with Cure of Souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only":

And whereas the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Randall Thomas, Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, pursuant to the provisions of the said Acts, hath duly prepared, and laid before His Majesty in Council, a Certificate in writing bearing date the 11th day of December, 1915, in the words following:—

"We, Randall Thomas, Archbishop of the Province of Canterbury, Primate of all England and Metropolitan, do hereby certify to Your Majesty in Council:—

"That The Right Reverend Winfrid Oldfield, Lord Bishop of Truro, as Bishop of the Diocese within which are situate the Vicarage of St. Anthony in Meneage, and the Vicarage of Manaccan, both in the County of Cornwall, having represented unto us that the said Benefices, being contiguous to each other, and of which the aggregate population does not exceed 1,500 persons, might with advantage to the interests of Religion be united into one Benefice, we inquired into the circumstances of the case:

"That on such Inquiry it appeared to us that such Union might be usefully made, and would not be of inconvenient extent, and that The Right Honourable Stanley Owen, Baron Buckmaster of Cheddington, Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, being the Patron or person entitled to present to the Vicarage of St. Anthony in Meneage, and also to the Vicarage of Manaccan, has consented to the proposed Union:

"That 6 weeks and upwards before certifying such Inquiry and Consent to Your Majesty in Council we caused a copy in writing of the aforesaid Representation of the said Lord Bishop to be affixed to the principal outer door of the Parish Church of each of the said Benefices, with notice to any person or persons interested that he, she, or they might, within such 6 weeks, show cause in writing under his, her, or their hand or hands, to us, the said Archbishop, against such Union, and no such cause has been shown:

The Representation of the said Lord Bishop of Truro, our Inquiry into the circumstances of the case, the Statement of Circumstances in reply thereto, the Consent in writing of the said Patron, and the Copies of the Representation and Notices before-mentioned, are hereunto annexed:

"And we do hereby certify the Inquiry and Consent aforesaid to your Majesty in Council, to the intent that Your Majesty in Council may, in case Your Majesty in Council shall think fit so to do, make and issue an Order for uniting the said Benefices into one Benefice with Cure of Souls for ecclesiastical purposes only.

the Vicarage of Saint Anthony in Meneage, situate in the County of Cornwall, and Diocese of Truro, and the Vicarage of Manaccan, situate in the same County and Diocese, shall be united into one Benefice, with Cure of Souls, for ecclesiastical purposes only.

“Whereas the Right Reverend Herbert Louis, now Bishop of Newcastle, is desirous that certain improvements should be made at the said Episcopal House of Residence, and has submitted to us the particulars of such improvements, and we have approved the same:

“And whereas the said Bishop is also desirous, and it appears to us to be expedient, that towards the cost of effecting the said improvements a sum of £1,500 0s. 0d. (being a sum which, together with the amount of the outstanding balance of the sum already borrowed upon the same security under the authority of the statutes hereinbefore mentioned, does not exceed two years' income of the See) should be provided by the borrowing of the same sum by way of Mortgage upon the security of all and every part of the lands, tenements, and hereditaments, endowments or emoluments, which now belong, or may hereafter belong, to the Bishopric of Newcastle:

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the said Herbert Louis, Bishop of Newcastle (testified by his having affixed his signature and episcopal seal to this Scheme), we, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, humbly recommend and propose that the said Bishop be authorized to borrow from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and that the said Governors be empowered to lend, under the provisions of the above-mentioned Acts, any sum not exceeding £1,500 0s. 0d., and that as a security for the same the said Bishop do mortgage all and every part of the lands, tenements, and hereditaments, and endowments or emoluments, which now belong, or may hereafter belong, to his said See to the said Governors by Deed for the term of 25 years, or until the said sum, so to be borrowed as aforesaid, with the interest for the same as hereinafter mentioned, and all costs and charges which may attend the recovery thereof, shall be fully paid and satisfied, and that such principal sum shall be repaid with interest in the manner following, that is to say, during and in respect of the first period of twelve months of the said term, computed from the day of the date of the Mortgage, no part of the said principal sum shall be repayable, but the said Bishop or his Successors shall yearly, at the end of the second period of twelve months, so computed, and at the end of every such like period of twelve months thereafter, pay to the said Governors, their Successors or Assigns, one-twentieth part of the said principal sum until the whole thereof shall be repaid, and shall also, at the end of the first and each succeeding period of twelve

