Rome, January 23.

THe Cardinal de Fourbin had on Sunday last a long Audience of the Pope, on the subject of the Proposals of Peace that have been lately made by the French King. On Monday was held a private Consistory, where several Bishops were preconised. Orders are sent to Civita-Vecchia to hasten out the Popes Gallies, which are to return to the Levant, with 1000 Land Soldiers, for the assistance of the Venetians. The Prince de Fumdi is shortly expected here with the Character of Ambassador Extraordinary from the Emperor. The Cardinal de Barberini designs to go hence on Monday or Tuesday next to his Government of Romania.

Genoa, January 27. The Five Gallies of the Duke of Turis's Squadron having repaired the damage they received in their Voyage hither from Barcelona, will part from hence the beginning of the next week for Naples, to fetch Recruits for the Spanish Troops in the Milanese. An Envoy is arrived here from the Governor of Milan to adjust the Contributions demanded of this République for the subsistence of the Emperor's Forces in Italy.

Venice, Febr. 5. There will be sent with the next Convoy, which lies ready to sail with the first fair Wind, to the Levant 1500 Soldiers, and a considerable Sum of Money, with great quantities of Ammunition and Provisions; Other Reinforcements are speedily to follow; and it seems to be the Resolution of the Senate to put the Doge into a condition to undertake some great Enterprize the next Summer. The Advices from Turkey say, that the Enemy designs to act Defensively this year against the Venetians and the Polanders, and to turn the streis of the War towards Hungary.

Warsaw, Jan. 16. The Count de Martinitz, who was coming hither in the Quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor to assist at the Dyet appointed to meet here the last Month, having received notice in his Journey of its being broke up, stopt at Breslaw in Silesia, and still continues there to know his Imperial Majesties Pleasure, whether he shall proceed or return to Vienna. The

thoughts there seem'd to be of calling another Dyet this Spring, are now wholly laid aside, as well because the State of the Kings Health (though 'tis much better at present then it has lately been) will not yet permit his removal from Zolkiew, as for other Considerations; But to supply as far as may be, what is wanting by this unhappy breaking up of the Dyet, for the Defence of the Kingdom, a great Council is going to be held at Zolkiew, to which all the Senators and other great Men are summoned in order to take such Resolutions as are necessary in the present Conjunction. We have advice from Moldavia, that the Tartars have drawn together 10 or 12000 Men, with a design to Conduct a great Convoy of Provisions to Caminiec, and after that to make Incursions into Podolia and other Frontier Provinces of this Kingdom; upon which the Crown General has ordered several Troops to march to observe the Enemies motions.

Vienna, Febr. 6. The Lettets from Peter Waradin of the 21th past inform us, that a Party of that Garison had been as far as Cupina near the Save, where they defeated a Turkish Party, and took several Prisoners. The Fortifications of that place, and of Eszecs, are almost brought to perfection.

Frankfurt, Febr. 14. They write from Zurichke of the 30th past, that the Lord Viscount Galway was arrived there in his way to Piedmont. 'Tis said that the Bishop of Munster will send a Body of his Troops to serve with the other Confederate Forces on the Rhine the next Campaigne.

Plymouth, Febr. 16. The 14th Instant came in from Milford Their Majesties Ships the Prince of Orange and Quaker Ketch, and under Their Convoy from thence the Williams of and for London, John Salmon Master, with Fruit from Seville; The John of and for London, John Hutchinson Master, from St. Sebastians, and 6 Vessels laden with Butter, &c. from Ireland. The same day the Mary Frigate sailed from hence to the Westward with the St. John Baptist of London bound for the Barbadoes. Yesterday passed by this Port to the Westward Rear-Admiral Mitchell with Their Majesties Ships under his Command; and the Success Sloop, William Rett Commander, arrived here from Virginia. This day came in from Milford the Adventure with 4 or 5 Colliers; as also the Newcastle from the Eastward; The Spanish-Merchant from Topsham; The Elizabeth of and for London with Wine and Oranges from O-Porto; The St. Nicholas of Stockton, and the Queen of Sudden, the two last from London.

Portsmouth, Febr. 18. Yesterday sailed from St. Helens Their Majesties Ships the Boyne, Deptford, and Mary Galley, with divers outward bound Merchant Ships.