months, computed as aforesaid, pay interest at the rate of four pounds per cent. per annum on the said principal sum or on so much thereof as shall from time to time remain unpaid: And that if and when it shall happen that either the principal or the interest directed to be paid as hereinbefore mentioned shall be in arrear and unpaid for the space of 40 days after the same shall become due, it shall and may be lawful for the said Governors, their Successors and Assigns, to recover the same, and the costs and charges attending the recovery thereof, by distress and sale in the like manner as rents may be recovered by landlords or lessors from their tenants by the laws in force at the time of such distress and sale, and that such Mortgage Deed shall be in the form and to the effect to be approved by us, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and shall bind as well the said Herbert Louis, now Bishop of the said Diocese of Newcastle, as every succeeding Bishop of the same Diocese, until the principal money and interest, costs and charges, shall have been paid off and discharged.

“Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a District Chapelry should be assigned to each of the said Churches of Saint Andrew, Kettering, and Saint Mary the Virgin, Kettering, situate as aforesaid:

“Now, therefore, with the consent of the Honourable and Right Reverend Edward Carr, Bishop of Peterborough, (testified by his having signed and sealed this Representation), We, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient, *first*, that all that part of the said Parish of Kettering which is described in the First Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured *green*, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of Saint Andrew, Kettering, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Kettering,’ and, *secondly*, that all that part of the said Parish of Kettering which is described in the Second Schedule hereunder written, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth upon the said map or plan, and is thereon coloured *pink*, should be assigned as a District Chapelry to the said Church of Saint Mary the Virgin, Kettering, situate as aforesaid, and that the same should be named ‘The District Chapelry of Saint Mary, Kettering.’

“And with the like consent of the said Edward Carr, Bishop of Peterborough, (testified as aforesaid), We, the said Ecclesiastical Commissioners, further represent that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at each of the said Churches of Saint Andrew, Kettering, and Saint Mary the Virgin, Kettering, situate as aforesaid, and that the fees to be received in respect of the publication of such banns, and of the solemnization or performance of the said offices, should be paid and belong to the respective Ministers of the same Churches for the time being; Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall be construed as expressing any intention on the part of us, the said Commissioners, to concur in or approve the taking of any fee for the performance of the

said office of baptism, or for the registration thereof.

“We, therefore, humbly pray that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into Your Royal Consideration, and to make such Order with respect thereto as to Your Majesty, in Your Royal Wisdom, shall seem meet.”

“THE FIRST SCHEDULE.

“The District Chapelry of Saint Andrew, Kettering, being:—

Parish of Warkton, upon the north by the Parish of Weekley, both in the said County and Diocese, and upon the remaining sides, that is to say, upon the west and upon the south, by an imaginary line commencing upon the boundary which divides the said Parish of Weekley from the said Parish of Kettering at the northern corner of the close numbered 325 upon the Ordnance Map of the Civil Parish of Kettering, published in the year 1900, upon the scale of 25 inches to a mile, and also upon the map or plan which is annexed to this Representation, and extending thence south-westward along the fence forming the north-western boundary of the said close for a distance of $2\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the point where it crosses the middle of Peg Brook, and extending thence southward along the middle of Peg Brook for a distance of 33 chains or thereabouts to the centre of the culvert which carries Avondale Road across the said Brook, and extending thence north-westward along the middle of Avondale Road for a distance of 4 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Bath Road, and extending thence, first south-westward, and then southward, along the middle of Bath Road for a distance of 28 chains or thereabouts to its junction with Montagu Street, and extending thence south-westward along the middle of Montagu Street for a distance of $3\frac{1}{4}$ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Thorngate Street, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Thorngate Street for a distance of $13\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Mill Road, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Mill Road for a distance of 4 yards or thereabouts to its junction with Gordon Street, and extending thence south-eastward along the middle of Gordon Street for a distance of $10\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to its junction with the road called Saint Peter's Avenue, and extending thence north-eastward along the middle of Saint Peter's Avenue for a distance of $7\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to its junction with Linden Road, and extending thence southward along the middle of Linden Road for a distance of $1\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the fence which divides such road from the close numbered 151 upon the said maps, and extending thence north-eastward along the said fence, and along the fences which divide the said close numbered 151 and the close numbered 156 upon the said maps from the close numbered 152 upon the same maps, for a distance in all of $14\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the south-eastern corner of the last mentioned close, and extending thence in a straight line due east for a distance of $20\frac{1}{2}$ chains or thereabouts to the boundary which divides the said Parish of Kettering from the said Parish of Warkton."

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the 8th and 9th years of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, Chapter 70, of the Act of the 14th and 15th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 97, and of the Act of the 19th and 20th years of Her said late Majesty, Chapter 55, have prepared, and now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council, the following Representation as to the assignment of a Consolidated Chapelry to the Consecrated Church of Saint Aidan, Shobnall, situate within the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint John, Horninglow, in the County of Stafford, and in the Diocese of Lichfield:

"Whereas at certain extremities of the said New Parish of Saint John, Horninglow, of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Christ Church, Burton upon Trent, and of the New Parish (sometime District Chapelry) of Saint Saviour, Branstone, both in the said County and Diocese, which said extremities lie contiguous one to another, and are described in the Schedule hereunder written, there is collected together a population which is situate at a distance from the several Churches of such New Parishes:

"And whereas it appears to us to be expedient that certain contiguous portions (being the portions containing the population aforesaid) of the said New Parish of Saint John, Horninglow, of the said New Parish of Christ Church, Burton upon Trent, and of the said New Parish of Saint Saviour, Branstone, should be formed into a Consolidated Chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, and that the same should be assigned to the said Church of Saint Aidan, Shobnall, situate as aforesaid:

And whereas it is provided by Section 2 of the Customs (Exportation Restriction) Act, 1914, that any Proclamation made under Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, may, whether the Proclamation was made before or after the passing of the Act now in recital, be varied or added to, whilst a state of war exists, by an Order made by the Lords of the Council on the recommendation of the Board of Trade:

And whereas by a Proclamation, dated the 28th day of July, 1915, and made under Section 8 of the Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1879, and Section 1 of the Exportation of Arms Act, 1900, and Section 1 of the Customs (Exportation Prohibition) Act, 1914, the exportation from the United Kingdom of certain articles to certain or all destinations was prohibited:

And whereas by subsequent Orders of Council the said Proclamation was amended and added to in certain particulars:

And whereas there was this day read at the Board a recommendation from the Board of Trade to the following effect:—

That the Proclamation, dated the 28th day

of July, 1915, as amended and added to by subsequent Orders of Council, should be further amended by making the following amendments in and additions to the same:—

(1) That the exportation of the following goods should be prohibited to all destinations:—

Carbon electrodes for electric furnaces;
Petroleum coke.

(2) That the heading "Capsicum and oleo-resin of capsicum" in the list of goods the exportation of which is prohibited to all destinations should be deleted, and there be substituted therefor the heading "Oleo-resin of capsicum."

(3) That the heading "Bladders, casings and sausage skins," in the list of goods the exportation of which is prohibited to all destinations abroad other than British Possessions and Protectorates should be deleted, and there be substituted therefor the heading "Bladders, guts, casings and sausage skins."

(4) That the heading "Bones for manure, dissolved bones, bone flour, bone meal and bone ash," in the list of goods the exportation of which is prohibited to all destinations abroad other than British Possessions and Protectorates should be deleted, and there be substituted therefor the heading "Bones, in any form, whole or crushed (including dissolved bones, bone flour and bone meal), and bone ash."

(5) That the heading "Capsicum and peppers" should be included in the list of goods the exportation of which is prohibited to all destinations abroad other than British Possessions and Protectorates.

(6) That the heading "Lead, pig, sheet or pipe (including solder containing lead)" in the list of goods the exportation of which is prohibited to all destinations abroad other than British Possessions and Protectorates should be deleted, and there be substituted therefor the heading "Lead, pig, sheet, pipe or scrap (including solder containing lead)."

(7) That the heading "Pepper" in the list of goods the exportation of which is prohibited to all foreign countries in Europe and on the Mediterranean and Black Seas, other than France, Russia (except through Baltic ports), Italy, Spain and Portugal, should be deleted.

(8) That the exportation of the following goods should be prohibited to all foreign countries in Europe and on the Mediterranean and Black Seas, other than France, Russia (except through Baltic ports), Italy, Spain and Portugal:—

Arrack;
Casein;

Cork and cork dust, not including floor coverings manufactured partly of cork dust.

Now, Therefore, Their Lordships, having taken the said recommendation into consideration, are pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the same be approved.

ORDER OF THE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES.

(DATED 11TH FEBRUARY 1916.)

SOMERSET (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1916.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Movement into, out of, or within Scheduled District.

1.—(1.) No cattle, sheep, goats or swine shall be moved into or out of the District described in the Schedule to this Order, hereinafter referred to as the Scheduled District, or be moved along, over, or across, or be allowed by the owner or person in charge thereof to stray upon a highway or thoroughfare within the Scheduled District; provided that nothing in this Order shall be deemed to apply to the movement of animals into or out of the Scheduled District where they are moved through such District by railway from a place outside such District to another place outside such District without unnecessary delay and without the animals being untrucked within such District except for the purposes of feeding or watering the animals within the railway station premises where such untrucking takes place.

(2.) If any farm (except any detached part) is partly within and partly without the Scheduled District, the whole shall be deemed to be within the Scheduled District.

Power to restrict Movement of Persons in Certain Cases.

2.—(1.) An Inspector of the Local Authority acting under their direction may serve a notice on the occupier of any field, shed, or other place in the Scheduled District, prohibiting the

entry of any person into any such field, shed, or other place, and thereupon, notwithstanding the existence of any footpath or right of way, no person shall enter the field, shed, or other place to which the notice relates while any cattle, sheep, goats or swine are therein, otherwise than in accordance with the following regulations, that is to say:—

(i.) The owner of the field, shed, or other place, or of the animals therein, or the agent or servants of such owner, may enter such field, shed, or other place so far as may be necessary for the feeding or tending of the animals.

(ii.) Any other person may enter such field, shed, or other place with a licence of an Inspector of the Local Authority or of the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries.

(2.) Copies of such notice shall be affixed or exhibited by the Inspector in such manner as he shall think desirable for ensuring notification of the restrictions thereby imposed.

(3.) A copy of every such notice shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, Whitehall Place, London, S.W.

Power to restrict Movement of Dogs and Poultry in Certain Cases.

3.—(1.) An Inspector of the Board, or of the Local Authority acting under their direction, may, for the purpose of preventing the spread of Foot-and-Mouth Disease, by a notice served on the occupier of any premises in the Scheduled District, require him:—

- (a) to keep in confinement, or under control, as may be prescribed by the notice, dogs on such premises;
- or (b) to confine live poultry on such premises in a pen or other like enclosure;
- or (c) to prevent the access of live poultry to any specific part of the premises to which cattle, sheep, goats, or swine have, or recently have had, access;

and if any occupier after service of any such notice shall fail to comply with the requirements thereof, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) An Inspector of the Board, or of the Local Authority acting under their direction, may, for the purpose of preventing the spread of Foot-and-Mouth Disease, by notice affixed or exhibited by the Inspector in such manner as he shall think desirable for ensuring notification of the restrictions thereby imposed, require dogs to be kept by the person in charge thereof under control while passing along any road or footpath specified in such notice, and if any person in charge of a dog while passing along any road or footpath to which any such notice relates fails to keep the dog under control, he shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(3.) Every notice served on an occupier of premises shall remain in operation until it is withdrawn by a further notice served by an Inspector of the Board or of the Local Authority.

(4.) A copy of every notice served by an Inspector of the Local Authority under this Article shall forthwith be sent by the Inspector to the Secretary, Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, Whitehall Place, London, S.W.

Local Authority to Enforce Order.

4. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Offences.

5.—(1.) If an animal is moved in contravention of this Order, the owner of the animal, and the person for the time being in charge thereof, and the person causing, directing, or permitting the movement, and the person moving or conveying the animal, and the consignee or other person receiving or keeping it, knowing it to have been moved in contravention as aforesaid, and the occupier of the place from which the animal is moved shall, each according to and in respect of his own acts and defaults, be deemed guilty of an offence against Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

(2.) If any person enters any field, shed, or other place in contravention of this Order, or of a notice served thereunder, such person shall be deemed guilty of an offence against the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

Short Title.

6. This Order may be cited as the SOMERSET (FOOT-AND-MOUTH DISEASE) ORDER OF 1916.

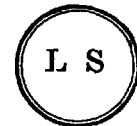

DEVONSHIRE (EPIZOOTIC ABORTION)
ORDER OF 1916.

The Board of Agriculture and Fisheries, by virtue and in exercise of the powers vested in them under the Diseases of Animals Acts, 1894 to 1914, and of every other power enabling them in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

Limitation of Scope of Order.

1. This Order shall not apply to a premature calving resulting from accident or some other definite cause other than epizootic abortion.

Notice of Premature Calving and Isolation pending Inquiry.

2.—(1.) Every person having in his possession or under his charge a cow which has calved prematurely shall with all practical speed give notice of the fact to a constable of the police force for the police area in which the cow is.

(2.) The constable receiving such notice shall forthwith give information of the receipt by him of the notice to an Inspector of the Local Authority, who shall forthwith report the same to the Local Authority.

(3.) The cow and its calf (if any) shall be kept separate by the owner or person in charge thereof from any bull or cow (other than a calf) pending the inquiry by the Local Authority as to the existence of epizootic abortion.

(4.) The membranes, discharges and other matter liable to cause infection, and the calf, if born dead, shall be destroyed by the owner or person in charge of the cow as soon as possible by burning or burial in lime at a depth of not less than three feet, but not until such samples as are required for the purpose of the prescribed veterinary inquiry have been taken by the officer employed by the Local Authority to carry out such inquiry. Such matter shall, as far as practicable, be removed from contact with cows by the owner or person in charge of the cow.

Inquiry by Local Authority as to existence of Epizootic Abortion.

3.—(1.) The Local Authority on receiving information of a premature calving shall forthwith cause inquiry to be instituted, with the assistance and advice of a Veterinary Inspector or of a veterinary practitioner qualified according to the Act of 1894 to be a Veterinary Inspector, to ascertain whether it was caused by epizootic abortion.

(2.) The owner and occupier of any premises on which there is a cow which has calved prematurely shall give all reasonable facilities for the inquiry by the Local Authority under this Article.

Isolation of Diseased Animals by Notice served by Inspector of Local Authority.

4.—(1.) The Local Authority, unless satisfied by an inquiry under the preceding Article that the premature calving was not caused by epizootic abortion, shall forthwith cause a Notice (in the Form set forth in the First Schedule to this Order or to the like effect) to be served by an Inspector of the Local Authority on the owner or person in charge of the cow affected requiring that the cow and its calf (if any) be detained on or in a field, yard, shed, or other place specified in the Notice, and after the service of such Notice it shall not be lawful for any person, until the expiration of two calendar months from the date of the calving, or the previous withdrawal of the Notice by an Inspector of the Local Authority—

- (i.) to move the cow or its calf, or permit either to stray, from or out of such field, yard, shed, or other place, except as hereinafter provided;
- (ii.) to permit the cow or its calf to come in contact with any bull or cow (other than a calf); or
- (iii.) to remove from or out of such field, yard, shed, or other place any dung, fodder, litter, or other thing that has been in contact with the cow, without the written permission of an Inspector of the Local Authority.

(2.) An Inspector of the Local Authority, if satisfied that the movement of a cow or its calf to which a Notice applies to some other place of detention is expedient for purposes of isolation or other necessary purpose, may by Licence authorise such movement, and the cow or its calf may thereupon be so moved, subject to the directions of the Inspector, by the nearest available route and without unnecessary delay, to such place of detention, and thereupon the Notice shall have effect as if such place of detention were therein specified.

(3.) A cow or its calf detained under a Notice under this Order may be moved from or out of the place of detention specified in the Notice to a slaughterhouse, if accompanied by a Movement Licence authorising such movement granted by an Inspector of the Local Authority of the District in which the premises are situate from which the cow or calf is to be moved. On arrival at the slaughterhouse the cow or calf shall be there detained until it is slaughtered.

(4.) Every Licence granted under this Article shall be delivered up at, or sent by post to, the nearest police station in the same District by the person in charge of the cow or calf at the time of completing the movement authorised by the Licence.

(5.) An Inspector shall with all practicable speed send copies of any Notice or Licence issued by him under this Article to the Local Authority, and to the police officer in charge of the nearest police station of the District. Where the place of destination is in another District the Inspector shall also send a copy of the Licence to the Local Authority of that District.

(6.) A calf placed with a cow shall, for the purpose of this Article, be treated as its calf.

Provision in case of Second Case of Premature Calving.

5. Where a premature calving of a cow takes place on any farm or premises on which a cow has aborted from epizootic abortion within three calendar months, the Local Authority may cause a Notice in respect of the subsequent premature calving to be served under the preceding Article without the necessity of the veterinary inquiry hereinbefore prescribed, unless at or immediately after their receipt of the information of premature calving they are furnished by the owner or person in charge of the cow with a veterinary certificate to the effect that the premature calving was not caused by epizootic abortion.

Disinfection of Animals in cases of Premature Calving.

6. The owner or person in charge of a cow which has calved prematurely, or of the calf, or of any other calf placed with the cow, shall, every day for one week after such premature calving, and at such time or times thereafter as an Inspector of the Local Authority may direct, cleanse and disinfect such internal and external parts of the cow as have been in contact with infectious membranes, discharges, or other matter, and cleanse and disinfect the calf, and shall, as far as practicable, give such notice to an Inspector of the Local Authority of the time and place of the intended cleansing as will enable the Inspector to superintend the cleansing and disinfection.

Cleansing and Disinfection of Premises and other Precautions.

7.—(1.) The occupier of any premises on which there is a cow required by this Order to be kept separate from other animals shall take such steps as may be necessary to prevent its dung or urine coming in contact with any other cow, and shall from time to time, as occasion may require, or as an Inspector of the Local Authority may direct, cleanse and disinfect the part of the premises used for the cow in manner following:—

- (i.) The part of the premises shall be thoroughly soaked or drenched with a four per cent. (minimum) solution of carbolic acid (containing not less than ninety-five per cent. of actual carbolic acid); then
- (ii.) The part of the premises shall, if the nature thereof so permit, be scraped and, where necessary, swept, and the scrapings and sweepings and all dung, sawdust, litter, and other matter shall be effectually removed therefrom; then
- (iii.) The part of the premises shall be thoroughly washed or scrubbed or scoured with water, and then be thoroughly coated or washed with—
 - (a) a one per cent. (minimum) solution of chloride of lime containing not less than thirty per cent. of available chlorine; or
 - (b) a four per cent. (minimum) solution of carbolic acid (containing not less than ninety-five per cent. of actual carbolic acid), followed by a thorough sprinkling with linewash; or
 - (c) a disinfectant equal in disinfective efficiency to the above-mentioned solution of carbolic acid, followed by a thorough sprinkling with limewash.

(2.) The scrapings and sweepings, and the dung, sawdust, litter, and other matter removed under this Article shall forthwith be burnt or well mixed with quicklime and be effectually removed from contact with cows.

Granting of Movement Licences.

8. A Movement Licence granted under this Order shall not be available if granted by the owner of the cow or calf to be moved, or by his agent, or by the consignee of the cow or calf, or by the occupier of the farm or premises or slaughterhouse from or to which the cow or calf is to be moved, or by any individual member of an Executive Committee or Sub-Committee of a Local Authority.

Withdrawal of Notices of Isolation.

9. A Notice of Isolation may be withdrawn by a Notice to that effect signed by an Inspector of the Local Authority acting under the direction of the Local Authority, served on the owner or person in charge of the cow.

Extension of certain Sections of Diseases of Animals Act, 1894.

10. Epizootic abortion of cows shall be a disease for the purposes of this Order and of the following sections of the Act of 1894 (namely):—

Section forty-three (*Police*);

Section forty-four (*General Administrative Provisions*);

and also for the purposes of all other sections of the said Act containing provisions relative to or consequent on the provisions of those sections and this Order, including such sections as relate to offences and legal proceedings.

Interpretation.

11. In this Order, unless the context otherwise requires—

“The Board” means the Board of Agriculture and Fisheries;

“The Act of 1894” means the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894;

“Inspector” includes Veterinary Inspector;

“Cow” includes heifer.

Other terms have the same meaning as in the Act of 1894.

Local Authority to enforce Order.

12. The provisions of this Order shall be executed and enforced by the Local Authority.

Extent.

13. This Order extends to the Districts of the Local Authorities of the county of Devon, the city and county borough of Exeter, and the borough of Torquay.

Revocation.

14. The Orders described in the Second Schedule hereto are hereby revoked.

Commencement.

15. This Order shall come into operation on the twenty-fourth day of February, nineteen hundred and sixteen.

Short Title.

16. This Order may be cited as the DEVONSHIRE (EPIZOOTIC ABORTION) ORDER OF 1916.
